IT'S ROUND UP TIME IN PARKLAND

War Whoop, Bagpipes, Cowboy All Have Place in Parade

"It looks like it's finally coming true—we are giving the country back to the Indians," Larry Armstrong, Parkland Round-Up Parade Chairman said this week.

His comment was prompted by the entries of two more tribal groups in the parade. So far, the Huron Tribe, Cowlitz and Nisqually will be represented, and Armstrong said he had been told that even more tribes may appear in the final line-up.

At any rate, war-whoops will resound down Pacific Avenue and on Garfield St. when the parade makes its annual journey on May 26th.

At least nine riding groups will be represented including the Parkland Junior Riding Club headed by Grace Kirkwood, the Tacoma Lariettes, the Spanaway Prairie Riders, and the Rocking H 4H Club from Summit View.

Each riding group this year must furnish its own clean up unit, Armstrong advised. There will be extra clean-up crews, also. The Tally-Ho—an open buggy -- will be with the parade again, as well as the stage coach, covered wagon surreys, buggys and eight passenger wagons.

Bands and plenty of western music will be provided, and there will be lots of old time cars, clowns, novelty acts and marching units.

Entries thus far have exceeded expectations, Armstrong says, and adds that the audience lining the parade route can expect a bigger, livelier parade than the one which caused so much favorable comment a year ago.

Activities Begin Thursday

With the activities starting on Thursday at the Rodeo Grounds, the 1962 Parkland Roundup promises to be bigger and better than ever.

Thursday morning, Burt McMurtrie will conduct his breakfast with McMurtrie radio program at the grounds.

In the evening, starting at 7 p.m., the judging of the Roundup Queen aspirants will begin at the Rodeo grounds. Admission is by Roundup button.

Friday night will see the big Western Jamboree in Parkland, with the merchants rolling out the red carpet for visitors and a street-type dance scheduled for 112th and Pacific at Beitz' Service Station. The dance will start at 9 p.m.

Moving into high gear on Saturday, the Round-Up Parade will take over the morning hours starting at 10 a.m. The big parade will start at 96th and Pacific and continue to 133rd and Pacific. The Parade route will include Garfield Street.

At 2 p.m. the Rodeo starts, with brahma bull riding, bareback bronc riding, Texas barrel reining, calf roping, wild cow milking and the mad scramble on the schedule. Entries for all events are available at The Bunkhouse.

Saturday night the big Rodeo Dance will be held at Spanaway Park, with Doc Watson's Jamboree providing plenty of western-type music for dancing, from 9 p.m. to 2 a.m.

Sunday's Rodeo will provide a fitting climax for the week of Round-Up activities.

Special attractions at the rodeo on both days will be parachute jumping exhibitions by the Rainier Sky Divers, Inc., the Sport Parachuting Club from Thun Field.

Admission to the Rodeo will be \$1.50 for adults, 75¢ for children. There are covered seats available in the grandstands, and plenty of free parking at the grounds. Concession stands will operate both days.

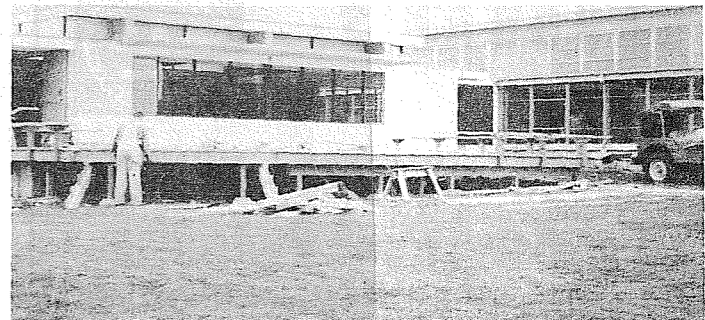

Student Commons Building Opens Doors At F-P

Franklin Pierce students will see the money they raised put to good use as their Student Commons Building will be opened this week.

Money for the lounge was started by the class of 1959's donation toward the school. The rest of the money was raised the following years by student drives.

The building was designed and constructed by the Douglas Fir Plywood Association. It is pre-fabricated and was built, painted, and tiled in only two and a half months. The building, designed basically as a portable classroom will be a place for students to come before and after school and during lunch.

A deck is now being built on the south side of the building. This deck was presented by this year's senior class as its gift. A stereo console, housed in a cabinet made by students in wood shop, will also be in the lounge.

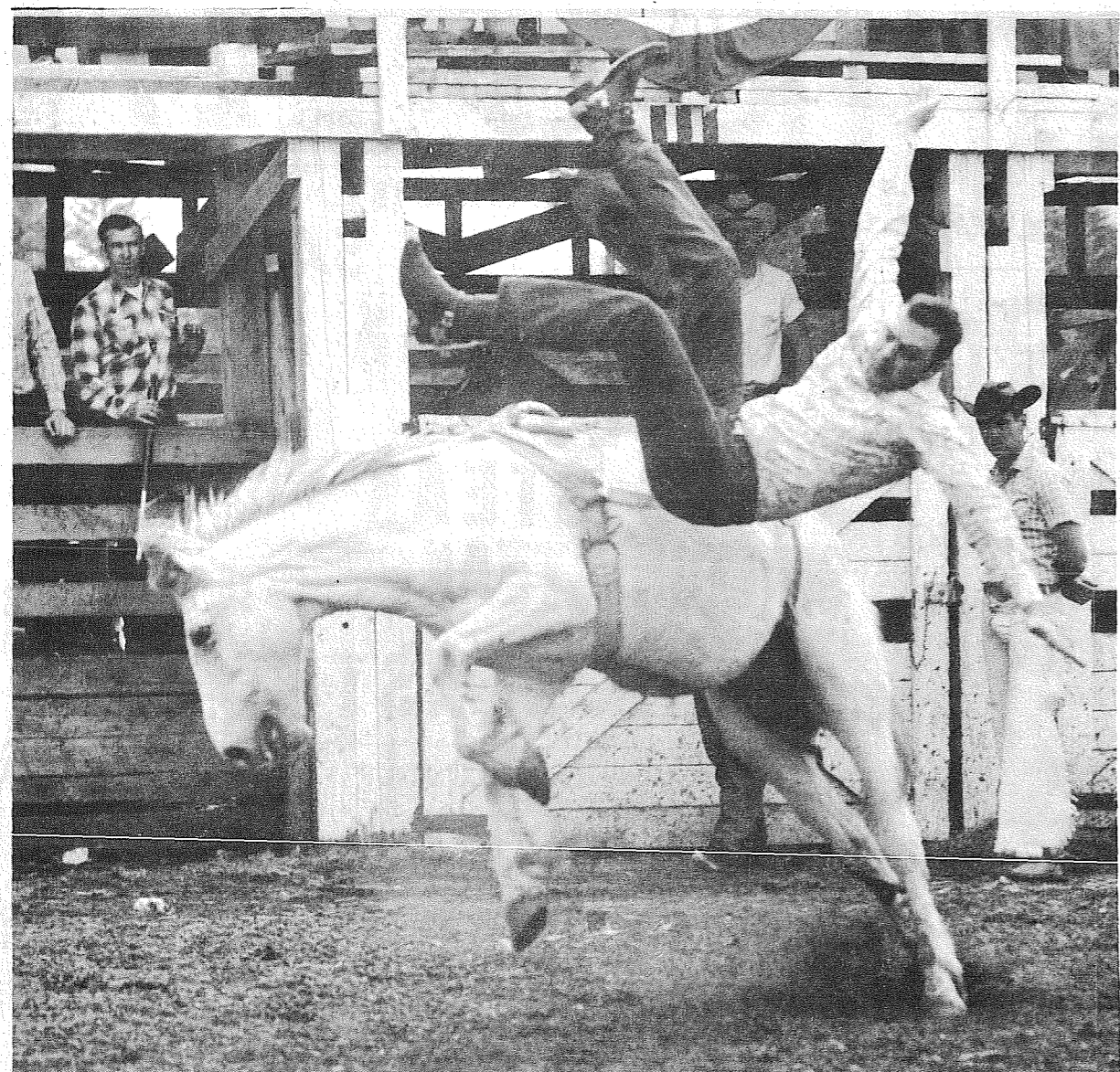

The American Legion Poppy Sale will be held May 25 and 26 this year. Poppies, made in veteran's hospitals all over the country will go on sale.

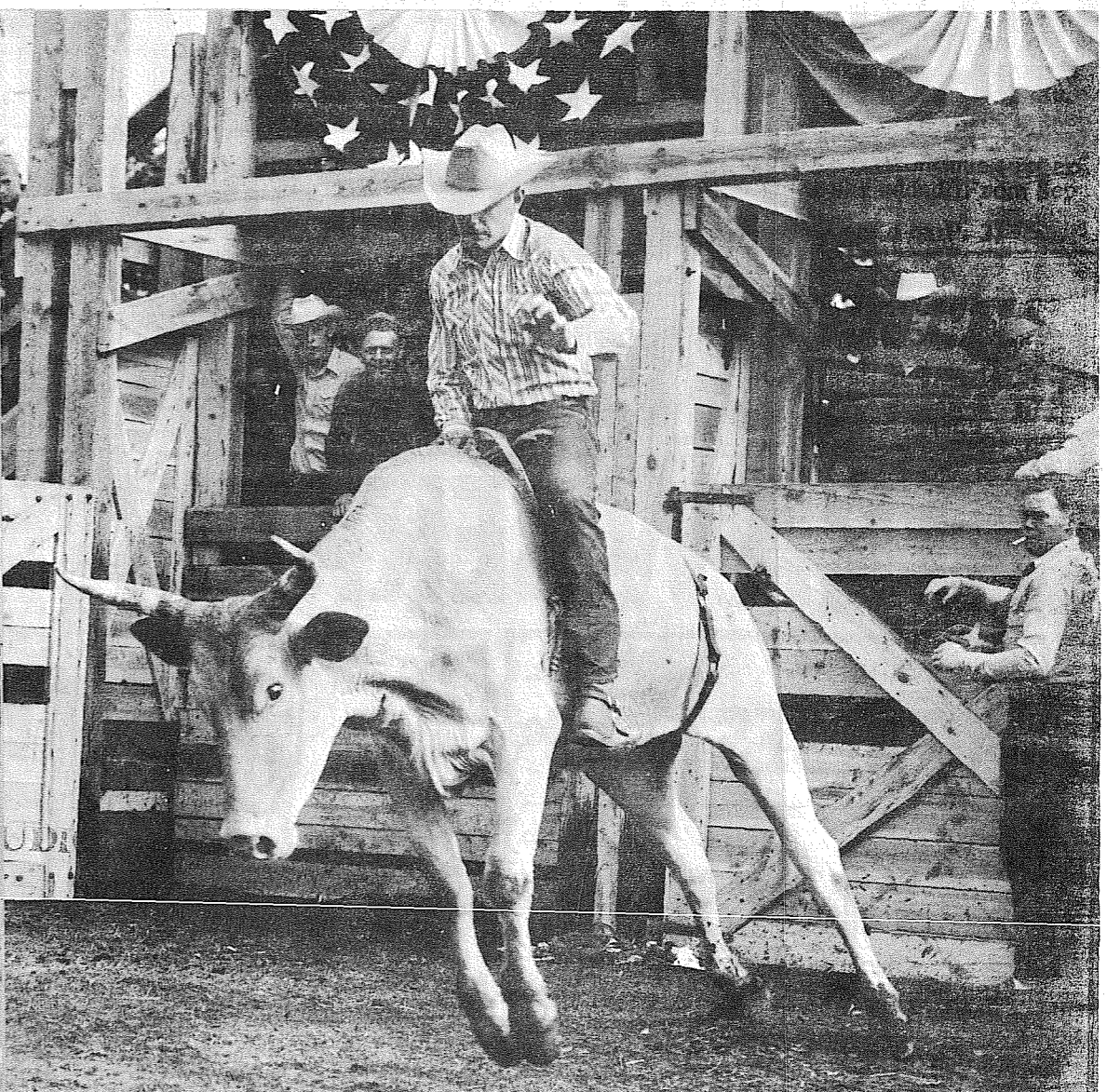

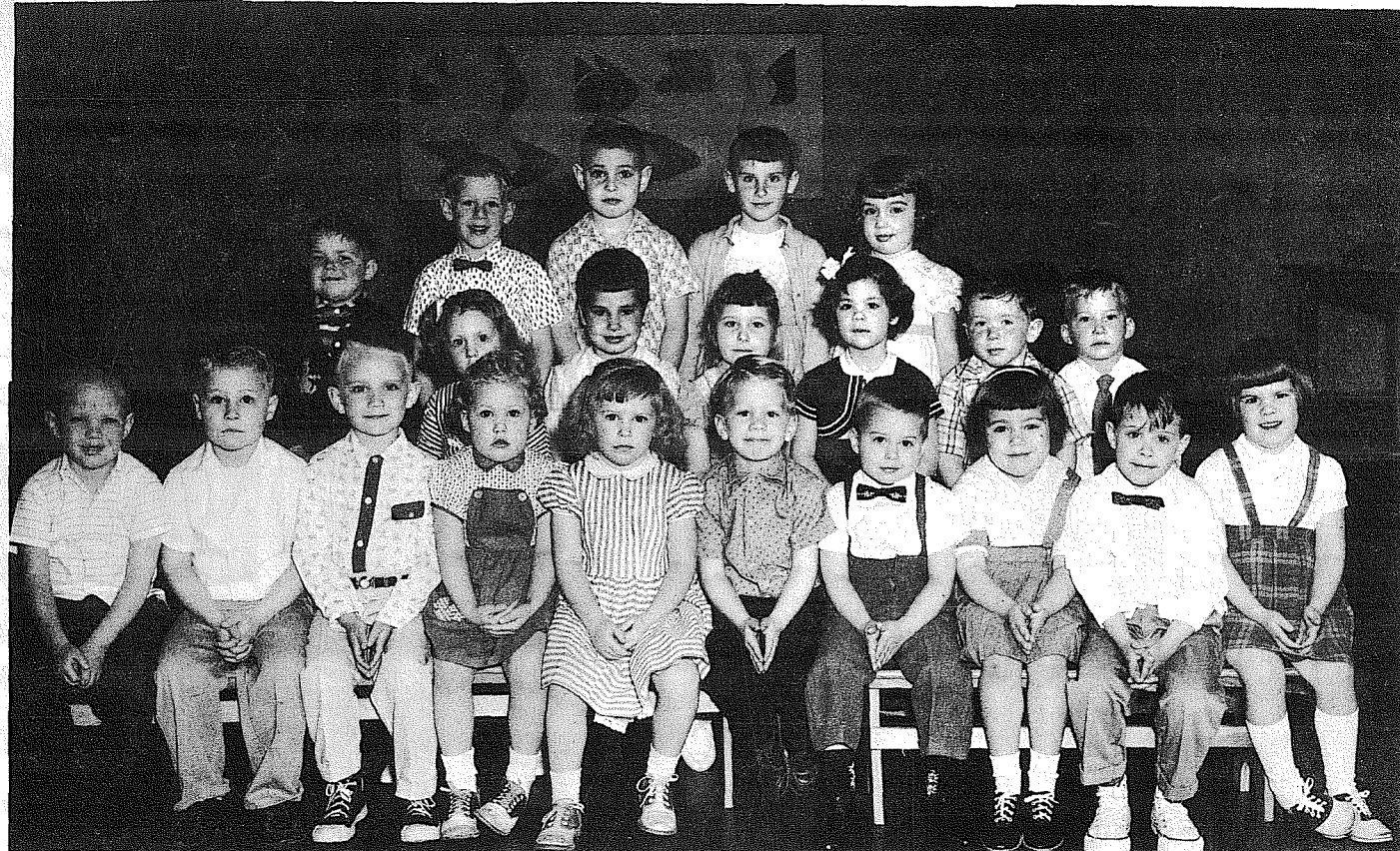


FP Teacher Selected For Institute To Hold Picnic



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

The Portland, Oregon, Journal has something worthwhile to say about the President's proposal for the most sweeping kind of federal laws to "protect" the consumer. These would cover a lengthy list of products in virtually universal use, including foods, drugs, cosmetics, and so on.

No one objects to regulations dealing with such matters as proper labeling, safety, and honest claims. But, as the Journal puts it, the question now "is whether we are ready for the federal government to go beyond its traditional policeman's role of enforcing 'thou shalt not' on manufacturers and merchandisers in competitive fields and to begin telling them that they must make specified products to specified standards."

Moreover, some of the proposals in the Presidential message seem to present practical impossibilities. Take, for instance, the provision applying to drugs. It would require manufacturers not only to prove that a drug is safe, which is certainly reasonable, but that it will also be effective. Inasmuch as in drug administration, as in so many other things, one man's meat may prove to be another man's poison, this would severely limit drug development and marketing, at an unknown but potentially great cost in health and human welfare.

Beyond that, the proposals, if accepted in toto, would substitute decisions of a bureaucracy for the decisions made, as of now, by the consumer, the producer, and the retailer. Big Brother would tell us what is good for us, and what we can and cannot have—whether the item in question is a medicine, a box of cereal, of a TV set. It's hard to believe the American public—or the American Congress—is ready for that.

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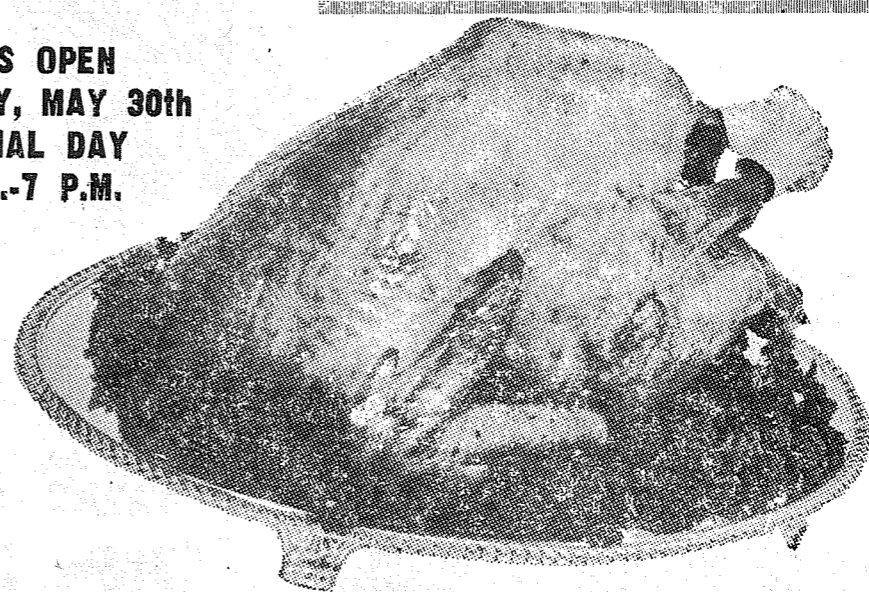
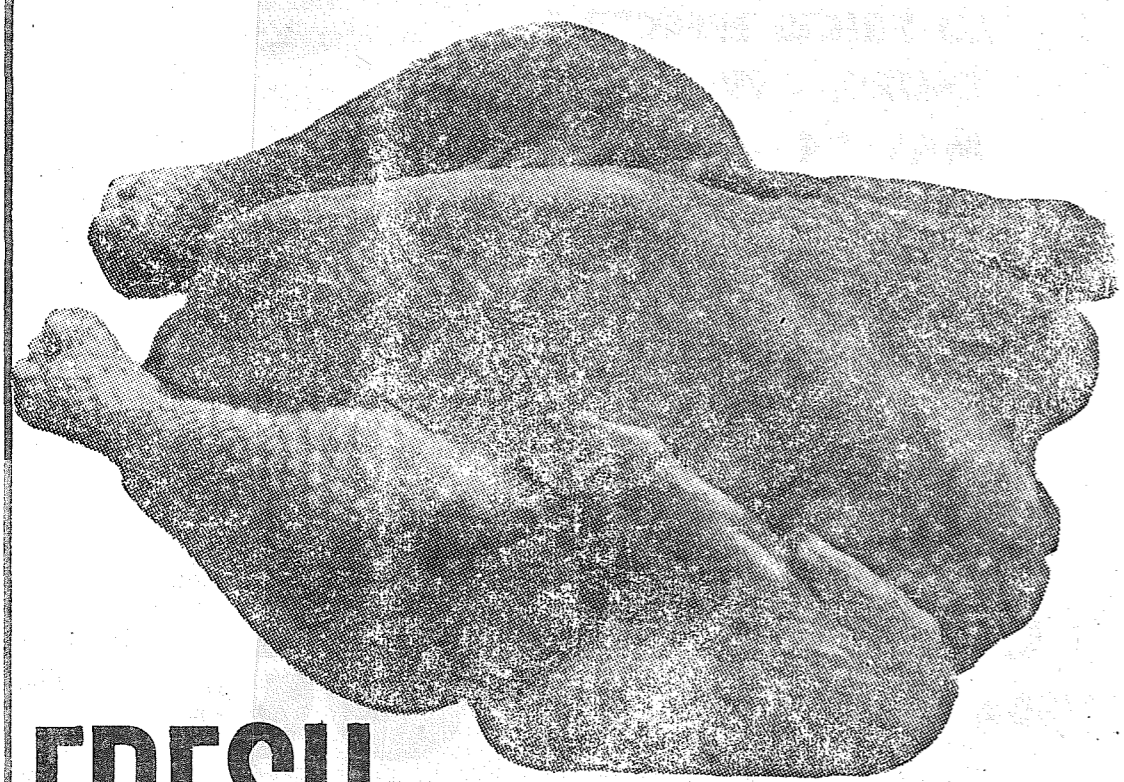

Sky Divers To Perform At Parkland Rodeo

Rainier Sky Divers will perform sky diving exhibitions during the Parkland Rodeo, Saturday and Sunday, May 26 and 27 between 1:00 and 2:00 p.m. Jumping from an altitude of 7,500 feet, the jumpers will execute aerobatic maneuvers, delaying 30 seconds before opening their parachutes. The jumpers will be Rod Zilkoski, Bud Lynn Lee Huston, Tom Moulds, Lon Ritchey, Bruce Wilson and Gary Gosenberg.

Rainier Sky Divers, a sport parachuting and sky diving club, has been organized for over five years and is the only civilian jump club in Pierce County. It now has 50 members and students, with clubhouse and operations at Thun Field near Puyallup. It is a non-profit sport club and each year makes exhibition jumps for child welfare and worthy causes. Rainier Sky Divers has jumped for Tacoma Boys Clubs, YMCA Boy Scouts and many community celebrations.

Saturday and Sunday, June 16 and 17, at Thun Field, five miles south of Puyallup on Highway 5N, the Rainier Sky Divers are holding their Second Annual Sky Diving Competition with entrants from all over the western United States. Over 100 jumpers will compete in the spot jumping and sky diving events. Five to six thousand spectators are expected and everyone is invited to attend the meet. All proceeds will go to child welfare through the Active 20 - 30 Club of Puyallup, which will provide concessions and fun for the whole family. Ample parking space will be available at the field.

Sport parachute jumping is a test of skill of parachute canopy manipulation by the jumper who must maneuver his parachute to a predetermined spot landing. Scoring is determined by the distance from where the jumper lands to the target center. These jumps take place at low altitudes. Sky diving events from much higher altitudes are judged much like platform diving in which the precision with which jumpers complete aerobatic maneuvers such as back loops, figure eights barrel rolls, etc., determines the contestant's score. The sky diver falls for over 30 seconds before opening his parachute.

Sky Diving, the Space Age Sport of Century 21, is relatively new in the United States. In Bulgaria, Russia, France and other European countries it has been an active sport for over thirty years. Sport sky diving in the United States really started after the Korean War and is one of the fastest growing sports in America today. In 1960 the United States made a clean sweep of the World Championships, defeating the Russians, Bulgarians, and French who had dominated the sport before that time. Once again American ingenuity, interest and competitive spirit triumphed in a sport new to the American scene. Leonardo da Vinci designed a parachute in 1495
