ON OCTOBER 22, 1974, I TALKED TO MRS. MALLA (SINLAND) DAHL TO SET UP AN INTERVIEW DATE. (MRS. DAHL CAME HERE IN 1893) HER MAIN INTEREST, DURING THIS PHONE CALL WAS "OLD BETSY", PARKLAND'S STEAM ENGINE CONTACT TO TACOMA. SHE SAID THE DEPOT WAS ON THE CORNER OF C STREET AND GARFIELD STREET, ACROSS FROM "THE PRIMITIVE SHOP", (WHAT USED TO BE THE MOWER SHOP.). THE ENGINE MADE TWO TRIPS PER DAY AND CONNECTED WITH THE STREET CAR IN SOUTH TACOMA.

ON NOVEMBER 1, 1974, I INTERVIEWED MRS. DAHL AT HER HOME. MRS. DAHL TALKED ABOUT HER FATHER, SAMUEL SINLAND; OLD BETSY (THE STEAM ENGINE); THE HARSTAD'S; AND OTHER FAMILIES IN THE AREA. THE SINLANDS CAME TO PARKLAND IN 1893 WHEN MRS. DAHL WAS 5 YEARS OLD. SAMUEL CAME FROM BELLINGHAM, AT BING HARSTAD'S REQUEST, TO WORK ON PLU'S FIRST BUILDING. THE PAY WAS \$1.00 PER DAY PLUS LAND. FAMILIES IN

MISCELLANEOUS NOTES FROM THIS INTERVIEW AND OTHER PHONE CALLS DURING THE PAST FEW MONTHS:

1. SINLAND FAMILY CAME FROM NORWAY IN 1885. MRS. DAHL BORN IN 1888 IN HARMONY, MINN. FAMILY CAME TO BELLINGHAM IN 1890 AND TO PARKLAND IN 1893. SAMUEL WAS A CARPENTER, (LISERAND).  
MRS. SINLAND - INGER TONETE KJISELAND
2. RIGNEY'S, MILE S.W. OF PARKLAND. DONATION CLAIM. SMITH LAND FOR WASHINGTON HIGH SCHOOL, SOUTH 37<sup>TH</sup> STREET, MABEL (SMITH) SINLAND, DAUGHTER OF GEORGE SMITH.
3. MRS. DAHL SAID NORWEGIANS LIVED AROUND THE SCHOOL AND EVERY ONE ELSE LIVED FARTHER AWAY. (IN THE OUTSKIRTS, <sup>i.e., BROOKDALE</sup> HILLHURST.)
4. BUTCHER WAGON MADE TRIPS AROUND THE COMMUNITY AND SOLD PORK & BEEF.
5. NORWEGIANS (FOREIGNERS) NOT WELL LIKED. COMMENT ABOUT WOMAN MRS. DAHL MET IN DENTIST'S OFFICE IN TAQUAMA. THE WOMAN TOLD MRS. DAHL SHE HAD LIVED IN PARKLAND AT ONE TIME, BUT HAD MOVED TO MIDLAND BECAUSE TOO MANY FOREIGNERS MADE LIFE RATHER UNBEARABLE.
6. MRS. DAHL'S DESCRIPTION OF TRIPS FROM OTHOP VALLEY TO TAQUAMA. TRAVELERS WOULD STAY OVERNIGHT AT THE SINLAND HOME ON PACIFIC AVENUE (NEAR STORAASLI HOME) AND THEN GO TO TAQUAMA THE NEXT MORNING. THE RETURN TRIP WAS IN REVERSE, TRIP TOOK 3 DAYS. FIRST DAY TO SINLANDS, SECOND DAY TO TAQUAMA AND BACK TO SINLANDS, AND THIRD DAY BACK.

7. SECOND HOUSE FROM MRS. DAHL'S WAS USED AS A PAROCHIAL SCHOOL, THEN TRANSFERRED TO PLA.
8. DAHL'S STORE, WHICH WAS LOCATED ON GARFIELD STREET WHERE GLASS COMPANY IS NOW. BUILDING WAS ORIGINALLY BUILT (1919-1915) FOR POOL HALL. BUT COLLEGE DIDN'T WANT IT SO THEY (THE BUILDERS) FINALLY GAVE IN. DAHLS BOUGHT IT OWNED IT FOR A WHILE, LATE 1920'S AND EARLY 1930'S. (1926-1933)
9. MRS. DAHL MARRIED IN 1908, MR. DAHL WAS FROM MINNESOTA.
10. THE RELIGION CONTROVERSY IN 1917 WAS VERY TRAGIC - MUCH BITTERNESS, DON'T DWELL ON THIS ASPECT, COUPLE OF YEARS.
11. GROUP FROM SEATTLE TRIED TO FORM NATIONAL CITY IN AREA WEST OF JAMES SALES PLACE. TORE DOWN SALES LOG HOUSE, DID NOT PROGRESS VERY FAR AND ONLY BUILT SMALL RETAINING WALL.
12. WHITE PICKET FENCE AROUND PLA.
13. MANY PARKLAND PEOPLE WORKED IN TACOMA. RODE BICYCLES TO WORK,
14. FRED MASON HOLMES, ARTIST. WHEN DAHL'S OWNED GROCERY, MR. HOLMES WOULD PAINT PICTURES FOR GROCERIES. MRS. DAHL HAS PICTURE OF FORT SMITHS. c. 1932.
15. RUST APPLIANCE REPAIR / PHOTOGRAPHY

16. STEAM ENGINE WITH ONE COACH - OLD BETSY HERE IN 1893.
17. ZEPPELIN - MOORING MAST USED FOR ONLY ONE (1) LANDING, CAMP LEWIS.
18. PACIFIC AVENUE - DIRT ROAD, PEOPLE FROM OHO VALLEY (SEE ABOVE), TRAILS, BICYCLE PATH - PARK AVENUE.
19. MRS. LOUISE SALES IS DAUGHTER OF JOHN BROTTMEN.
20. KRAABER-ERIKSEN STORE ON GARFIELD, HALL AND LIVING QUARTERS UPSTAIRS, STORE DOWN STAIRS, MILK - 5¢ A QUART.
21. PRARIE AND LITTLE PATCHES OF WOODS, EARLY SPRING, WITH VIOLETS, WILD FLOWERS, WILD STRAWBERRIES, RED WITH BERRIES. LADY SLIPPERS, JOHNNY JUMP-UPS,
22. FIRST POST OFFICE IN BROOKDALE - STORE/P.O., BROCK JOHNSON, 1311 ST, LATER MOVED TO K&E STORE.
23. BLACKSMITH SHOP - TOP OF HILL ON PACIFIC #122ND, J.C. PETERSEN,
24. B. HARSTAD - BELOW HILL FROM SCHOOL (PLA). PARSONAGE BUILT HERE - MOVED FROM COLLEGE CAMPUS.
25. OLD PARKLAND GRADE SCHOOL. WINGS BOUGHT BY SINLAND, BUILT HOME FROM ONE OF THE WINGS - 1908/9, ANOTHER WING ON YACIMA, NEAR HAUGE'S HOUSE, JOHN SALATER - BOUGHT RHODES SECTION - NOW KETTLESON NURSING HOME.
26. 123<sup>RD</sup>\*A, S.E. CORNER - CHILDREN'S HOME, OWNED BY M. E. MERRITT, MERRITT COLLEGE

COMBINED WITH PLU. 1917 - CHILDREN'S HOME NOW IN EVERETT, LATER CITY CENTER.

27. NORWEGIANS CAME TO PLU FROM SEATTLE - CHEAPER TO LIVE HERE, THAN RENT IN SEATTLE. FISHERMEN.

28. HALLOWEEN TRICKS - GREASE TRACKS  
(STREET CAR) SO TRAIN COULDN'T GO UP HILL ON RETURN TRIP FROM SPANAWAY TO PARKLAND - 123<sup>rd</sup> & E STS.

29. 1890'S - OTTESEN HOUSE, WHERE MRS. DOERING LIVES NOW, JIM BEZEL - HOME ON 116<sup>th</sup> ST. SINALAND'S ON 118<sup>th</sup> ST. KNUTSON HOUSE ON GARFIELD. - BARBER SHOP, FRED HANDY, FROM SPANAWAY AREA, BROTHER-IN-LAW OF MRS. DAHL. STORE - SOLD BREAD, CANDY, ETC. KIDS SHOOK DICE, GARFIELD ST. ACROSS FROM PRESENT POST OFFICE, SHAGER HOUSE - WHERE UNION HOUSE IS NOW, THOMPSON'S STORE - STILL STANDING ON GARFIELD, LATER OWNED BY J. O. BROTHMAN. SINALAND'S RENTED FROM GUNNAR JOHNSON, 12<sup>th</sup> & YAKIMA WHERE HIS BUILDING IS, SECOND HOUSE FROM MRS. DAHL'S - BUILT BY CAMPBELLSON, FROM ROY - PAROCHIAL SCHOOL HERE, THEN TRANSFERRED TO BASEMENT OF OLD MAIN, JOHN RISCLAND - MRS. DAHL'S UNCLE - HOUSE ON 117<sup>th</sup> - FISH COMMISSIONER IN PARKLAND 1890'S. DEPOT WAS ON WEST SIDE OF A STREET, PAROCHIAL SCHOOL BELOW

- HILL, BUILT AFTER 1800, CAMBELL HOUSE  
- ACROSS FROM PUBLIC SCHOOL.
30. RUBBER PLANTATION - INVESTMENT TO  
RAISE MONEY FOR SCHOOL, DIDN'T WORK  
OUT. MEXICO - Q, 1905-1906. WORK OF  
HARSTAD.
31. \$1,00 A YEAR CLUB DURING TINGESTAD'S  
TIME - ROUGHT GOING FINANCIALLY, TRIED  
TO RAISE MONEY THIS WAY,
32. WHERE PIGGY WIGGLY STORE IS -  
"SKLADER" ERICKSON'S HOME, TAYLOR.
33. MOSES HERBER (OCOND) BUILT HOME  
LATER OWNED BY PROF ARRE, OF PLU.  
PROPERTY LATER BOUGHT BY COLLEGE.
