Parkland Team Wins Connie Mack State Tourney Berth

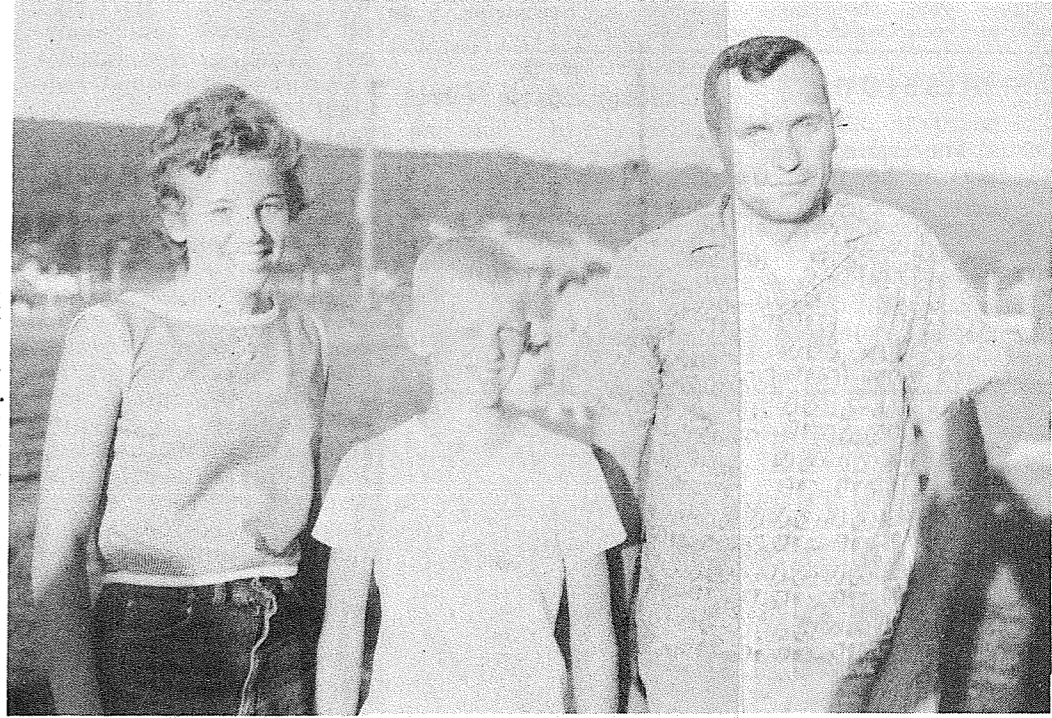

Let Me Tell One: Dr. Eastvold Retires Here

This week the retirement was official. Dr. Seth C. Eastvold, stepped down on Tuesday as the president of Pacific Lutheran University, an institution which he had guided since 1943. Among the accomplishments attained during his tenure at the Parkland School included the reaching of the stature of a University; major buildings such as the science hall, college union, three dormitories, a new classroom building and the new gymnasium. Rising now on the campus is the brand new dormitory and dining hall. A number of smaller buildings were built during this period also. Dr. Eastvold has a very fitting memorial to a Christian gentleman in the Eastvold Chapel, named for him. Succeeding Dr. Eastvold is Dr. Robert Mortved, of Chicago, a highly respected educator. Having never had the privilege of meeting Dr. Eastvold personally, I can only speak of him through the reactions of the community and through the observations I have made on several trips around the campus of the school. It is hard to assess the impact that any one man has had on a community. I feel safe in saying that Dr. Eastvold would be more willing to give some of the credit for his accomplishments to others who have undoubtedly helped him. But during the past 19 years, one name has been associated with Pacific Lutheran, and usually when one thought of the school one thought of Dr. Eastvold. I also feel safe in saying for the community. "Well done, and the best of wishes for your new position."

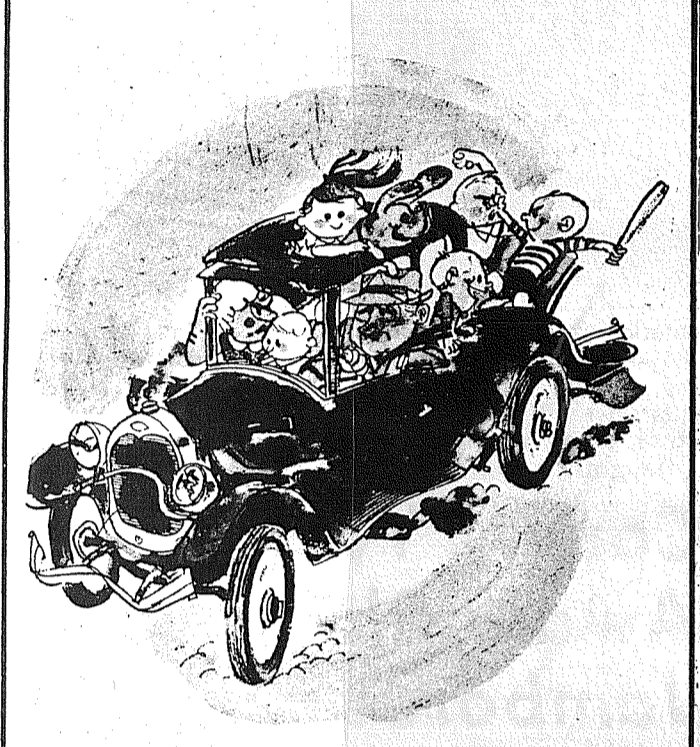

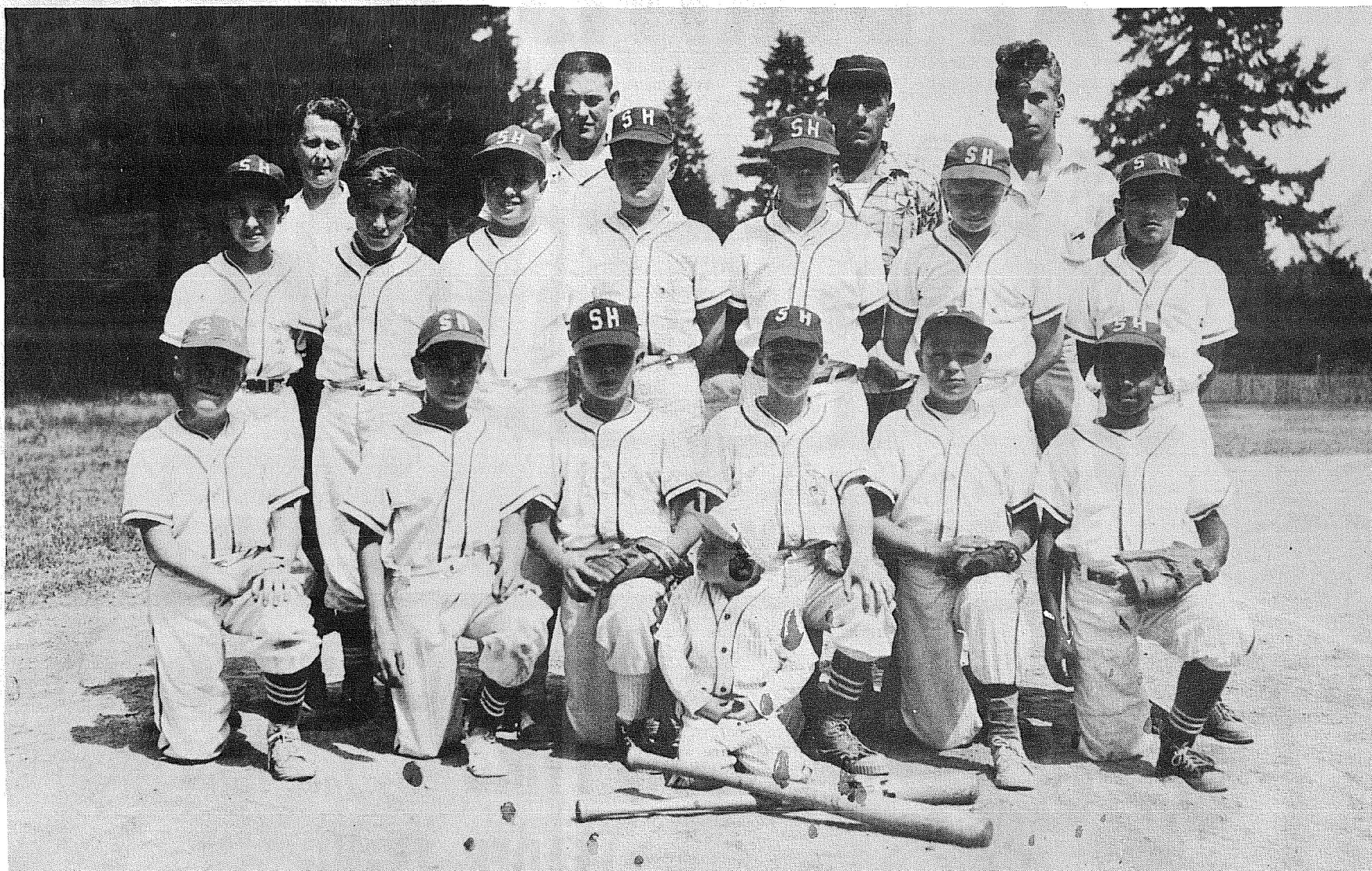
Letter To Editor:

S. 174 does NOT add or control in any way ANY land, not now, in government control--it merely

places bounds on this area and places it in control of Congress and the President instead of one man as of now--it provides for a great many thousand acres to be withdrawn for public use--and the remainder to have 10 years study by forestry experts and mining and other experts BEFORE it is permanently classified as wilderness--and also in case of national emergency or need can be used in any manner. It provides all existing woods must remain open--all areas inside the area now open to lumbering to remain open, all areas now used for grazing to remain open for grazing, all private owned lands to remain private, all landing fields now use to remain open and used, trails now in use to continue in use, and makes provisions for additional trails for any needed use.

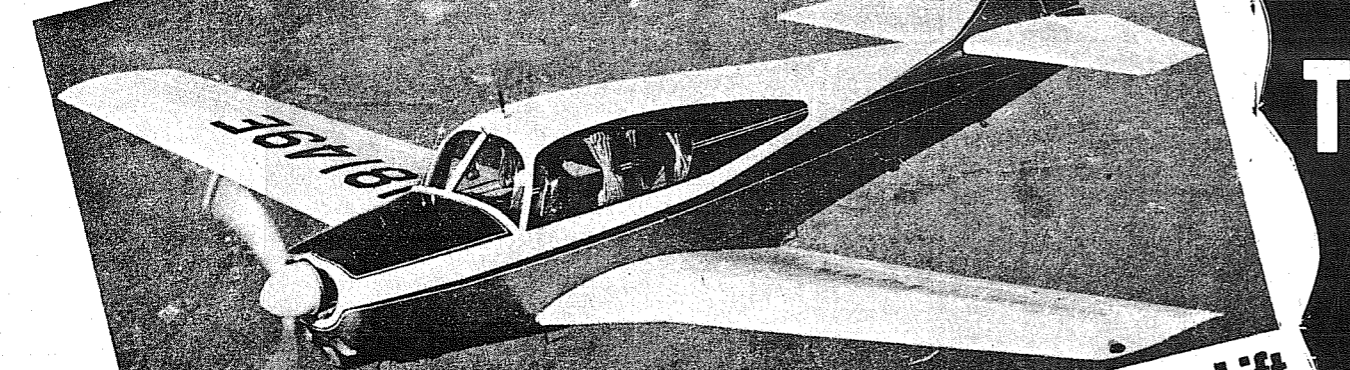
