An Open Letter

Elmhurst Mutual Members Speak

In the beginning, there were kerosene lamps,-- and so that all the members might know just how we have come this far,-- and with whose help, we hereby submit a brief history of our association with Tacoma City Light.

Next March, it will be forty (40) years since Elmhurst was founded, for a period of fifty (50) years. In those days, prior to its forming, we could have had electric lights, -- the so-called "Street car lights", which meant the juice would be taken from the street car line and every time the street car went by, your lights would almost go out. This would have been most unsatisfactory. So it was then, that the founders of Elmhurst, my Father-in-law included, approached the Tacoma City Light, and a most agreeable arrangement was forthcoming. The old saying, "There is no sentiment in business," could very well be disproved with a look at the last 39 (almost 40) years. The loaning out or borrowing of equipment to us with never a thought of rental charge; a reasonable rate for power; a "working-together" of crews from both City Light and Elmhurst whenever there are storms and outages, with the result of a return of power in the shortest possible time. Tacoma City Light has four substations available to us, plus a mobile substation, mounted on a low-bed trailer, to be brought wherever needed for emergency or maintenance. City Light maintains a shop, complete with testing machines for testing the rubber gloves, akenson

transformers, regulators, cutouts, meters, and all sorts of equipment used in the transmission of power, and the Mutuals have access to these machines for a very nominal fee. As was recently stated by a City Light official, "Elmhurst receives many benefits which are difficult to evaluate financially."

It seems to us that if the Board of Directors were working in the best interest of the membership, it would only be natural that they would want the members to be informed on BOTH SIDES of this question of whether to stay with City Light or take Bonneville power. We have had numerous calls from people asking about the rector cards sent to members for voting purposes. There was no explanation what-so-ever on the cards. The members should be informed as to the amount of indebtedness Elmhurst would incur, and we understand that as members of a Mutual we could be assessed. It doesn't really make sense, that we should go so deeply in debt to duplicate something which we already have--as in so doing it would cost us many thousands of dollars, and we would not then have the services and protection which we now have.

In all fairness, it doesn't seem right to just "dump" the original associate, who, after all, came to our rescue when we first wanted lights, especially after so many intervening years of pleasant association. Respectfully & Sincerely submitted, Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Haktenson

Well Baby Clinics Provide Specific Need For Eligibles

Well Baby Clinics, which from the health officer are scattered throughout the area, provide a specific need. They have always been a regular program in the Public Health Department, and were developed in the prevention of disease and the promotion of optimum health.

Those who can benefit are infants and pre-school children (up to 5 years) in families with a marginal income, or those in income groups which can meet the expense for disease treatment, but cannot follow through for the health supervision of well children. Any child under the public assistance program, such as ADC, is also eligible for Clinic benefits.

A continuing check is made of the eligibility of parents, usually at the time of their visit to the clinic.

Well Baby Clinics do not provide treatment, but they do provide a regular physical and health inventory program whereby aspects regarding feeding and nutrition, accident prevention and immunization is carried on continuously. The Clinics are also screening houses for deviations in the child's health which may not be apparent otherwise.

If treatment is required, the child is referred back to its own doctor. Physicians for the clinics previously were drawn

Seeing that any one or all of the above benefits are made available to eligible survivors is but one of the many services rendered to families in their hour of need.

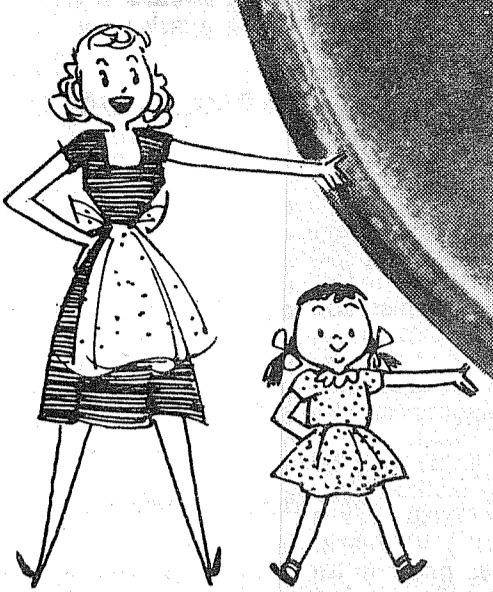
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

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the First Fleet which took part in Exercise Black Bear from Nov. 24 through Dec. 1, off the coast of southern California.

FP Seniors In College Test

The majority of FP's 130 pre-college seniors will journey to Pacific Lutheran University this Saturday to take the Washington Grade Prediction tests, which are required by most Washington colleges.

The tests, which will take eight hours to complete, will be combined with the students' high school transcripts to predict an overall college grade point average. In addition possible grade averages in 45 different subjects will be predicted.

Scores from this test, which the University of Washington deems "remarkably accurate", will be used by counselors to help students select their college schedules.

The examination is not an admission or entrance test.

Traffic Deaths Below Estimate

Washington's traffic death record was below the estimate for the Christmas Holidays. It was estimated that 11 would die over the three-day period, but only 9 actually lost their lives.

Chief Roy A. Betlach of the State Patrol said, "I suppose we should be very thankful that at least those two lives were spared--and of course we are--but, it is difficult to sit back and congratulate ourselves when nine people are dead as a result of careless driving. Everyone of those fatalities were the result of not obeying the law--speeding, going through a red light, drinking, etc."

"Those deaths were not the result of accidents," he continued. "They were the result of some drivers not obeying the law. Usually we think of an accident as something which cannot be avoided -- but let me tell you, these deaths could have been avoided. And the answer seems so simple," he said. "By merely observing and obeying those laws which are designed to make driving safe on our highways, traffic deaths would become literally a thing of the past."

He continued, "We are going to be faced with the same problem over the New Year's Holiday weekend -- three days of potential slaughter on the highways. Yet again, the answer is not complicated -- If all drivers will not drink and drive and will obey the speed laws and the other common-sense rules of driving, we can have a safe holiday weekend."

"It's up to you and the others who are going to be using the highways this weekend," he concluded. "Nobody else can do it for you."

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
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
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

It's The Law!

"To My Son John, Unless"

You've read mystery novels where the plot turns on a "freak" will: Gwendolyn can't marry because if she does she loses her estate under her late uncle's will.

The fact is the courts wouldn't waste much time on such a will. Most likely it would hand the property over to Gwendolyn anyway; the law regards provisions in restraint of marriage as against public policy and courts as a rule will not carry them out. In effect, the court has modified uncle's will without his consent, and contrary to his wishes. But, it has done so to avoid aiding an undesirable social policy. The same would be true if a will required a beneficiary to commit an illegal act. The court has the inherent power to see that justice is done by striking out these "freak" clauses which are against public policy.

In some cases, the court will modify a will so a named heir received less than the testator intended him to have. Let's say you are the apple of Aunt Minnie's eye and you don't want those other relatives to cut in. So you help her draw her will leaving everything to you. Then you and the gardener sign the will as witnesses.

Do you get the whole estate? Not in Washington. The court would allow you only that share of the estate which you would have received had there been no will. The reason for this

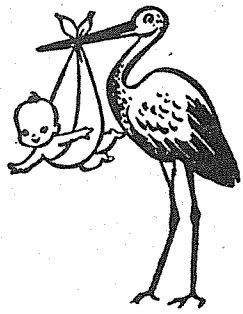

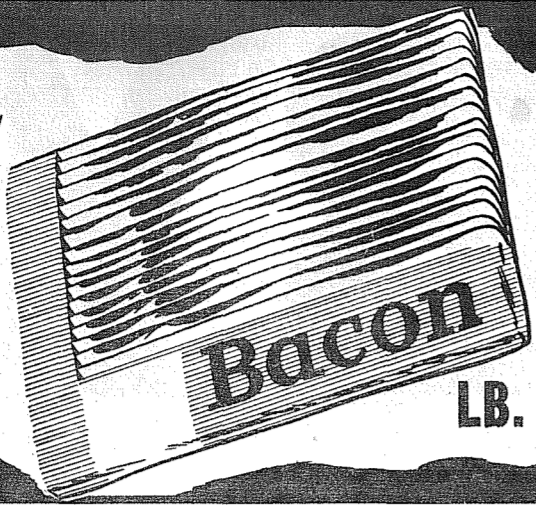

The 15 chapters of the booklet contain easy to read instructions in both general and specialized areas of Federal income and self-employment taxes as they apply to farmers. Discussed are: Filing Requirements and Return Forms, the Importance of Good Records (with illustrations of sample record forms), and many other subjects. A Farmer's Tax Calendar has been added this year which tells the farmer what he should do and when he should do it in regard to his Federal taxes during 1962. A Sample Filled-in Federal Income Tax Return is also contained in the booklet.

Mr. Warren, in announcing the new edition of the booklet, pointed out that the expanded tax assistance program for farmers will include utilization of all new media to insure maximum dissemination of information on tax matters of interest to farmers, and the participation by Internal Revenue officials in meetings of local farm groups to discuss Federal tax problems, as well as offering assistance to farmers on an individual basis by telephone, letter, or personal visit to Internal Revenue offices.

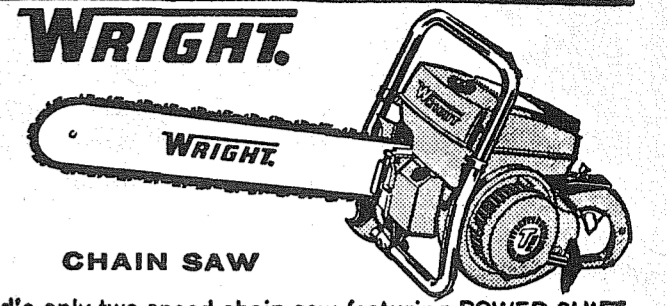

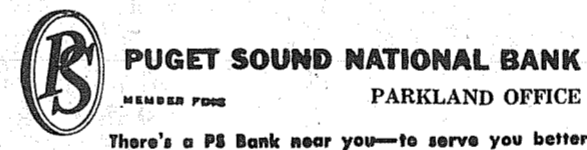

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
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Diet conscious and convenience oriented Americans are taking a long look at the new non-stick, "greaseless" fry pans which are now on the market, Bernice Belshaw, County Extension Agent, says.

The new fry pans, originally imported products, are now being manufactured in the U. S. Foods will not stick to the pans because their surface has an applied plastic coating. These fluorocarbon or silicone coatings are sold under different brand names.

Unusual properties of the coating make it resist attack by other materials and resist combination with them even at extreme heats, she said.

Arlean Pattison, WSU Extension home management specialist, advises that if the fry pan is not a good one to begin with, it won't be satisfactory even with the non-stick coating.
