The 23 calves averaged \$83.26; and 14 Holsteins, \$99.20; the Gurnseys, \$71.25, and the 5 Jerseys, \$48.

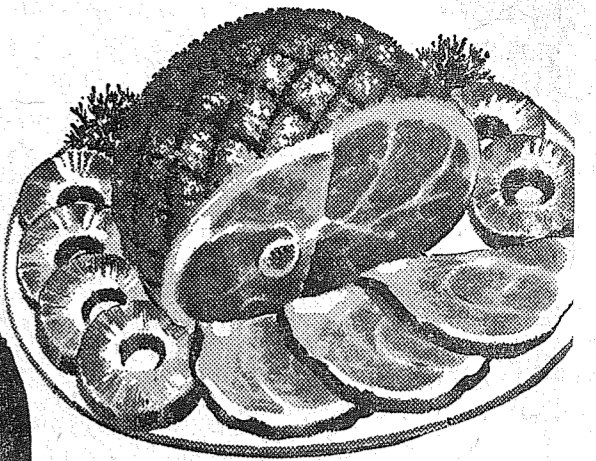
