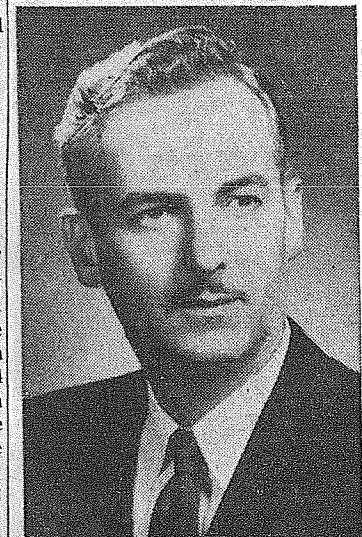

Parkland Light and Water Company is petitioning the Pierce County Commissioners for a franchise for a period of 25 years, to construct, operate, and maintain transmission lines for the transmission and distribution of electric

Notices for said hearing are in loose-leaf petition form, tacked to light poles of Elmhurst Mutual Company, in two places that I am aware of, namely: at 136th & A Streets, and 140th & A Streets. Both of these streets are dead-end streets. To my knowledge, there has been no official notice of this hearing in local newspapers.

If this franchise is granted as requested, the very "heart" of Elmhurst Mutual Company will be gone, with only the outside fringe areas left intact. The Company will be badly crippled, and it is doubtful if it could possibly carry on.

The Elmhurst Mutual Company is owned by its members, with each member having a vote; and it is a Company of which you can be proud. In the earlier years, the going was tough in serving the people in this area, which at that time no other company wanted to be bothered with. However, now that it is built up in first class shape, and the area is growing rapidly, it appears that it is a "ripe plum for somebody to pick."

If you, the members, are interested in saving your company, do not be misled, but turn out in mass at the hearing afore mentioned and protest the granting of a franchise to Parkland Light & Water Company for the transmission and distribution of electric energy in our territory. This is something that you cannot leave up to your neighbor to do. It is urgent that YOU be there, for it is YOU, and only YOU, who can save this company. a-Wondering . . . and a-Wandering . . .

I don't know about you, but I for one was more than a little disgusted with the Associated Press recently when they released a picture of Queen Elizabeth and Princess Margaret of England awaiting the arrival of our own president, to greet him. The picture under normal circumstances would have been wonderful and done much to strengthen relations between the U.S. and England, but some joker with a camera in his hand and mud in his mind snapped the picture just as a gust of wind whipped the princess's skirt high. This in itself was bad enough, when common decency compels a man to turn his head under the circumstances, but to have the daily papers throughout our nation flaunt the picture on their front pages was in my way of thinking a despicable gesture of indifference with reference to our world position, to say nothing of being in utter poor taste.

I've often wondered what it takes to have a so called green thumb. As I drive on Pacific Ave. I've noticed several places where beautiful green grass is crowding its way up through the cracks in the cement, despite a lack of water and the countless thousands of cars passing over it. How does it happen that grass grows there yet dries out and dies out on my well watered and little traveled lawn? Is there some Cecil Solly out there among our readers who can supply the answer?

A number of congressmen have polled constituents to learn what they want in the way of a labor bill. The evidence is overwhelming that the voters want a really strong bill — far stronger than any that has so far been given serious Congressional consideration.

Representative Conte of Massachusetts asked: "Do you feel that labor reform legislation should cover the problems of secondary boycotts and blackmail picketing?" The results: 843 people said Yes, as against 43 No.

Representative Latta of Ohio asked: "Do you favor legislation to effectively curb the irregularities revealed by the McClellan committee in some of the labor unions?" The result: 95.2 per cent of those replying said Yes; 4.8 per cent No.

Representative Berry of South Dakota asked: "Following the findings of the McClellan Labor Rackets Committee hearings, the President recommended labor legislation which would do four things: (1) Safeguard workers' funds in union treasuries against misuse of any kind whatsoever; (2) protect the rights and freedoms of individual union members, including the basic right to free and secret election of officers; (3) advance true and responsible collective bargaining; (4) protect the public and innocent third parties from unfair and coercive practices such as boycotting and blackmail picketing. Do you want me to oppose legislation which falls short of these four goals?" The result: 74 per cent said Yes; 14 said No.

It's hard to see how Congress, despite all the pressures for doing nothing brought by unions, can disregard such expressions of public opinion. The nation wants adequate labor legislation and it wants it now.

It's the LAW

At the trial of a married man for violation of the Mann Act the Court, over defendant's objection, permitted his wife to testify against him. His conviction was upheld by the Court of Appeals which held that such testimony was not error. Since Courts of Appeal in other circuits had followed a long-standing rule of evidence which bars one spouse from testifying against his or her spouse, the Supreme Court of the United States granted certiorari.

In its written opinion the Court reviewed the history of the common-law rule that a husband and wife were incompetent as witnesses for and against each other. The rule was based on a desire to foster family harmony, and an unwillingness to use testimony so influenced by self-interest. In fact, many years ago, a defendant was barred as a witness in his own behalf because of self interest. If he couldn't testify for himself, neither could his wife.

The modern trend has caused some of these disqualifications to be abolished. A defendant may testify in his own behalf and interested witnesses may now testify for him. It is for the jury to determine their credibility. But while judicial decisions now permit one spouse to testify for

his or her spouse, they have not changed that part of the common-law rule which excludes adverse testimony by one spouse against the other. The basic reason for the common-law rule still exists—the law refuses to pit husband against wife in a trial where life or liberty is at stake.

Over the centuries the rule has changed from one of absolute disqualification to a rule which bars the testimony of one spouse against the other unless both consent. There are certain limited exceptions to this rule, of course, such as a suit for divorce, annulment or separate maintenance, in which one spouse may testify directly against the other.

The Court concluded that under existing circumstances the rule should not be further relaxed. It found, therefore, that the wife's testimony was prejudicial and de-
