> The family is tucked in bed, the kitty out for the night, and the stove is giving out an occasional crackle as the fire dies down. As I sit here at the kitchen table mulling over what I can say to you, my thoughts go back to my first remembrance of "P.T.A.". I recall a vow made as fourth grader . . . "when I grow up I'm going to go to the P.T.A. meetings!" Sure, that's from a child's point of view in trying to be one of the gang, an understandable desire. But then I recall a vow made a year ago . . . "well, alright, I'll go—but **I'm** not going to get involved!" ... and promptly became "involved". But in so doing, I have discovered that becoming "involved" is not what I though the word implied.

> We are "involved" from the moment our first child is born. Involved in the early anzieties that only a firstborn brings. Later, after we become accustomed to the diaper, formula, walking-the-floor routine, we begin to look outward to the influences surrounding our child. Soon we are "involved" all over again . . . the choice of playmates, his choice of "choice" words, our choice of discipline . . . and so the pattern grows. It is unending and never ceasing, for we are "involved" with our children.

An as we bring our child to the schoolhouse door, others become directly involved. Men and women trained in their profession will be moulding this little mind, influencing and guiding, building upon the foundation which we have laid in his first five years. Outside influences will make heroines . . . but will they be directing him in the way

And, like it or not, I realize we're already involved with our future grandchildren. For the kind of father our son is to be depends upon what he sees and hears and practices today, not twenty years from today. Likewise, the kind of school, community and nation to which those grandchildren fall heir depends upon the groundwork laid today. Twenty years passes all too fast, legislative wheels

Yet even those thoughts used to leave me cold when the word "P.T.A." was used. I instinctively turned away.
