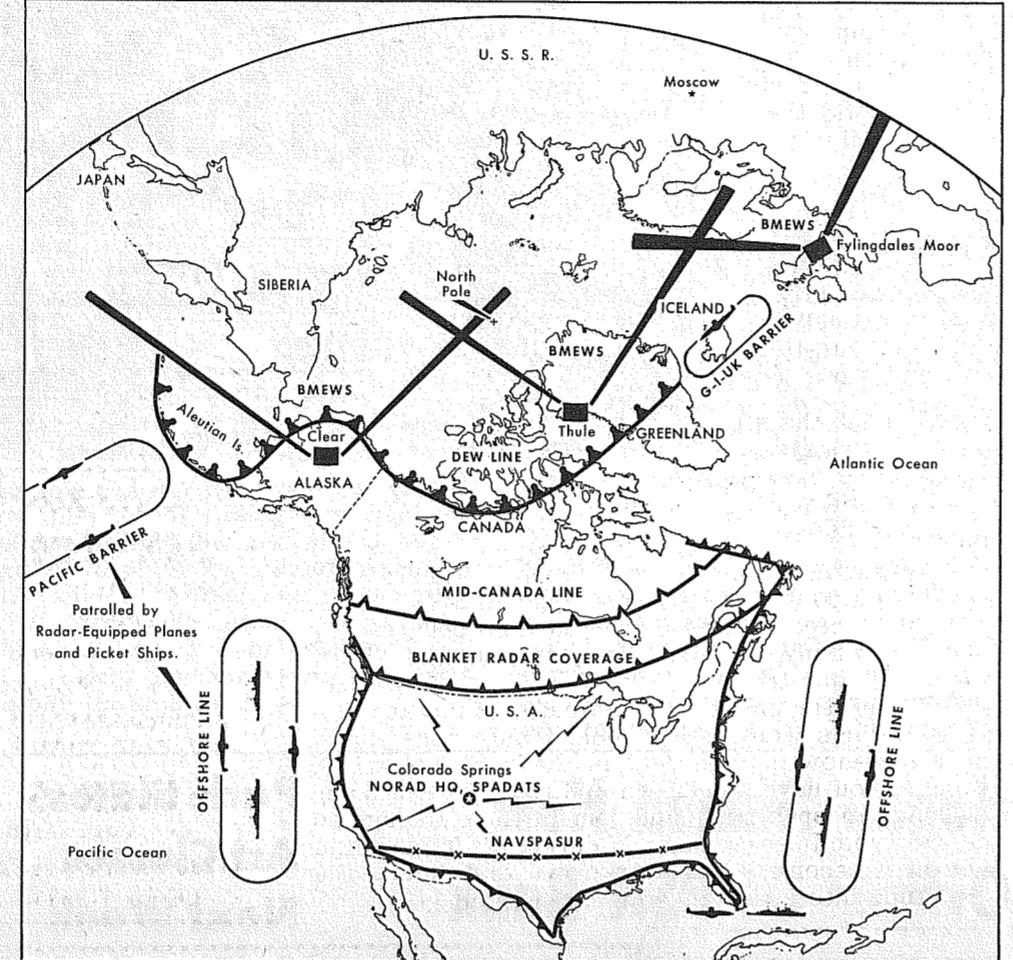


Donna Beckman Becomes Bride Of William Harr

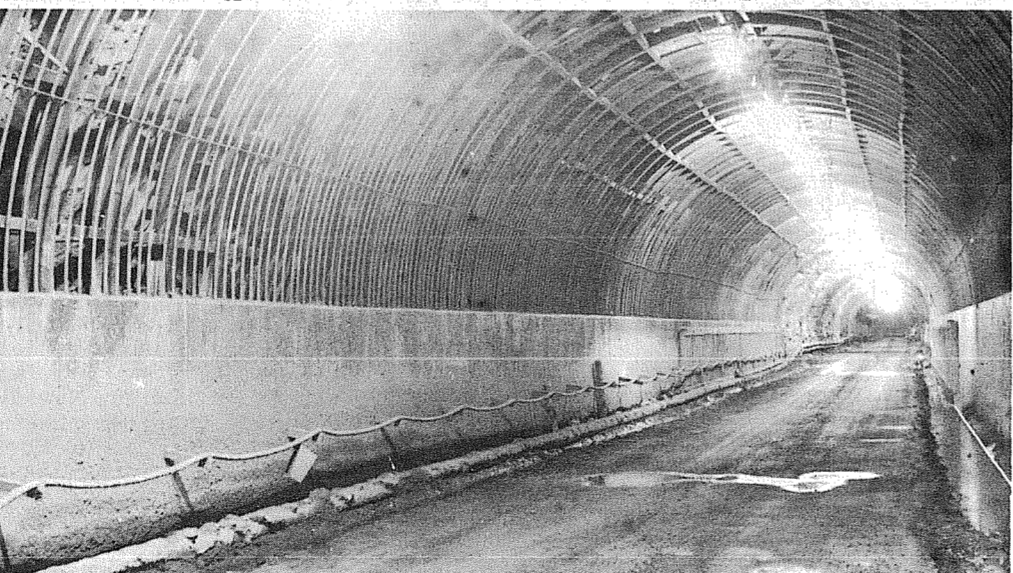

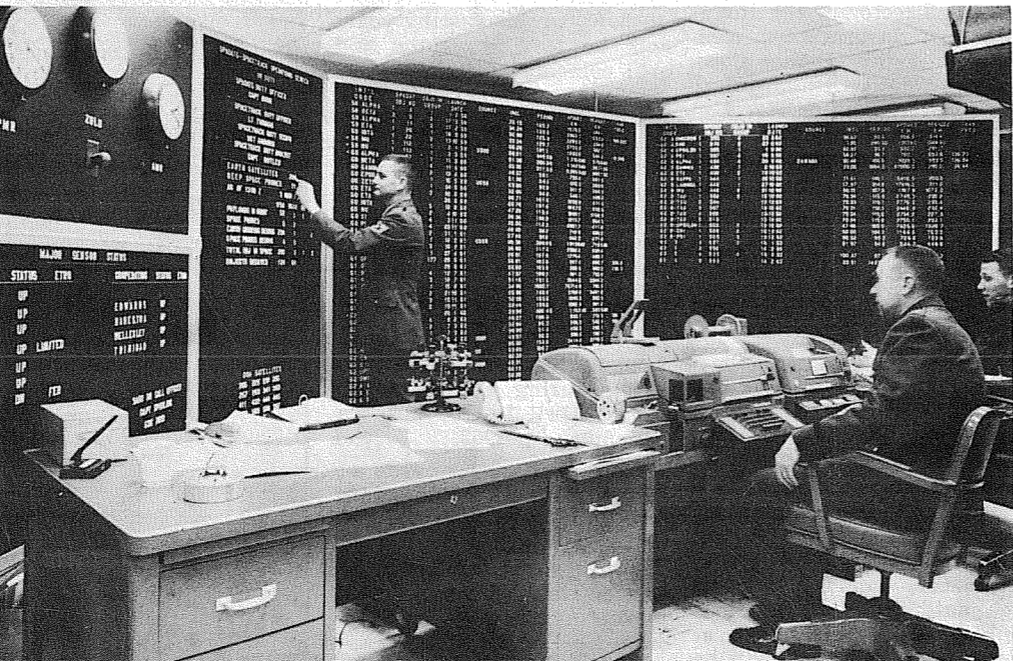
THIS AERIAL VIEW OF CHEYENNE MOUNTAIN, near Colorado Springs, Colorado, pinpoints the area selected to house the North American Air Defense Command's "hardened" underground Combat Operations Center. From the Utah Construction Company's base camp the main access road branches out, circles the mountain toward the north and south portals, bores through a mile of solid granite and meets again 1000' under the earth's surface.



NORAD DETECTION SYSTEM - Protecting the North American Continent from surprise aerospace attack is a widespread electronic screen stretching from the Arctic to the Mexican border and from mid-Pacific to the United Kingdom. At three locations across the top of the world - Clear, Alaska; Thule, Greenland; and Flyingdales Moor, England - massive radar antennas reach out electronically for 3,000 miles to give 15 minute warning time of an ICBM attack over the Arctic. Against the manned bomber threat, NORAD employs three warning and detection lines in Canada - the Distant Early Warning (DEW) Line, the Mid-Canada Line, and the Pinetree Radar System across the middle of the continent - coupled with a system of radars in the continental United States to provide blanket radar coverage. Off-shore extensions of the network include the Pacific Barrier on the west and the G-I-UK (Greenland-Iceland-United Kingdom) Barrier on the east. These extensions of the DEW Line, are patrolled by radar-equipped Navy Super Constellations. Off both coasts, and between Florida and Cuba, Navy picket ships and USAF Super Constellations extend radar coverage far out to sea. In space, the Navy's Space Surveillance System, an electronic fence across the Southern United States, and the Air Force's Spacetrack System track all objects in earth orbit and feed data to the Space Detection and Tracking System at NORAD. All elements are in instant communication with NORAD Headquarters at Colorado Springs, Colorado.



THIS CAVERNOUS TUNNEL leads into the heart of Cheyenne Mountain where NORAD's underground Combat Operations Center is under construction. A three-story building inside the mountain will house electronic equipment needed to maintain the constant surveillance on North America's aerospace boundaries and provide data the NORAD staff would use to conduct the aerospace defense of this continent should the need arise.



SPACE SCOREBOARDS - Status boards in NORAD's Space Detection and Tracking System (SPADATS) operations control center at Colorado Springs, Colo., display timely tracking information on all man-made objects in earth orbit. Huge digital computers receive tracking information from the Air Force's Spacetrack System, the Navy's Space Surveillance System, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory and space sensor stations around the world. Once processed by the computers, the information is displayed on these status boards. Through closed-circuit television this information is piped to the central display area in the combat operations center and is available at all times to General John K. Gerhart, NORAD's commander in chief, and his battle staff. All equipment and operations such as above will soon be transferred to the "Hardened" combat operations center deep within Cheyenne Mountain. See a-Wondering and a-Wandering in Next Column.

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a - Wondering and a - Wandering ...

With JACK BROWN

There are many among us who, in no uncertain terms, feel that people such as I should crawl off some place and keep our fat mouths shut. These individuals look upon us as the breeders of hate and unrest and most assuredly believe that we cry wolf when only a shaggy pup yelps at our door for warmth, food and understanding. If you and I listen intently to their ideology we too might become lulled into a false sense of security and tend to discount any danger to ourselves, our property and the very land of freedom we love so dearly. Without a real and clear knowledge of threat, without being able to clearly see the picture and without the ability to read between the lines, this false sense of security, promoted by propagandists, is an easy state for one to lapse into. Once there, it is only natural to feel indignation towards those who try to prod you into mental alertness.

Just this past week I had the opportunity to join with those Americans upon whose shoulders rests the responsibility of defending our country, should the need arise. I met with them, talked to them, looked over the defense system at their command and, most important of all, got the answer I sought. Is there or is there not a real existing danger from communist Russia today? Were Kruchev's words "We will bury you," made without backing?

I visited the North American Air Defense Command Headquarters and saw for myself the threat as well as the tools at our command to counteract it. I personally talked to the Commander-in-Chief of NORAD, General John K. Gerhart, USAF. I talked to his men, Army men and to several of the Canadian officers serving at the joint command headquarters. From this contact I gained a knowledge of what it is like to live and know and daily witness the fact that the bark at the door is in reality from a wolf and not a whelping pup. I found out from these men what it is like to actually watch the communist threat move above us thru space, around our borders on sea and in the air. These men daily not only see the threat moving across their screens but are constantly bombarded with photos obtained from various intercepts that show huge fleets of manned Soviet bombers cruising within a few miles of our borders, carrying enough nuclear weapons to practically wipe out our civilization were they to be released upon us without notice. These people daily see this threat to our freedom. They live with it and spend every working moment striving to lessen the threat by creating better and better defenses and methods of warning.

My only regret is that each and every one of you can't make the trip and see for yourself what is being accomplished in the way of defense of our continent and particularly those of you who have been lulled into believing that any threat is either minor or imagined.

Let me retrogress for a moment and perhaps I can bring a clearer picture into focus for you as to the point I am trying to make or rather the bell I am trying to ring, for if you are asleep, believe me I am trying hard to awaken you.

The need for a strong air defense system is fully recognized by military leaders of both the United States and Canada. Both countries have joined in a common defense system, NORAD. Knowing that the problem is a common one shared by both sovereign nations. By treaty agreement in 1957 they told the world they considered national security a common problem and under the agreement any air attack against the North American continent would be opposed by both countries operating under a common command, contributing forces, real estate and equipment to a single operational agency, NORAD. NORAD's mission is defence of the North American Continent. In carrying out this mission the system has four basic functions: DETECTION, INTERCEPTION, IDENTIFICATION AND DESTRUCTION if necessary of enemy aircraft as far from their intended targets as possible.

And there, my friends, with this summation of the mission of NORAD, can you possibly see eye to eye with those who cry "Warmongers" at us and our Canadian counterparts who are responsible for setting up an organization with the sole purpose of defense?

The communist ideology is to dominate the world. This must never happen. I firmly believe that a strong defense plus a large retaliatory force to keep the cold war cold is an absolute must at this time. As long as the communists proclaim their ideology to dominate and their giant planes fly over our borders non-stop from Moscow to Cuba (and this, daily), their intercontinental missiles cross above our land on practice shots and their Sputniks whirl constantly overhead, we must stand ready to protect ourselves.

In this column, as you know, I have pointed out what I consider to be a waste of our tax money in many instances. On this hand, however, let me say that I firmly believe that every cent of tax money appropriated to the NORAD system is well spent and an investment in the security of America.

Some of you may say, "So old Brown hitched a ride with the Air Force over to Colorado and now he's spouting off to pay the tab". Brother, you've dialed the wrong number. No one buys my pen, including (Continued on Page 3)

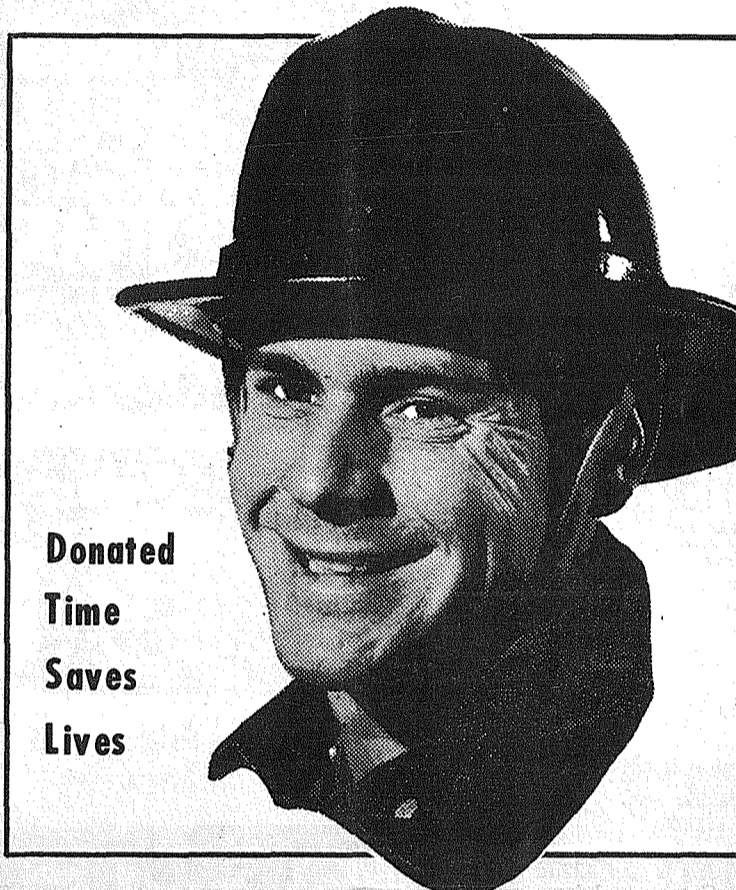
