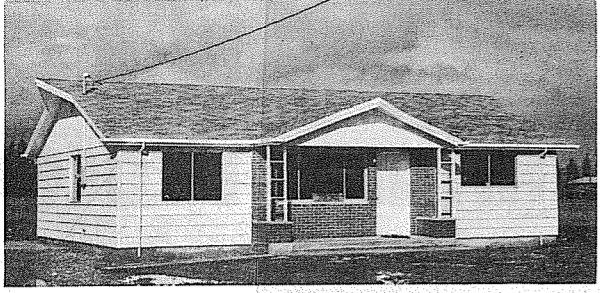


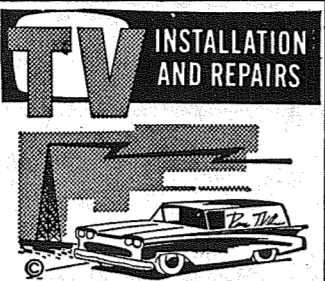
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County Agents Corner

Cecil Foster, Buckley poultryman, was reelected to a second term as president of the Pierce County Egg Producers' Association, at their annual meeting recently. R. C. Miller, from Firgrove, was reelected vice-president and Leo Doty, South Prairie, secretary-treasurer.

Newly elected directors for a three-year term, include E. M. Antonson, Gig Harbor, Charles Brunoff, Edgewood, and Harold Foster, Sumner.

Holdover directors in addition to the officers, include Wm. Hannam from Vickery Road, Clifford Johnson, Edgewood; Sig Sivertson, Edgewood; Orley Andrews, Graham; and Henry Whitehouse, Buckley.

A report of last year's activities included presentation of SB-50 to remove sales tax from baby chicks and miscellaneous production items. Senate bill 67, a bill to reduce egg dealers' license fees from \$15.00 to \$5.00 was opposed by the group. Other activities credited to the Pierce County Egg Producers' Association, included assisting the State Department of Agriculture to revise its egg advisory council from a four member

group, consisting of egg dealers only, to ten members. Commercial egg producers, consumers, Grange, Farm Bureau, and retail grocers are represented on the new setup.

Members from Lewis and King counties also participated in the meeting. Lewis county reported on action taken by their group regarding proposed enabling type legislation. They favor the legislation with an exclusion of block voting by cooperatives.

All egg producers are invited to join the Pierce County Egg Producers' Association and support action to help solve industry problems.

Karl Hobson, well known Washington State University Extension price economist, will serve as instructor for the February 14th sessions of the "Principles of Economics as applied to Pierce County Agriculture" short course. The sessions are held from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. in the Western Washington Experiment Station Winter School Building. The public is invited.

Hobson will discuss prices, money, credit and banking, price levels, business cycles, and distribution of income during the two sessions.

The opening session featured Dr. Bruce Brooks, WSU economics professor. He discussed basic economic concepts and their application to agriculture.

The weekly two-hour course is sponsored by the Pierce County Extension Service to better acquaint producers with a basic knowledge of economic principles.

Dr. Elmer Searles, Washington State University Extension Marketing specialist, is coordinating the instructional phase of the course.

It's a cinch not all the squirrels are sitting in a tree eating nuts. Some of them have inadvertently been sent to Olympia under the guise of being lawmakers. Charged and sent forth as such, many of them feel they must by all means pass some kind of a law to live up to their title. The fact that this is the case is evidenced by some of the utter tripe being fostered in our state capital.

It's true that the majority of our lawmakers are sincere, and the bills they propose have merit. It's the minority that propose the ridiculous that give a shadowy reflection to all. If you take time to analyze the proposed bills, you'll find some of them so pointedly onerous that you can fairly hear the rustle of money changing hands. If you think this a rash statement take the time to read thru a dozen or so bills and see for yourself.

Judgin' from some of the letters we git around here the dictionary is the worlds fergottin' book.

I didn't know what J.F.K.'s philosophy is, but mine has always been that if things are bad and you run around telling everyone how bad they are, they are bound to get worse. On the other hand, when things are bad, if you run around telling people about the things that are good, everything starts getting better.

Nearly 70 million voters cast ballots in the past general election. What most people do not know is that but for our archaic voting laws, the turnout of voters last November could have approached the 80 million mark. Between 5 and 10 million American citizens were forced to stand on the sidelines while their fellow citizens went to the polls. These 5 to 10 million disenfranchised citizens were deprived of the right to vote for president because they had moved recently and could not meet the residency requirements in the states to which they had moved.

We have become a mobile nation, not only for pleasure but of necessity. Countless thousands of persons employed by larger corporations have to change residences as they are transferred or promoted. When this happens shortly before a presidential election under our present laws they automatically lose the right to vote for president.

The irony of the situation is expressed with feeling by one victim of disenfranchisement who was recently promoted and transferred by a major oil company. He writes, "We were being exhorted on all sides to get out and vote. When Arthur Godfrey told my wife (via radio) 'to get off your duff and vote' she wrote him immediately saying she would be glad to but the states would not let her. She committed a terrible crime—she moved! . . ."

Here's something some of the jokers down in Olympia could sink their teeth into, instead of proposing a bill that it would be a felony to let loose an unbanded wiffle sniffle. It should be the business of our state legislature to modernize our election registration procedures. If a person is a U. S. citizen, he or she should be entitled to cast a ballot during a presidential election regardless of whether they have just moved into the state or the county.

Seven local residents announced plans this week to travel to Europe for the 1961 International European assemblies of Jehovah's witnesses. They will attend a series of Bible educational programs in four European cities.

Charter to New York

The seven, who attend the East congregation of Jehovah's witnesses, will fly by charter plane from New York to Amsterdam, the Netherlands, early in July. For the next month they will spend one week each in Copenhagen, Denmark; Hamburg, Germany; London, England; and Paris, France.

Five Languages

Assembly talks will be given in as many as five languages simultaneously, including English. Besides these four large conventions two others are planned. These will be in Turin,

Italy, and Amsterdam, the Netherlands.

More Meetings

Besides the Europe meetings, there will be six witness conventions in the Western Hemisphere: five in the United States and one in Canada. Tacomans not traveling to Europe will go either to Vancouver, British Columbia or to San Francisco to attend a convention.

Important Role

Mr. Samuel Hummel, one of the assistant ministers in the East Unit congregation of Jehovah's witnesses who will travel to Europe remarked, "Conventions play a very important role in the New World Society of Jehovah's witnesses. They allow delegates the opportunity to see the love and unity within the world-wide preaching organization of Jehovah's witnesses. There is harmony in spite of national and racial differences."

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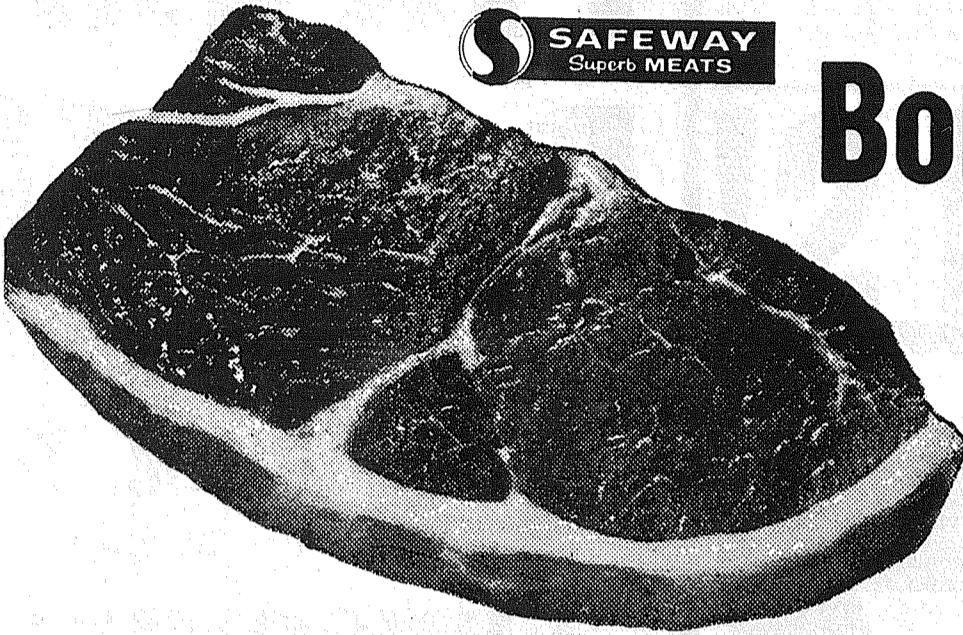

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It's The Law

Ted M owned a row boat which he stored for the winter by standing the boat on its stern, leaning against the back of his garage.

Billy, a six-year-old neighbor boy, was playing with some other children behind Ted M's garage. The children rolled some barrels into the boat with enough force to knock it over. Billy was pinned beneath the falling boat and suffered a broken leg and other injuries.

Billy's parents sued Ted M for \$25,000 damages, claiming that the boat was an "attractive nuisance" because it was left in such a position on Ted's property that it could be pushed over, causing injury to a child.

Do you think Billy's parents will be able to collect damages for the injuries the child suffered?

The answer is that the parents will not be able to recover damages. A child, even though trespassing on someone else's property, may recover damages under certain circumstances if his injuries are caused by an "attractive nuisance." But the thing causing the injury must be a nuisance. Plans for the new recreation project.

dangerous in itself, which means that it must be something which is likely to, or probably will, result in an injury to a child attracted by and coming in contact with it.

A boat, even when leaning against a building, is not dangerous in itself and cannot be classed as an attractive nuisance, any more than a pile of wood or lumber could be considered an attractive nuisance.

The law did not require Ted M to foresee that Billy might be injured in the way he was. Therefore, Billy's parents could not recover from Ted for Billy's injuries.
