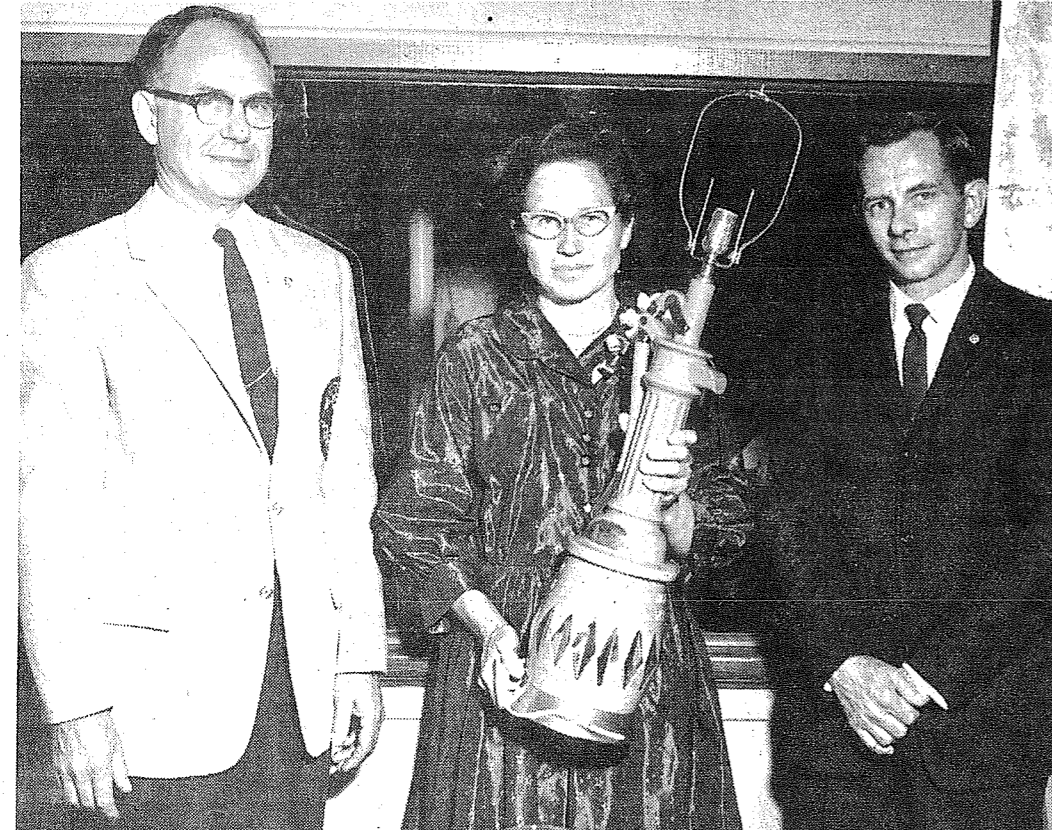

## Let Me Tell One: Postal Rate Raise

In attempting to publish a newspaper, one runs across many things which surprise, confuse, irritate and even enrage. Today I'm hovering between irritation and rage, but I hope (for my family's sake) that neither prevails and the calm will descend again. I can't figure out the Federal government, from any angle. This is supposed to be the best representative government in the world and yet things are done which seem to be government by whim, or at least, which seem to give credence to the facetious jokes which say "We'll give them what WE want" when quoting congressmen about their constituents. A number of things in the past few weeks have been touted as being in the "best interest" of the country. One of them is the investigation now going on in the legislative committees concerning the raising of postal rates. The Federal government is caught in the same squeeze as was England and in which U.S. industry will be caught if modernization of plants and machinery are not effected as a matter of policy instead of as a tax deduction. The postal system was taken over by the government as the logical thing to do, Government could, at the time, finance the system and for a time was intent on improving the system so as to give the best possible service for the least cost.



Neil McLean. Now, apparently, the business men recruited into the government are looking at the present problem in the light of making this a solvent, profit-making business. I have very few kicks against the service given by the Postal employees, and I think they would agree with me that the system is antiquated in many respects and could use a major overhaul. I do object, however, to the arbitrary plan to raise postal rates, with no promise of better service or improvement in techniques. Instead the rulemakers have added more restrictions and condensed the service. In the face of these changed rules and less service, the plan now is to raise the rates in all classes of postage. In the case

of the Times Journal, we would be hit with a raise of about \$40 per week. In other cases of magazines and newspapers which rely entirely on the mail, some of the raises would be as much as 89% of their present costs. It is time, I think, to take a long hard look at the Government-in-business which has grown up around us for various reasons. The government, meaning our own representatives in Congress, quite possibly had very valid reasons for some of the ventures in which it launched out into the world of economics. In a system such as ours, I fail to see the reasons for some of the industries which the government operates. It may be that private enterprise could operate the postal system more efficiently than it is being operated at present. The big problem, of course, would be the requirement of initial investment, which would be staggering in its conception. However, if private business couldn't finance the operation, then maybe it shouldn't try to operate in the black. Put it on the same basis as the farm program, subsidize it. When you contemplate the raise in postage for your personal letters to 5¢, remember some of us will face minimum raises of 40¢ or more for our weekly stamp bill.

## Only "Safe, Sane" Fireworks For Sale At Approved Stands

Families of this area will be celebrating the Fourth of July this year with "Safe and Sane" fireworks. Many communities in the state have exercised the local option to allow the sale of "safe and sane" fireworks at licensed and supervised retail stands. Under terms of the new state fireworks law, only fireworks classified "safe and sane" by the State Fire Marshal will be allowed for sale. In most cases retail outlets are sponsored by non-profit community organizations as a treasury-building venture. In 1961 the State Legislature passed legislation permitting the public sale and use of "safe and sane" fireworks in the State of Washington. "Safe and sane" fireworks are those items of pyrotechnic display which have been tested and approved by the State Fire Marshal and which carry the State Seal of Approval. "Safe and sane" fireworks are those which produce safe, colorful, family-type entertainment.

They must not, according to the state law, explode, rise into the air, discharge balls of fire, or contain poisonous chemicals. "Safe and Sane" fireworks will be on sale from June 28th thru July 4th by: Southeast Optimist Club located at the National Bank of Washington, 112th & Pacific; the Parkland Boys' Babe Ruth League located at the Thriftway in Summit; Parkland Kiwanis, Lucky Store, 133rd & Pacific; Franklin Pierce High Boosters at Lapenski Fuel Co., 9910 Pacific Avenue. Operators of these stands urge the public to buy early while inventories are complete; so that the families of the area may be able to enjoy the Fourth of July celebrating in the traditional manner--with fireworks--the "safe and sane" variety.

**Good Fences Make Good Neighbors**

"Good fences make good neighbors" is a phrase which defines the beauty and architectural charm of imaginative fencing made possible through the use of hardboard. With today's growing accent on outdoor living, fences have become an integral part of new home planning and designs for better living all over your property. Then, too, adequate fencing can do much to alleviate the awkward look most new houses must pass through

until lawns, plantings and patios are fully developed. Just marking off the area where the patio will be with an attractive enclosure can work wonders for a new home, the fence will have a long life as an important element in the landscape planning. Wall-high fences not only complement new homes, but add to its dimension while shutting off unpleasant views, offering shade, and breaking the wind for an outdoor "living room." Perimeter fencing, around the outside of your property, can actually make the lot look bigger. Here, less solid designs avoid any suggestion of a "spite" fence between you and your new neighbors. Be sure to use only tempered hardboard panels for exterior fencing applications. Tempered hardboard has been specially treated at the factory to make it harder, thus more resistant to changing hot summer and cold winter weather conditions. Painting the paneling is recommended, not only for the beauty it will give the fenced-in area, but because it will increase the longevity of the paneling. Because hardboard will flex without cracking or splintering while preserving its tough surface and strength, fences of tempered hardboard can be woven readily into popular but out-of-the-ordinary basket-weave fencing. Either horizontal or vertical applications are practical and striking.

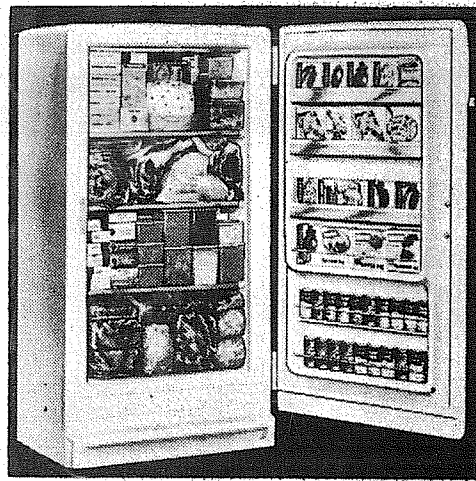


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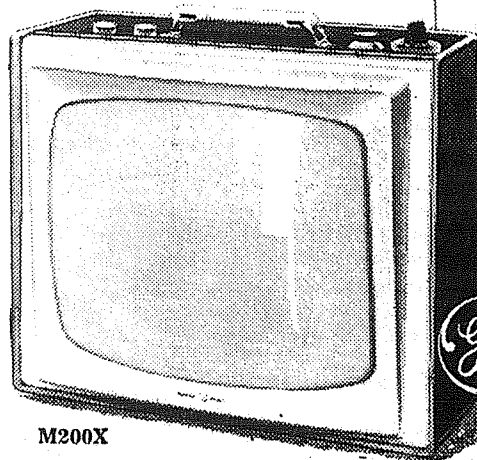

The crew of the fishing ship are believed to have abandoned it before it sank, but a subsequent search conducted in the area by the Windham County failed to locate additional survivors.

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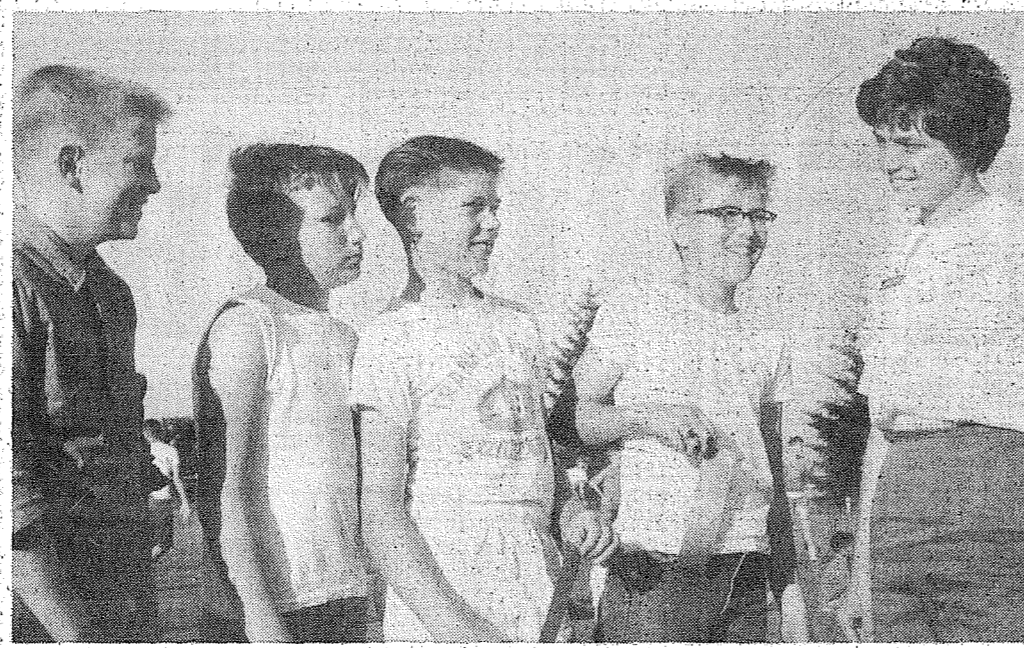

**It's The Law**

It was raining when Cookie's father stopped the car in front of Meanswell's Market. Cookie jumped out of the car to run into the store. As she ran toward the door, she lowered her head to keep the rain out of her face.

In her haste to get in out of the rain, Cookie did not see the plate glass door and struck it with her head, causing the glass to shatter. She was badly cut.

Cookie sued Mr. Meanswell, the owner of the market, claiming that he was negligent in having a plate glass door installed in his store that would shatter as this one did.

Do you think Cookie is entitled to damages?

The Court held that although the law requires store owners to keep them safe or free from danger, this requirement was not violated in this case. The law is complied with if the premises are made as safe or free from danger as their nature will reasonably permit. In this case the door was well marked, and the glass was of the same type and thickness as was commonly used throughout the area.

Mr. Meanswell had no reason to anticipate that the door would be subjected to an extraordinary force such as that applied when Cookie's head struck it. Had the glass broken under more normal use, such as by a slamming or by a person's being pushed or crowded into the door, the result might have been otherwise.

Cookie lost the case.

## Legislation Would End Resident Law For Police Recruits

Major changes will take place in recruitment provisions for local law enforcement officers if certain recommendations before the Joint Committee on Governmental Cooperation are adopted and proposed to the 1963 Washington Legislature. "Recruitment of qualified and conscientious young men and women into local law enforcement is without doubt the most critical factor in developing and maintaining a sound and efficient police force," Senator William Gissberg of Marysville, chairman of the committee declared. "Under the present law, counties and most cities are restricted in recruitment to persons who have lived at least one year in the respective city or county, in some instances this has created hardship; in others there has been deliberate violation of the law," Gissberg explained. Senator Gissberg announced that his committee would take final action this summer on proposals which would remove the city and county residency restrictions; which would allow appointing authorities a discretionary choice

from among the top three candidates on qualification lists; and which would add to the powers of Civil Service Commissions in the area of testing and examination. "Techniques of testing applicants for police positions as to their physical and mental abilities as well as their character and advanced greatly in the past few years," Gissberg explained. "Considerable confusion on these points exists at present among Civil Service Commissions which these proposals may resolve." The Subcommittee on Local Law Enforcement Standards, headed by Senator Harry Elway of Hoquiam, recommended the legislative changes after a 6 months study of practices and procedures of city police departments and county sheriffs' offices, and

**WCTU Sponsors Kids Day Camp**

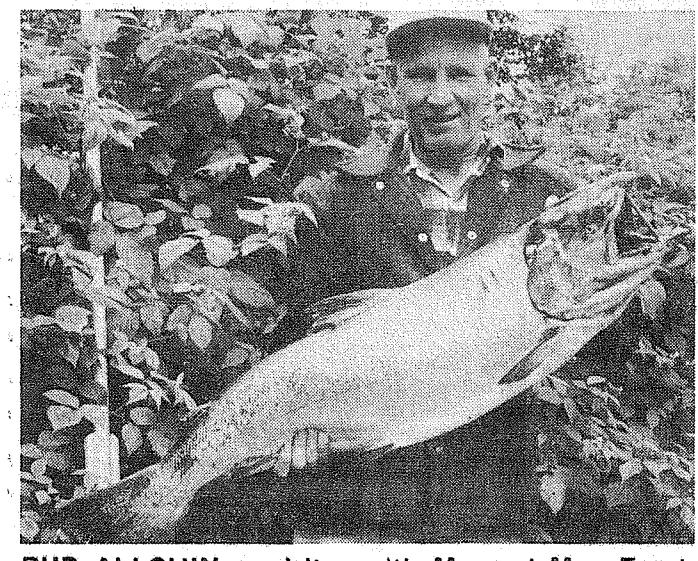
