Beach Is Closed To Clam Diggers Says Fish Dept.

A temporary emergency closure of personal use razor clam digging on the stretch of beach from the Quinault Indian Reservation boundary (just north of Moclips) on the north, to the Copalis River on the south, has been ordered by the Fisheries Department.

The area closed is that stretch of beach, about 8 miles in length, which has been the scene the past few days of a kill of razor clams, crabs, sea birds and other marine life. The area of kill stretches both north and south from Moclips where a leaking gasoline and oil barge was grounded last week and pulled off the beach after diesel oil and gasoline had been pumped from the barge into the surf. First razor clam kills were noted Friday by Fisheries biologists and continuing surveillance revealed massive clam kills through Wednesday morning.

"Our first concern," said Starlund, "is to insure the foundation for a recovery of the razor clam population in the area and this calls for immediate protection of the remaining clams for future production." If after full assessment, clam abundance is great enough to supply the seed stock and further harvest, the closure will be lifted. It may be several weeks before the full extent of the damages is known.

New Church Started Here

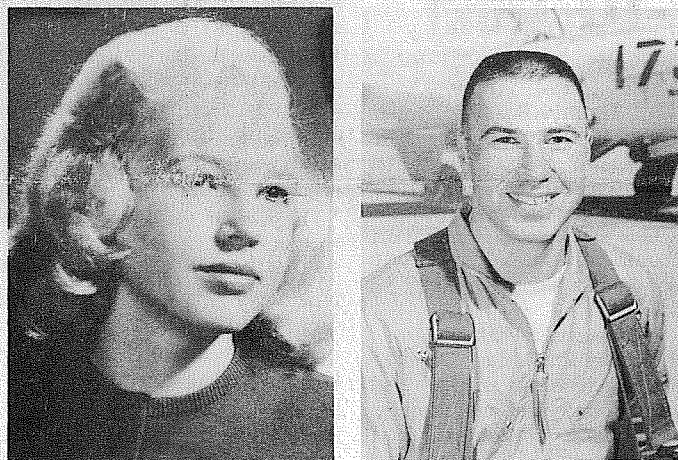
A new local church, Church of God of Prophecy, is worshipping at 11102 South Yakima, in the Parkland area.
