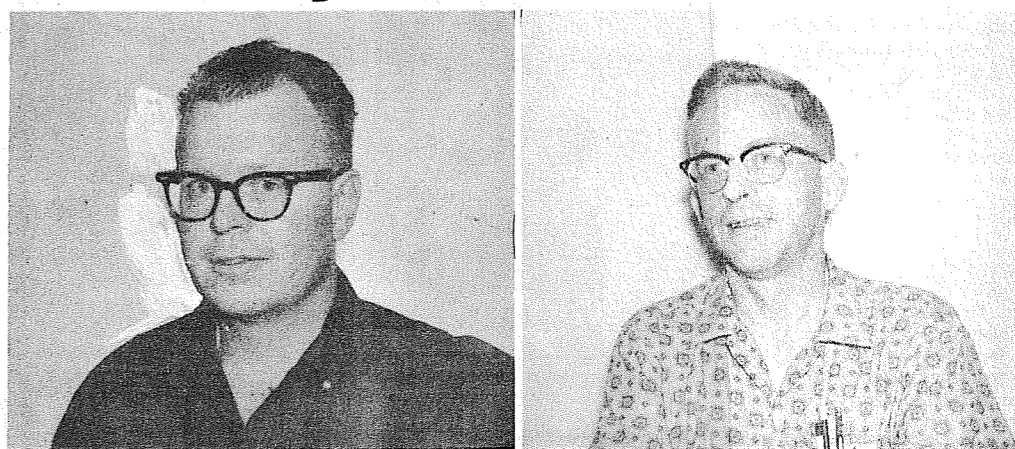

west Flyer. Originated three years ago within the walls of the Times Journal Publishing Co., the Northwest Flyer has grown to such proportions that it demands the full attention of Mr. Brown, who will continue to publish it in the same location. The paper has become the voice of Northwest aviation and has received nation-wide recognition.

He and his wife Gail and daughter Debbie, 8½, are planning on moving to the area before school starts in the fall. Neil comes with a complete background in newspaper work, having been in the field over 12 years. He has over six years of college training, having graduated from Seattle University.

The new co-publishers of the Journal, Dick Anderson and Neil McLean, have headed the movement of the whole Type Craft organization to Parkland, thus increasing the community payroll.

Dick has been in advertising and printing machine sales for the past 13 years. He is formerly of this area, having at-

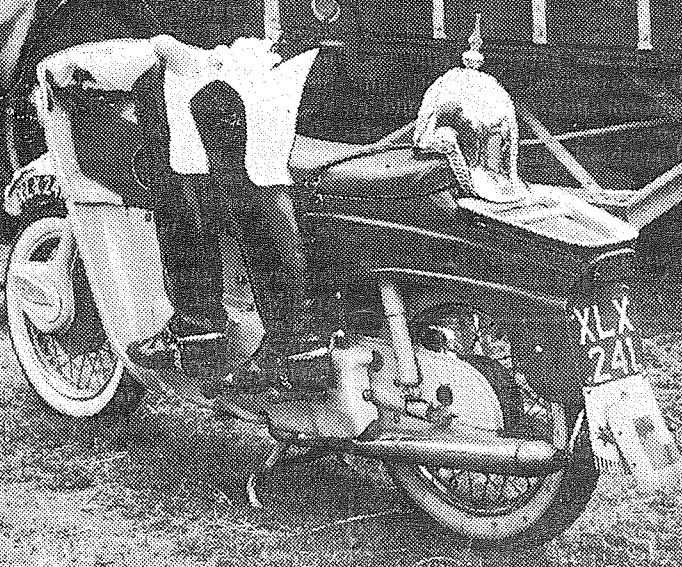

"Disappearing" Family Farm Becoming Widespread Myth

By Jack Crawford
The following information was part of a Ford Farm Forum Report and is being passed on because of our interest in our farm program at this time.

"The farm problem" and decrease in number of farms has given birth to the widespread myth that the family farm is disappearing — that American Agriculture is a declining industry. If this were more fact than fiction, it would be a disastrous omen indeed for the American consumer . . . for the billions hungry around the world . . . and for generations yet unborn.

The real truth is that the American family farm, although smaller in numbers, and undergoing revolutionary changes, is stronger than ever.

The American family farm is 40 percent bigger in size—302 acres compared with 215 acres only 10 years ago. Mechanization has made this possible.

The farmer has a bigger investment. He averages \$33,242 in land and buildings. Farmers have \$21,303 invested per worker. That's 34 percent more than investment in industry. Total farm investment is \$203 billion.

He is a bigger and better producer. Today, a farmer produces enough food for himself and 24 others. Farm productivity per man hour has jumped 40 percent since 1948, compared with an increase of only 32 percent in industry. One hour of farm labor produces 4 times as much food as other crops as it did 40 years ago.

The American farmer is a bigger buyer. He spends a whopping \$27 billion for farm expenses. He buys 56 percent more feed than 10 years ago and 61 percent more fertilizer.

He's a bigger seller. Gross sales in 1960 were \$33,746,000,000. In the last 5 years he sold 40 percent more hogs, 65 percent more chickens, and 42 percent more corn.

The American farmer has a bigger farm income than at any time in history. Last year gross farm income jumped to \$10,286 each for the 3.7 million farms listed in the census. Net—the

"keep home" pay was \$3,238 per farm. And often overlooked is the fact that 1.6 million farmers work some off the farm. Adding non-farm income to farm income gives the 3.7 million farms an average net income of \$4,888, also an all time high.

Family farm ownership is highest in history — 79 percent of the farmers own all or part of the land they farm.

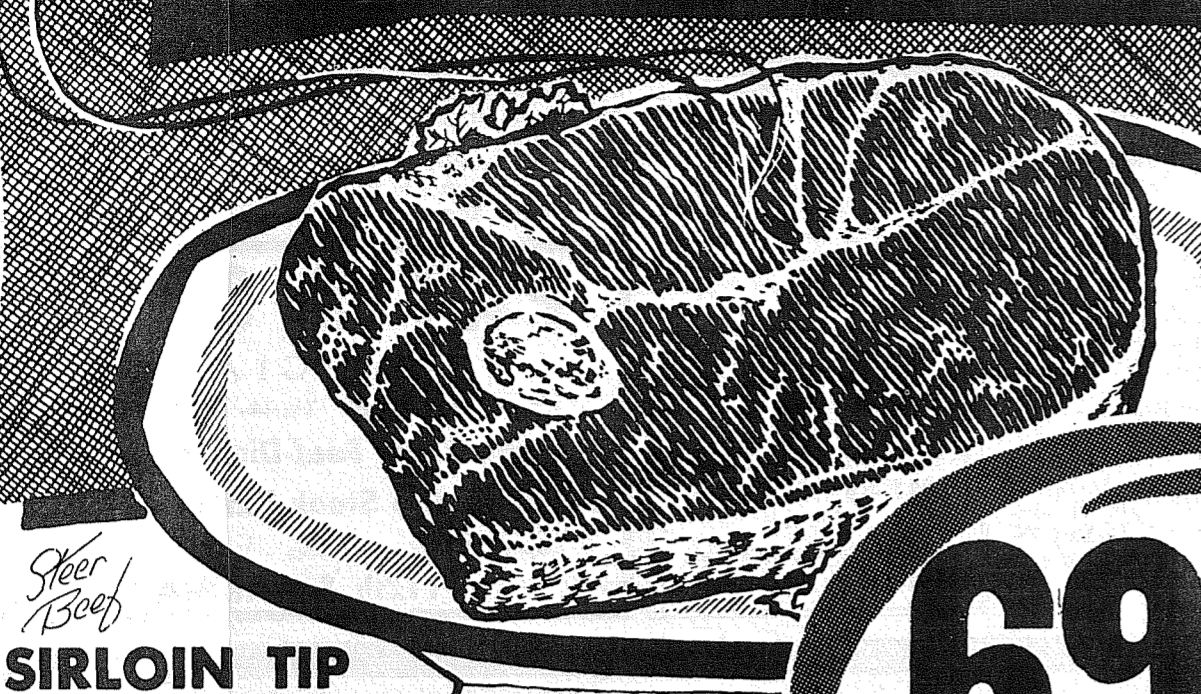
These farmers are the best in the world. But let Nikita Khrushchev tell it. He complained recently: "Soviet farmers are using more than 7 times as much labor to produce grain as the U.S. . . . more than 14 times as much labor to raise cattle . . . more than 16 times as much labor to raise pigs."

American superiority on the food front is significant for these reasons: It can be a strategic weapon for Uncle Sam. It can be a beacon of hope to the underdeveloped nations of the world. It is assurance and insurance to the American consumer.

MISTAKE: An emetic must always be given in cases of poisoning.

FACT: If the patient has swallowed a corrosive poison (it's probably corrosive if you see burns around his mouth) an emetic may kill him. If he swallowed an acid poison such as cleaning fluid, give him milk of magnesia. If he swallowed an alkali such as ammonia, give him orange or lemon juice. Call the doctor as soon as possible.
