Religious Preference Survey To Be Sunday

At a meeting at the Spanaway Lutheran Church last Friday evening, final plans were completed for the religious survey to be made in the Spanaway and surrounding area next Sunday afternoon, September 22nd.

Representatives and ministers from the participating five churches received instructions and materials from Pastor John Briel, chairman of the instruction committee. A map was distributed indicating the assigned area each of the churches will cover, and an instruction sheet for each survey caller was explained.

Survey Time

Most of the participating church groups expect to begin the survey of their assigned areas around one or one-thirty on Sunday afternoon, hoping to complete most calls that day.

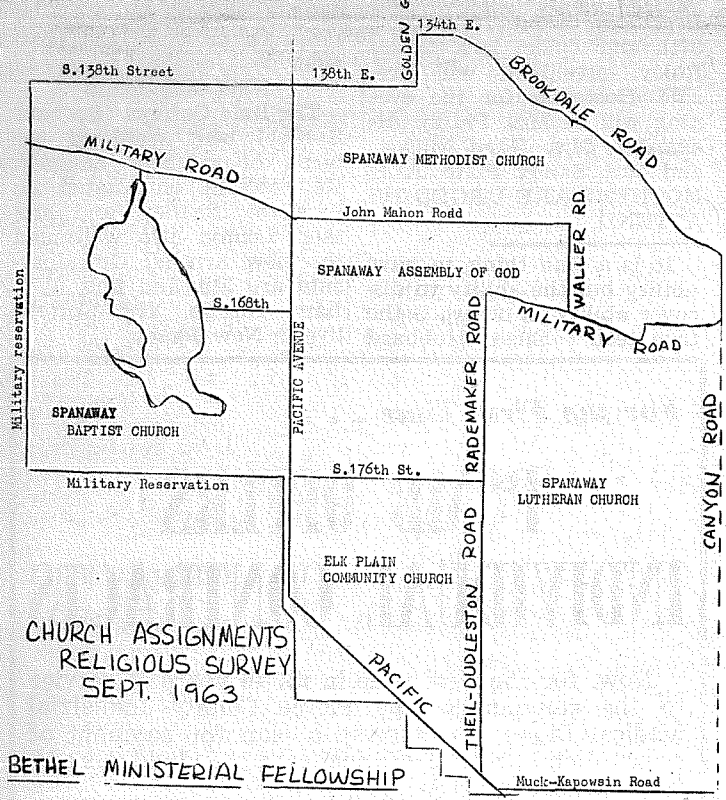
It was stressed at the planning meeting that the survey would be thorough, and that if people are not home when the first call is made, one or more follow-up calls will be made to their residence until the desired information can be obtained. "Unless the survey is a complete one," Pastor Friend of the Assembly of God Church explained, "we will not be able to get a true picture of the needs, interests, and attitudes of all the people in our community."

Objective Information

Reverend Qualley of the Methodist Church restated that the objective of the survey was merely to obtain information about the religious preferences of the community residents, and that the callers would not give personal testimony concerning their own faith, unless asked to do so. "Most people will be very gracious and cooperative," Pastor Qualley said. "Even the unchurched people of the community recognize the value of our religious institutions and will want to give us all the help they can in making the survey, especially since our churches are all working together on the project."

Each survey caller will be identified with a name tag marked "Community Religious Census," and will use a survey card marked "Bethel Community Religious Census". The information they will be the names of members of the family, with the ages of the children; the church or Sunday School of which the members of the family are members; or, if they are not church members, the church or denomination they attend or prefer. The caller will also ask for the family's mailing address. No other information is being requested, and at all times the caller will be polite and courteous.

Individual Medical Insurance Available

Individual coverage for hospital and medical-surgical care was made available to residents of the county this week by the Pierce County Industrial Medical Bureau for the first time in the 46-year history of the Bureau.

Laurence J. Evey, bureau manager, said the new program was designed to provide coverage for individuals and their dependents who are not members of groups holding contracts with PCMB. Applications are now being accepted, with coverage to begin as early as November 1.

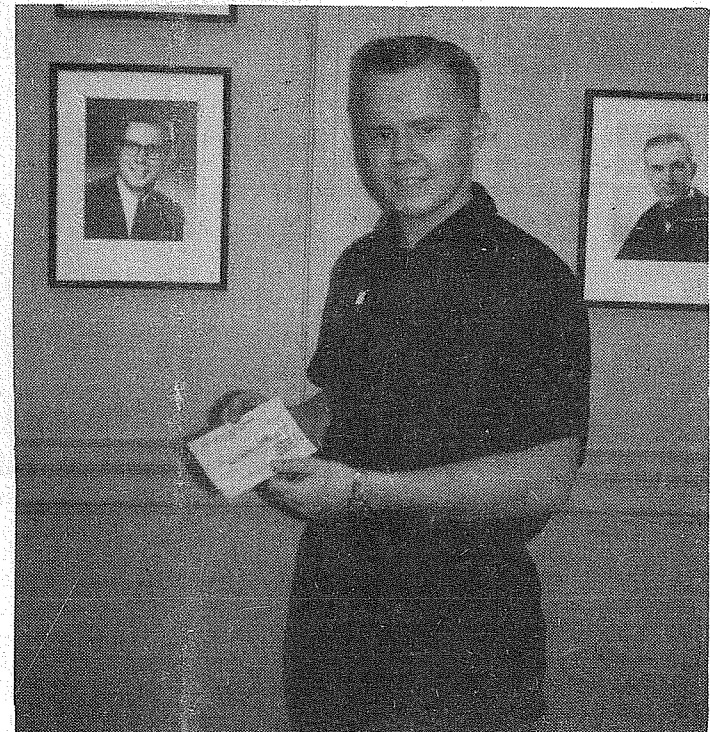
"We have received occasional requests for individual coverage for a number of years," Evey said, "but in recent months the demand has reached the point where we determined such a program should be designed and offered to the public."

The bureau, which already covers 70,000 Pierce County residents, now offers protection under the individual contract closely paralleling the hospital, medical and surgical benefits derived under group contracts. In addition, Evey said, worldwide protection is provided those travelling outside the county and in need of medical care.

To qualify, the bureau manager said, an applicant need only be under 65 years of age and a bona fide resident of Pierce County.

The new program is the second to be offered the public this year. Earlier in 1963 the bureau began a participating program for Pierce County residents over 65 years of age.

Methodists Get Funds To Build

The Spanaway Methodist Church this week received a \$20,000.00 check from the Pacific Northwest Annual Conference of their denomination. The funds are to be used by the church in the construction of their new building at S. 163rd St. and Pacific Avenue.

Pastor John Qualley explained that this amount was raised by all of the Methodist churches of the state as part of their Urgent Needs Appeal campaign for church extension. In this campaign, Methodists subscribed over two million dollars in three-year pledges.

From the funds already received by the Urgent Needs Appeal, many special gifts and loans have been made to churches, including the Spanaway church.

The funds received by the Spanaway church are in the form of a special deferred loan, with repayments to begin five years from now. This has permitted the church to begin construction much earlier than would otherwise be possible.

Mr. Lloyd Carey, building committee chairman, and Mr. Leland Powell, Urgent Needs Appeal Chairman, have announced that plans are already being made to celebrate the opening of the new church building with a special invitational Thanksgiving dinner, scheduled for late November or early December.

FP Budget Studied

Handicapped Registration Is Conducted

A registration of handicapped children who are not enrolled in special education classes or receiving any special education services is now being conducted in the Franklin Pierce School District as a part of a state-wide census by the State Office of Public Instruction.

Parents of handicapped children between the ages of 3 and 21 who are not now receiving any special education services are asked to call the school nearest them, or the District office, which will send them a form to be completed.

During last year, about 61,000 handicapped children in 287 school districts were served with State funds for special education classes. They include children who are temporarily or permanently handicapped because they are blind or partially seeing, mentally retarded, deaf or hard of hearing, cerebral palsied, orthopedically handicapped, epileptic or emotionally disturbed.

"Many parents may not realize the help which is available to them through the public schools," Louis Bruno, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, said. "It is our hope that this survey and registration will make them aware of this help and enable these handicapped boys and girls to go to school with the rest of the children."

Board Will Meet In Early October For Adoption Vote

The Franklin Pierce School Board will consider the final budget for the 1963-64 school year at a meeting to be held October 7 at 8 p.m. in the Administration Building on the High School grounds.

The preliminary budget, set up last April, calls for a total of \$3,108,741 for the operation of the district. Of this total district officials expect almost \$2 million from state funds. Local and county funds will account for about \$750,000 of the total and \$200,000 will come from non-tax and non-revenue funds.

Distribution

Slightly more than 67 per cent of the total will be spent on instruction which includes salaries for more than 700 teachers, administrators and others and also includes more than \$44,000 for textbooks. The libraries of the district will be allotted about \$30,000.

The next largest item in the budget is operation of the various schools. This is expected to take almost 9 per cent of the total budget. Food services, an item which is almost totally reimbursed by milk and lunch allowances and by student payment for lunches will amount to approximately \$313,716, about 6 per cent of the budget.

The total millage receipts, subject to revision when the actual assessed valuation of the district is set on October 1, will be about \$705,000. This is based on an estimated \$17,000,000 in assessed valuation of the district. The valuation for real and personal property taxes has had an average increase of about \$70,000 each year since the district was formed in 1949. Taxpayers will be assessed a total of 41 mills, instead of the anticipated 44 mills for the 1964 tax year.

School opening counts show an increase of 285 students in Bethel District over last year's figures. The official count Friday, September 6th was 3,100. Lacamas District joining Bethel added 40 pupils. Bethel High School increased by 85.

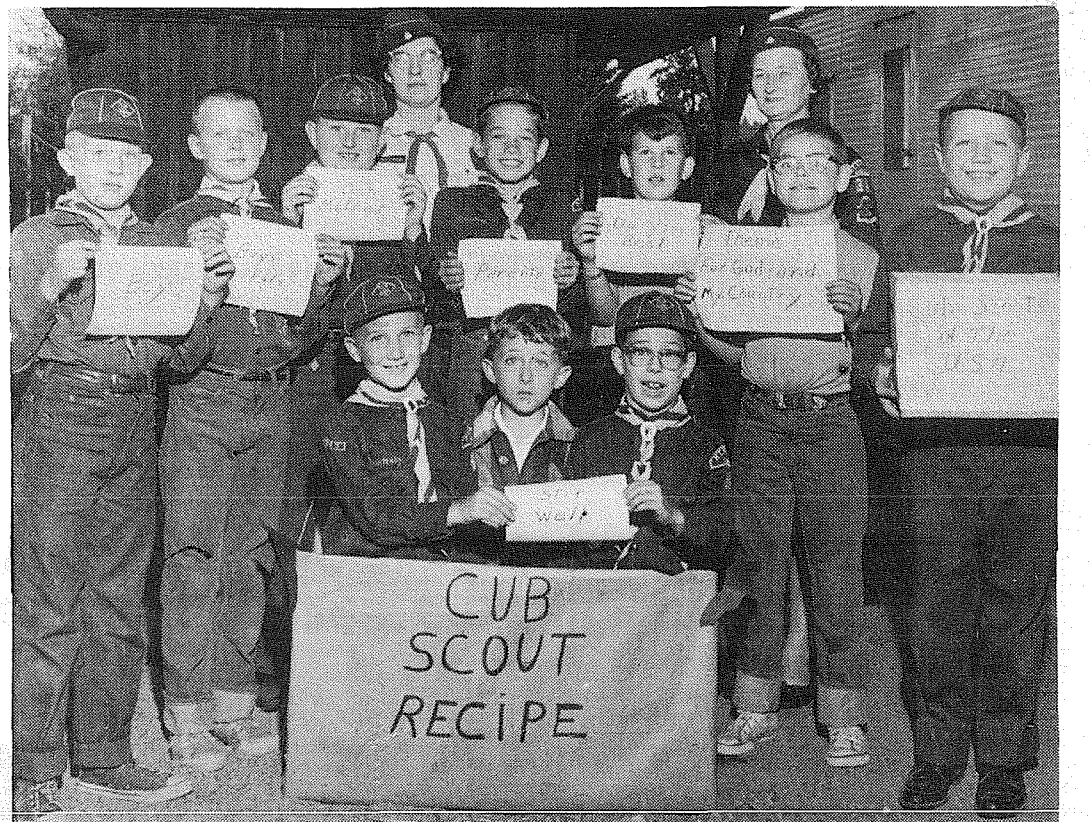
Berry Speaks To GOP Group

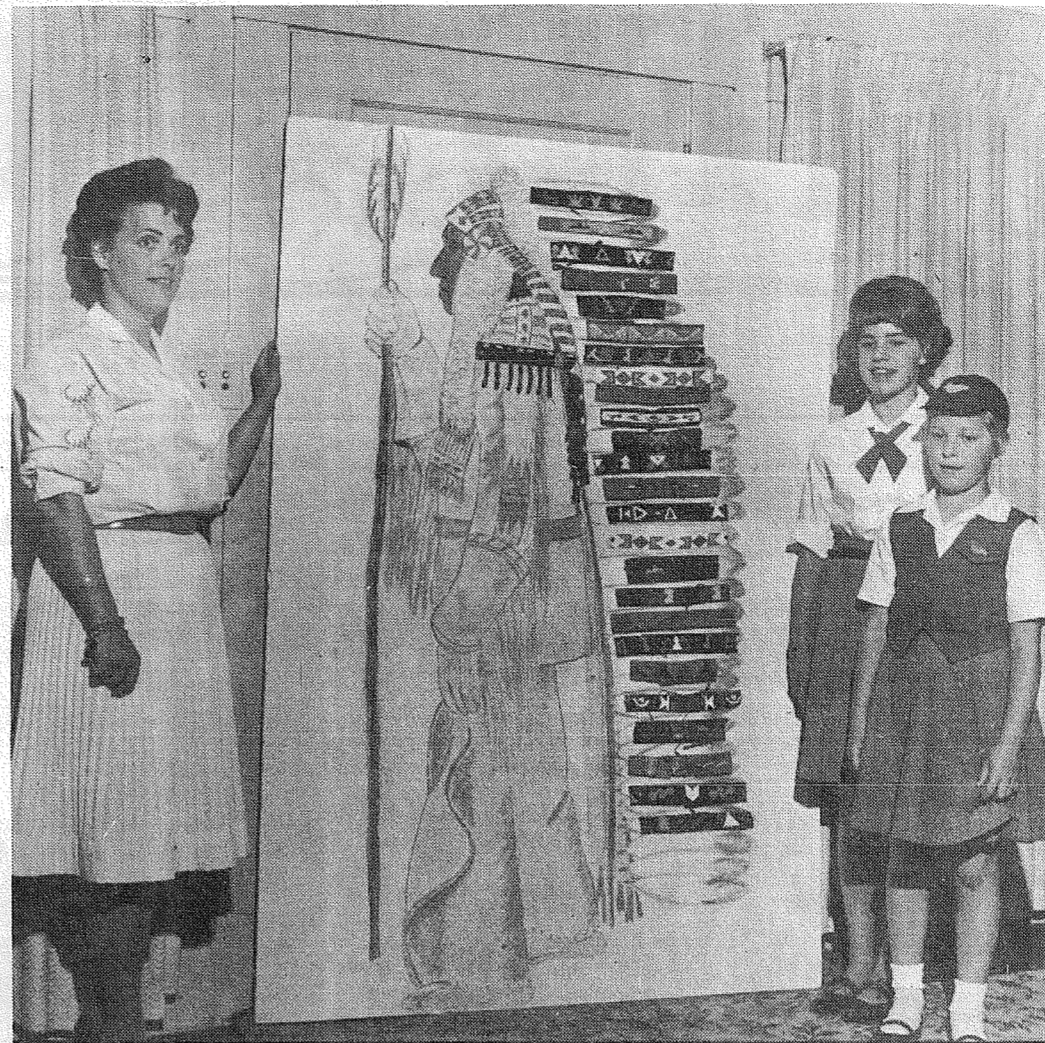
