Church Convention Set For July

Mr. Hugh Ostrander, presiding minister of Jehovah's Witnesses for Tacoma, announced that the Watchtower Society has chosen Empire Stadium, Vancouver, B.C., Canada, to be the site for one of the series of mammoth district Bible conventions to be held from the Eastern coast to the Western hal of the United States and Canada.

Ostrander noted that an enthusiastic delegation from Tacoma is making plans to attend the six-day Bible conference, July 4 to 9.

The gathering will be the high point of the year's convention activities of Jehovah's Witnesses, who annually hold one district and two circuit Bible conventions. The attendance is expected to soar to 25,000 for the six-day seminar. Ostrander observed, "Jehovah's Witnesses feel that never before in the history of the world has there been a greater need for a return to Bible principles, and as they see world tension mounting with Communism closing in on all sides, it shows them the need to assemble with other Christians and share the message of hope offered by the Bible."

The headquarters of the Watchtower Society in Brooklyn, New York, will be sending special representatives to deliver key-note addresses at the meeting.

The Tacoma group will be arranging transportation for all persons interested in attending the Canadian convention. For further information, you are invited to call GR 2-8855.

The dates for the Puyallup Summer School program has been set for Thursday June 15, through Friday July 28th. This will allow for a two day holiday on Monday and Tuesday July 3 and 4th.

The summer school program has two principal objectives. The first of these is to provide

an enrichment program. This is accomplished by allowing students to take courses required for graduation so that their regular school program will be more flexible, to take courses of interest which are not offered in the regular school curriculum, and to take courses extending abilities and talents in special fields. The other objective is providing a remedial program. On the elementary level remedial courses will be offered in reading (phonics), arithmetic, language, handwriting and spelling. On the secondary level students may make up deficiencies in mathematics, english, social studies and other courses.

Classes for students in grades 3-8 will meet for one-hour sessions beginning at 9:00 am. In grades 9-12 classes will meet for two-hour sessions beginning at 8 am.

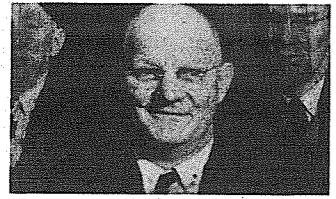

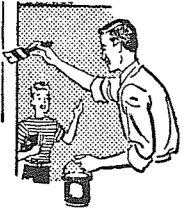

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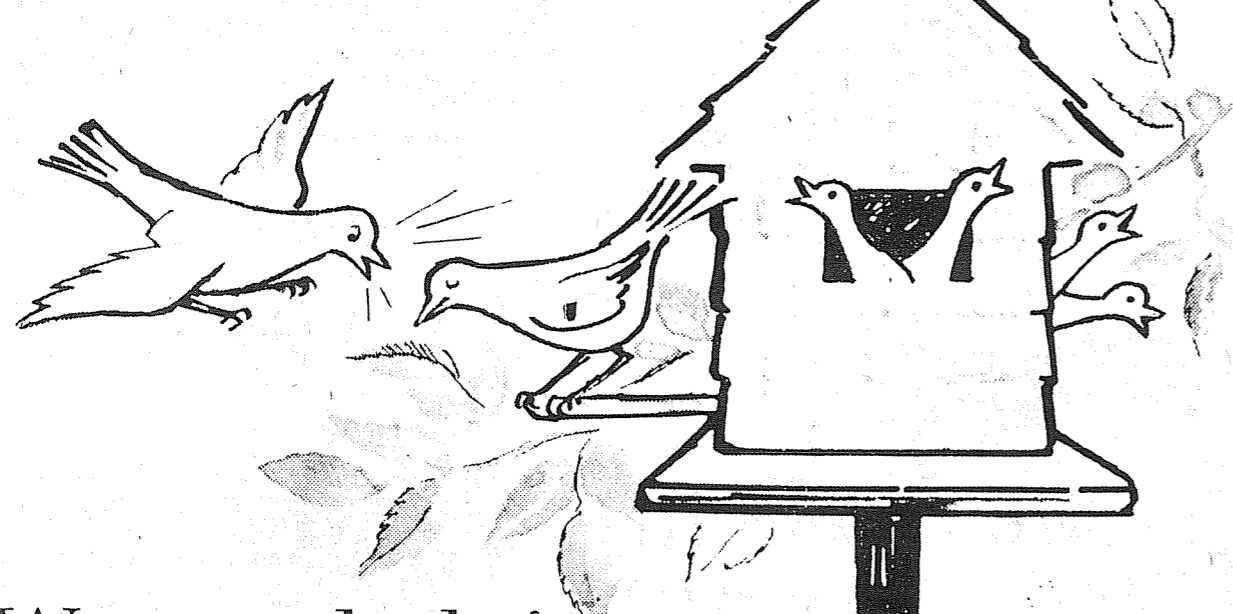

**a-Wondering . . .

Most people pay their federal income taxes via the withholding system. The employer keeps back a certain percentage of the paycheck and turns it over to the government.

Many workers don't have any accurate idea of just how much is deducted, so some concerns have adopted novel ways of driving the lesson home.

One, for instance, set up two adjoining pay windows. At the first each employee was given his full check, without deductions. But he had to go at once to the second window and shell out his tax for that pay period.

Another used a different means of achieving the same purpose. An employee whose pay was \$100 a week was given the full amount, without any deductions, for three weeks. But at the end of the fourth week the pay envelope held a measly \$23.60. When he screamed in protest the tax story was explained to him. His four-week bill was \$76.40, and the company had taken it in one big bite, instead of four smaller ones.

A publication of the Florida Power and Light Company, after telling of these two devices to make employees more conscious, observes: "Employees who suddenly have been jolted by the size of the tax bite, usually develop a less complacent viewpoint. They see the connection between high federal spending and the lump of tax money chopped from their paychecks."

The country needs more of that kind of jolting of the taxpayers.

There's no longer much prestige in being a two car family unless you can boast a horse trailer, house trailer and a boat trailer, to boot, for each.

Well I just took a look-see in my desk drawer and find I have seven magazine articles and four books yet to look through that I have promised people I would read, so please . . . no more for a little while till I catch up. By the same token please do not construe this to mean that I do not appreciate people taking the time to bring me articles they feel would be of interest to you readers.

I have one letter that I have picked up, read and re-read several times and so far have not had the time to look into the matter at all, to my satisfaction. The writer obviously did not intend the letter to be a letter to the editor and therefore it has not appeared as such, however I am going to run it in this column sans head and sig and see what your reaction to it is. Maybe there's some of you who have the time and knowledge to champion this cause, if, as this writer feels, it deserves a champion.

The letter is as follows
"Small town newspaper editors are famous for championing lost causes. How about championing a cause that seems to be lost before it's started? I'm referring to Educational T.V. in the Franklin Pierce school district.

Right here I'd like to point out that Ed. T.V. is NOT experimental. It passed that point long ago. It has been proven, is being used and has been used in Eastern Schools for years. The Franklin Pierce School District has peculiar problems in that it is the fastest growing area in the state. As a result the school district is so far behind the population explosion in its building program that it may take years to catch up. In addition, there is equipment, scientific, and otherwise, sadly lacking in our classrooms due to inadequate funds. So there is no money for Educational T.V. and may not be for 5, 10, 15 years to come.

The school officials can't ask for more millage to provide for a T.V. program because the people are paying nearly 20 mills now and experience has shown that above 20 mills the taxpayer refuses to vote it in. Consequently, such a failure would mean not only no T.V. program, but also a drastic curtailment of the building program which they can't allow to happen.

They could cut something else in the school program and use E. T.V. in its place. But what would it be? We need everything provided for in the budget now. Squeeze it in? Ha! Even Houdini himself would find it hard to squeeze in \$10,000 to \$20,000 for this program. It would cost even more except that the National Defense Act supports part of it.

The only way I can see is for the taxpayer to be informed of the facts, what it would cost, what the benefits are, how it would help the child, the teacher, the parent, the school, the community and let him decide whether the children in the Franklin Pierce School District are being deprived of something that the neighbor's children are getting in the districts of Bethel, Clover Park, Puyallup, the other county schools and the Tacoma schools. Perhaps then the taxpayer, and that means me, my friends and neighbors may consent to loosen the purse strings and say to the School Board, "Look Gentlemen, you are doing a magnificent job with what we've given you, but it's not enough, so here's a little more if you'll use it for the Educational Television Program."

So how about it, Jack? Feel like slaying a few dragons for the kids in our district?

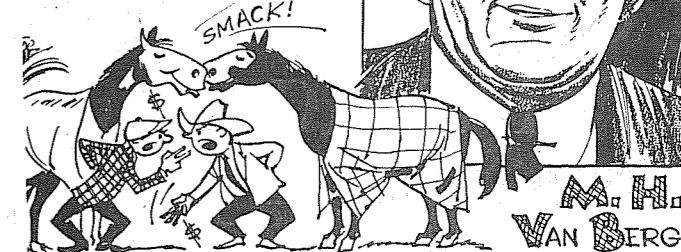
Thanks a lot if you do, and thanks anyway if you don't."

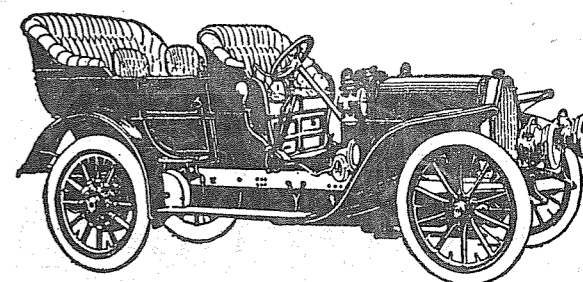

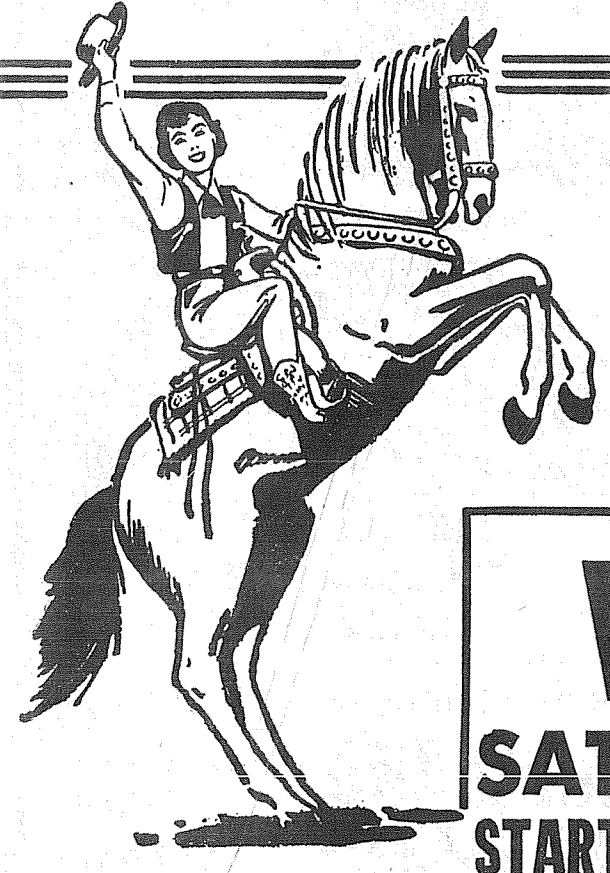

It's the Law

WHO GETS THE PATENTS?
Joe invented a novel snow remover for use on sidewalks in 1957.

A local manufacturer built fifty of Joe's snow removers in a partnership with Joe and sold them in the winter of 1957-1958. Joe didn't apply for a patent on his invention. The local manufacturer lost interest in making more of the machines.

In the fall of 1959 a national manufacturer showed interest in the snow remover and offered to make and sell them and pay Joe a royalty if he would get a U.S. patent covering the device.

Do you think Joe will have any trouble patenting his snow remover?

Unfortunately, it will be impossible for Joe to patent his invention now, even though he could have patented it successfully in 1957. Joe failed to meet the time deadlines established by Congress in the patent laws.

The most important stumbling block in the patent laws is that an application for patent protection of an invention must be filed in the Patent Office within one year of the first public use or sale of the new invention, or within one year of its description in a printed publication.

A patent grants to an inventor a limited monopoly to make, use and sell his invention in this country for seventeen years. It is not renewable except by a special act of Congress. In return for the monopoly privilege given, the government demands prompt disclosure of the invention.

A delay of more than a year in filing a patent application violates the intent of the patent laws. For his delay in applying for a patent, Joe lost his right to patent what might have been a valuable invention.



GOOD GOLF

Poor Grip, Poor Score
Power, Control Depend on Grip
BY SAM SWING

The mechanics of golf are exacting and the way you grip the club is no exception. Good golf hinges on a good grip. Two grips — the overlapping and the interlocking — are standard. From them you fashion your own. Basically, the club is held by the three last fingers of the left hand and the thumb and forefinger of the right. The V's formed by thumbs and index fingers of both hands should point somewhere between the head and right shoulder. Remember that your hands are your only link with the club and, indirectly, with the ball. Hold, don't squeeze, the club and make sure your grip is firm and comfortable through your entire swing.

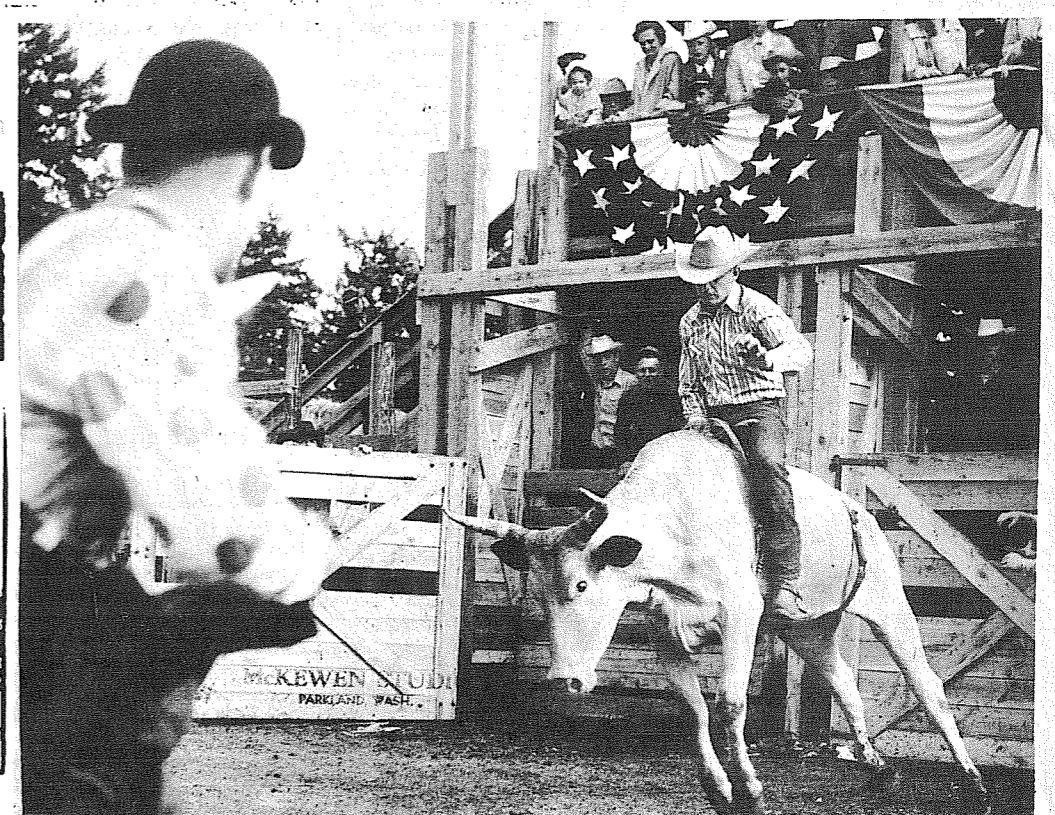
