

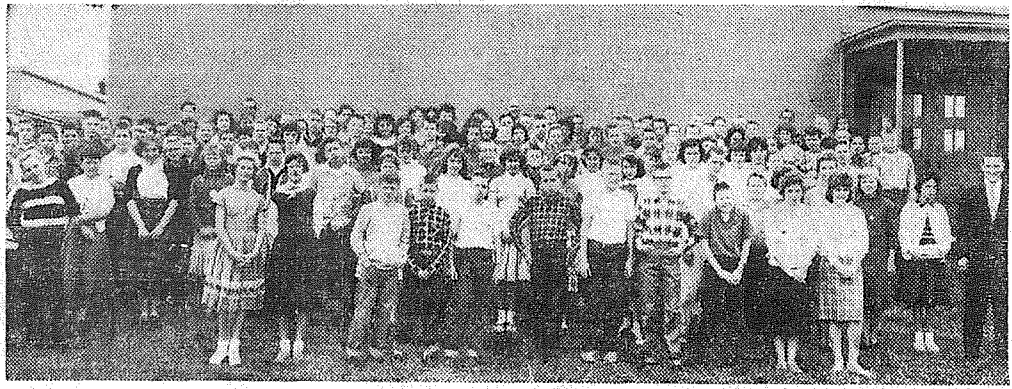

Have Children, Need Schools! Pancake Feed At FP November 6



HAVE CHILDREN — Need Schools! This might be the saying of the Franklin Pierce School District as it views the nearly 175 seventh graders shown above that occupy an entire building at the senior high school. Funds expected from the passage of Proposition No. 1, which appears as an excess levy request on the November 8 general election ballot, will help alleviate such crowding by providing equipment and supplies for the Perry G. Keithly Junior High School expected to open next September.

Nearly 1,700 new students will enroll in the Franklin Pierce schools in the next three years, according to a pre-election information booklet released by the

Education Council this week. These figures are based upon new enrollments in the past, and subsequent projections of student population in the future. The projected student count for September 1963 is 7,699.

School officials, in view of these enrollment figures that show a 500-student increase due next year, have placed a 9-mill, \$120,000 excess levy proposition on the November 8 general election ballot. Funds from Proposition No. 1 are scheduled to be used to hire additional teachers and buy text-

books and equipment. Money from this amount would also be used to provide custodial personnel and equipment for the new junior high school soon to be built in Parkland, as well as aid in defraying the rising costs of maintaining and operating the presently operating schools.

The report pointed out that it costs about \$100 over and above the normal costs for previously enrolled students to equip and supply a newcomer to the school. Of this \$100, books require about \$30 and desks, chairs, supplies, and the like take the remaining \$70. For the 500 new students due next year, an amount approximating \$50,000 will be needed.

Mrs. W. L. Krueger, education Council president, has urged voters in the School District to look carefully for the Propositions on the ballot and to mark them Yes.

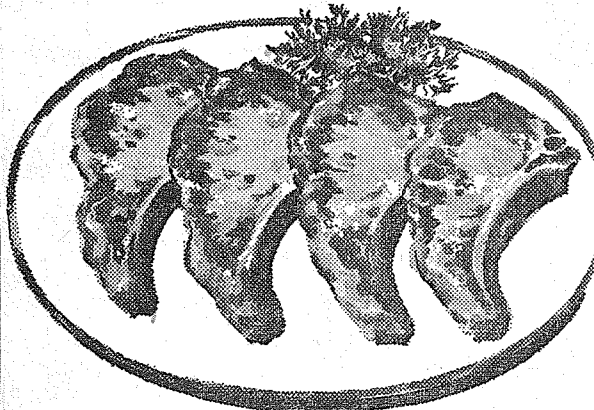

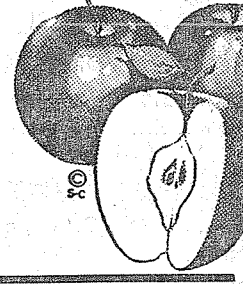

It so happens that I am off base tonight with a few hours to spare so thought I would knock out my column for next week. All my notes are back in Parkland in my desk and for some reason I just don't seem to be bursting with fresh ideas. Several people have asked me to bring up various subjects but I can think of only two of them off hand. One of my readers called up the other day hopping mad over the inconsiderate attitude of some people. He was referring particularly to those who act first and think afterward. Just recently he had witnessed a bunch of the local firemen responding to an alarm in the middle of the night only to find a tiny grass fire that had already burned itself out in the rain. It apparently had never occurred to the person turning in the alarm that the rain would extinguish the fire in only a few minutes more or that perhaps they could keep an eye on it for a few minutes themselves instead of calling out the fire department which out here in our area means getting a heck of a lot of your neighbors out of the nest on a rainy night to dash around half asleep getting to the nearest thing to a false alarm that could be. These people are civic minded individuals that the rest of us not so ambitious citizens owe a lot of thanks to. "At least be considerate of them", says my friend on the other end on the phone.

He's right. We should be. It's no fun to have to jump out of bed in the middle of the night in a cold house, wake up the kids while you're trying to find your boots, get screamed at by the war department, jump into your pants backwards, step into the dogs dish on the way out the door, fall down the steps, run into the garage door in the dark, sit down on a cold plastic car seat cover without your pants all the way up, back out and smash into the neighbors fence, burn up a few gallons of hard earned gas dashing across the country, driving around half asleep trying to remember where they said the fire was, just miss getting hit by a drunk by inches and finally to arrive at a fire you could spit on and put out, or worse yet, no fire, just a false alarm. I don't think I could take much of that. A couple of those wild trips and I'd be ready to turn in my badge. Probably a lot of our volunteer firemen feel that way right now. Let's don't lose them. Use your head before you turn in an alarm.

The other day I was flying across the mountains returning from a hunting trip. My only companions were my son, who was sound asleep and snoring so loudly I could hear him above the steady hum of my engine, and a two point buck who had a glassy eyed stare centered on the back of my neck. All I could think about was an article I had read recently in another paper written by some woman who was a self styled protector of all living things other than human. To her we humans who take to the hills once a year to hunt are nothing more than murderers. In her mind's eye she apparently had visions of a wounded deer lying behind every log, living its last moments on this earth in agony. I couldn't help but think how misled this person was. The deer in the back of the plane, which incidently wasn't mine, was to me just a part of another crop that must be harvested once a year. I have yet to come upon my first wounded deer lying dying in the woods. Usually if you don't drop a deer on the first or second shot it begins to sound like the Korean war had broken out again as other hunters open up on him. No—his chances of just slipping away someplace to suffer and die are practically nil in this day and age. This woman seems to forget or chooses to overlook the number of families who stock their larders each hunting season with venison and other wild game. She overlooks the damage and resultant cost to foresters and farmers alike were we to let our wildlife flourish in too great an abundance. She overlooks the enjoyment and companionship derived from fellow men joining in a hunting trip. True there are injuries, but many a man who has stayed home to play safe during hunting season has fallen off a ladder and broken a leg or suffered some such injury. I'm sure people like the lady I mentioned really mean well. They just put their pen or their jaw into operation before engaging their brains and thinking the thing out clearly.
