At their Tuesday, January 7th meeting, the Directors of Bethel School District established the date and propositions for the Spring Special Election.

The Special Election will be Tuesday, March 19, 1964 in designated district polling places. Two propositions will be on

the ballot. 1. A General Fund maint-

enance and operation special levy of \$115,000 (approximately 13.4 mills) for 1964-65. This measure is mostly a


replacement of the special operation levy of this school year; to meet the additional costs of an anticipated enrollment increase of 200 and maintain the district's level of education, transportation and maintenance services. The amount has been in-

creased from last year's \$80,-000 to off-set the decrease in State per-pupil allotments, to meet higher operation costs and competitive salary schedules for teaching and non-teaching employees. The money is needed to

maintain Kindergarten, hire additional teachers, provide textbooks and supplies, replace buses and continue the district program of building and grounds maintenance and improvements. 2. A Building Fund Levy of
