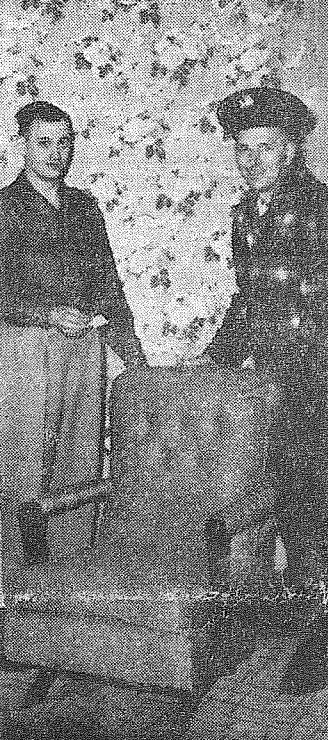

### Spanaway Ponders Water District

A community meeting will be held Monday, March 14, at the Spanaway school to discuss the formation of a legal water district in the Spanaway area.

"Many inquiries have been received for water service in areas a little too far away from lines to enable us to reach them through our present co-operative plan of financing line extension," said Hugh Gonyea, president of the present Spanaway Water Co.

"While our growth has been steady, it has been slow, and the company has not been able to give the community as much service as we would have liked. The co-operative plan enabled us to prove that a public water company was feasible in Spanaway and would definitely enhance property values. This has been shown by the demand for lots served by water and the new homes built along the present water mains. Some residents have suggested the formation of a public water system either through forming a water district or incorporating Spanaway into a town. If either of the plans should be completed, a plan will be instituted to re-buy the present Spanaway Water Co. membership shares. Next year the Water Company

will be faced with a county tax of nearly \$12 per member. A large public water system would be exempt from this tax." There are 1,200 glaciers in the Swiss Alps.

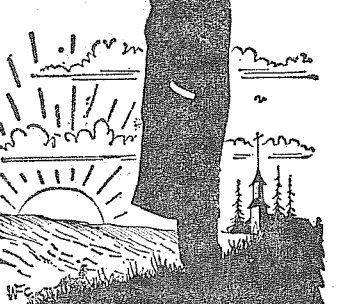

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**National FFA Week Feb. 20-27**

Celebration of FFA Week, Feb. 20 to 27, seeks primarily to focus attention on the Future Farmers of today, who will be the successful farmers of tomorrow.

This nation must have a constant supply of NEW farmers every year to replace those who die, retire, or otherwise leave the farm. These must be men with experience and training, for the successful farmer today is both a scientist and a businessman; mechanic and a laborer, at the same time capable of leadership in the affairs of the community. Generally, they must be men who have begun farming at an early age, so that by the time they are ready to marry and start a family they will be firmly established in a farming program that promises a good future.

Vocational Agriculture and the FFA constitute the most effective program yet developed for training boys to be good farmers and helping them to become established in the farming occupations of their choice.

In view of the nation's need for NEW farmers, it is fitting that recognition be given these young men who are preparing for careers in farming. Encouragement at this time will do much to stimulate them to harder work and greater

achievement.  
The national FFA organization, launched at Kansas City, Mo., in 1928, was the start of many years of development of vocational agriculture student organizations in the States and local communities. The FFA now has 380,000 active members in 9,000 local chapters located in farming areas throughout the 50 States and Puerto Rico.  
A basic requirement for membership in the FFA is that a boy must be a student of vocational agriculture in high school, although he is permitted to retain his membership for three years following graduation.  
Well organized FFA groups in the Franklin Pierce and Bethel High Schools are training nearly 200 young men in modern scientific methods of agriculture and farm management. Well trained teachers and good equipment make the courses of great value to those looking forward to successful futures in farming.

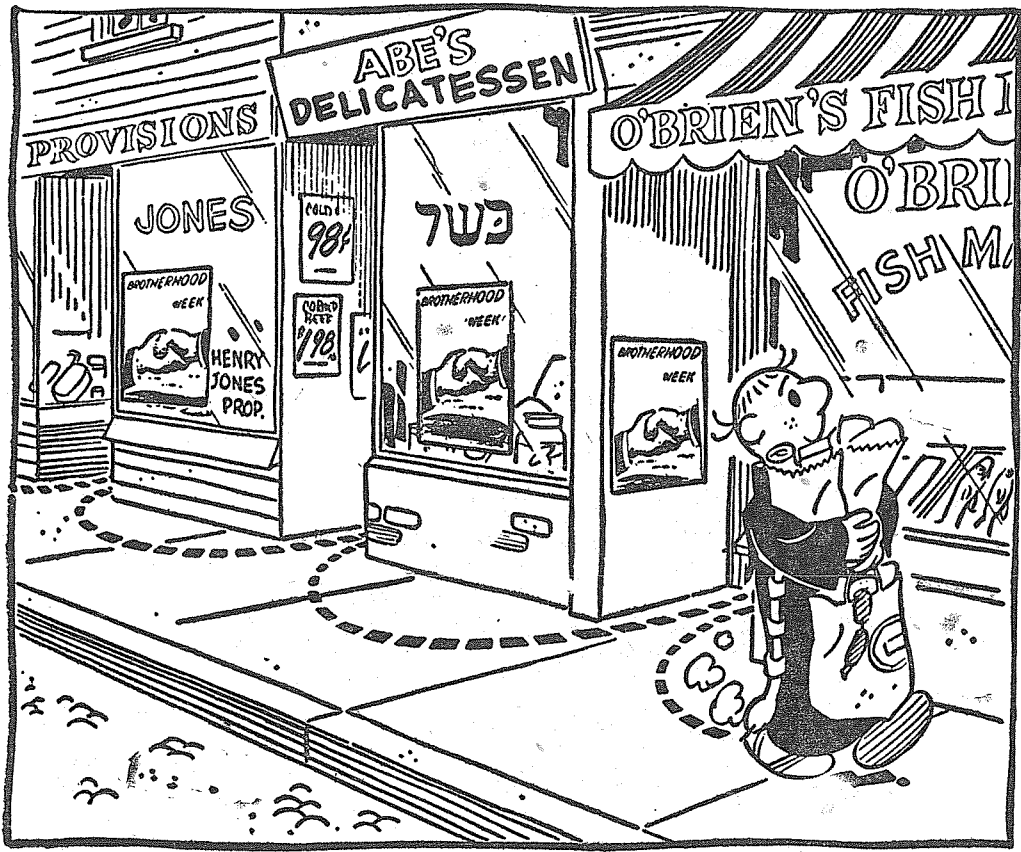

**County Agent's Corner**

Building a successful grassland dairy herd operation on a sandy and gravelly Spanaway soil is the achievement of Louis Balmer and son Bob of Graham.

Their development from a herd of 28 cows to the present 70 cows has been during a period generally unkind to all, including established dairy farmers on fertile farms.

In addition to their industry and general good management the Balmers have been quick to adopt all new information available through research or services of the USDA. In the beginning in 1952, these facilities helped the Balmers develop a farm plan for irrigated pastures to be maintained with an adequate fertilizer program.

The barren acres responded with a show of blossoming Ladino Clover and a crowd of waving Orchard Grass blades. The situation changed from a two months grazing season for the 28 cow herd to six months each year of lush green pastures for the present large herd.

Balmers are continuing on their search for new information and ideas for efficient operation. Their most recent find of information was concerned with the movement of ground water in their Spanaway soils. This information has cut in half their work of moving irrigation pipes.

Last summer two graduate students from the WSU soils department, making a ground water study in Pierce county, used the Balmer farm for investigation. As a result of observing test holes and water action in the Spanaway formation they concluded the upper layers of finer soil would hold twice as much water as was being applied. Balmers increased their irrigation rate from two to four inches and cut their number of irrigations in half. This meant covering their pasture every twenty four days instead of every twelve.

Louis Balmer says those students were right because their pastures responded and gave steadier growth under the new watering schedule.

The water study showed that the rocky layer under the finer material acts as a barrier with no water penetrating this area until the upper layer of finer material is completely saturated.

The Balmers continue to be alert to adopt new information and practices. This attitude helps them continue to qualify as producers in an increasingly competitive agricultural economy.

Antibiotics Control White Pine Blister Rust

A new development, Actidione, used in the control of White Pine Blister Rust has proven 80 per cent effective. This rust disease of Western White Pine has previously been beyond direct control. Trees stricken with the disease were invariably doomed.

The Western White Pine tree has commonly been planted by Pierce county owners as an ornamental. It has beautiful blue-green foliage with needles grouped in clusters of five. Unfortunately, many of the trees were killed before they reached a desirable ornamental size.

Plant pathologist, Virgil Moss, states that last year the U. S. Forest Service used Actidione in treating over four million White Pine trees in forest areas. Moss, who is with the U. S. Forest Service Island Empire Research Center in Spokane, states that with Actidione the life blood of White Pines is guarded in the

same way as the life blood of human beings — with Antibiotics. Actidione is related to an Antibiotic used by humans for medicinal purposes.

Fryer producers are doing their part to stop the unfavorable foreign trade balance of our country. That may sound odd but here's the story:

Fryer producers need to be very efficient if they are going to realize a profit from their poultry business. The extreme competition in the business has forced some to quit. Those remaining are very, very efficient.

Even using price-supported grains U.S. fryer growers are producing fryers at a lower cost than other countries. The price of our poultry is well below the world market.

That's one of the reasons U.S. exports of poultry meat have more than doubled in 1959 — from 51 million pounds in 1958 to around 120 million pounds. And that's not all — they're expected to double again, according to USDA estimates.

This export business has taken about 120 million pounds of poultry off overburdened markets in this country. Nearly all of this has been sold — not given away.

This presents quite a contrast to most American products which have priced themselves beyond the reach of foreign markets. To help achieve this favorable position in world trade many fryer producers have been unable to compete. It's interesting to speculate though whether in the long run we are not better off by being in a position to compete with other countries. Many personal sacrifices have been made to achieve the amazing results exhibited by the growers. I wonder if a little of this philosophy would be good for other segments of our economy.

SPRAY NOW! — PEACH CURL! I am expecting far fewer calls this spring and summer because I run on to so many people lately who tell me they have just sprayed their peach trees for curl.

Now I want to remind those who haven't sprayed to do so right away, quick like, provided the trees are dry and you have decided it isn't going to rain within the next 24 hours.

To control peach leaf curl, the spray must be applied before the buds swell or expand — as that is when the infection takes place.

The easiest material to use is Puritized Agricultural spray — just add 3 ozs. to 5 gallons of water — the resulting solution does not require continuous agitation.

Other materials that do just as good a job are Phygion XL and Fermanate.

Remember time is the important factor — apply now — and in any event not later than February 15th.

**a-Wondering . . . and a-Wandering . . .**

With **JACK BROWN**  
"At present more bunk is being peddled to the public concerning food than on any other subject."  
That forthright charge came from a man who should know — Wallace F. Janssen of the U. S. Food and Drug Administration. He made it in a talk before members of the American Dietetic Association.  
He said: "Modern nutrition education needs to acquire a new dimension — emphasizing the ability to question and to recognize and reject what is false and unscientific. Teachers need to keep up-to-date on the latest dietary nonsense; to teach regarding what is not true, or is merely speculation, as well as what is true." He then dealt specifically with certain dangerous representations of foods as medical cures, such as carrot juice for leukemia, apple cider vinegar as a general cure-all, garlic pills for high and low blood pressure, lecithin for coronary disease, powdered grapefruit for diabetes, Vitamin E for muscular dystrophy, and royal bee jelly for sexual rejuvenation and as a cosmetic.  
The vast majority of people, of all ages, need a balanced diet — the kind of diet that is obtained from the standard foods offered in every grocery. Above all, a substantial proportion of protein in the diet is essential to both physical and mental health — the kind of protein that is found in its most palatable form in good, honest meat.  
There is, of course, a small minority of people who require special diets because of disease and deficiencies. But no such diet should ever be adopted except on the advice of a physician.  
No grocer or butcher prompted this article. It's just a little horse sense added to cold facts.  
Life would be much simpler if we didn't try to make people think we're what we're not.

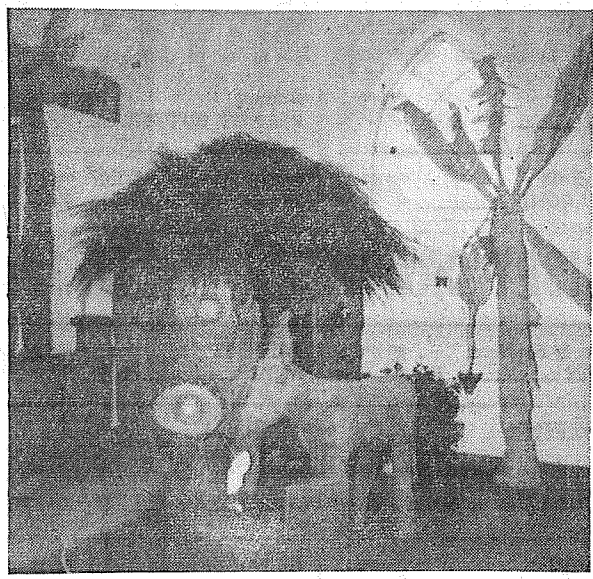

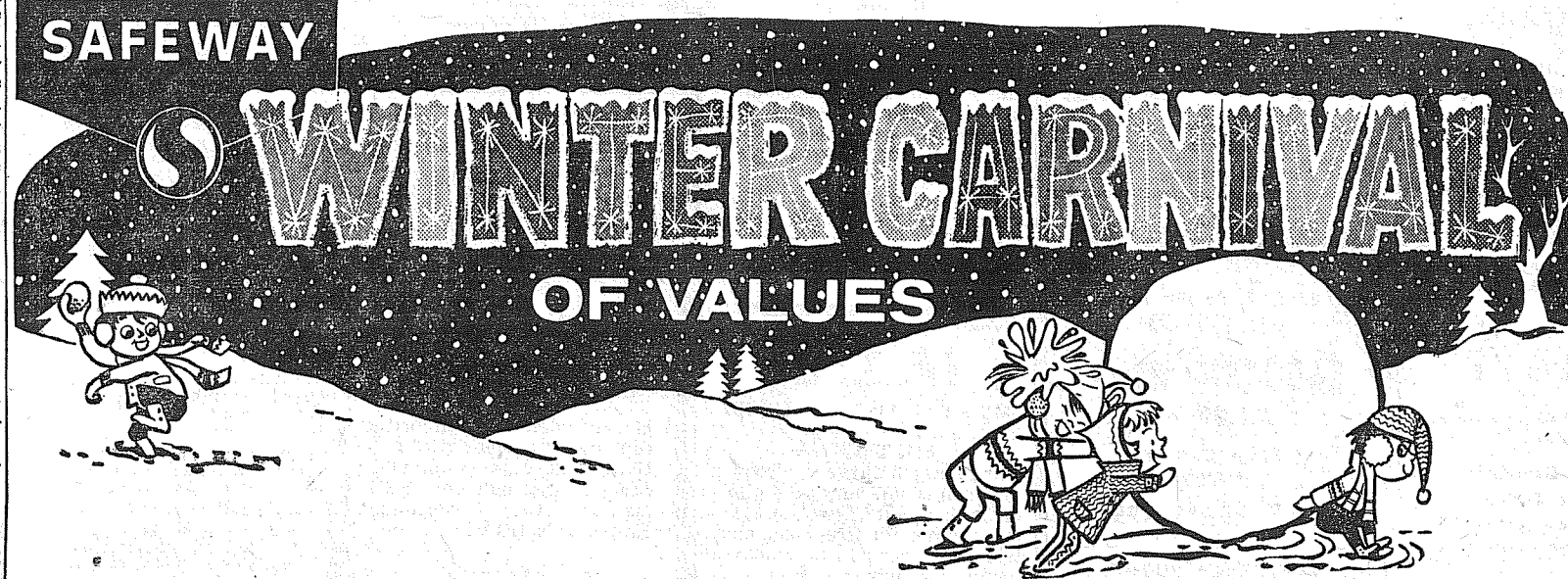

**Letter to the editor**

Dear Editor:  
I would like to call your attention to a very interesting article in the Cardinal by Mr. Whitesel, principal of the Franklin Pierce High School.

He says "Students need to devote more time to studies." Only 155 students received a grade of B or better, or 12 per cent of the student body was on the honor roll.

What is wrong with our expensive education that our students are doing so poorly?

I made a very interesting observation about my children's school years. And so I discussed this with friends — in Lewis county and Tacoma and, naturally, in Parkland.

We looked back over our children's report cards and we found our children did better work—were happier—had a real liking for their teachers and were much better disciplined in grade school than when they entered junior high.

So we asked ourselves why? We came to the conclusion it was the school itself. Not one of our children had attended these newley styled schools!

Our Parkland grade school is far from being an elaborately designed school. It does not have any elaborate landscaping either. But our boys and girls learned.

As soon as our children left grade school and went into Junior High—and it is a newly designed Junior High school Too—they lost

interest in studies and became more interested in social activities and clubs, again, why?

I very firmly believe the style schools that are being built is affecting our boys' and girls desire to study and learn.

They do not associate this type of elaborate building with the institution of learning.

Covered walk ways—what good are they? They certainly do not protect the students—I know, I've been through them and froze in the process of going from one building to another. I still cannot see why an elaborate court yard is needed to make our boys and girls study. I think Mr. Whitesel's comment has proved that.

I am far from being against schools—we do need them but why in heaven's name can't we have sensible buildings?

A school with the gyms and lunchrooms located in the basement, with the classrooms divided on two stories is certainly not out of the question. Our climate is not suited for buildings that belong in the south. There is nothing wrong with each room having an inside door to wide halls and an outside door for more protection.

We have much better materials to build our classrooms with so this excuse that two-story buildings aren't safe goes to show that our school officials have no faith in what is being taught our would-be scientists.

Our hospitals are built with two and sometimes six floors. They house sick, helpless people for months at a time—so why should healthy students be less safe in a two-story building when they are there for only a few hours a day?

I have heard teachers criticized for not doing their jobs—some do earn that criticism—but I feel sorry for them having to try to teach social minded boys and girls who are just satisfied to loiter around in a cafe society type atmosphere.

My husband and I are plain mad and disgusted with having to pay taxes on our home to support the type of schools built simply because politics are taking over.

We're fed up to the gills too on having to pay taxes to support schools so non-taxpayers can send their children there to receive an education at our expense.

There is a school election next month and Mr. Whitesel has made it very clear — something is wrong somewhere.

These are my views on the subject and I'll stick with them.

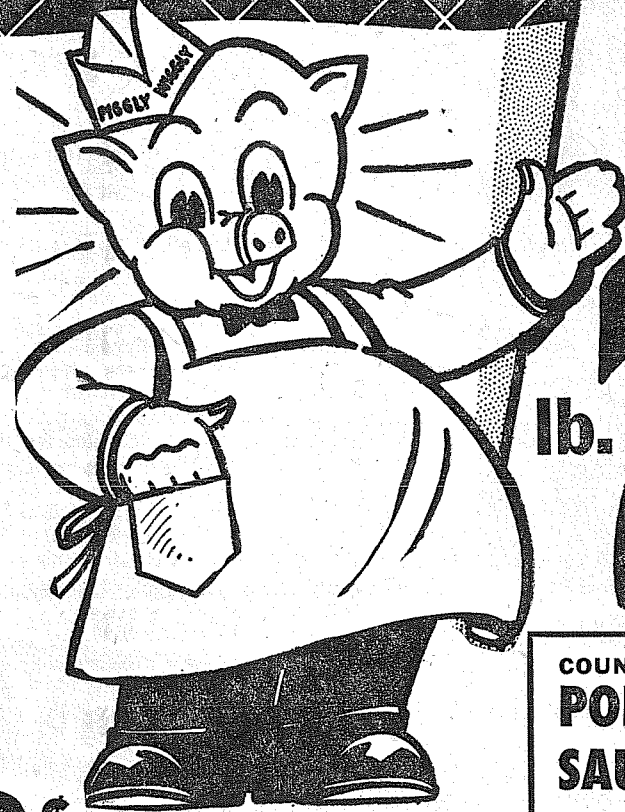

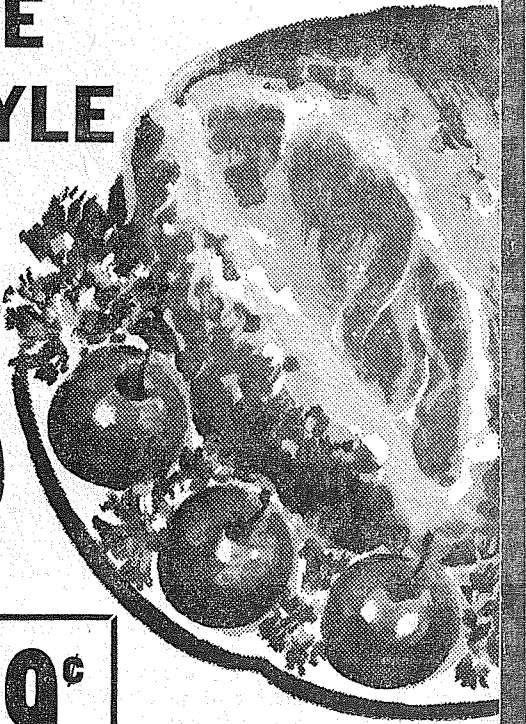
