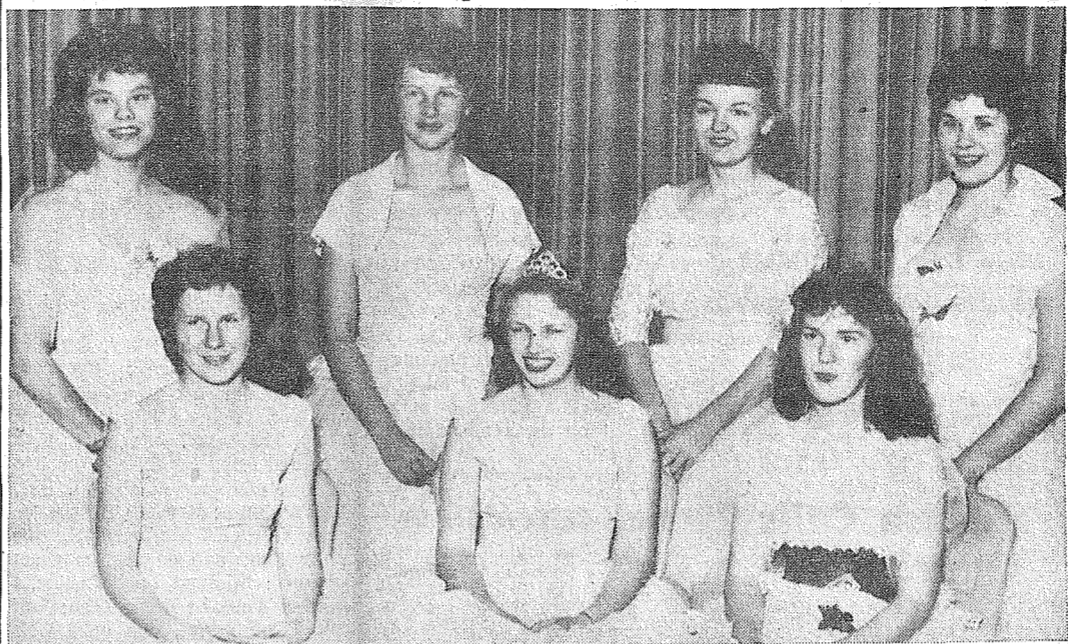

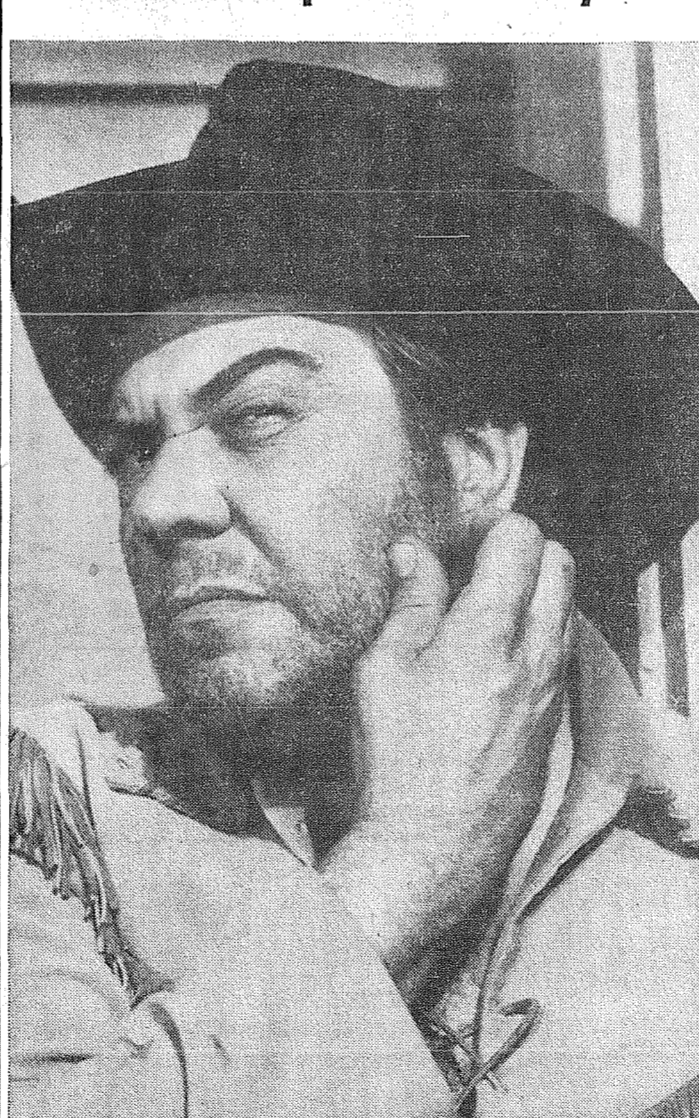

tractive with painted mail boxes and supports, according to Postmaster Helen G. Young of Spanaway.

The Department encourages patrons of rural delivery service to provide suitable boxes, erected and maintained for easy and safe accessibility, presenting a neat appearance, and affording protection for the mail.

Names of box owners should be inscribed on the side of the box visible to the carrier as he approaches, or on the door if boxes are grouped. The box number may be inscribed on the box, and boxes

a-Wondering . . . and a-Wandering . . .

With JACK BROWN

Some weeks I wonder and others I wander and probably many of you wish I'd wander off and forget to come back. However this past week I wandered 6,770 miles, courtesy of the U. S. Air Force and particularly the 1705th MATS (Military Air Transport Service) Group, McChord Field, who were my host. As one of their ten guests from this area, I attended the Aerial Firepower demonstration at the world's largest air base, Eglin, in Florida, traveling aboard a McChord based MATS C-118 plane.

We as citizens of the U.S.A. expect the best possible protection for our homes, families and our country. The Air Force is providing 24-hour-a-day, 365-day-a-year protection for us. This responsibility is accepted by them with the full knowledge of the cost of failure. Air Force personnel are citizens of this country dedicated to accomplishing this vitally important task. Most of us take the services offered us by the Air Force, or any other branch of the service for that matter, for granted, with only partial or no knowledge of their capabilities. The purpose of the demonstration in Florida was to let some 6000 newsmen and community leaders see just how hard and how fast the Air Force could strike back at an enemy in time of need.



At the start of the demonstration two RF-101 Voodoos made a photo pass over the viewing stands. Above you see the results of that pass. This photo was one of those taken and returned to the viewing stand in exactly 54 minutes. Even Mac, our photographer doesn't give me that kind of service. Following the first fly over came an hour and thirty five minute demonstration of incredible power and speed of delivery on the punches.

To describe in detail what I witnessed in that short period of time would fill a book. A short summary of the program follows: Ground weapons demo; time hack; 4 F 102s in vertical boom; F 102 in air to air rocket demo; F 100 and B-57 in air to air gunnery, demo; F-101B in Nuclear rocket demo; F 100, B-57s and T-33 in sidewinder missile demo; F-104 in 5" HVAR rocket and GAR-8 sidewinder missile demo; F-104 and 4 F-102s in supersonic pass and high altitude intercept; F-104s in industrial and airplane attack and straffing demo; F-100s in versatility and bombing demos, F-105 in low level boom; supersonic toss bombing; high altitude bombing and straffing demo; KB-50 and 3 F-100s in air refueling demo; RB-6s in night photo reconnaissance demo; C130 in rough field landing; 16 F-100s in squadron attack; C-123, C-124, C-130 and C-133 in transport aircraft fly-by; H-21 in photo delivery; KC-135 and B-52 in air refueling demo; B-47s and B-52s in bomber fly-bys; B-52 in simulated nuclear bomb drop; and a 25 min. show by the world famous Air Force precision flying team, the Thunderbirds.

One thing the trip proved to me is that the Air Force is on the ball and packs a terrific punch. With an outfit like that opposing him Mr. Joe Red will think a long time before he starts something. Just remember, the next time you hear a sonic boom, don't cuss; tip your hat and be thankful the Air Force is on the job carrying out its responsibility to train, equip, and maintain a force capable of assuring continuous aerial protection of our country from attack.

We've got some wonderful neighbors to the west of us at McChord. Next time you meet one of them, why not go just a little out of your way to let him know he's welcome in our community.
