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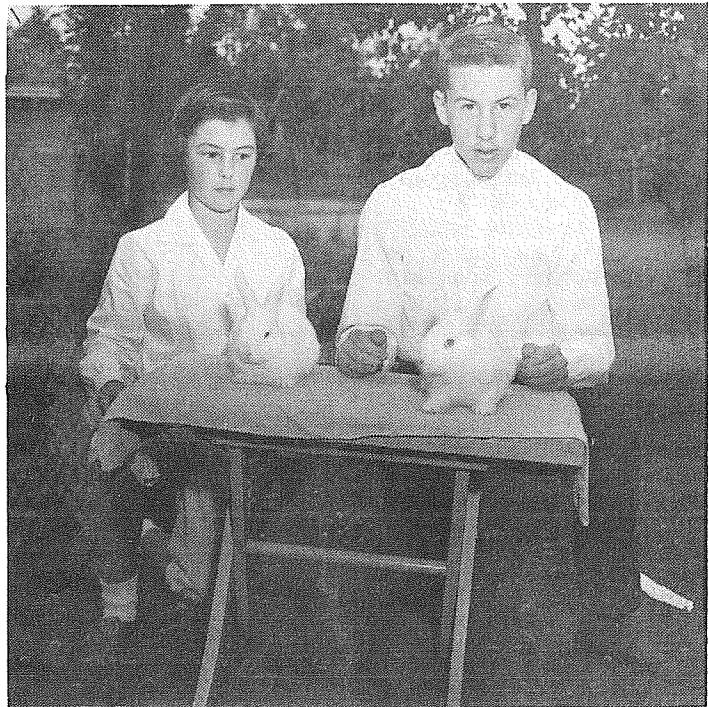

### Bethel School Enrollment Up Two Hundred

Two hundred additional students are anticipated in Bethel District when school opens Wednesday, September 4. The new high enrollment will exceed 3,000 in the district and make a 67% district growth in the last 10 years. Lacomas district joining Bethel will add some 40 elementary and Junior High pupils. A large growth will be present in Bethel High School where grades 10-11-12 will reach a new high of approximately 575.

### Firemen Get Assist Call In Gas Leak

A small case of "Heap Big Smoke But Not Much Fire" described the situation at the Redi-Gas Company, 14012 Pacific Ave., Sunday evening when the Parkland Fire Department was called out to banket a leaky hose with water while Redi-Gas personnel made repairs.

Personnel had detected a leak in the transport unloading hose coupling commonly referred to as a Boss hose clamp. The leak permitted propane to escape, setting up an artificial refrigeration which formed ice on the hose fitting.

In repairing the leak, the fire department sprayed a protective blanket of water while the gas was dissipated into the atmosphere. The main valves controlling the storage tanks were turned off (as they are each evening and weekends so that the only gas permitted to be vented to the atmosphere was that already in the pipe lines.

No damage was sustained and danger was virtually non-existent although the company and the fire department took all necessary precautions to control the situation.

### Parents Get Date, Area Information On District Three

Parents of children in the Puyallup Public Schools, District number three, are advised to have children registered before opening date, September 3. Registration can be done from 8:30 to noon on August 26, 27, and 28. Children who should be registered during these three days are all kindergarten children not registered last spring who will be five years old by September 10; all first grade children not already registered last spring who will be six years old by September 10; all new students; all students in grades one through six who have changed their addresses since school was dismissed in June.

The Puyallup School Boundary district encompasses Firgrove, Woodland, North Puyallup, Firwood, Waller Road, and Riverside as well as the five elementary buildings that are in the Puyallup city limits.

The two kindergarten sessions at Waller Road School will serve the Waller Road district which includes both sides of Canyon Road from East 80th to Pioneer and

west of this road to city limits of Tacoma. Students living west of and on both sides of Vickery will register for the morning session. All pupils living east of Vickery Road, and including both sides of Canyon Road, will register for the afternoon session.

**School Fees**  
The kindergarten fee will be \$5.50 and supply fee for grades one through six will be \$1.50. There will also be the customary towel fee of \$3.00 and a book and locker fee of \$1.25 for the upper grades.

Senior high school students who have not previously registered may register at the high school daily before school begins, exclusive of the noon hour.

These people are urged to register before the first day of school. Junior High students who have not registered previously should do so at the East or West Junior High Office, respectively. That office is open for registration from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. daily, exclusive of the noon hour.

**Physical Exams**  
All students who expect to attend the first grade in Puyallup Public Schools must have a physical examination before they will be allowed to enter. The Puyallup doctors have a card which they will issue to each parent for his or her first grade child after the physical examination. If there are parents who prefer to have their children examined by a doctor of another area, they should be sure to obtain a card from the superintendent's office to be filled out by the doctor. The signed card should be presented to the principal when the child is enrolled. A birth certificate or the equivalent is required for each kindergarten and first grade student.

Parents who have questions about bus runs should contact their building principal.

He is also a past president of Charles Wright Academy Parents Organization and past president of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers Tacoma Sub-Section. His Bachelor of Science Degree was granted by Washington State University at Pullman. The Franklin Pierce School District became a reality in 1949 when four local school districts consolidated: Parkland, Midland, Central Avenue and Collins. At the time of consolidation there were about 2000 students and a faculty that numbered 63. The current enrollment figure is 7000 with a teaching staff of 300.

The school district continues to grow at the rate of 6% or about 400 students per year. Indicative of the growth are the new schools that have been added since 1949. The Harvard, James Sales, Brookdale and Christensen Elementaries; the Morris E. Ford and Perry Keithley Junior High Schools and the Franklin Pierce High School.

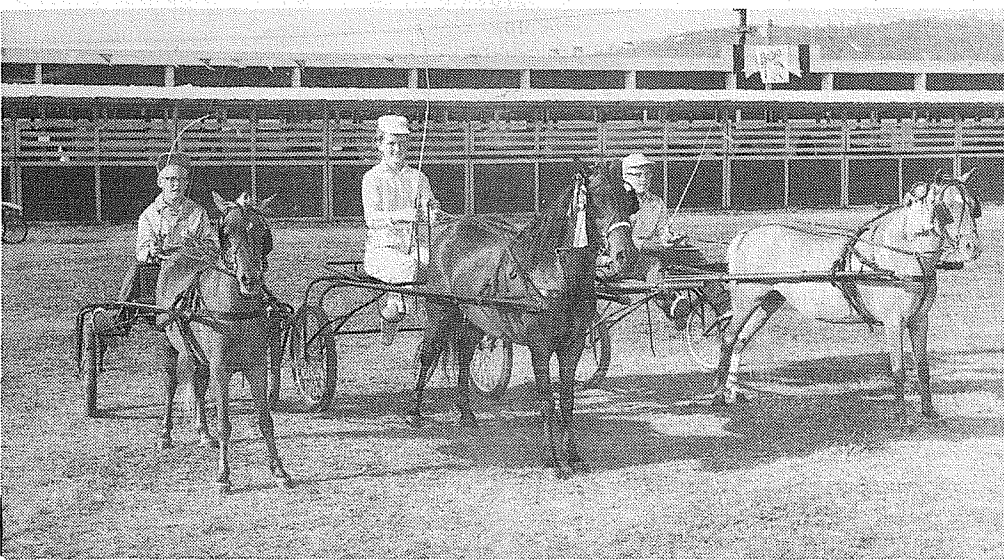

### Vandals Get Heavy Fines

**Longmire, (SPECIAL)** — Four youths were given jail terms and heavy fines by U. S. Commissioner Earl V. Clifford on August 8, for violating Park Rules and Regulations in Mount Rainier National Park, Superintendent John A. Rutter announced today.

Rutter said that the Park has been experiencing a rash of malicious vandalism and rowdiness this summer. Signs along the roadways have been destroyed, mirrors in comfort stations have been smashed, names scratched and painted on rocks and buildings, and windows broken on contractor and Government trucks. Violators of the Rules and Regulations

of the National Park are subject to \$500 fines or 6 months in jail or both depending upon the seriousness of the violation. Cases are taken before United States Commissioners.

Supt. Rutter points out that the vast majority of visitors to Mount Rainier National Park use and enjoy the area in a proper manner. The flagrant and serious violations, as reported above, are committed by a very few persons who have not come to realize the basic purposes and objectives of the Park.

### F.P. Counts Pupil Noses

Franklin Pierce School District announced this week a total anticipated enrollment for each of the schools of their area.

Brookdale Elementary expects 679, Parkland Elementary, 650; James Sales Elementary, 488, Andrew Christensen Elementary will have 445, Harvard Elementary, 417, Midland Elementary, 500; Central Avenue Elementary 414; and Collins Elementary 535.

Ford Junior High School expects an enrollment of 725, Keithley Junior High School, 730, and Franklin Pierce High School, 1300.

These are the figures on which the district must base estimates for services and supplies.

### Machine Can Do Kidney's Function Now

The pioneering work of a local Seattle doctor has been instrumental in a Veterans Administration project aimed toward setting up a nationwide network of artificial kidney treatment centers.

Work in developing artificial kidney machines was done by Dr. Belding H. Scribner several years ago while he was on the staff of the Seattle VA Hospital. It was further developed by Dr. Scribner after he left the VA and became a member of the teaching staff of the University of Washington School of Medicine.

These treatment centers will be among the first of their kind in the nation.

Two already are in full operation at the VA hospitals in Los Angeles, Calif., and Hines, Ill., and many VA hospitals, including the one in Portland, are providing this treatment on a more limited scale.

The agency plans to open other artificial-kidney treatment centers as personnel can be trained. Present plans call for a total of 30 of these VA centers within the next three years.

The VA centers will accept only veterans with severe, chronic kidney disease — those who otherwise would die within weeks or months. They will have to receive the treatment regularly for the remainder of their lives.

The VA estimates that it now has between 200 and 300 patients with chronic kidney disease who need such treatment.

Dr. William B. Tucker, the VA director of medical service, in Washington, D. C., explained that the kidney-machine treatment to be given at the centers is a new method.

Although brief use of the kidney machines has been made in medicine for years, he said, continuing use for chronic patients is a recent field. Therefore, centers cannot be set up until sufficient personnel become skilled in the new method.

Each patient being treated for chronic kidney disease visits the treatment center regularly, usually once or twice a week, to have his blood stream cleansed of impurities by the artificial kidney machine.

Thus the machine takes over the function that the kidneys should be doing daily. Most of these patients in Seattle have not only been saved from death but have been able to return to their normal jobs. Some have been completely without natural kidney function for three years or more.

### Welfare Funds Are Arriving 2 Days Later

Beginning in August, many of Washington's recipients of welfare grants will receive their monthly warrants a day or two later than they have been accustomed to receiving them, the Department of Public Assistance reminded today.

Combined with a speedier machine-sorting procedure, the later mailing of warrants will give counties an average of three more days each month in which to process changes in grants. A slower hand-sorting method was formerly used for handling the warrants.

The department estimated that the change will save taxpayers a minimum of several hundreds of dollars a month. Paper-work costs will be decreased because the number of warrants that have to be re-directed or cancelled and recomputed will be reduced. The number of over-payments also will decline.

In the past, welfare recipients received their monthly checks on any one of the first four days of the month, depending on the location of the county in which they lived. The new procedure will change these dates to the third or fourth day of the month.

The total of monthly payments sent directly to welfare recipients is about \$5.5 million, which goes into all counties of Washington State to help those who are in need.

### Witnesses Can't Give Opinions In Testimony

In a trial the parties present the facts, and the judge or jury draw their conclusions from them.

Thus a witness who tries to tell the court who was at fault is likely to find this opinion ruled out. Most witnesses can speak only of things they can see and hear, not what they conclude from these things. The court, judge or jury, decides who, if anybody, is at fault.

But expert witnesses such as doctors, engineers, scientists, mechanics and others often express their opinion to help the court reach a decision.

In a suit for deaths caused by an explosion of nitroglycerine used by an industrial firm, a professor of chemistry has been recognized as an expert on the cause of the disaster. Doctors of medicine frequently testify as to the probable cause of an illness or the relationship of an injury to a disability.

Most of us may qualify experts in some field: We can give fairly sound views as to the speed, distance or the size of things. When people whom we see every day get sued, we may well have to testify as to their conduct, views or feelings. Certain people whose handwriting we often see, may make us expert in their handwriting.

We are all experts on our own things: If the state condemns your land for a freeway, you can testify as to its value, use and prospects. Of course, other witnesses may differ from you. If the government imposes a gift

or a death tax based on the gift's value, you can challenge the tax and testify as to the gift's value.

Who is an expert? It is anyone the trial judge says. In one case the court was trying the accused for burglary. The case turned upon his fingerprint. He tried to call in an "expert" to disprove the fingerprint. But the court said the "expert" did not qualify: though he had taken a criminology course, he had never had any practical experience in checking fingerprints. (This column is written to inform, not advise. Facts may change the application of the law.)

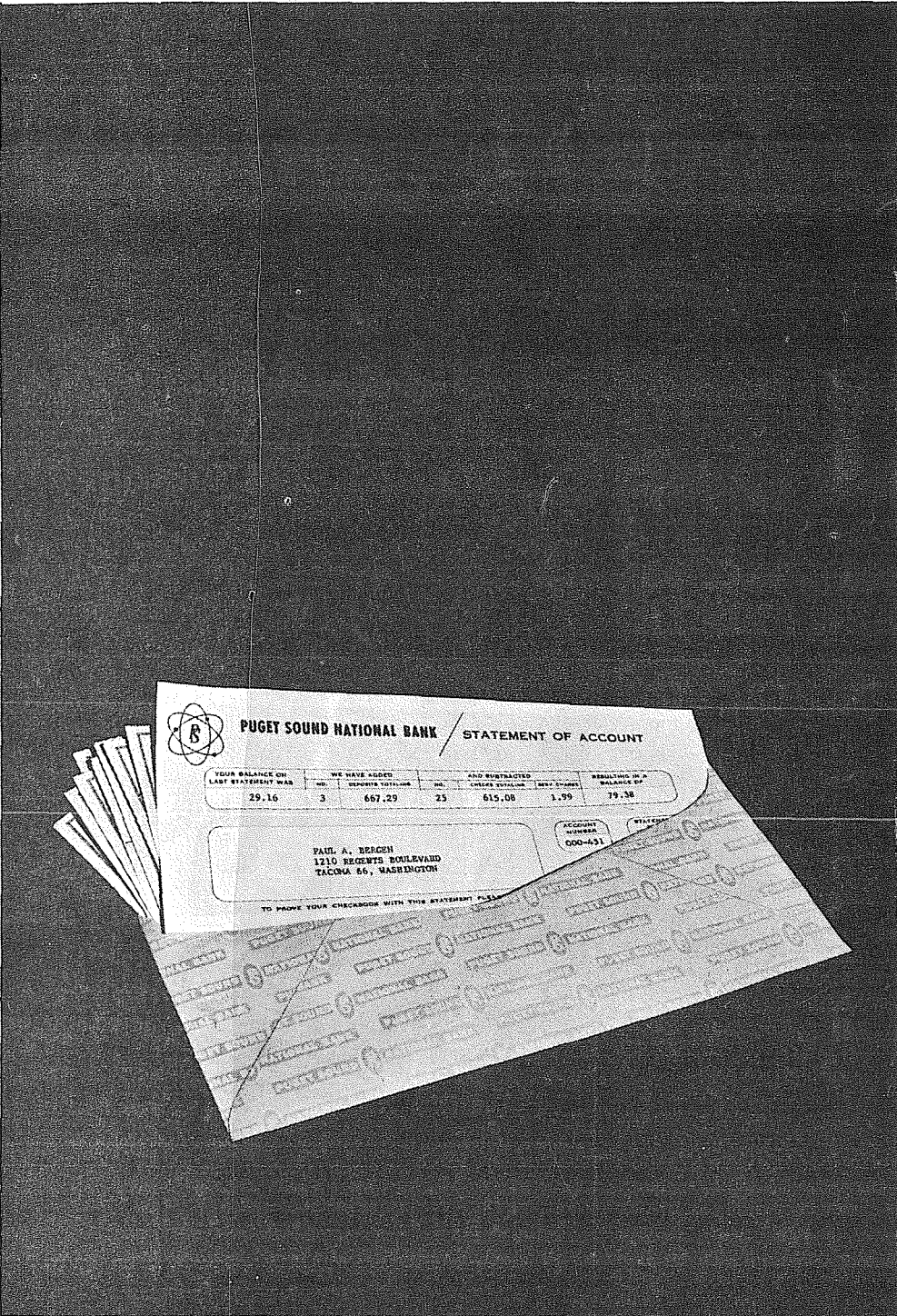

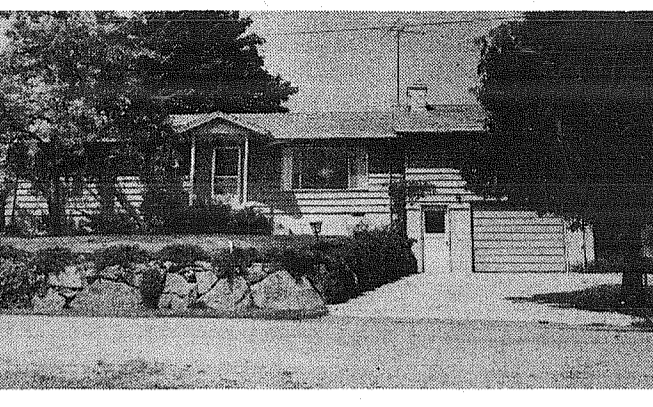
