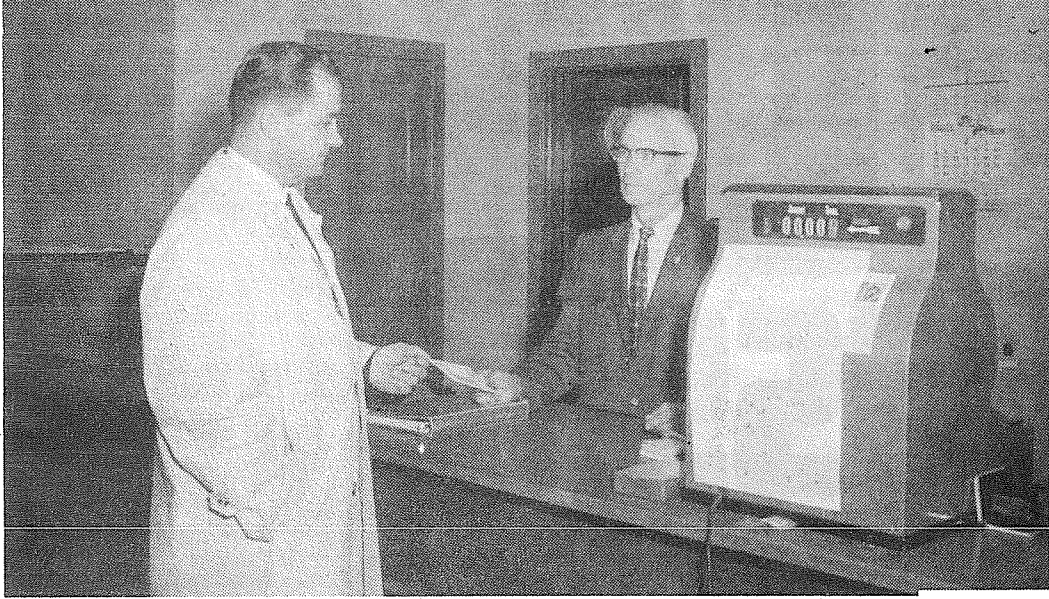

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Receives Free Light Bill Jack Brown Resumes As Times Journal Publisher

Light and Water Company. Richardson represented the school district, one of the largest users of electric power, as the power company declared a dividend of the November electricity bill for its members. The total amounts to about \$40,000.

\$40,000 Worth Of Free Electricity Given Parkland L&W Patrons

The announcement was made this week that the Board of Trustees of Parkland Light and Water Company had taken action to make the usual electric service bill for the month of November free to members of the company. The free service applies to the electric portion of the bill and not to the water charges, it was pointed out.

The action will account for more than \$40,000 to the members of the company, officials said. They based their estimate on the figures available to them through the meter readings which have just been completed. The company's action in "forgiving" the November bill was made possible by an accumulation of funds in excess of those needed for normal operation and reserve funds of the light department.

Company officials also pointed out that the funds are a direct result of an increase in electric power sales through the increased installation of electric heat. They added

that, since Parkland Light and Water Company is a non-profit cooperative, the members reap the benefits of increased sales.

The free bill represents about a ten per cent reduction in electric power rates for the year 1962, lowest in Pierce County, a company spokesman said. Members using the largest amount of electricity primarily electric heat users, receive the greatest share of the reduction.

The management of the company has started a program to sell an increase in electric heat use, the spokesman said.

He said the plans call for a two-point program: (1) to make available to members the necessary information for getting the best possible installation; and (2) to provide technical advice for any members for the correction of a system, if not operating properly.

The Man of the Year award is given not only for safe driving and care of equipment but for ability to meet the public and to get along with fellow employees.

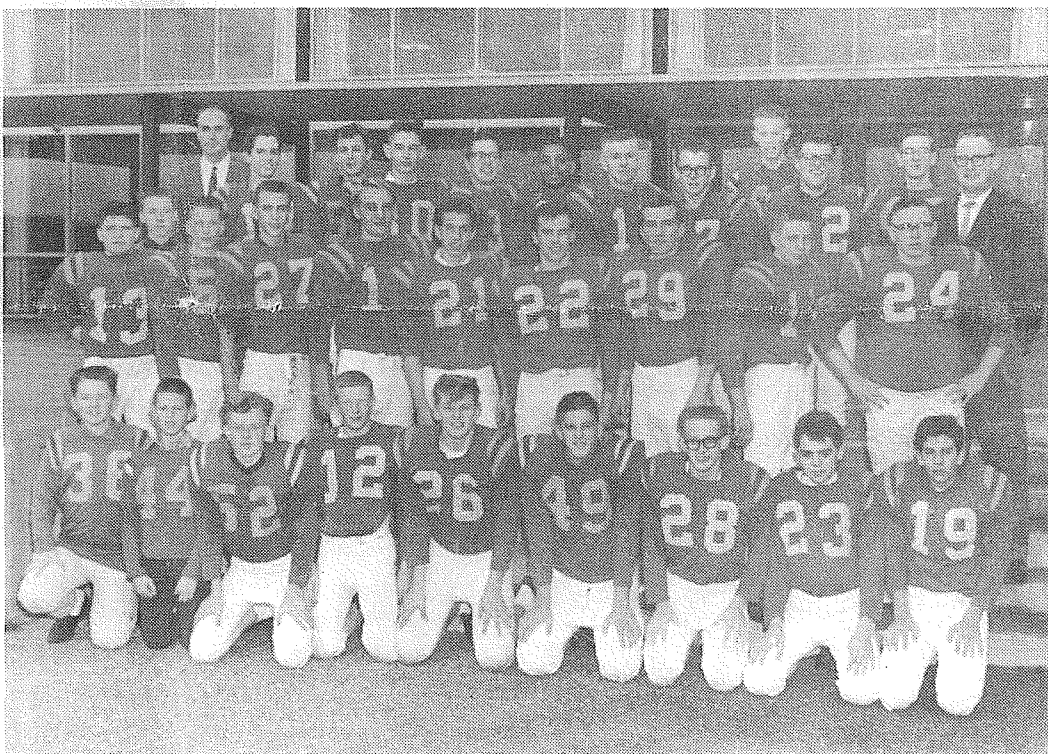


JACK BROWN, shown above, alighting from his airplane after making a trip in the interest of his aviation

Your Growing Garden

By Harriet Kennedy

Improper watering of house plants, (gardens, too, for that matter) will turn any garden thumb pale, for a clear, emerald green thumb begins with water control. No land plant can live if its roots are immersed in standing water. Nor can any plant live without access to fresh water. Nature aids the plants if they are growing outdoors, but plants are helpless indoors unless we provide protection.

Because of the tropical temperature in homes, ideal for house plants, the same temperature should be insured when they are watered. Luke warm, not warm nor hot, water should be used for watering, and for spraying and washing leaves.

While underwatering causes house plants to wilt, drop their flowers and stunts growth, overwatering is more commonly done and is disastrous. It causes excess salts to build up in the potting soil, while washing away soil nutrients. It prevents oxygen intake, soaks roots causing them to rot. Plants become leggy, lower leaves drop, the entire plant loses strength and stamina even though the top leaves may still grow, in some cases even large, it is forced growth.

A few protective measures will solve both these problems. The best of all method is to use two pots with a lining between them of peat moss with a little sand mixed in with it packed solidly around the side walls, with fine gravel, sprinkled with charcoal in the base of both pots. Periodically the inner pot may be removed, any ex-

cess water standing in the outer pot can be completely poured out and the inner pot replaced. If only one pot is used, it should be set on some kind of saucer to provide drainage that may easily be poured out.

Ornamental "dish gardens" must be checked after EACH watering to see whether the water has been absorbed by the potting mix. If there is an excess in the bottom of the dish, the planter should be tilted to drain it. A miserable job, for the plants must be held in place and the soil prevented from spilling out. A base layer of gravel and charcoal is an absolute must for dish gardens as is very careful watering. The best favor you can do for your plants is to get a syringe bulb with a fine spray nozzle from your florist or garden shop. Set the plants in a sink or tub, fill the bulb with luke warm water and give the leaves a cleansing, beneficial spray bath. This will help the leaves pores from becoming dust clogged too. All factors in liquid seaweed are beneficial for house plants, it can be made into solution for watering, added to the bulb for spraying or an eye dropper full may be squirted directly on the soil top just before watering. A half inch layer of peat moss, sawdust or crumbled leaves placed on top of the soil as a mulch cover will retain moisture. Daily investigating with your finger tips will tell you when it's time to water again. The ingredients in your potting mix is important too. Sand provides drainage, more should be added if the soil is a humus, or peat type, less for sandy soils. The addition of compost, peat moss and sawdust to sand and soil will help absorb and retain moisture as well as to prevent soil packing that would squeeze out oxygen.
