## Bethel Superintendent Explains School Needs In March Election

Transportation and Maintenance programs in the Bethel District are dependent on the passage of the 13.4 mill levy contained in proposition I on the Bethel District March tenth ballot according to Superintendent John Milroy.

He explained the \$115,000 levy in two parts in spelling out the district's requirements. Bethel's anticipated 200 enrollment increase — 95% of whom ride buses — means more carrying capacity is needed. Levy money would be used to replace a 1948, 58 passenger bus with three

new vehicles (two 73-passenger diesels and one smaller shuttle run, gasoline vehicle).

The present standard of stop services for elementary, secondary, and special runs could continue. State regulations call for two mile service, giving service when the walking by students exceeds two miles. Bethel's present level far exceeds this.

After school studies and extra-curricular activities at the junior and senior high school students are dependent on four bus runs Monday through Thursday. This service requires special levy money.

Maintenance The levy would permit a continuation of the present level of building and grounds cleaning and maintenance services, keeping the present ratio of custodian to buildings and providing materials and supplies.

Summertime preventative maintenance and improvements in re-roofing, painting, minor renovating, walkways etc., are possible with levy funds. Each building site has needs.

## Area Leaders Join Forces For Sparking Economic Growth And Development

## Officers To Get Group Underway

In efforts to form a south-eastern Pierce County coordinating organization to make the most of the area's present and potential development, a small group of local businessmen who only last fall were on opposing sides of the sewer vote joined forces last week.

As was pointed out in last week's Times Journal, this area is slated for the greatest growth in Pierce County during the period from 1965 to 1968 according to a report from planning director Robert Eveleigh.

Temporary officers named by the group will be headed by Fire Chief E. R. (Bud) Larson as chairman. Earl Dryden of the Parkland Branch of the National Bank of Washington, will serve as secretary and publicity director, with Ray Rich of the Automobile Salesman's Union as vice chairman. John Austin, an architect, will be treasurer. Dryden points out that the next meeting of the group will be on February 24th at 8 p.m. at the Parkland Light and Water building. He says all citizens of the area who wish to make their part of the county a healthier economic climate, while maintaining and promoting its home advantages are invited to attend the meeting and become members of the group.

In addressing the group at their last meeting, Robert Huesers, managing director of Lakewood Unlimited, urged immediate action. He said of his own organization, "Our Lakewood Unlimited developed out of a desire on the part of only a small group of business and civic leaders to do something that would keep the community a fine place to live and at the same time prosper. We had two objectives: a healthier business and economic climate and coordinate the efforts of the many individuals in Lakewood so that we could achieve the ultimate in these areas endeavor."

Huesers told the group that the Lakewood district started organizing in 1961 as a "Bureau of Commerce." Following the format of Greater Seattle, Inc., the group began with only 78 members and today boasts approximately 700 business, professional and independent members, having merged with the Lakewood Improvement Council and has succeeded in consolidating the Lakes district into several annual overall business promotions among other successes.

Alvin Raper, who spearheaded the project as the Parkland Improvement Association, is among the local enthusiasts. Also active in the movement is Clayton Peterson, vice president of Pacific Lutheran University. Each person in attendance at last week's meeting has been urged to bring three to five prospective members to next week's meeting. All in attendance may become charter members by paying a \$5 assessment fee for the year. County Commissioner Harry Sprinker plans to be present for next week's session, he told the Times Journal today.

Among items on the agenda for discussion include a new library building as well as a better street lighting system. credits to be shown on his return. All receipts, cancelled checks, and other evidence to prove the amounts claimed as deductions must be retained as part of the taxpayer's records.

## FP Organizes To Give Public Election Info

Election processes in the Franklin Pierce district are moving into high gear this week as the Education Council, and PTA and school officials organize to get information to citizens.

Meeting last week the Council, which is headed by Mrs. Richard Johnson, set up procedures whereby P-TA groups in each elementary school will solicit volunteer workers from their areas, send information home to parents, conduct telephone campaigns and generally in-

form citizens about the school issues to be on the March 10 ballot.

The school district has three issues to be presented to the voters. Proposition I requests approximately 18 mills, or \$333,000, for operation and maintenance of school facilities for next year. Growing enrollment, additional teachers and increased costs of materials dictate the need for the additional funds, school officials said.

Proposition II requests approximately 4 mills, or \$70,

000 for the purchase of four new buses to transport additional students to and from school. Present buses are making many double trips and carrying many more students each time than they were designed for.

Kindergartens, which are supported 70 per cent by the State, can only be operated if additional funds are available. An excess levy request of about 2 mills, or \$40,000, is being asked by school directors.

## IRS Can't Aid Verifications For Taxpayers

Some taxpayers assume that the Internal Revenue Service is responsible for obtaining information which will help the taxpayer verify exemptions, deductions and credits claimed on their income tax returns. This assumption is not correct, Neal S. Warren, District Director of Internal Revenue said today. For example, the Internal Revenue Service will not attempt to obtain information for the taxpayer concerning interest and tax payments, support of a dependent, medical expense payments, etc. The burden of proof lies with the taxpayer.

Every taxpayer is required by law to maintain such records as will enable him to prepare a complete and accurate tax return, Mr. Warren said. The law does not require any particular kind of records but they must contain such information as will enable the taxpayer to accurately determine his exemptions and the amount of his income, deductions and

# a - Wandering and a - Wandering . . .

Living in a land of Liberty and Justice For All and keeping it that way can oft times pose a problem. In fact, Justice seems to get all kicked out of shape occasionally. At times when this happens the result can be quite disturbing and the effects far reaching.  
I'd like to point out to you what I can only consider injustice handed out in a Justice Court in Kittitas County recently, and also to bring out the far reaching effects of the case.  
First, let's picture this if you can. On the ninth day of last November on the eastern slopes of the Cascades, during Elk season, 69 cow elk were slaughtered and left lying to rot. The cause of this perhaps covered every phase of human action from fright to wanton, sadistic taking of a life. The bulk of the cows were undoubtedly killed by the vermin who infest our forests during the hunting season and shoot first, then look for horns afterwards. Then too, some were undoubtedly shot down in error.  
At any rate, seventy cows were shot down and sixty-nine hunters faded off into the brush after finding they had downed a cow. One man, the 70th killed a cow by accident, cleaned it out to preserve the meat, went hunting a game warden to explain what happened and came up before a Justice Of The Peace to be fined \$103.25. This is justice??  
Let's go into the story just a little more. First, let's be sure the cow was downed accidentally and not wantonly. This man came upon a herd of elk, picked out a big bull for his mark and fired. The bull lunged across the open space the herd was in, as if to bolt from the area. The hunter, thinking he had missed, pressed off another shot at the running bull, and just at that moment a cow elk ran between him and the bull. The cow dropped instantly, dead from a bullet thru the neck! Likewise, the bull took a couple more steps and dropped from the first bullet.  
Thus the scene was set. Should this hunter clean out the bull and disclaim any and all knowledge of the cow or should he do the right thing and gut out the cow, as well, to preserve the meat? This course he selected. He propped the animal open to air, slit the ear and attached a note with his name and address, stating that he had shot the elk in error and had gone for a game warden, hauled his bull back to camp and headed down the mountain.  
A call to the sheriff's office brought the advice that he should try to find a game warden as matters of this nature were out of their hands. A call to the State Patrol received the same answer, however, they did take the information and say that they would contact the game department. This call was made at 8:30 a.m. The hunter returned to camp to await the warden.  
Around 2:30 that afternoon the game warden put in an appearance. The hunter had stood by patiently waiting instead of returning home with his bull and forgetting the whole thing.  
The warden visited the spot, looked over the situation and opined that he could readily see how this could occur. During the conversation he remarked that this made seventy cows downed and that this hunter was the first and only one to call the Game Department.  
Since it was apparent that the warden couldn't get to the cow with his car, the hunter volunteered his truck, and the cow was subsequently hauled to town.  
The hunter and warden went to the Justice Court, where the hunter appeared before a Justice of the Peace, who questioned him about the incident, while serving customers at his small store. When asked if he was guilty, the hunter replied that since he had shot the cow he must be guilty. The judge immediately said that he would put down a plea of 'NOT GUILTY'. At this point the hunter felt that in doing what he knew to be right he was to be rewarded with a warning of some sort or perhaps a vote of thanks for his honesty. Then his self-righteous thoughts were blasted into thin air when the judge stated, "That will be \$103.25". Needless to say, our honest friend was rocked on his heels.  
The fine was paid, the sheriff called to come and get the cow for the jail prisoners' fare, the game warden carefully put the elk liver in his car and the hunter stood looking at his receipt, (which I have in front of me) for \$103.25 and thinking only of the mockery of the words thereon . . . "IN THE JUSTICE COURT."  
Now you be the judge. Was this justice? Did the merchant and Justice of the Peace of the town mete out justice? Whatever his actions they certainly were not as prescribed by law. The law clearly states that the fine for being in possession of illegal game shall be \$1,000 maximum and \$250 minimum. In setting the fine in the \$100 bracket he was apparently making up his own rules to fit the occasion as he saw fit, and thus it must be assumed the fine could just as well have been one dollar instead of \$100. It seems to me that "Justice" would have been better served by a token fine to uphold the law, and a pat on the back to the hunter for his honesty and efforts to do the right thing.  
Now for the far reaching effects of this situation. Word of this fine spread like wildfire thru the hunting area. How many men, knowing of this incident, if caught in the vise of the same trap will react as this hunter did? Few, if any! They too, will fade away into the brush!  
What are we to tell our generation of young hunters? If they unavoidably kill a cow during the hunting season, shall we advise them to stand up and face the fact like true Americans, or shall we advise them if they value their pocketbook and their clean record never to face a Justice of the Peace in his Justice Court if they can avoid it?  
Personally, I commend this hunter for his honest actions, and condemn the game warden for not speaking up in his behalf in the face of the evidence he saw and also I condemn this J.P. for meting out what I consider injustice instead of justice in a Justice Court.  
Over the years these two men and those who have helped to write laws that condone such injustice may stand and take a bow each and every time some hunter fades away into the brush after an honest unavoidable kill, instead of taking care of the meat and advising authorities.  
As well, they may take a bow for the blow this has dealt those of us who try to raise our children to always do right. The job is hard enough as it is in this day and age, without incidents such as this.  
Just for the record, I have met this hunter only once in my life and at the time that he told me this story and gave me the receipt for his fine. His story was substantiated by two other gentlemen who accompanied him to my office. This is not just a blast for an old buddy's sake. It is an appeal for corrective action so that justice may once again prevail in a justice court and so that no man who is doing right may fear to face a judge.  
After all — THIS IS AMERICA!
