The business meeting will start promptly at 8 p.m. and it is hoped that mothers will bring their questions about Rainbows.

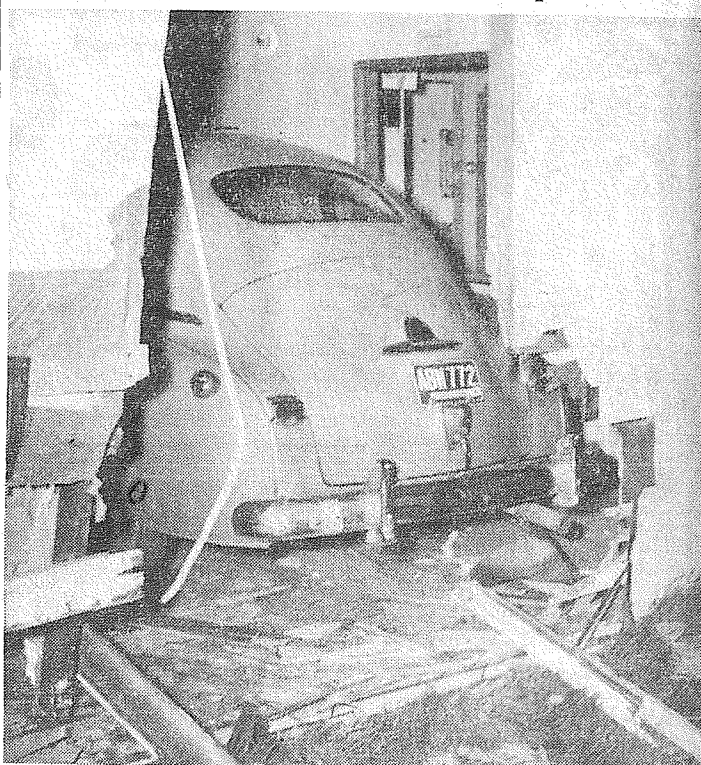
A pleasant and interesting conclusion to the evening will be instructions in how to make fir cone flowers.

Phone Co. Lays New Cable In Area

Pacific Telephone construction crews have placed a new underground cable on East 112th between Park Avenue and Golden Givens Road.

Manager Ron Johnson said that the \$30,000 project will provide additional telephone lines to a 14-square-mile area north and east of the LEnox telephone building. The area is made up largely of suburban residences and small farms.

Some 6,100 feet of special underground cable containing 1200 pairs of wires have been placed, according to supervising construction foreman C. S. Hartman. Cable splicers will start joining the sections of the huge new cable this week (week of 9-28), and will complete the project during late November, he said.

Jobs such as these indicate the continuing growth of Tacoma and its suburbs, reflecting the telephone company's confidence in the future of the area, Manager Johnson said.

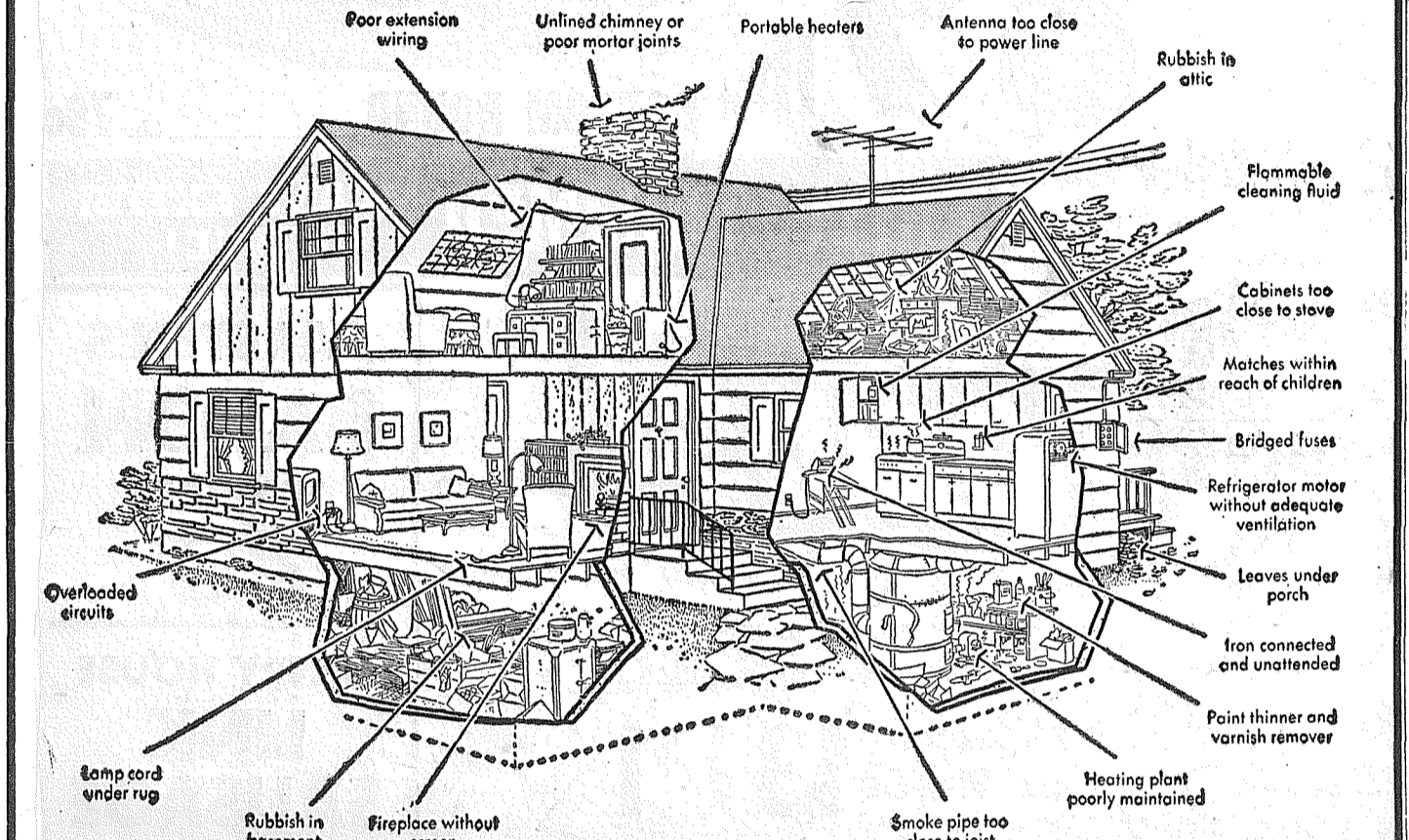
Lovely Wedding For Local Girl

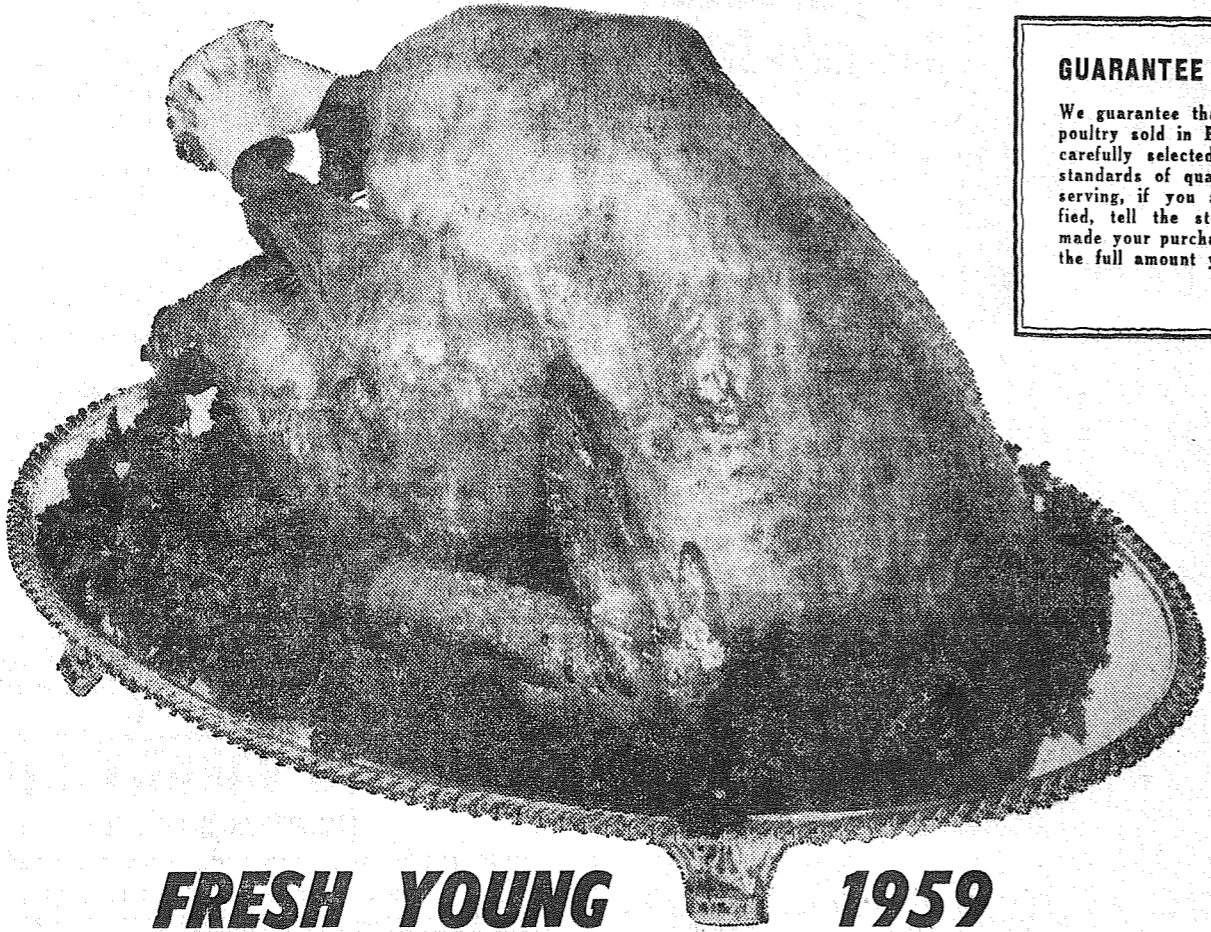

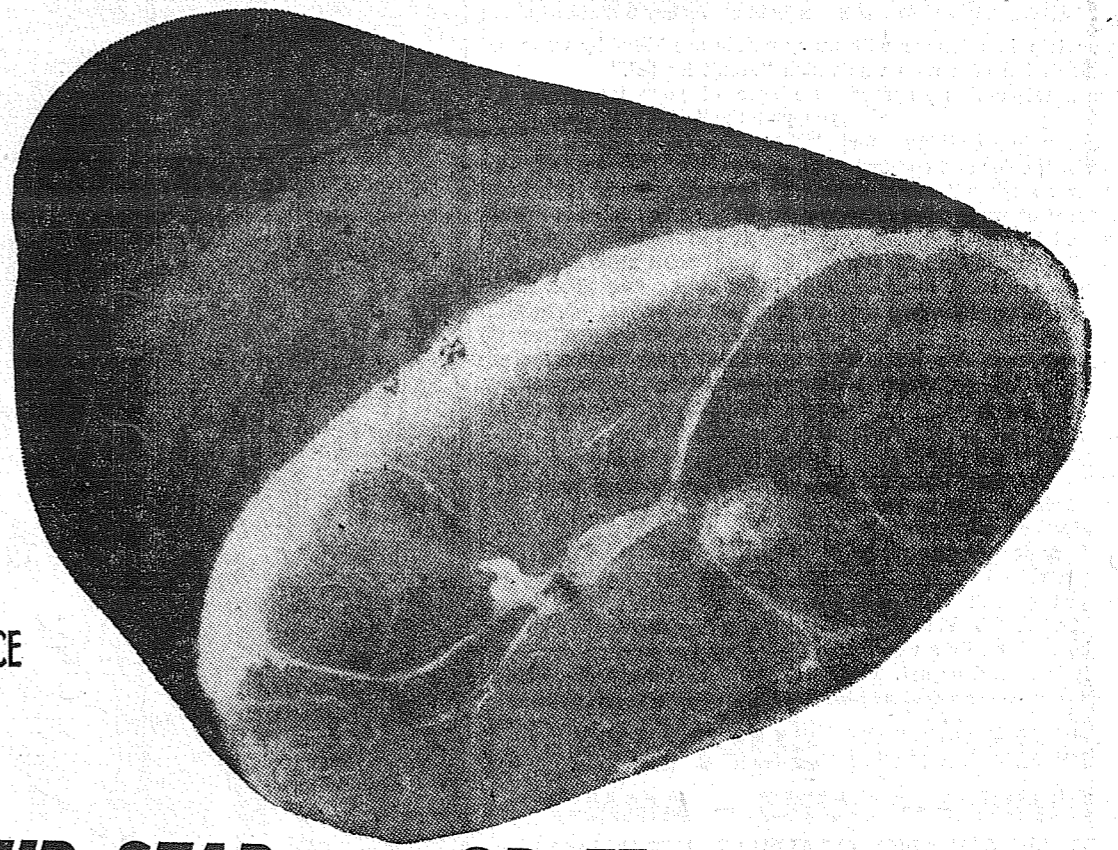

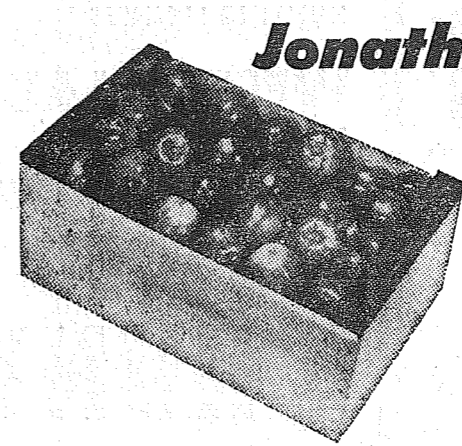

For Happy Endings to Hunting Trips Notify Someone Of Your Destination

Plan your trip in advance with the cold calculation of a man who expects the worst—and is prepared for it.

Wear adequate clothing for warmth, weight, color and comfort. No man is an island! says the song, a statement most applicable to the hunter. NEVER travel alone. Take a buddy with you. If you should become separated, however, DON'T PANIC. Stay where you are and build a fire.

About your weapon—the shotgun or rifle with which you hope to bring home the big game:

The relentless accuracy of statistics each year show that about 2,200 persons will lose their lives due to the careless use of firearms. During hunting season the possibility of being accidentally shot is increasing greatly.

The weapon doesn't control itself—YOU CONTROL IT! Never partake in horseplay with a weapon—whether it is loaded or not. Too many people are killed by weapons which "aren't loaded."

Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger.

There are many things which common sense will dictate that you do with or about your weapon; they apply whether you are on a rabbit or bear track: carry the weapon so that it will point away from you and others, and never point it at anything you do not intend to kill. Open the breech before you inspect the barrel and never leave a loaded weapon unattended. Keep weapons and ammunition out of the reach of children, PERIOD!

Good hunting is no accident—and no accidents means good hunting.

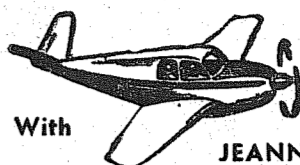

The following is reprinted from the Southern California Forum:

"Here's a note on inflation. It's the German story. When the Socialist controlled Government took over in Germany in 1919 it took four and a fifth German marks to equal the purchasing power of \$1.00 in American money. German inflation began to run wild in 1922-23.

"Then it took 160 thousand marks to equal our dollar's purchasing power. By November, 1923, the mark was valued at 4 billion 200 million to the dollar.

"A newspaper in Berlin sold for 200 million marks per copy.

"There is an interesting story of a young German being left an inheritance of 650,000 marks in 1920. That was worth approximately 65 thousands dollars at the time. The provision was that he would receive it when he was 21, and he became 21 in the middle of 1923.

"With his entire inheritance he was then able to buy only one meal.

"Think what will happen to pensions, insurance and savings with that kind of inflation."

Some go because "it is the thing to do." Others go because they have an objective. Still more figure it is a good way to loaf for a few years at the expense of their parents. All too many come out with a degree that has absolutely no meaning, yet they expect it to open the door to everything.

"According to Radio Moscow, a new gadget is available that's a combination potato peeler and cocktail mixer. It can peel three-quarters of a pound of spuds in three or four minutes, makes a container of cocktails in 90 seconds, they proudly claim (What connection the separate ingredients have is not made clear).

"We, of course, have nothing to compare with this — although there has been a manual model available for many years. Over here it's called a husband."

Cheering coeds and klieg lights have brought football a long way from the days when the English stubbed their toes kicking around the skull of a Dane.

That's one theory of how the game started, according to research experts.

The Danes occupied England from 1016 to 1042. A few years after they left, some workmen digging in an old battlefield uncovered a Danish skull and started kicking it back and forth. Several boys who had been watching dug up another skull and soon everybody was "kicking the Dane's head."

They were also getting bruised toes. Some precocious youngster substituted an inflated cow bladder . . . and the game of football was born.

In the 1100's, the "game" was more of a riot. Teams from neighboring towns — sometimes with hundreds of players on each side — met at some midway point. The bladder was thrown down and the free-for-all was on. The object of the game was to kick the ball into the center of the rival town. When the yelling horde descended on the town, pedestrians ran for their lives and shopkeepers bolted their doors.

Eventually the players were ordered to play in some vacant area or give up the sport. The teams retired to a field marked off with boundaries similar to those of a soccer field. And the towns — and football — were saved.

If nothing else, writing this column has caused me to read more and think more than ever before. Now if some of the philosophy from the learned men I read of will just rub off it will all be worth it.

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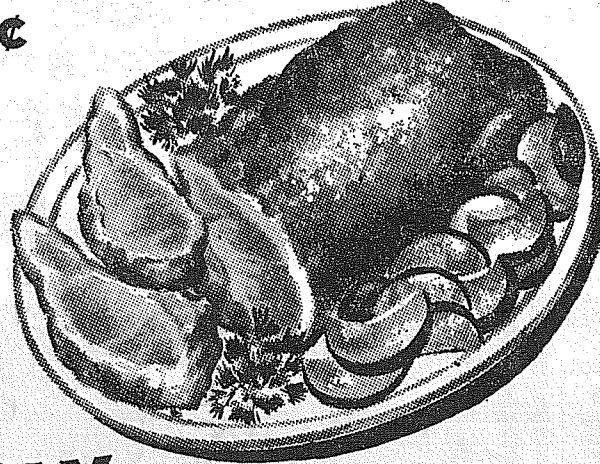
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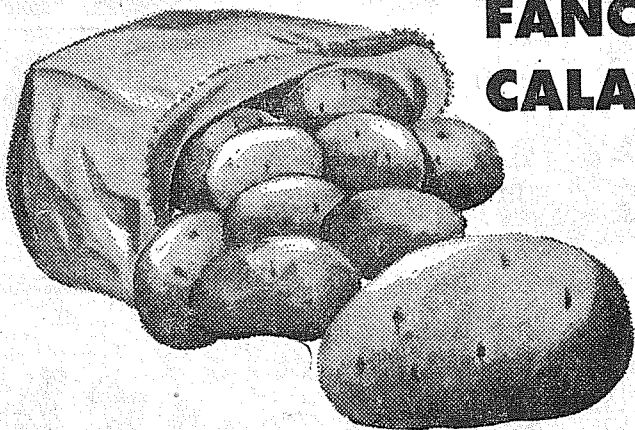


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
