

FOR SUMMER DRINK

Leased by Charles Fulwiler to partners Dale and Lowell, store equipment builders and designers, the two-story white frame building with the TV western facade is bustling with activity.

Reported to be at least 75 years old, the building was last operated by Fulwiler as the Garfield Variety Store. He purchased the building in 1945.

The real history lies during the Lehman tenancy which started in 1926. Known as the Parkland Mercantile Company, it was traditionally a "crossroads" of "piny" northwest civilization equiped with pot-bellied stock and crackerbarrels. Alvin R. Lehman dispensed linament to linoleum with judicious observation on the state of the nation and the weather. It was the days of the almanacs printed next to patent medicine ads and sure cures for everything from gout to sciatica.

This was where the mail came also. The postoffice was operated in the back room with Lehman acting as postmaster until his death in 1944.

Old-fashioned winters and the short-range benefits of the "freeze or bake" heating system brought Lehman chillblains on the hands that traded necessary staples for butter and eggs.

A frugal economy then, farmers relied on Lehman's Mercantile in the days when function was the better part of value. Lehman's feed fed the flocks that produced the eggs that bought the feed and so on —

The old building on Garfield in the center of Parkland still serves as a reminder of old-timers of the days of chillblains, pot-bellied stoves, home-churned butter and the days of right-neighborly folks who sat for "jist a spell' 'at Lehman's Merchantile.

Silhouettes in bedding have changed as much in the last 100 years as in milady's fashions. Both have slimmed down consid-

erably and eliminated the puffs and padding.

Northern Electric Company, the nation's largest producer of electric blankets, points out that the typical bed in 1860 was a fit companion for the lady of the house. Its voluminous feather mattresses, thick blankets and puffy coverlets matched her well padded frame adorned with bustles, hoop skirts and ruffled sleeves. Elaborate coverlets and quilts were pleasing to the eye, but heavy on the sleeping body. And what a chore to wash!

Today's homemaker flits about her bedroom in slim tapered

pants and gay top, making her beds in a fraction of the time her great-grandmother required. Her beds, too, are sleek and smooth, thanks to fitted sheets and blankets of easy-care synthetic fibers that provide warmth without weight or bulk. A truly modern advance, the electric blanket, originated by Northern in 1912, can take the place of three conventional ones. This reduces the number of motions in bedmaking as well as the heft of bed coverings.


