



Other changes will be noticeable in the paper make up and the format of the Times Journal, so well known by readers over the years, will gradually return to the paper. Brown, as owner of the

Times Journal Publishing Company has, over the past 14 years, built up the paper from a small seven column four page paper into one of the leading controlled circulation weeklies in the northwest. For several years the firm has been producing an aviation publication as well, known throughout the United States as the Northwest Flyer. Don Norris, local Parkland resident and aviator, has held the position of editor on this paper, which in the first issue of November announced to the aviation industry that it was the largest aviation newspaper in the world, thus the name "Parkland" has spread far and wide.

cess water standing in the outer pot can be completely poured out and the inner pot replaced. If only one pot is used,

it should be set on some kind of saucer to provide drainage that may easily be poured out.
Ornamental "dish gar-

dens" must be checked after EACH watering to see whether the water has been absorbed by the potting mix. If there is an excess in the bottom of the dish, the planter should be tilted to drain it. A miserable job, for the plants must be held in place and the soil prevented from spilling out. A base layer of gravel and charcoal is an absolute must for dish gardens as is very careful watering.

The best favor you can do for your plants is to get a syringe bulb with a fine spray nozzle from your florist or garden shop. Set the plants in a sink or tub, fill the bulb with luke warm water and give the leaves a cleans. ing, beneficial spray bath. This will help the leaves pores from becoming dust

clogged too.

All factors in liquid seaweed are beneficial for house plants, it can be made into solution for watering, added to the bulb for spraying or an eye dropper full may be squirted directly on the soil top just before water-

A half inch layer of peat moss, sawdust or crumbled leaves placed on top of the soil as a mulch cover will retain mois-

Daily investigating with your finger tips will tell you when it's time to water again.

The ingredients in your potting mix is important too. Sand provides drainage, more should be added if the soil is a humus, or peat type, less for sandy soils. The addition of compost, peat moss and sawdust to sand and soil will help absorb and retain moisture as well as to prevent soil packing that would squeeze out oxygen. Leaf mold or crumbled leaves help
