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SEWER BOND ISSUE ON NOV. BALLOT

Additional Four Rooms Open Soon At Collins

A \$62,600, four-room addition to Collins Elementary School is expected to open in about a week to relieve the classes now meeting in makeshift quarters in the old gym, Edwin L. Nelson, Franklin Pierce superintendent, said this week.

The addition, one of four under construction in the District as a result of a bond issue passed by voters last spring, will be the second to be put into operation this fall. Brookdale Elementary School is already using its four new classrooms though final finishing work and installation of completed heating and plumbing facilities is still being done.

Classroom additions at both James Sales Elementary School and Harvard Elementary School are only now in the preliminary construction state. A completion date for these two additions can not yet be determined, Nelson said. The James Sales two-room addition will relieve some of the crowding which this year has resulted in two classes being put together in one room because regular classroom space is not available. The sixth grade at Harvard is now meeting at Midland Elementary School because they do not have sufficient classroom space at Harvard. The new addition there will provide three new classrooms.

The total cost of the four additions will be approximately \$228,000, of which only about 38% is covered by local funds. State matching funds pay the remainder of the cost, according to Orin Fjeran, Franklin Pierce business manager. The 13 new classrooms are in addition to the two portable classrooms erected last spring, one each at James Sales and

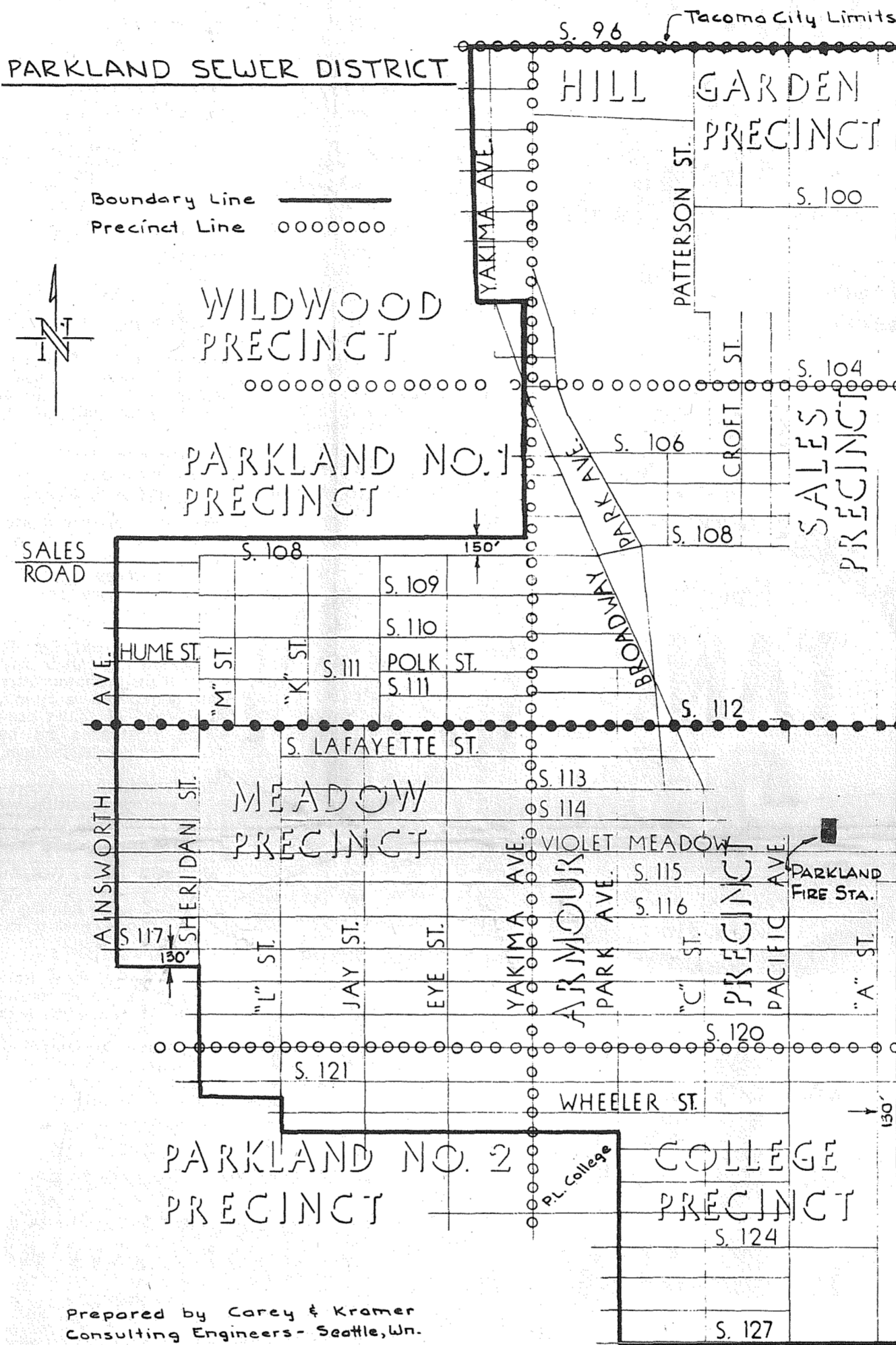

Voters Asked To Approve \$3.4 Million Revenue Bonds For Parkland

All registered voters within the boundaries of the Parkland Sewer District (see map) will vote November 6 at the general election on the latest bond issue proposed by the District Commissioners.

The proposition on the ballot is for the approval for the District to issue sewer revenue bonds in the amount of \$3,400,000 for the purpose of constructing sanitary sewers, a

trunk line and treatment plant to serve the district. The bonds will be 20-and 30-year instruments to be paid from the revenues of the district.

The Parkland Sewer District was formed at an election held on January 7, 1954. At that time voters voted for the district but voted down a millage to provide funds for the preliminary expenses of planning the service.

The proposed bonds will not add anything to the general tax rolls, it was pointed out by Lawrence Armstrong, chairman of the Board of Commissioners. The bonds, if authorized, will be paid out of the revenues of the system, if it is constructed.

This year, the Commissioners received authorization for \$250,000 in federal funds to help in the construction of the treatment plant. This money must be put into the system within a year after it was authorized, according to the Commissioners.

Tentative plans indicate that the treatment plant will probably be built in conjunction with the Town of Steilacoom.

The election in November is not the final step in getting sewers for the district, according to Armstrong. Property owners affected will have to approve the formation of Local Improvement Districts before any dirt can be moved.

The election does not authorize the district to collect any money, since the property owners must give the final approval for the spending of the bond issue, if it is approved.

The Parkland Sewer District serves an area which is bounded approximately by 96th, 127th, Ainsworth and A Streets. The population of the area is about 7,000.

Preliminary plans call for collection system in the area, a 36-inch gravity trunk line to the bay near Steilacoom City and a treatment plant there.

A citizens committee of those interested in sewers for Parkland will meet September 25th at 8 p.m. in the Parkland Light and Water building on Garfield Street.

Rev. A. W. Ramstad, elected Chairman of the committee at a previous meeting held August 28th at the same location, will preside. Dr. Charles O. Evans was elected as co-chairman.

The chief item on the agenda will be to find ways and means to inform those in the sewer district about the coming sewer election to be held November 6th.

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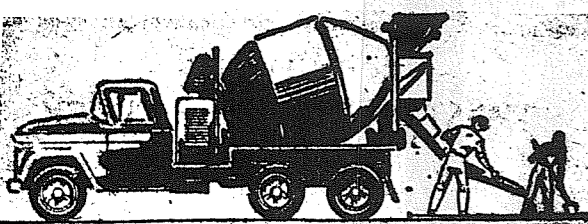

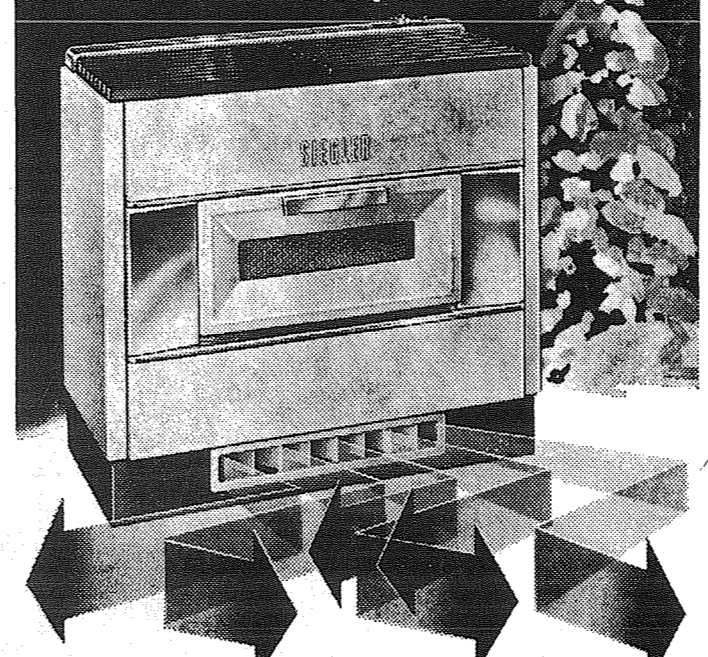

Your Growing Garden

Nature is constantly building soil, which only goes to show it can be done. The difference between us is that Nature can take the time but we can't. Then, too, we want to use more variety in our planting, and we prefer the horticulturally developed plants that need more nourishment and the best of soil conditions. Negligence in preparing soil properly and any skimping on nourishment for our plants brings its own penalties of weeds, disease, insects and labor. Fortunately the basic principles of good soil preparation and management are easy to learn and accomplish. Most plants have similar basic needs. Once these are understood it is a simple matter to learn the horticulture variances.

True, some homes seem to be built on a rock pile. In this case the only thing possible is to get as much peat or other humus soil heavy enough to have holding qualities in as large quantity as you can. Add as much as you can get of fresh sawdust and manure. Mix them together with a tiller then plant a legume cover crop that can be tilled under in the spring.

This is the time of year to use fresh manure in and on the garden but only in two ways. Fresh manure should never be used in the soil for any planting except a cover crop, although composted manure may be used any time. The second way to use fresh manure is in a manner we call "sheet composting" and is best done this time of year. It is put on after fall cleaning up and conditioning is done for the winter. First a mulch is put on, and left on top of the ground. The best home garden mulches are sawdust, 4 inches deep, or 6-8 inches depth of leaves. If the last grass clippings of the season are used, they should be mixed in with the other mulch rather than be themselves. After the mulch is on, then the fresh manure is put on top as a top dressing to be left until next spring.

A lot has been said about compost. How such a good thing can have so many misconceptions about it is amazing. Real compost is alive and vital and should be used within 6 months after it is begun. After that it begins to rapidly lose its value. Later on we'll do a column on short cuts and tips to making compost. Right now we'll just include compost as an essential factor for soil

preparation. Another material that has been getting a lot of scientific research is "roughage" tilled into the soil. Chaff from crops such as soy, oats, rye, etc., are found to have different effects on various crops. This is sometimes called biodynamic soil care. The home gardener, however, can use sawdust, and grass clippings for roughage. Sawdust for gardening is a subject in itself, too, but in the meantime don't be afraid to use fresh sawdust for it is a perfect roughage as well as mulch. This gives us two points of a triangle.

1. Compost. 2. Roughage. The third point is fertilizer. Puget Sound climate is so varied in the winter that no nitrogen should be used during fall and winter months. Nitrogen stimulates growth, along with the warm spells we have in the winter here, growth would endanger the plant when the inevitable cold snap comes along. Natural raw rock minerals such as phosphorus, potash especially, should be generously used. Limestone is inexpensive but should be used only when a soil test indicates a need for it. It is better to use dolomite for calcium for it contains magnesium which is also needed by the plants. No calcium should be used on rhododendrons or azaleas unless the soil is

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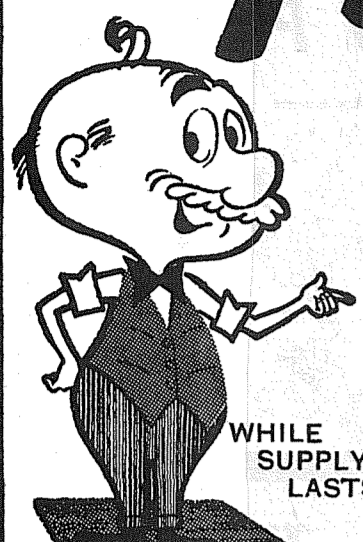

And taxes are the usual theme, which I wonder about a lot because I am plain mad and I get angrier when I see how far my husband's paycheck goes and the things we would like to do to help

ourselves but can't. Everyone knows about urban renewal. The original purpose as I understand it was to clean out slums which, for intelligent people to believe is idiotic. We have always had, and will continue to have a certain class of people who are parasites. So you clean out one area of slums, these people move elsewhere and up the same standards, and we have people who relish making a living off of these people by supplying such places to live in. Now, these people's property taxes are low--yet they have a right to enjoy all the services supplied by people who are penalized by higher taxes based on assessments because they care about the type of places they live in and make an effort to keep them up.

Sometime ago an ad appeared in the News Tribune advocating home improvements with the idea of "have what you want without raising taxes." 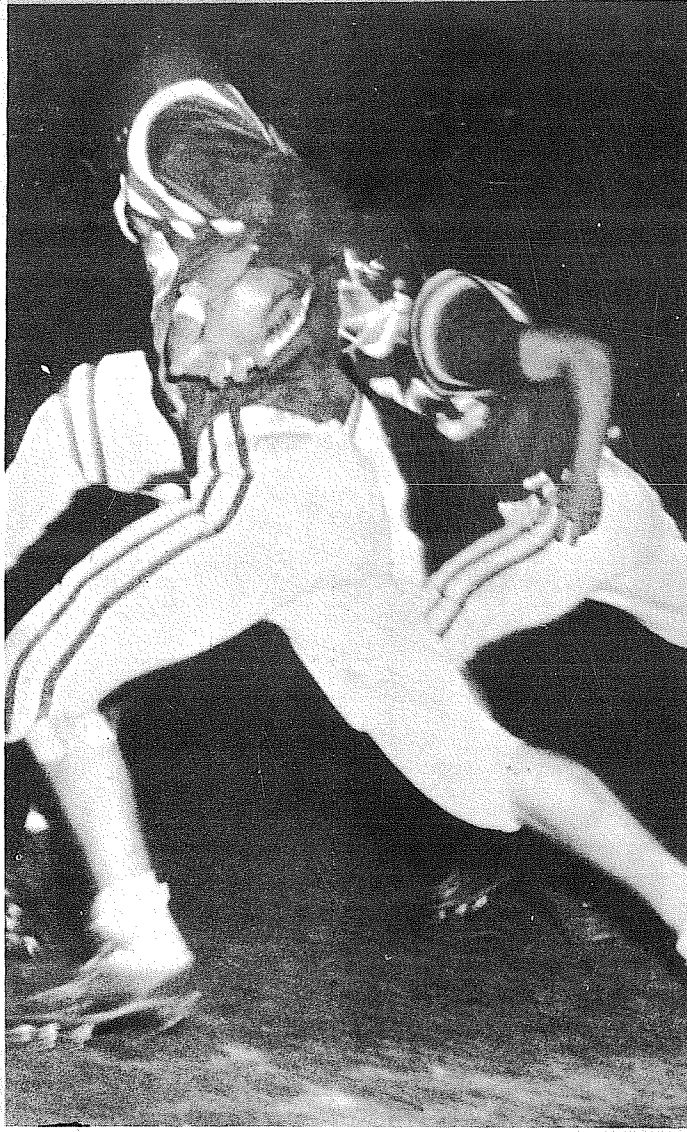

completely overbalanced. Most often this natural rock phosphate can be used in a heavier application. If dolomite (never limestone) it should be used very sparingly. This is the best time of the year to use liquid seaweed and kelp meal for trace elements and for their tendency to slow down top growth while encouraging healthy roots. Seaweed has often been found to somewhat repel rodents, too. Next week we'll talk about planning the garden for easy care, and soil pH the acid, alkaline plants requirements. Then the following week we'll be ready to discuss transplanting.

Stall Housing Booklet Out For Dairymen
Dairymen in Pierce county and the state have available a new publication on the construction of stall type housing, according to Jack Crawford, County Extension Agent. This publication was given out for the first time on the Dairy Building Tour held recently for Pierce county dairymen.
Many dairymen in the state have changed to loose stall housing since the first unit was built in 1960. They find loose stalls save up to 75% on bedding, fewer under injuries, make cows easier to handle, reduce space needed per cow, and require less labor to keep the loafing area clean.
Several versions of the loose stall housing are now in use in Pierce county. The new Washington State University publication discusses the different types of buildings and stall arrangements along with management in loose stall housing.
Diagrams of stall space and arrangements are provided along with detailed dimensions of partitions.
Among the authors is Willard Winters, Extension Dairy Specialist, stationed at the Western Washington Experiment Station in Puyallup.
Copies of the loose stall housing bulletin are available at the County Agents office in the County-City Building.
