Performance judge will be Miss Vera Anderson of Port Orchard, with Henry Palin of Tacoma officiating during the drill team competition, and Mr. Harold Osborn of Mossyrock a judge of the game events.


During the morning beginning at 9:00 a.m. the juniors will be judged on horsemanship beginning with the western riders and afterward the english group.

Other events will be maiden jumping; english pleasure horse; bareback relay, teams of four; western pleasure horse, senior; western pleasure horse, junior; pole bending; individual; Texas barrel reining; scurry by pairs; obstacle course, timed.

There will be trophies and ribbons in each class with a high point trophy going to the rider winning the most points during the show.

**County Agents
Corner**

STRAWBERRIES

Strawberries are one of the best small fruit crops adapted to the type of fruit growing carried on

in Pierce county. It is practical to grow strawberries on the small acreages that we have in this area because they can be cultivated and tended to with the smaller type of equipment—even getting down to hand operated equipment. This crop is a high income producing crop per acre and it takes the minimum of time to get into strawberry production. Fields planted this spring will produce some berries for this summer's harvest, but a year from now will find them to be at full production and continuing for at least three years. Strawberries are a high cost crop, too, as it takes from six to twelve or fourteen thousand plants per

acre, depending upon the method of setting. The plants cost about \$15,000 a thousand and it goes without saying that they should be certified. There is expense other than for plants, such as the necessary spray materials to keep the plants free from insects and diseases. But I still say it is an excellent crop for small acreages and part time farmers, and especially for those people who have young families that need to provide something for the kids to do during the long, spring and summer days. One of the best markets for these fresh strawberries is provided by the city folks coming out to the farms to buy their berries direct. They love the opportunity of getting a short outing and, too, which is most important, they are sure they get their berries freshly picked and, of course, this is a big item in getting fruit of the highest quality. Now I am scheduling a strawberry field day beginning at 1:30 p.m., Friday, May 19th. The assembly point will be the Alderton school grounds. We will visit a few of the strawberry farms near by and also see the various varieties, including some plantings of the newest varieties called the Cascade and Columbus. These two new varieties were introduced this spring for the first time. There should be an adequacy of these plants by next year. Won't you join us on this strawberry tour? Bring your questions and we will try and answer them as we will have the Washington State University Extension Specialist with us that afternoon.

at Washington State University in Pullman. Over 2,500 samples were received in February, a thousand more than any previous month. At the same time, the lab was moved and they started in the new lab with a 1000 sample backlog. The situation is fast correcting itself and with new lab facilities, persons should not experience any further delays in this program.

Soil testing is still the base for sound fertilizer programs. What Pasture Fertilizer To Use Many questions are asked as to what fertilizer should be used on pastures. First of all, all barnyard manure should be used as it is valuable soil builder. The manure should be applied to older stands as manure with high nitrogen and weed seeds often hurts newer stands of clover and grass.

If the older grass stand is very poor, then use of fertilizer is not very economical even though some improvement can be attained. If stands are old and have good grass, then a person should concentrate on a nitrogen fertilizer program. If the stand is newer and has good clover, then the phosphorus and potash becomes more important. It should always be remembered that phosphorus and potash and potato tend to stim-

It's The Law

SOVEREIGN IMMUNITY
Joe drove a street cleaning truck for the city of Mudville.

One day while Joe was flushing the streets, he drove down the wrong side of the street and ran into Pete's lawfully parked car. A week later while Joe was flushing another street of sewage which had been left standing by a broken sewer line, he drove down the wrong side of the street and ran into Bill's car, also lawfully parked.

Both Pete and Bill started lawsuits against the City of Mudville for damages. Pete was successful in his suit but Bill's lawsuit was dismissed.

Since the days of the kings in Europe all sovereign powers have been immune from suits for damages caused by the neglect or carelessness of their employees, except when consent to be sued has been given by statute or constitutional provision. In the United States both the Federal Government and the States possess immunity unless it has been waived. The United States has partially waived its immunity but the State of Washington has not.

A city, being a municipal corporation, performs functions which are governmental and functions which are private person could perform. When a city engages in governmental functions it is immune from lawsuits. Pete was able to recover damages because street repairing is considered to be a proprietary function and not governmental. Bill could not recover because activities undertaken by a city in the interest of public health or safety, such as removing sewage, are considered to be governmental, thus conferring immunity upon the city.

The immunity given does not protect the individual employee who commits the wrong, unless he is performing a judicial or legislative function. Either Pete or Bill could bring an action for damages against Joe.



A department store in Ohio says the legislation will add about \$300,000 to wage costs, and that it will lay off 90 of its 1,500 employees.



Life Expectancy at All-Time High



The average American baby born in 1959 had a life expectancy at that time of 69.7 years—the highest ever recorded for the total population of infants, Health Information Foundation reports.

By contrast, as the chart illustrates, a baby born in 1900 could expect to live only 47.3 years. Although both males and females have benefited from increasing life expectancy in this century, the Foundation adds, greater gains have been made by females. Thus, while life expectancy for males rose from 46.3 years in 1900 to 66.4 in 1958 (a gain of 20.1 years), the comparable rise for females was from 48.3 to 72.7 (a gain of 24.4 years).

The Foundation singles out a number of social consequences arising from the trend toward longer life, notably a record growth in the number of aged persons in this country, an increase in the working lifetime of the average person, a decline in the number of orphans, and a general postponing of widowhood to the later years. According to George Bugbee, Foundation President, the increase in life expectancy is "one of the most fundamental changes to affect our country in this century." The improvement has been largely due to a "dynamic growth" in medical knowledge, particularly in the last two decades. To illustrate the effect of medical progress on improved life expectancy, Mr. Bugbee refers to "the infective and parasitic diseases, which once decimated those at the younger ages, but which have now been largely controlled. This class of diseases, which caused about 18 per cent of the deaths in 1900, today causes just over 1 per cent."







County Agents Corner

By Morrill Delano
This is strawberry planting time and if it were not for a certain group of strawberry plant growers, we would not have the quality, disease free, planting stock that is now available for those to plant for fruit purposes. I am referring to the Certified Strawberry Plant Growers, five of which are located in Pierce county with four of them located in the Alderton, McMillin area. The other located in the Nisqually Valley.

Strawberry plant production in this day and age is a very specialized business—with these five growers digging and sorting to grade some forty million plants this year. And believe you me, this is a lot of strawberry plants.

If you are to put out any new strawberry plantings this year, even if its only a hundred plants in your back yard, I would certainly suggest that you insist on Certified Plants, which means they are free from disease, insect infestation and also true to the variety. You might also be interested to know that plant production is not coupled with fruit production. Plants come from fields planted the spring before and the entire field, with the increase, is due at the time the plants are to be processed.

These five plant growers should be highly complimented on their ability to produce so many fine certified plants for the general improvement of the strawberry industry. They are: Kenneth Scholz, Matlock Fruit Farms, Ken Spooner, Mervin Ward, and our Nisqually Valley grower, Staats Farms.


