

Parents of handicapped children between the ages of 3 and 21 who are not now receiving any special education services are asked to call the school nearest them, or the District office, which will send them a form to be com-

pleted. During last year, about 61,000 handicapped children in 287 school districts were served with State funds for special education classes. Next Wednesday The adult education pro-

gram offered by Puyallup Public Schools begins Wednesday evening, September 25 with registration for fall quarter. Thirty-seven classes are scheduled in academic, home improvement, self-improvement, and business courses. The ten week classes start on Monday, September 30 and end the first week in December.

The major change in the program this year is withdrawal of State support and recognition of the Extended Secondary courses. Legislative action during the last session marked the end of this popular program. All of the courses, however, will still be offered without college credit.

Exchange Teachers

For the third consecutive year the foreign language courses will be taught by exchange teachers. Argentina, Morocco, and France have contributed to this year's staff. In addition, German will also be taught by a recent arrival from Germany. New Courses

Classes being offered for the first time are English Grammar, Physical Science. and Photography. The first two will allow adults working toward high school diplomas to meet English and science requirements, while the photography class is made possible by the new high school addition which has dark room facilities. Free Courses



The other day I was reading a theory of someone's that in the dark ages you could walk up to a Dinousaur, kick him in the butt and still get out of the way of his tail before he hit you with it or turned to bite you. It seems it took a minute or so for the sensation of pain to travel the long distance up to it's brain. They became so overgrown and slow in reactions that one end was hardly aware of what the other end was doing. No doesn't this sound like an apt description of our state and federal governments today?
