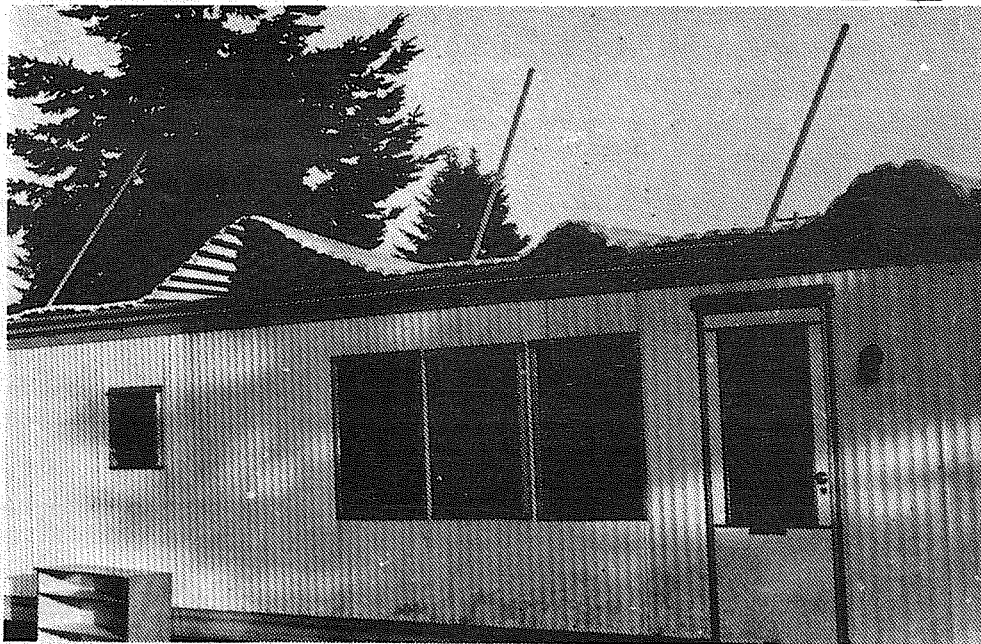

MINI TWISTER HITS SPANAWAY

Trailer Damaged

A small twister struck Spanaway in the vicinity of 173rd and East B about 8 p.m. Sunday to cause an estimated \$1000 damage to a 60 foot house trailer.

The whirlwind left the trailer canopy belonging to Mrs. Guyida White, Route 2 Box 2169A, a crumpled pile of metal. Some damage to the trailer roof was apparent. Mrs. White was in Seattle at the time of the incident and was not available for comment.

Neighbors reported the mini-twister came as a whirling mass of newspapers and debris headed south from 172nd Street. As it passed over homes the "shingles stood straight up," one eye witness stated.

Mrs. White is in the process of moving into her trailer, and is not occupying it as yet, a neighbor, Mrs. Lorraine Zetner 135 East 173rd stated. No other damage was reported from the area.

Alarms turned into the Spanaway-Elk Plain Fire Department last week included:

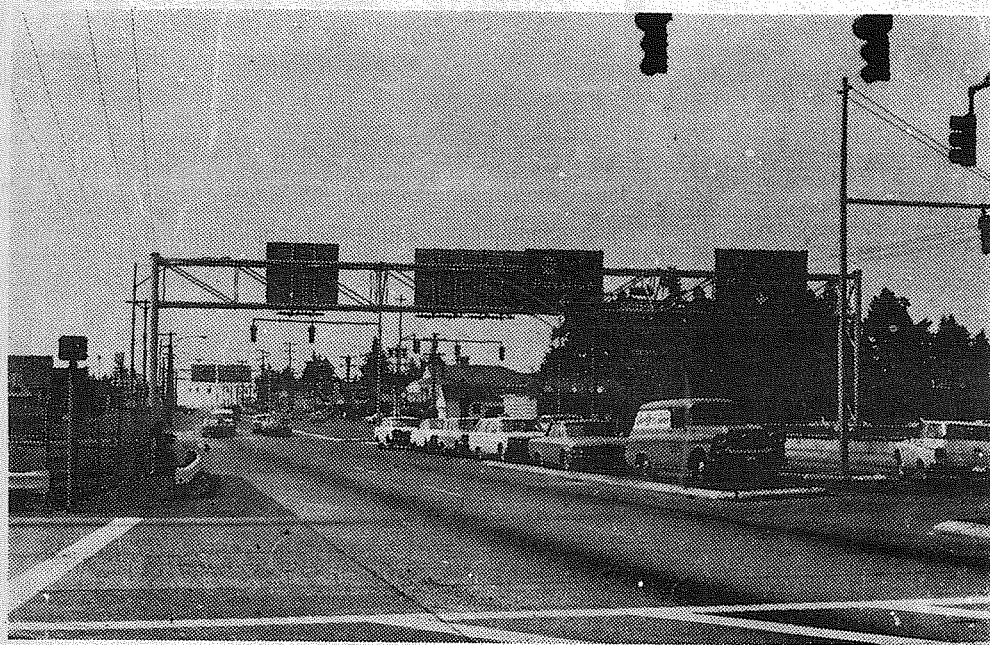
An Ant Hill Fire the woods at Military Rd.

The Franklin Pierce School District bus driver, who became an institution among children, died suddenly of a heart attack Saturday.

Howard "Howie" J. Lee, 52, of 816 E. 90th, was bus driver and custodian for the school district for 30 years. Never did he forget to buy a favor for a child's birthday or have a cheerful word on the morning of an exam day.

"Howie was probably the oldest employee in the district," said Vern Young, director of maintenance at the district, "he started at Central Avenue before the district was consolidated."

"Howie" also ran all of the concession stands for the school carnivals.

He was a member of the Operating Engineers Union, Tacoma Musicians Association, Building Service Employees Union and Public School Employees Union. He was a charter member of Fruitland Grange.

Survivors include his wife, Esther; a son, Terry H. of the home; a brother, Wallace H. of Tacoma; and two sisters, Mrs. Alfred Scholz of Orting and Mrs. Joseph Lloyd of Tacoma.

Services were held Wednesday at 11 a.m. from Dryer's Fir Lane Chapel with Rev. John Coffman officiating. Burial is in the Fir Lane Memorial Park.

"We do this once a year to get the community together for a visit," said officials at the Fire Department.

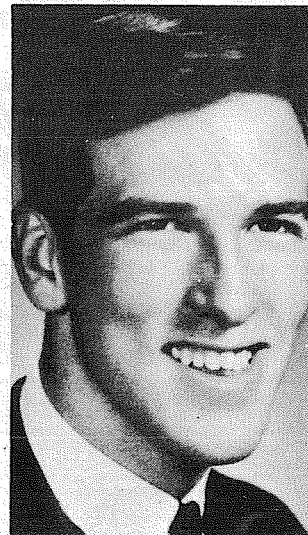
The menu includes tossed salad, baked beans, hot rolls and butter, cold drinks and coffee.

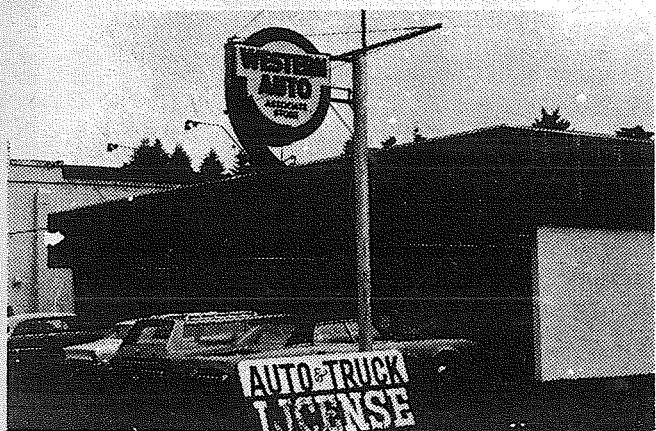


Harding, a 1967 graduate of Franklin-Pierce High School, won the award in a Boys' Voice Contest sponsored by the association.

UPS Offers New Courses

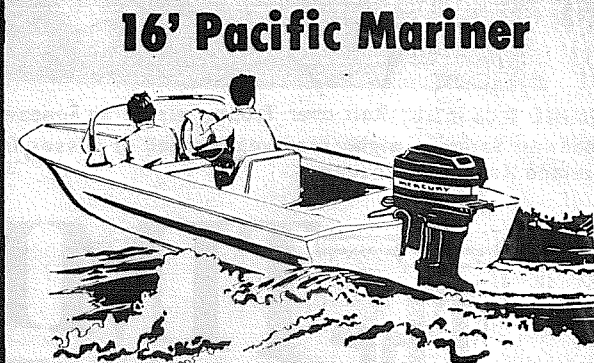
For the first time the Uni-

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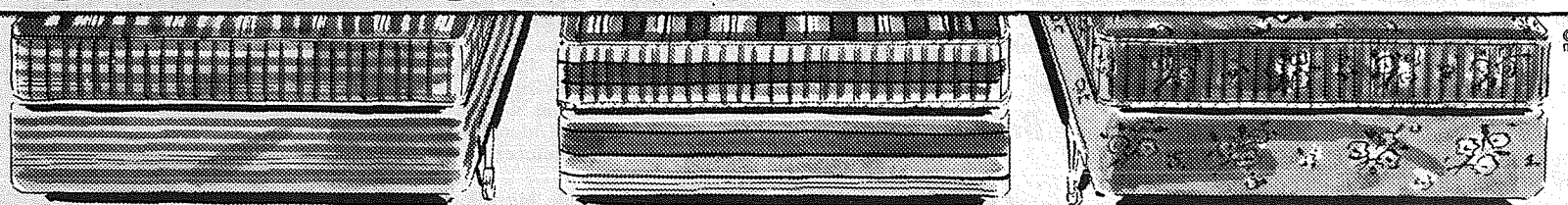

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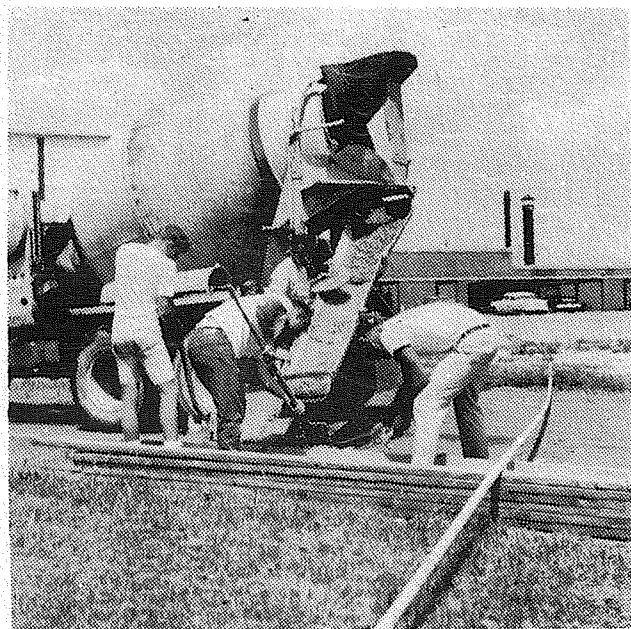

Franklin Pierce School Costs Run More Than Imagined

(Editor's Note: This is the first of two factual stories on the cost our school districts incur. The first one deals with Franklin Pierce School District, and the second one will cover the Bethel School District.)

Educational costs, like everything else, are going up. But what does "Educational Costs" entail?

There are, of course, the accepted costs of schools, such as text books, salaries of teachers and so on, but also taking portion on the school's budget are many things that are not immediately associated with our tax dollar as it applies to education.

For instance in the Franklin Pierce School District's 1966-67 school year, \$59,808 was spent on electricity, water and sewage, propane gas,

refuse removal and telephones, another \$15,629 was spent on maintenance of the grounds and equipment, i.e.; carpentry, plumbing, roofing, electrical work, heating plants, and unforeseeable repairs and also the repair of office equipment.

Maintenance and operation of transportation, including tires, gasoline, oil and repair of normal wear and tear, resulted in a \$34,416 expenditure.

For the 1967-68 budget it is anticipated that 22.55 per cent will be used for costs of the school district other than administration and instruction.

This figure broken down shows 1.62 per cent is used for pupil services, including nursing and guidance staff; 4.52 per cent for food services; 4.34 per cent for pupil transportation; 7.87 per cent for operation of plant; 3.30 per cent for maintenance of plant; .045 per cent for community services; .795 per cent for payments to other districts; and .060 per cent for non-warrant expenditures.

In the 1967-68 fiscal year five building projects will be underway for the district. They include addition of nine rooms to Keithley Junior High, a new administration building, beginning of a second high school, improvements to present buildings, new sites and addition as needed for new school buildings and addition to present buildings, and a

diagnostic center at Parkland School.

Funds for the coming year's budget are expected to be received as follows: 16.3 per cent, local taxes; 2.2 per cent county administered funds; 70.2 per cent, state funds; 6.11 per cent, federal funds; .72 per cent local non-tax revenue receipts; 3.79 per cent, federal non-revenue receipts; and .68 per cent from transfers and payments from other districts.

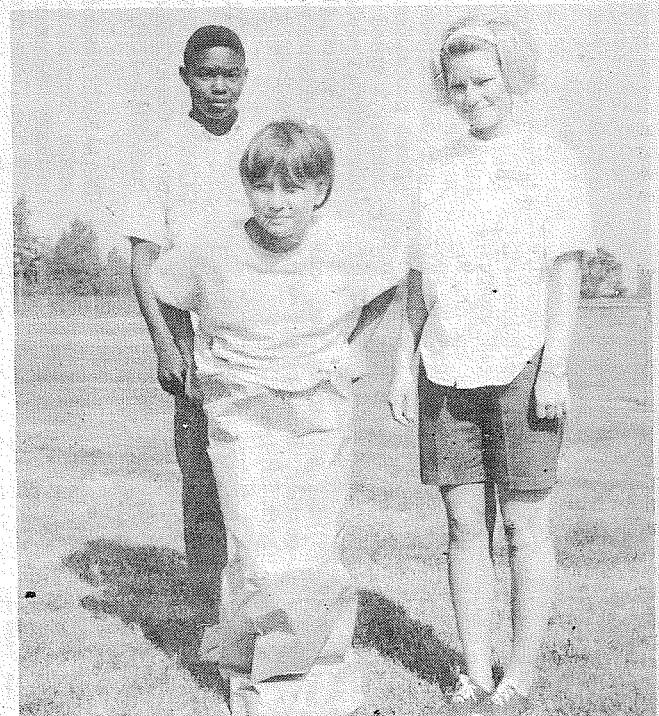

Mental Retardation Affects Everyone

(Editors Note: This is the first of a series of articles pertaining to Mental Retardation in Pierce County. Although only a small percentage of the mentally retarded are from the immediate area, we feel that it directly affects every citizen.)

would become retarded. This figure would indicate that 3.0 percent of all births would be affected in some way.

The degree of retardation varies among individuals. It ranges from the profoundly retarded person, who must have protective care for life, to the mildly affected individual, who can achieve a measure of independence.

In the last few years many steps have been taken to almost eliminate such diseases as diphtheria, whooping cough and scarlet fever. Even Tuberculosis and Polio have been reduced dramatically. In spite of all the latest medical advances, mental retardation still persists.

Any condition which affects or interferes with the prenatal development of the brain, or which injures its structure after birth may cause mental retardation. An individual's intellectual development may be seriously impeded, by an unfavorable emotional or cultural environment. In three out of four mentally retarded persons,

the causes are not yet clearly known. Accurate diagnosis is essential to the treatment of mental retardation. However, only gross impairment is evident in early childhood. This is generally involved in failure to walk and talk at appropriate times. Survey's show in most cases, that until the child goes to school, intellectual deficit does not become apparent. This generally becomes evident by inability to perform kindergarten or first grade work.

Sunday's stock car slate will also feature another Powderpuff main, better known as the battle of the unguided missiles.

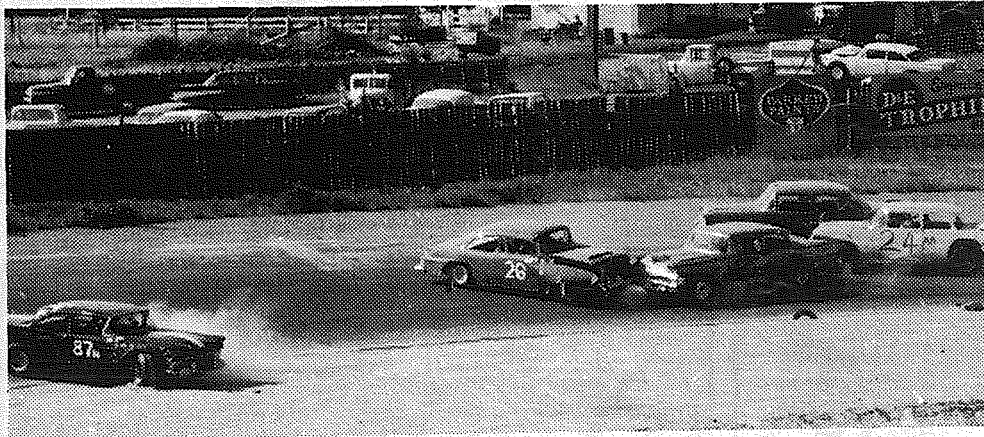
A near record crowd attended last week's ARI mid season championships and were treated to some of the finest racing action of the year.

McCHORD AFB - "Eternal Vigilance is the price of liberty," Thomas Jefferson said. This week the Air Defense Command, with headquarters in Colorado Springs, Colo., marks its 17th anniversary of active runway alert.

The 325th Fighter Wing at McChord has been a part of that alert force since its beginning, flying the sleek F-106 Delta Darts.

Since 1950, the U.S. Air Force Air Defense Command has been helping the nation pay the price of which Jefferson spoke. It began on

June 27, three days after the Korean War had started. It was a hurried, patchwork beginning with rickety World War II fighter planes ordered to 24 hour alert against a developing threat. And, Jefferson was correct in his early observation, since the threat and the alert have proved to be enduring.

"This threat represents a continual responsibility and a vital challenge. We in the Air Force Air Defense Com-

mand are not pessimistic about the outcome. It was said 20 years ago that we could not attain an effective capability against the manned bomber. We have that capacity now, and we feel confident that some day, we hope soon, the nation shall have a similar capability to defend against both the inter-continental ballistic missile and any developed threat from space vehicles," said Lt. Gen. Herbert E. Thatcher, commander of Air Defense Command.

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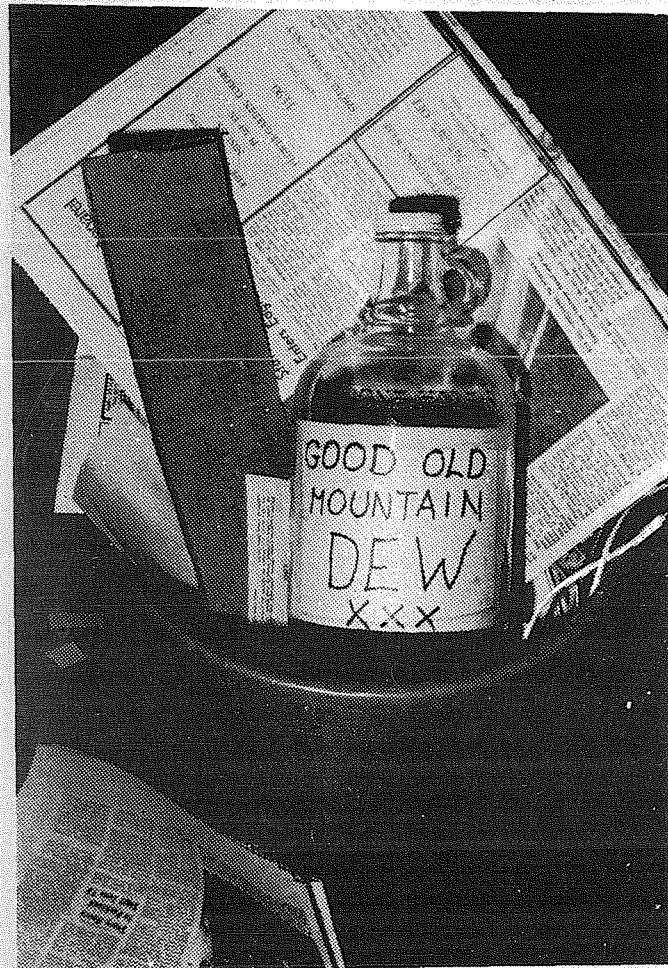


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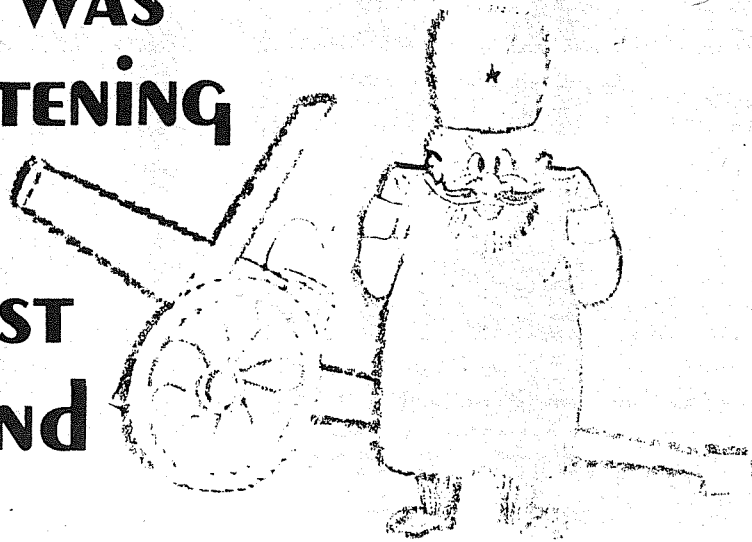
