

Bethel Teachers Lower Salary Requests

The Bethel Education Association, the negociating body representing most District 403 teachers, passed a resolution last week recommending lower wages than previously requested to help continue quality education in

Richard L. Myking, Bethel Education Association president, announced Saturday that the teachers voted to reconsider a previously passed resolution recommending a starting salary of \$6500 per year for the Bethel District. District 403 School Directors had not yet approved the \$6500 recommendation.

All teachers' and administrators' salaries are based on starting teachers' wage schedules, and by passing the resolution the teachers agreed to accept less money inorder to maintain education standards.

Of the move Myking said, "In this day and age it's hard to believe that people will vote for less income inorder to provide better services." The move from reconsideration came after teachers learned that if school directors approved the \$6500 base wage, then fewer new teachers would be hired than deemed necessary to maintain present class loads. The result would be less individual attention to students by the teacher, Myking stated.

The resolution was passed during the May 29 meeting, but only after considerable discussion. But once the alternatives were explained, it passed easily, he said.

The new resolution calls for a base salary of \$6300 per year, a figure most teachers agree is not competitive

when it comes to recruiting new members for the faculty.

Myking pointed out that the resolution leaves it open for the school board to determine whether the district can afford to pay more than \$6300 base pay without jeopardizing services and if cuts in the quality of education are to be made, it will not be caused by teachers' salary demands.

The resolution was worded as follows:
"RESOLVED that the B.E.A. go on record to accept
the base salary of \$6300 for the 1969-70 school year.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that if the Superintendent and Bethel School Board feel the base salary is to low, then it is their responsibility to cut out programs and budget items to raise the base salary above \$6300.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Superintendent and Bethel School Board be responsible to the public for the curtailment of certain worthwhile programs of the

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Superintendent and Bethel School Board should be thinking about the raising of the base salary at the same time they are discussing next year's millage.





Parkland Lutheran Wins Tri Olympics

Three Lutheran Ele-mentary Schools held a joint field day at Parkland Lutheran School May 23 to form the 1st Annual Lutheran Spring Olym-

Events were divided into 3 divisions depending on the grade level of the competitors. Kindergarteners through third grade battled for their respective schools in 50 yard dashes, relay races, sack races, and a 3 legged

Fourth and Fifth graders competed, and sixth and seventh grade stu-dents participated in a 50 yard dash, 100 yard dash, running bases backward against the clock, standing broad jump, and a relay. In addition boys had a 200 yard event. Top-ping off competition was a spelling bee.

When all the points were compiled, Parkland Lutheran students came out on top. Other schools were Faith Lutheran School and Lakewood forma. Lutheran School.

F. P. Budget Ök'd By School Board

A 1969-70 preliminary budget of \$6,412,324 was approved by the Franklin Pierce Board of Directors at their regular meeting Tuesday May 27th. The budget represents an increase of \$668,382 over the final budget approved in 1968-69 with a percentage increase of 11.6 per cent. Dr. Hill indicated that 7.6 per cent of this increase was required to grant salary improvements, 3 per cent to provide additional staff and 1 per cent to pay for non-salary cost increases in-cluding the opening of Washington High School.

Also approved, was a building fund budget of \$1,739,838 to finish Washington High School; to purchase three additional sites; to provide equipment for Washington High School; and to provide selected new equipment for the schools.

A bond interest and redemption fund budget of \$260,100 was approved. Dr. Hill told the Board that

the total millage required to support the budget was 59.504 mills, an increase of 8 mills over the present figure. Most of this increase was due to a special millage to purchase sites approved by the Voters last November.

In a report to the Board, Dr. Hill stated that the District had been accepted into the "School-to-School" program and would be cooperat-ing with the Tacoma Public Schools in selecting a suitable overseas school to be sponsored by the District. Effective date of establishing the relationship was set for June

In other action, the Board approved bids to purchase equipment and new bleachers for Washington High School and took care of routine finan-cial business for June. Be-cause three of the Board members will be on vacation, the Regular Board Meeting for June was cancelled.

Bethel Therapist To Teach Blind

Patrick McMurray, speech therapist for the Bethel School District, has been awarded a graduate fellowship to pursue a Masters Degree in Special Education at Boston College. He will train to be a teacher of the blind, living and teaching at the Perkins School for the Blind in Watertown, Massachusetts. Course work will be done on the Boston College campus.

Perkins is established residential school for blind and deaf-blind children. By residential we mean that the students actually live in the school. Perkins is probably best known to the general public as the institution which trained Ann Sullivan, Helen Keller's teacher.
