a - Wondering . . . and a - Wandering . . .

Too often the public is not aware of the slim profits a merchant must operate upon, and this article is very apropos at this time.

Last week I mentioned the activity in Olympia with particular reference to the ridiculous nature of some of the bills brought up by those we have elected to act as our representatives at the Capital. Since that article was written, I have run across a bill I would not class as ridiculous, but rather as one instigated by uninformed legislators.

SB No. 383, now in the mill at Olympia, would in effect remove the legal standing of papers such as ours. From a monetary standpoint it would mean next to nothing to the Times Journal, but from a standpoint of principle it means a lot to me personally. I consider it about as UnAmerican as they come.

The laws of our land say that certain legal procedures must be published for various numbers of times in a legal newspaper of general circulation in the area for the purpose of giving publicity and knowledge concerning the matter in question. A newspaper is used for the publication of these notices to give wide dissemination of the facts involved.

If passed, SB No. 383 would make it mandatory that any newspaper desiring to be qualified as a legal publication would have to hold a second class mailing permit. Such permits are issued only to those newspapers with a one hundred percent paid circulation. Since you have not been asked to pay for the Times Journal, it would not qualify as a legal publication.

In this state there are legitimate weekly newspapers being published and delivered free to as many as 30,000 homes in their respective areas. In this county the Times Journal is delivered to over 13,600 homes both by mail and now by delivery boy in some areas. We have added around \$20,000 per year to the coffers of the postal department, a sum which we believe has helped in some small way to hold the line on their loss of revenue. Had we sold a subscription to each of the 13,600 homes and had a second class permit, our postage bill would be but a fraction of the above mentioned amount, but the postman's work would be the same.

In this state there are weekly newspapers with a total paid circulation of as low as 20. There are nine of these small papers in the state with less than 100 subscribers. SB No. 383 would not only set them up as legal newspapers, but would also leave us and our readers out in the cold, even though we publish several thousand more papers and more news than they do. Besides, we pay our way with Uncle by paying a much higher rate of postage.

What does the passing of this bill mean to you? It would mean an uninformed public as far as this portion of the county is concerned. It would mean that to receive information on "Notices to Creditors in Probate", "Calls for Bids", "Buildings to be Moved or Razed", "Summons by Publication", "Notices of Hearing Petitions for Conditional Permits", "Notices of Hearing of Final Reports and Petitions for Distribution", "Notice of Private Sale of Real Property", "Notices of Adoption", "Notices of School Meetings", "Notices of Hearing of Zoning of Property", "Notices of Sale of County Property", etc., all being matters of concern in our local community, your only choice would be to carefully scan through the myriad pages of the daily, or to subscribe to some of the small weeklies in hopes legal notices of interest to you would be printed therein.

This is one bill that's fooling with one of the basic rights of every American, the right to know.

If the present laws need modifying to distinguish between a shopper and a newspaper, then let our legislators correct them. But to obliterate three-quarters of the weekly circulation in the state as far as legal matters is concerned is knifing the heart of our American way of life.

If you feel as I do about this matter, then a word to your state senator and representatives would certainly be in order.

I for one defy anyone to show me the logic in SB No. 383.



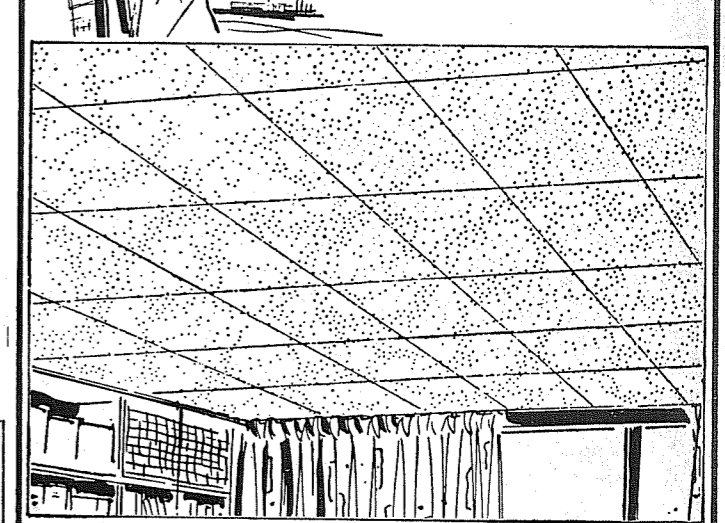

County Agents Corner

Management factors that can affect the quality and value of wool at shearing time, include proper equipment and feeding practices during the winter months.

Feeding hay during the winter is a common practice, but unless done carefully, it can lower the value of wool. The presence of hay, straw, seeds, or other vegetable matter in the fleece lowers the grade. Racks used for feeding hay should be built so the openings are not large enough for sheep to get their entire head into the hay. When this happens, pieces of hay or weeds and burrs will cling to the wool. Pitching hay down from a truck or wagon will also cause hay and chaff to fall on the back and neck of the sheep and stick to the wool.

George Purcell suggests filling the racks or feeders when the sheep are out of the pen. If the sheep are on pasture, it is best to throw the entire bale to the ground, and then scatter it, rather than pitch loose hay from a truck.

A sudden change in feeding can also affect wool quality. Heavy feeding can cause a "tender" spot or wool break-in the fiber. This will lower the value of the wool considerably and greatly reduce the price when marketed.

Random rural visits the other day produced some very interesting comments from various interesting people. For example: Weyman Tow, who leases the Fort Lewis range for grazing his 700 herd of beef cattle says one of his best investments has been a fly and lice spray machine. Although it cost \$1700, he feels it paid for itself during the first season used.

Winston Baker, a poultry farmer of Edgewood is another enthusiastic booster of sheep as a sideline. He has a good flock of Romney's. After showing him how to dock and castrate his lambs and showing him how to trim his ewes' hooves, he feels confident he now can do these elementary tasks.

Art Fries of Graham is planning new pasture seedings and plan to later plant corn for silage for his new beef herd.

It's The Law

George and Hilda Bright, married 26 years began to quarrel about her brother, Arthur Dimm, who had a criminal record.

Mrs. Bright wanted to help her brother stay out of trouble so she visited with him and occasionally invited him to dinner. Mr. Bright finally insisted that she stop seeing her "jail bird" brother.

Resenting her husband's attitude, Mrs. Bright sued for separate maintenance, though her husband continued to live at the family home and pay the family bills. He countered by suing for divorce, claiming her association with her brother was cruel treatment and heaped "personal indignities" on her husband.

Do you think she is entitled to separate maintenance or her husband is entitled to a divorce?

In such a situation neither is entitled to a decree of divorce

or separate maintenance. Separate maintenance can be granted a wife only when her husband has abandoned her without cause or has compelled her to live apart from him because of his wrongful conduct, and has neglected to support her. Mrs. Bright was not entitled to separate maintenance since her husband had not abandoned her and was still supporting her.

A court cannot grant a divorce simply because husband and wife no longer are getting along well together. Neither incompatibility, uncongeniality, dissatisfaction nor unhappiness constitutes ground for divorce in this state.

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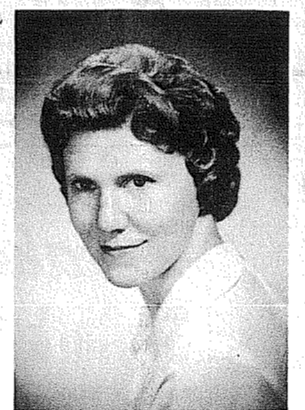

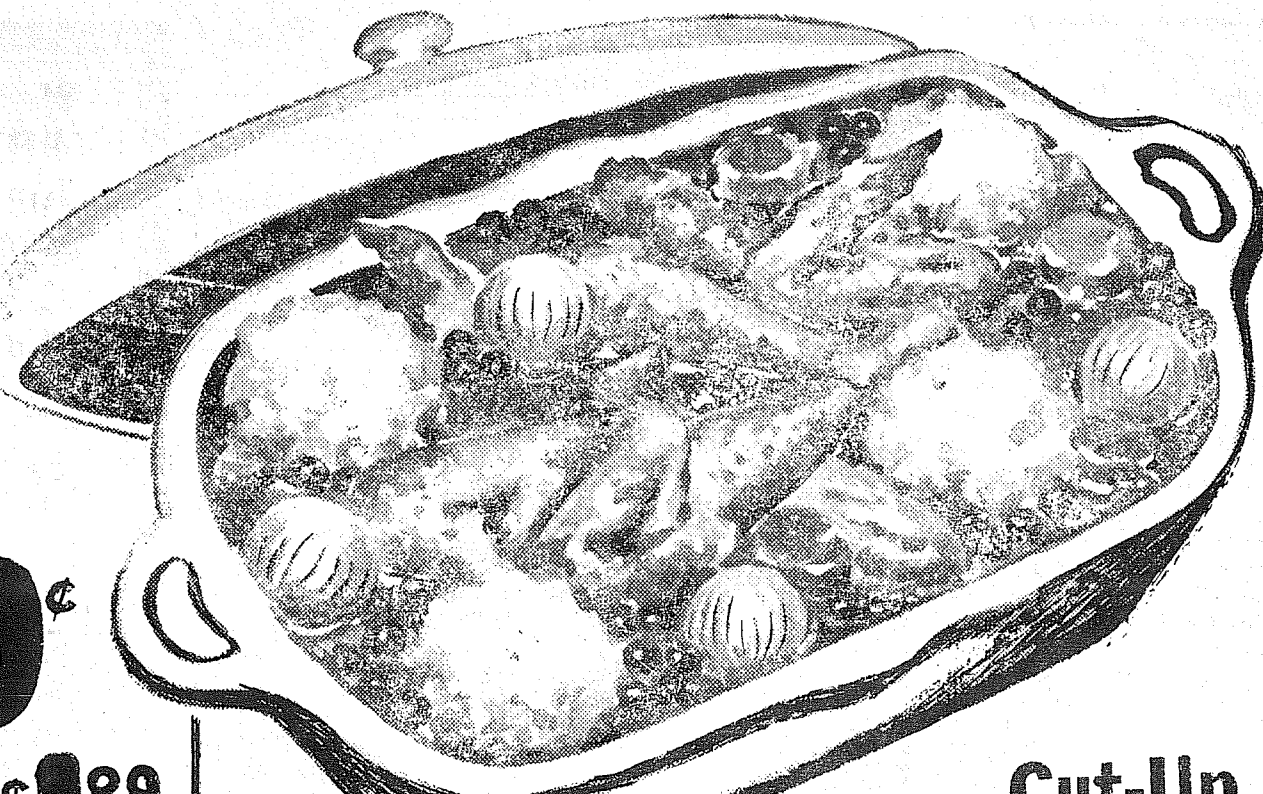
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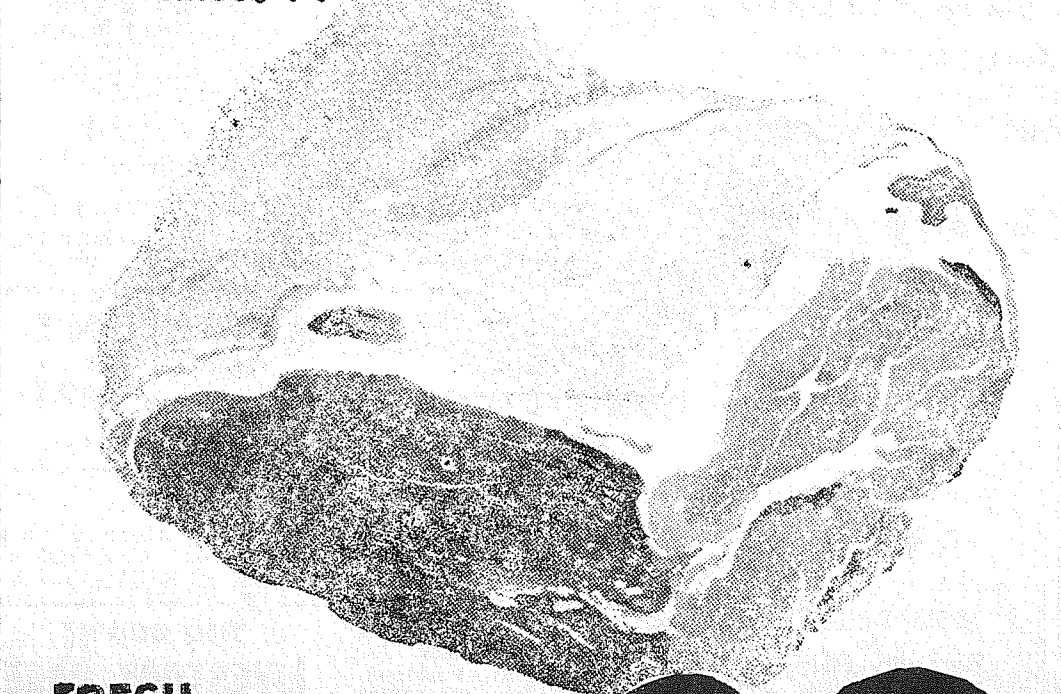
