Now that school is out I'd like to address a message to all the children who will be having their fun with no thoughts of school, at least for a couple of months. I think this should be addressed to the younger, grade school children and to the junior high set.

This year it's up to you to stay alive on the streets and highways.

Traffic safety has been pounded into all the older people who can drive cars until they can listen without even hearing what is being said.

It's up to you to look before you cross streets and before you chase that ball into the street. Because the ones of us who can drive probably won't be thinking about all of you being scattered around to your homes enjoying the vacation from the regimentation of school.

You'll be as free as birds, coming and going at all hours of the days, and we older people tend to forget that while you're in school. We usually get annoyed when we're driving just before or after school because we have to be careful in school zones and watch out for school busses.

It might be a good thing if you took it on yourselves--each one of you--to make a personal project to reduce the terrible toll of children hurt and killed each year by us drivers.

It doesn't take a big campaign or a solemn committee meeting or anything like that.



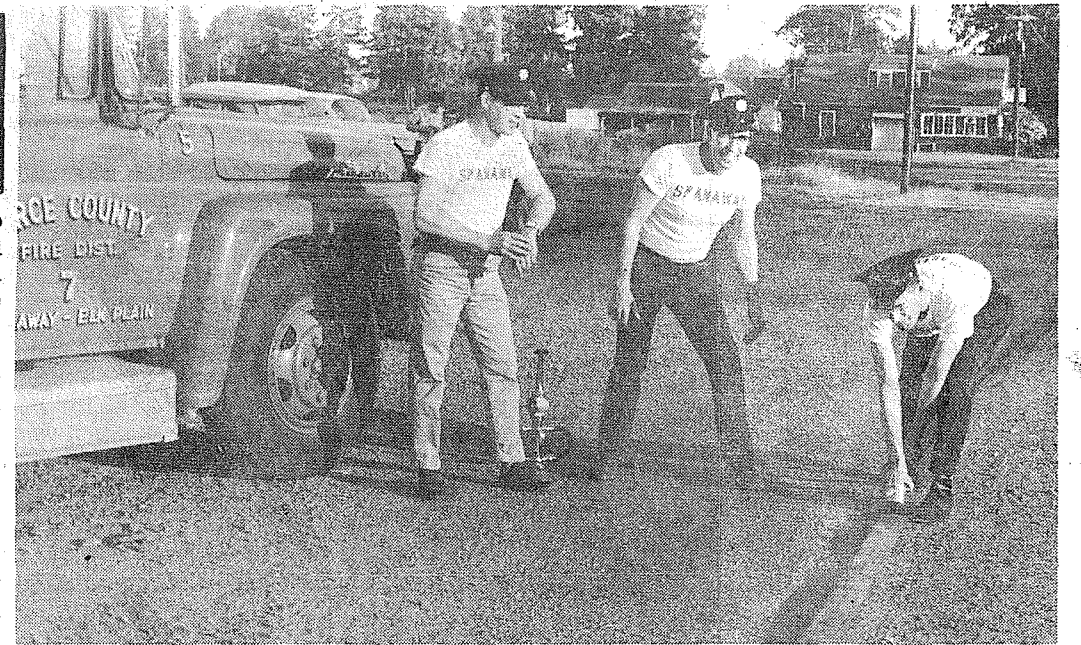

What it will take to keep the traffic safety record clear is for each of you children to be the one to remember the traffic laws and to be safety conscious. That way you can eliminate many of the accidents which are caused by those of us who drive.

The rules, of course, are simple. Don't play in the street, don't run across streets, always look before crossing a street and stay out from between parked cars. These and a few more which I'm sure you know are the main ones.

By remembering these you'll give yourself a chance and you'll also give a chance to drivers who tend to get careless. Most of us drivers know the rules and usually forget them in the rush of getting somewhere.

So, if all the young people who can't drive will take extra care this summer then our carelessness won't show in the statistical column which relates that more than 25,000 youngsters are hurt each year by automobiles.

## Roy Chaplain Retires From Army Service

Chaplain (Lt. Col.) Gary W. Roush of Roy, Ore., two in Alaska, two in the Orient, in addition to Fort Lawton recently upon completion of twenty years active duty in the U. S. Army. At a full military review commanded by Major General F. M. McGoldrick, commander of X U. S. Army Corps, comprising the five Northwestern states, Lt. Col. ## Area Code Official, Bell Tells

An important message to telephone customers here will arrive with June bills, according to an announcement from Pacific Northwest Bell manager David L. Williams.

A special bill insert will contain four stickers bearing the words "Area Code 206" and an explanation of the importance of Area Codes in long distance telephoning. The small "half moon" stickers are to be placed on the number plate of the telephone dial so that they cover the city name.

Instructions accompanying the stickers point out that Area Codes make each telephone customer's number "nationwide and personal, unduplicated among more than 80,000,000 telephones in the United States."

"We want customers to know the importance of Area Codes, be familiar with their own, and use them not only in placing calls to cities outside their home area but also by displaying them on business letterheads, cards and similar material," Williams explained.

Batali Files For Post

County Office Swayze Goal

Attorney Dino Batali, 29, today announced he will seek the Democratic nomination for state legislator from the 29th District.

Batali said many people within his district have urged him to run. "Foremost," said he, "the incumbents have let our district down." The incumbents are Helmut Jeuling and Dr. Charles Neuschwander, both Republicans.

Batali, a Gonzaga University law school graduate is a partner of the law firm, Stubbs & Batali. He is a former associate of Sterbeck, Manza, Moceri and Sterbeck, also a law firm.

Batali, a former assistant attorney general located in Seattle, was directly responsible to State Attorney General, John J. O'Connell.

A former trial examiner for the Washington State Board of Industrial Insurance Appeals, Batali initiated opinions and rulings involving workman injured on the job. During law school, he clerked for former U. S. Senator, C. C. Dill, a Democrat.

An Army veteran, Batali and his wife, a former Tacoma school teacher (Sue Backer), and their three children reside at 2102 Seaview Avenue.

Thomas A. (Tom) Swayze, Jr., today officially announced his candidacy for the Office of Prosecuting Attorney of Pierce County, on the Republican ticket.

Born in Tacoma in 1930, Swayze attended local schools, graduating from Stadium of Tacoma in 1948. He later earned degrees from the University of Puget Sound and the Law School of the University of Washington. Upon admission to practice by the Supreme Court, he became an Assistant Attorney General for the State of Washington, followed by a call to active duty with U. S. military forces.

Active in local, civic and professional affairs, Swayze is the retiring President of the Young Men's Business Club of Tacoma and an active member of other civic and fraternal organizations.

The newly announced candidate resides with his wife, the former Mariliss M. McCann, and their two daughters at 3408 N. 24th Street in Tacoma. His father was a former city and state official and one of the county's most respected citizens, before his passing in the fall of 1961. His mother is a State Representative for the 26th Legislative District.

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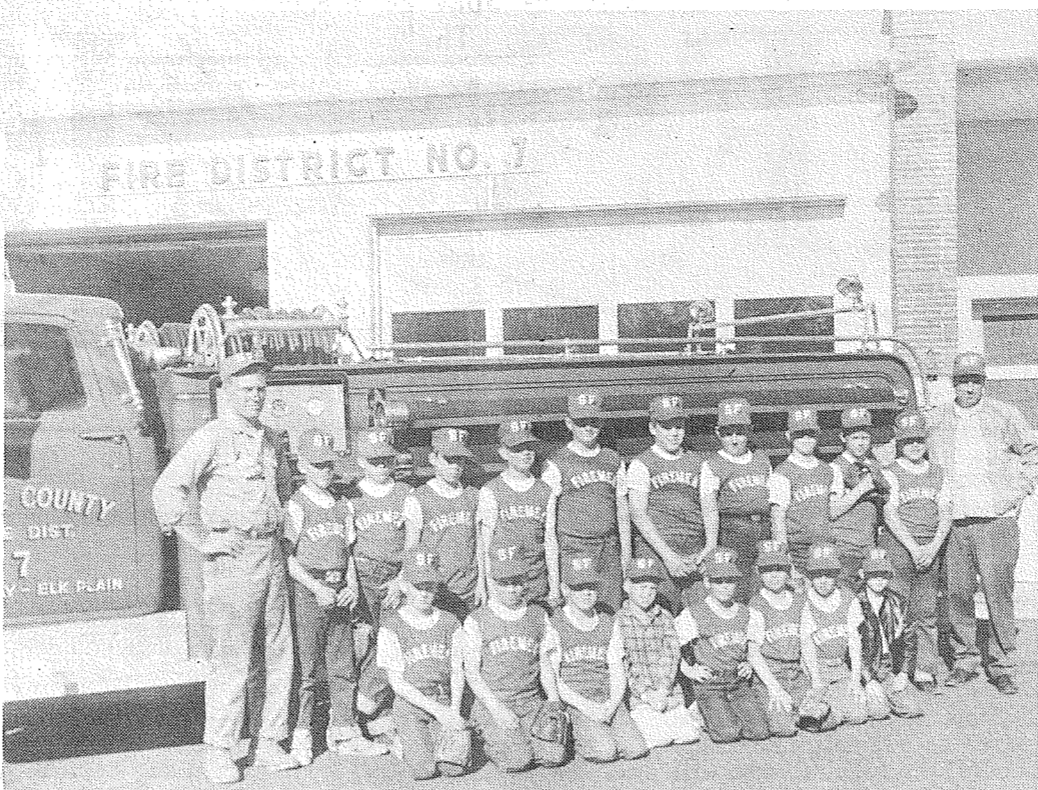
**Treasure Hunt Set By V.W. Club**
