Parkland Round-up Set June 12-14

The 1959 Parkland Round-up is in business! The kick-off was the big committee meeting held Monday evening in the clubhouse on the Round-up grounds.

Kent Erickson will again serve as Round-up chairman, having been appointed by Parkland Business Club President Morrie Anderson. Erickson made a splendid record in his previous term as chairman and prospects are very bright for an even more successful celebration this year. The 1959 Round-up will be held June 12, 13 and 14. An attractive and varied program of events and entertainment is in the making.

Of first importance right now is the signing up of Queen candidates, young girls of the community who may be sponsored by organizations or business firms or may enter on their own. Rules of the contest are as follows:

I. ELIGIBILITY

Candidacy open to girls sixteen to twenty-one inclusive, unmarried, and having residence in Pierce County. Candidate must be at least 16 and not over 21 on June 1, 1959.

II. JUDGING

Five impartial, qualified judges will judge the girls on poise, beauty, and horsemanship, and rank girls according to scoring rules set down by the Parkland Round-up.

III. SCORING

Scoring will be determined on a maximum point basis of 3000 decided and obtained as follows:

A. A maximum of 1000 points for beauty and poise.

B. A maximum of 1000 points for horsemanship.

C. A maximum of 1000 points for selling a limited number of Parkland Round-up buttons.

Explanation of parts A. and B: The contest for beauty and poise and horsemanship will be held at the Parkland Round-up grounds. Each candidate will be interviewed and then mount and display her ability to handle her horse easily and gracefully, and other points of good horsemanship. Judges will rank and score each candidate.

Explanation of part C: Each candidate will be given 100 Round-up buttons at the time of the Round-up.

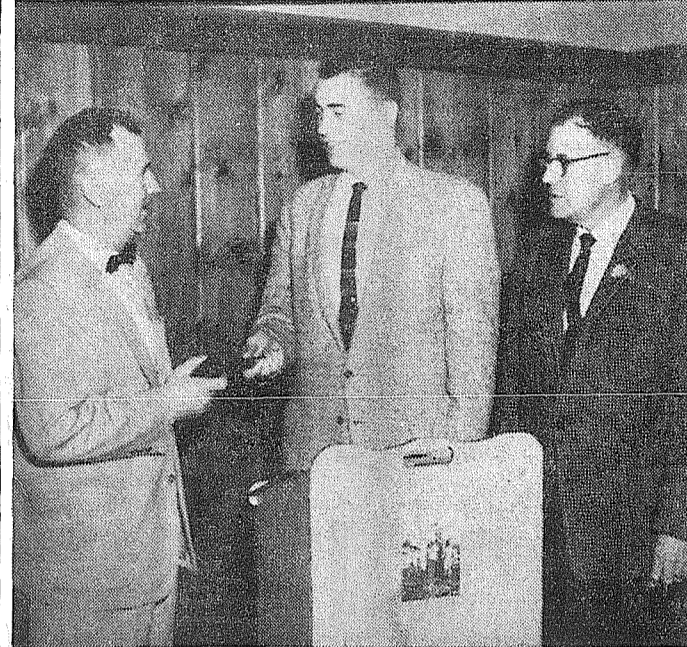
Spanaway Speedway Races Start 12th

Sunday, April 12, marks the opening of 1959 racing at Spanaway Speedway, two miles east of Pacific on 159th street. Time trials start at 1:30, racing at 3 p.m.

Races will be held every Sunday during the season with modified, early-late model stock cars, mid-gets, and Indianapolis type cars featured throughout the Summer. Several important improvements have been made at the Speedway during the past few months. In addition to the track used last year, there is now a 3/8 mile blacktop track in the middle of the field, supered 6 feet on the 50-foot corners.

New bleachers have been built, increasing the seating capacity to 3000; patrons may also watch the races from their cars.

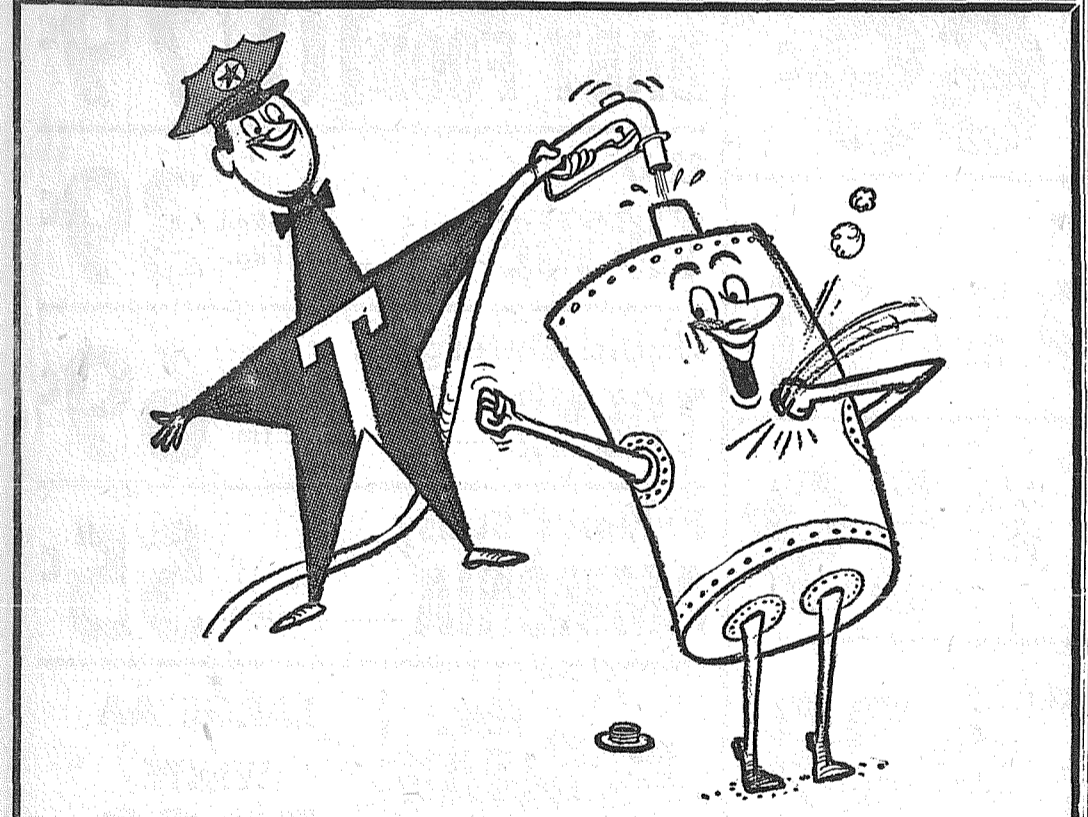

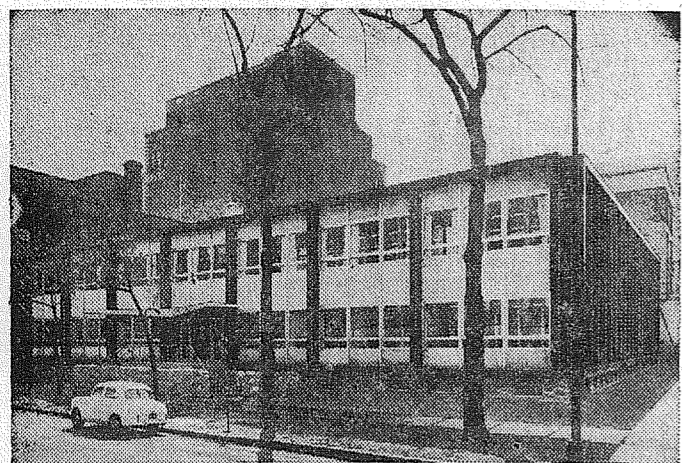

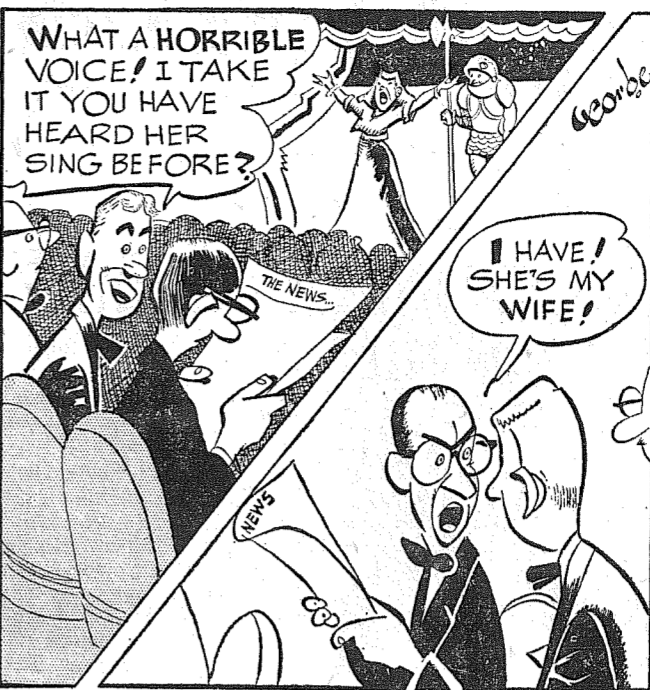
The bus driver announced, "this is as far as I can go," and opened the bus doors. He helped one man get off the bus.

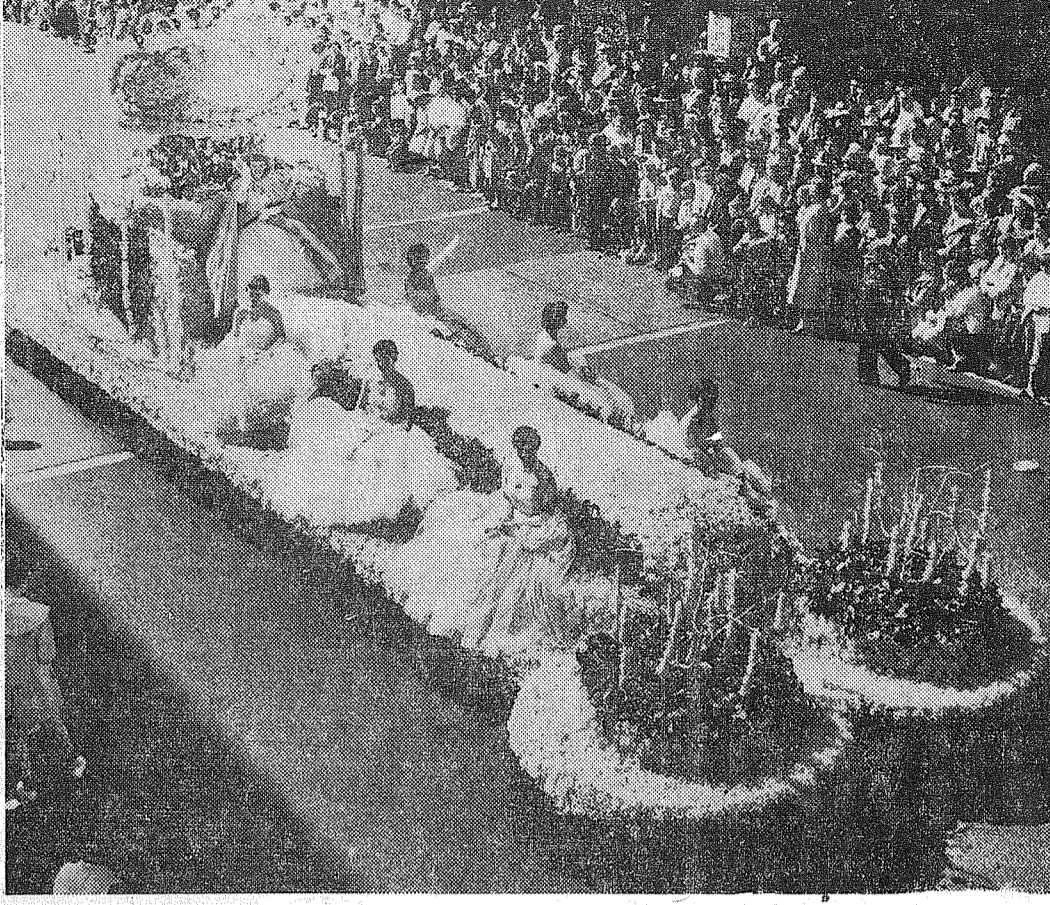

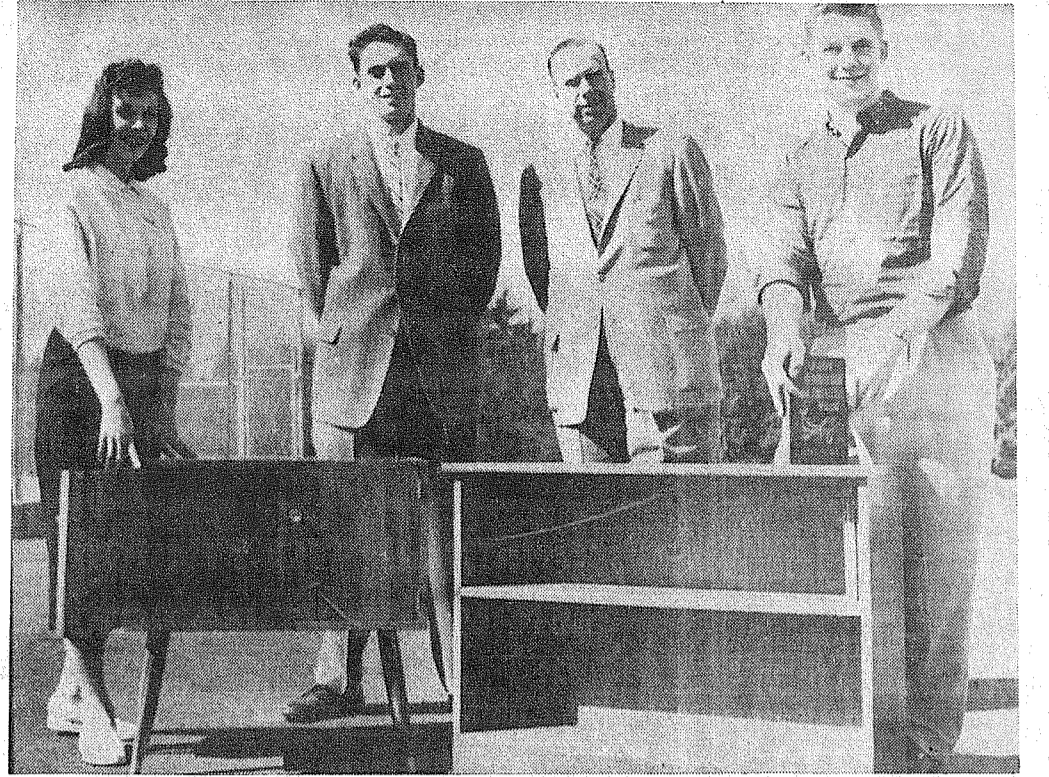

We Must Learn How to Bear 'Gethsemane'
The cup that in Gethsemane Jesus prayed so earnestly might pass, did not pass.
We know how He drank it, and drank to the very lees of sacrifice and suffering.
It is the mystery of God and the universe that the living powers, alike of nature and of grace, are intimately bound up with suffering and death.
It is one thing to recognize a general law of sacrifice, but how different when we are faced with a real, insistent danger, or demand for sacrifice ourselves.
Then comes the real testing. Many find the faith and power. Out of Gethsemane the Master came with the serenity of a profound faith in the destiny that the Father had for Him, and with a quiet sublime courage.
That serenity and courage endured alike the buffeting of His aggressors, the taunts of the cowardly and the cynical contempt of the worldly minded Pilate.
From Gethsemane to Calvary! We must go with Jesus all the way, if we could get the inspiration of that divine tragedy and its fulfillment of blessing for mankind. Thus will the message of that divine tragedy come to us personally, pointing the way to triumph and glory.

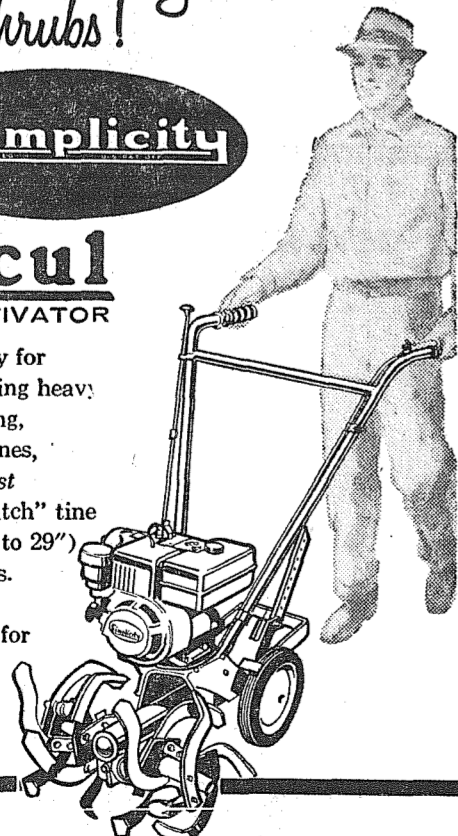

Fire Permits

Now that fire season is here we are going to set down some requirements, so that everyone may understand just what will be considered a proper burning barrel. Burning may be done at anytime in proper containers and no permit will be required. A barrel or outdoor fireplace or incinerator will be accepted provided that it is in good condition, and covered with proper screen to prevent sparks from escaping. Under no conditions will a barrel that is full of holes, or only half its original size be acceptable. Fireplaces used to burn without a permit must have a door to prevent contents from spilling out. Barrels set in the dry grass or too near buildings or other hazards shall not be considered safe. Over loading of barrels so the contents spill out shall

be considered an unsafe condition. Outdoor fires are permitted; all that is required is a fire permit which can be had at the fire station free of charge. If conditions in the fire district become so dry and hazardous as to present a threat to the community, all fires will be prohibited by a notice in the paper or other means. If any special problem arises concerning permits, please contact the fire station at LE 7-8530.

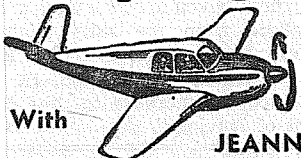

Mrs. A got off the bus, she ceased to be a passenger, and the bus company owed her no further duty to see to it that she was not injured.

Do you think she may recover damages in this situation?

The answer is that she can. A bus company must use the highest degree of care consistent with the practical operation of its busses to safeguard its passengers from injury. Under the circumstances here, it would not have hindered the practical operation of the bus service for the bus driver to stand by the door and assist a passenger such as Mrs. A to a safe place on the sidewalk.

When the bus driver let her off the bus in an unsafe place, as the court found the slippery street to be, she would not cease to be a passenger until she had a reasonable opportunity, in the exercise of ordinary care, to reach a place of safety such as the sidewalk.

Because the bus driver let her off in a dangerous place where she was injured despite her attempt to get to a place of safety, she was entitled to collect damages from the bus company.

(This column is written to inform, not advise. Facts may change the application of the law.)

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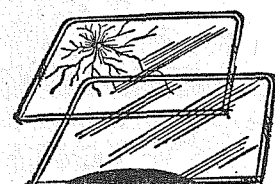
