## Local Company Stresses Quality

### So. End Firm Manufactures Radiant-Aire

"Radiant-Air" is a name rapidly becoming a household word to thousands of families throughout the Pacific Northwest.

Manufactured by the wholesale firm of Inter City Manufacturing, the product is distributed to retail outlets from the Canadian border to Portland.

Mr. and Mrs. John James, three-year Parkland residents, own Inter City Manufacturing, having purchased it from a Seattle firm. The James formerly did business in Fife, but moved out here three years ago when they realized the great business potential in the South End area.

The greatest feature of the Radiant-Air process is economy. A home completely installed with Radiant-Air will utilize six or seven units at a total cost of from \$600 to 700.

Another key feature is styling. No bulky heaters are needed when Radiant-Air is used. The units blend in smoothly with the wall of the house, and are safe as well as attractive. The outside never gets very hot, thus curtains can be placed extremely near them without danger of fire.

The process of manufacturing the heaters is indeed simple. The heating elements are placed inside copper tubing which is inserted through a long series of fins. The fins generate the heat, making the air hot and thus causing it to rise. When this happens, air moves across the room to make up for it, thus distributing the heat evenly throughout the whole room.

Temperature is controlled by a wall thermostat which is accurate to within one degree.

Apartment houses and schools use Radiant-Air extensively, remarked Mrs. James, as they, too, find it the best way to solve their heating problems.

Anyone wishing to order the decorations may call Larry home of Mrs. David Preston Thursday, Nov. 16.

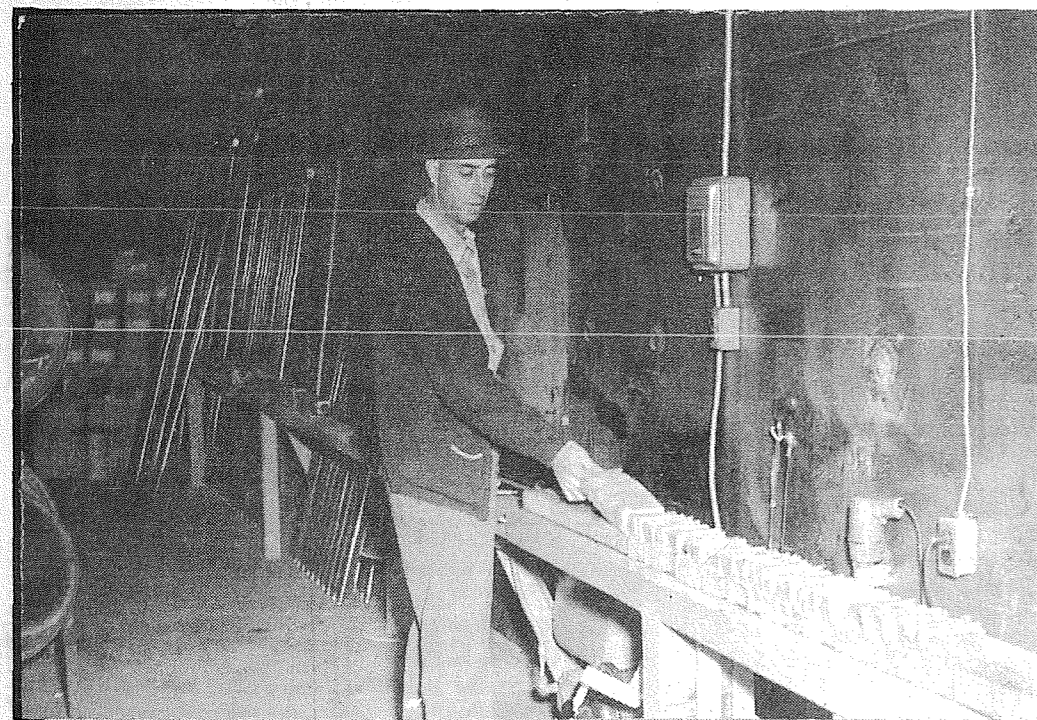

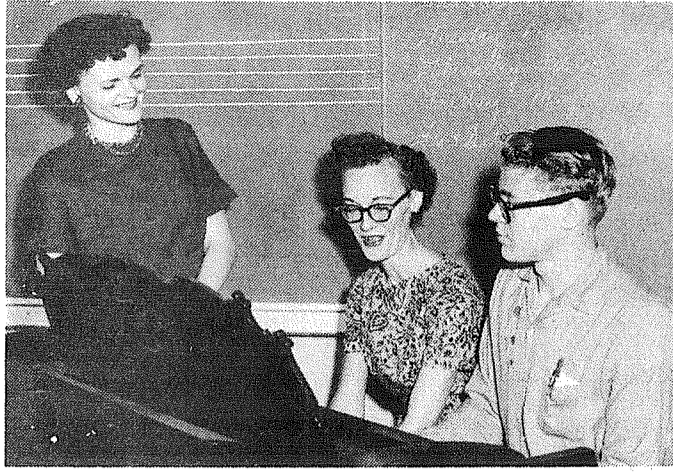

## How to Form a 4 H Club

Are you seeing your children wander aimlessly when you know there must be something that would catch their interest and channel that energy? If so, George Purcell, county Extension Agent, believes you may have a perfect setup for 4-H Club work.

He offers the following ingredients for success:

Take 6 or 8 children about 10 years old. Pick a project you can teach that is written for their age. Some examples are gardening, electricity, cooking, sewing, or livestock.

Plan with them to meet once every week or two, usually after school at their homes.

Plan to teach something definite at each meeting. Give them a chance to keep their record books up to date - to put in what they have done at home

and at the meeting. Give them a chance to do some teaching too by demonstrating to the other club members.

Give them a chance to learn quality and standards by judging what they make or do.

Help them set individual and club goals such as making something to exhibit at the fair, planning a club tour, learning a new method and sharing with others. Remember that fun is important too. Games are in order after the new ideas have been explained, the new methods learned or demonstrated. And there is the county 4-H camp next summer. Your club will surely want to attend as a group.

Encourage greater interest in the community and doing things for others. Service can add a new dimension to 4-H work. It can be as simple as caroling for shut-ins on Christmas or as complicated as landscaping a community building.

When the club year ends, you as their teacher-leader should be able to look up on those 6 or 8 members as more adequate individuals because of some real learning rather than all aimless play. They will have enough enthusiasm to keep going another year and take more than one challenging project. You will have more confidence to do more technical teaching.

Right now, your first step is to call or write the Agricultural Extension Service. The telephone number is FU 3-3311, Ext. 511. The office is located on the 7th floor of the County-City Building in Tacoma.

Fall is tree planting time in our western Washington woodlands. This year the state of Washington Forest Nursery, located a few miles south of Olympia, again has a large selection of forest trees for woodland owners.

Steve Harvey, Dept. of Natural Resources Farm Forester at Puyallup, has provided us with the following information:

- Two year old seedling species available are Douglas Fir, Ponderosa Pine, Western White Pine, Scotch Pine, Austrian Pine, Lodgepole Pine, Shasta Red

Fir, Pacific Silver Fir, and Norway Spruce. These trees are available at \$9.20 per 1000 seedlings.

- Three year old seedlings available are Douglas Fir (Rocky Mt. form) Ponderosa Pine and Lodgepole Pine at \$14.00 per 1000.
- Three year old (2-1) transplants available are Douglas Fir, Norway Spruce and Pacific Silver Fir, at \$24.00 per 1000.
- Rabbit repellent will cost from 40¢ to \$3.00 per 1000 trees, depending on tree size.
- This year smaller quantities, 25 tree lots and 100 tree lots are available. The cost is greater than at the 1000 lot basis however. Costs are available.

Farm forester Steve Harvey also reminds us that cost sharing is available for tree planting un-

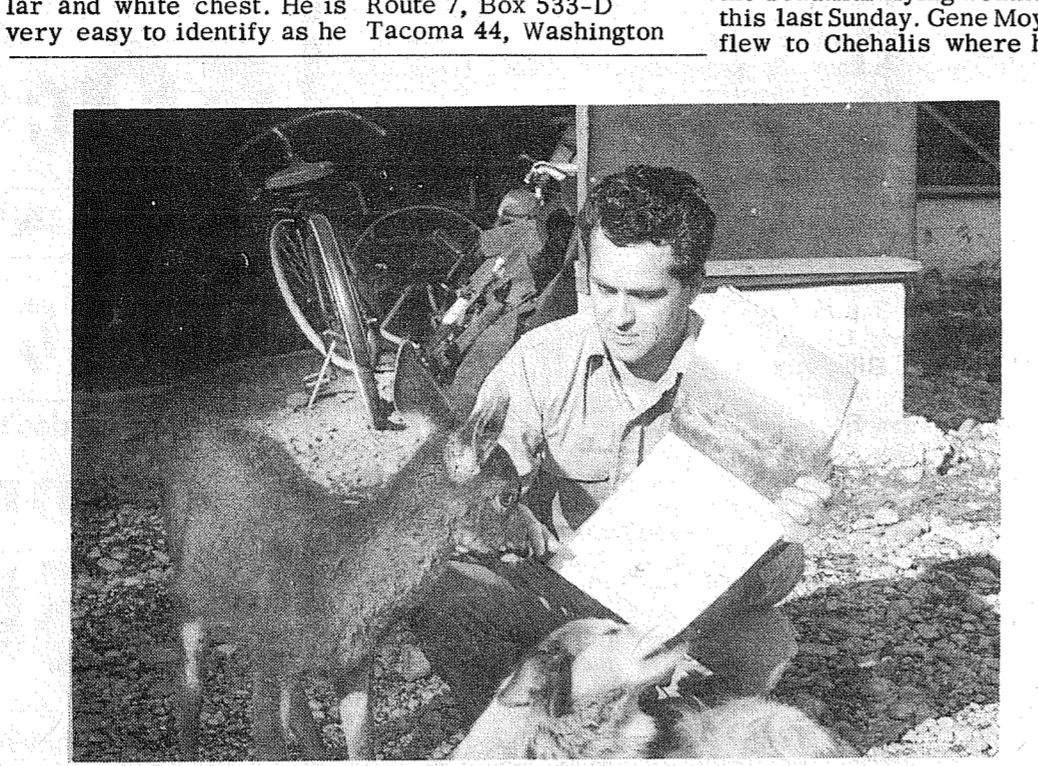

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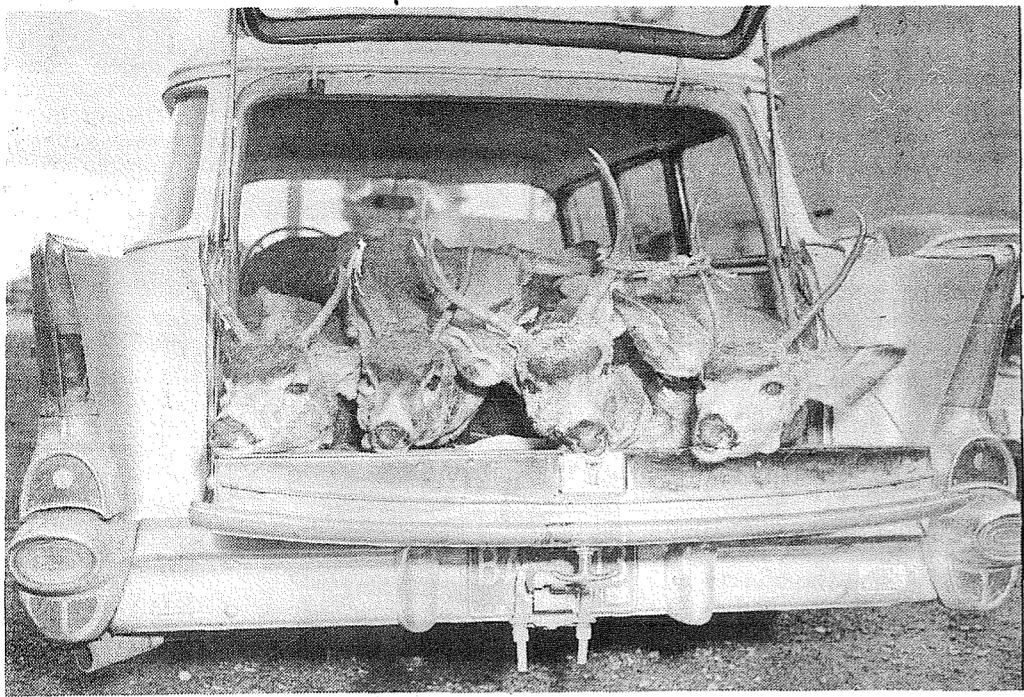
