

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## a - Wondering and a-Wandering . . .

Of late there has been an effort on the part of some people to play up American poverty. Those depicted as most in need of help are naturally unemployed and on welfare rolls.

Cases have been taken from all races and all sections of the country. I am not at all sure what is behind this move to bare our supposedly unfortunates to the world. If it should be directed towards taking care of our own before taking care of the balance of the world then I am all for it. However, there are many things I do not understand about the approach taken.

For example, one dire case was portrayed wherein a mother with a fifteen year old son to support and a husband who had deserted her was on welfare rolls receiving \$142 per month for food and other necessities plus having her rent of \$44 per month paid. In reality this woman is receiving \$186.00 tax free each month of your money and mine. Countless thousands and thousands like her receive similar amounts.

Articles have been written that would lead us to believe that this was a shameful disgrace to our nation to have so many people trying to get by on so little. I am not so sure I buy this.

First I agree that in this nation of plenty we cannot stand idly by and watch people sit in our streets and starve, such as happens in other countries. By the same token we cannot allow this to become a nation of parasites either.

In the case of the mother and the 15 year old. I seem to picture a boy with a goof ball haircut standing around on the streets, probably a drop out from school and the mother sitting around enjoying an occasional beer with a boy friend while smoking up a storm. So long as you and I thru welfare pay her \$186.00 she'll continue to sit around and sing the blues about how unfortunate she is and her son will roam the streets with the rest of the "cats," or whatever the current phrase is.

Let's paint the picture a little differently. Just suppose the bottom of the barrel came up dry and she was cut off from her "free of effort" monthly stipend. My guess is that suddenly she would find some sewing to do, washing to take in, a waitress job or something similar. Perhaps her son might even look around for a lawn to mow or a paper route. True she and the boy might have to lay off cigarettes and she the friendly beer, but small loss there

Still the truth is . . . . will these people ever make an effort on their own or will they go on forever living off us and crying "Shame! Look at the squalor we live in! Gimme, Gimme more! Personally I think some of the problem is akin to a disease. Once life becomes stagnant for some, it's hard to ever get them off their duff again.

By now you are beginning to wonder what I have in mind. I'll tell you. I think this fuss over American poverty is out of proportion to the real issue. I think the real issue is that some people certainly will not make an effort to help themselvs and want no help except a handout from the rest of the world. While they are raking in the tax free greenery and crying over their plight let's just consider how bad it really is, or isn't.



son on \$186.00 tax free money per month. I'll be the first to admit that this isn't a great amount. But are those who say it isn't enough to hand out free right? I think not, myself, because we are surrounded by people who daily prove that with any initiative, energy and reasonable outlook on life two people can get by on that amount or less.

Thru the gates of McChord Field every morning pour many a married airman living among us here in Pierce County. Most of them own a car, take in an occasional show and enjoy life as free Americans. I have never heard of one sitting around singing the blues to the world about his lot. You'll find these men off their duffs out looking around for opportunity. Few sit and wait for it to knock at their doors.

How many of you who have felt bad after reading of the plight of our welfare recipients have also felt sorry for the airman living next door? Well maybe you should, for many a married airman third class living in this area has the grand total of \$158.77 per month for him and his wife to live on after taxes have been taken out of their pay. On top of this it is mandatory that if they live off base they must have a phone. Now who's face is the reddest?

We give out our tax dollars free to most welfare cases and receive absolutely nothing in return and suddenly the nation worries that we are not giving away enough of our money. We pay the airman less money and expect him to work any number of hours per day, be on constant call, travel away from his family and in time of war, if necessary give his life for a paltry \$158.77 per month.

I know there are a lot of arguments that the airmen receive other benefits, but you can rule them all out except the fact that he gets his first set of clothes free, a small clothing allowance for himself, and can buy a few things at the base BX and commissary at a small savings over what you and I pay. On an expenditure of \$158.65 per month he could hardly pocket a savings equivalent to the \$27.23 less he receives than the welfare case of two mouths.

No . . I can't help but think that for reasons best known to themselves, people are pushing for bigger expenditures of our tax money for welfare. I just can't see it. I'm getting fed up with seeing my hard earned tax money spent to feed a bunch of deadbeats here and abroad.

I say that if we must hand out this money lets get some CCC units or something similar organized and start getting something back for our dollars. Just think what all the drop out teenagers now living on welfare could do for our country. They could build trails, parks, police our highways of litter, help replant forests and hundreds of other things that would be useful to our nation instead of cluttering up our streets and alleys with brawling mobs.

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


