

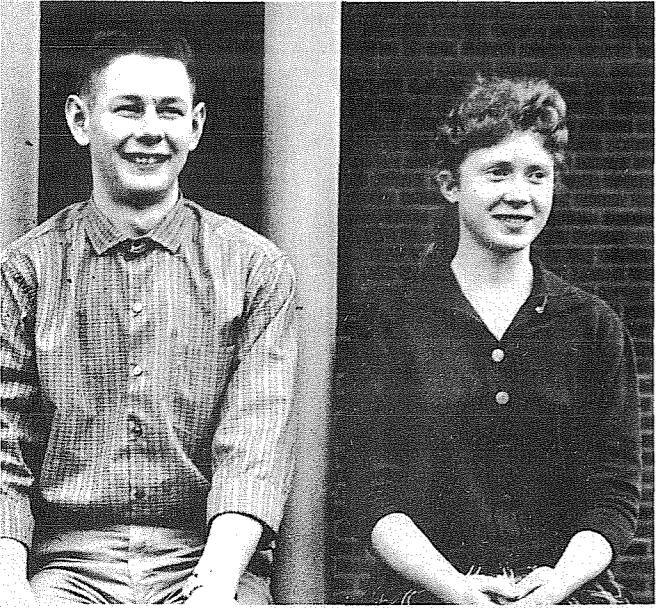

A representative from the Pierce County Health Department will explain the services of the health department to the community.

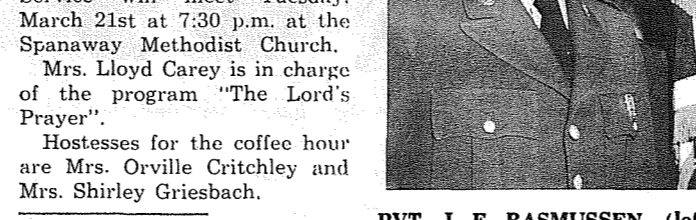

Plans were set up recently for the Enumclaw Spring Dairy show for 4-H and FFA members. The date of May 20th was set for the annual event to be held at King County's Enumclaw Recreation Grounds.

The meeting, held at Ingham's Cafe on Lynden Drive, was conducted by president Les Sroufe, Jersey breeder from Enumclaw. County agents, 4-H leaders, FFA instructors, and dairymen, representing King, Pierce, and Kitsap counties attended the meeting.

Premium lists will be available soon and will be sent to 4-H leaders. Entries must be made to the county agents and FFA instructors by May 1st.

The Enumclaw show is acclaimed to be the largest of this kind in the Western U. S. ## Cattle Breeders Must Improve

Beef cattle breeders will have to make more use of performance records in the future to remain in a competitive position.

This is the opinion of George Purcell, county extension agent, who reports that maximum improvement of breeding stock through selection can be done only with the aid of accurate records.

Though many breeders pride themselves on their ability to pick "good-doers" by appearance alone, research shows that there is little relationship between appearance and performance. Many factors, such as the different appearance of an animal in fat or lean condition, can lead to expensive mistakes unless the breeder's judgment is backed up with records.

Some breeders fear that selection on the basis of records will result in large, long-legged, beef-headed animals of poor beef type, Purcell says. There is some evidence that this could happen if selection is based on performance alone, according to Rudy Eetzler, Washington State University Extension Livestock specialist, but it can be avoided if selection is based on a combination of performance and appearance. Both can be improved at the same time.

Though performance records involve additional effort and expense on the part of the stockman, most animal breeders feel that demand in the future will be for bulls which have good performance records to go along with desirable type and conformation. (Continued on Page 8)

**All About Dogo**

**Befriend or Be Bitten**  
More than 100,000 dog bites were reported in the country last year. The number remains a dull statistic—until some growling canine fixes a hungry eye on you! Then comes the impulse to run for the hills—but . . . Never run away. Even if a barking dog is charging directly at you, hold your ground. Agreed, it takes a bit of courage but if you panic, your flight will convince him that you have bad intentions and should be bitten—and you will be.

Talk to those hands," warns Clarence C. Fawcett at the Purina Dog Care Center. Keep them visible but out of his reach. And avoid any sudden jerky movements. If the dog seems willing to make friends, extend your hand very slowly. Never extend the hand with the fingers outstretched. Rather, make a fist of your hand and offer the back of it. If he should suddenly bite—this lessens the danger of a crippling injury.

Don't shout. Using a loud tone of voice will enrage a belligerent dog and intimidate a shy one. Talk to him in a normal, soothing manner.

Dogs have deservedly earned their reputation as man's best friend. A little forethought and effort by non-dog owners and particularly, by dog owners, can prevent the relatively few temperamental ones from tarnishing that reputation.

Before placing cut flowers in a vase, be sure to remove all leaves below the water line. Leaves decompose very quickly in water.

### So You Want To Buy Antiques

by EDITH PARODY-Furniture

If you're among the Americans who spend a total of \$250 million a year on antique furniture . . . be sure you get your money's worth by first learning to identify a true antique.

Familiarize yourself with furniture styles of the period you are interested in. Example—four-posters of early American vintage are never double beds!

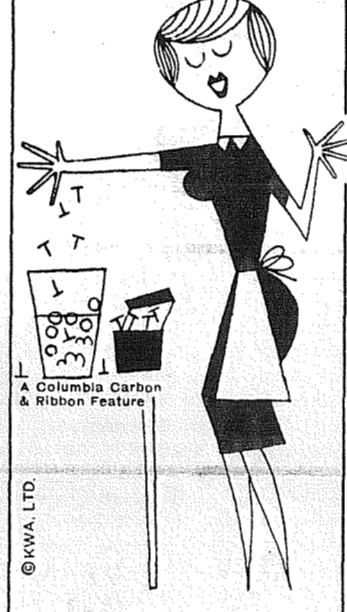
Benjamin Raubvogel, Curator of the White Horse Cellar Museum of Tavern Memorabilia in New York City, offers some expert advice: "First, know what an antique is . . . furniture made prior to 1830, roughly the date machine-made articles came into common use. Authentic patina, your clue to age and value of antique furniture, is even in color . . . and only penetrates a few thousands of an inch."

Mr. Raubvogel's museum is a re-creation of the celebrated 18th century White Horse Cellar Coaching Inn in Edinburgh, Scotland. Here such notables as James Boswell, Robert Burns, David Hume and Adam Smith gathered for a stimulating evening of conversation intermingled with a dram or two of the Inn's famous White Horse Scotch Whisky.

Pine and oak furniture, Mr. Raubvogel continues, was made of carefully matched boards, rarely had knots. Joiners made dovels by hand . . . so if you find them perfectly round, the piece may be a fake! The same applies to chair legs . . . true antiques are normally uneven in diameter along their length. And glass in really old cupboards won't be sheet-smooth.

Armed with basic knowledge of what to look for, you should be able to distinguish "old furniture" from valuable antiques.

### It's The Law

Look Where You Walk

Architectural styles change just as do styles in automobiles and clothes. Modern office buildings and stores make great use of glass, even in their doors and entryways.

Occasionally we hear of someone walking into an all-glass door and injuring himself. In such a case, is the proprietor liable for damages?

In the majority of cases, where a person walks into a stationary glass door and is injured, the courts have held the proprietor not negligent and hence not liable for damages.

In one case the court noted that the door was in good repair and that the proprietor was not negligent simply because the door was one large piece of glass. Even so, the court said, the door was not wholly invisible, and a door is to be expected at the entrance to a store. The court added that door fronts of solid glass are commonly used today and are accepted as sound and safe building construction.

Different facts may well change the result and make the owner liable. Such was the case where a hotel installed a glass wall between a lounge and lobby

closing off an entry used for some time. Also, where an office building had glass doors marked with red reflector tapes, and removed the tapes without warning.

So, too, a home builder was held liable to suit for injuries to a child who walked through a sliding glass door at an open house. The child and his mother had just visited a similar adjoining house, also open for display, where the sliding doors to the patio had been open. The court here was especially careful to point out the greater duty on the owner, who should have anticipated children would be attending the open house with their parents.

**How to Cook Veal Chops**  
Veal chops are excellent eating, but it is often difficult to find tender young veal. Older veal needs longer cooking and good seasoning to give it flavor.  
A good method of cooking veal chops is to bake them in a tasty sauce. Wipe the chops with a damp cloth and arrange them in a shallow baking pan. On top of each chop, place:  
1/3 cup catsup or chile sauce  
1 tsp. grated onion  
1 tsp. Lea & Perrins Worcestershire sauce

1 slice lemon  
1 strip bacon  
Pour about 1/8 inch of water in the bottom of the baking pan and bake chops in a moderate oven (350° F.) for about 1 hour; or in a hot oven (425° F.) about 40 minutes. Serve a spoonful of the sauce from the pan over each chop.

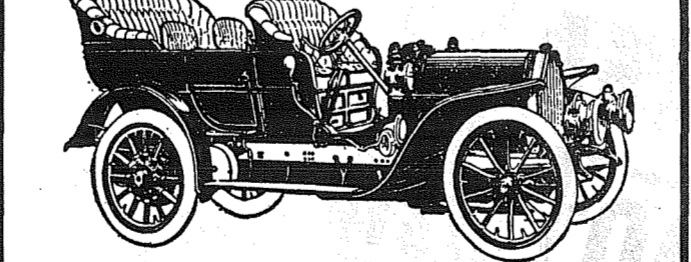

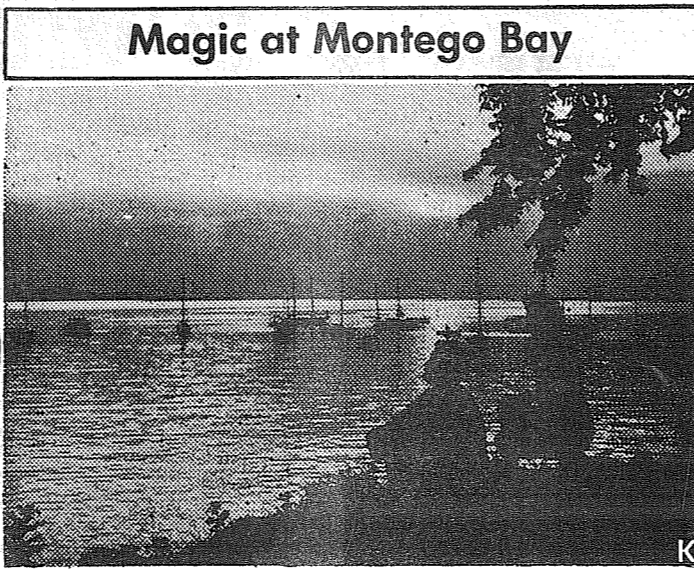

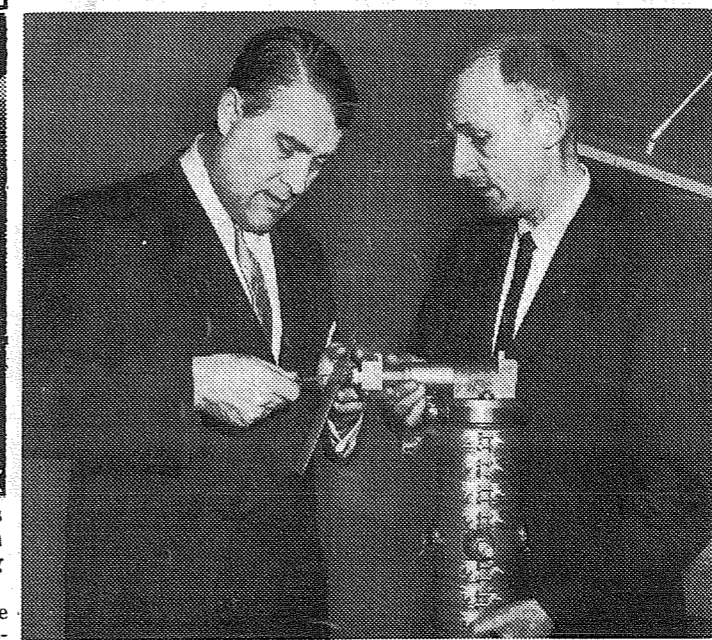

**Space Kitchen Impresses Rocket Expert**



Benton Harbor, Mich.—America's foremost rocket expert is "quite surprised" at the compactness of this country's first experimental space kitchen.

Dr. Werner Von Braun, (left) director of the George C. Marshall Flight Center in Huntsville, Ala., expressed this reaction on seeing the experimental kitchen for the first time during a recent visit to Whirlpool Corporation's research laboratories here, where it is under development. He is shown here examining a miniature water heater that will be installed in the kitchen.

The space kitchen is approximately half completed for delivery to the U.S. Air Force in May of this year. It is designed to store and dispense all foods and beverages required by three astronauts on a 14-day space mission.

Shown a number of kitchen devices already completed, Dr. Von Braun was particularly impressed by the miniature water heater that, unlike its bulkier household counterpart, is only 17 1/4 inches from top to bottom and 5 1/2 inches in diameter. Three pints of 170 degree water can be drawn from the miniature tank every two hours. Two separate heating elements are utilized to forestall complete operating breakdown in the event of failure in one of the elements. Though designing and building the tank and heating elements sounds relatively easy described in these terms, say Whirlpool scientists, months of research and testing were required to devise an operative unit workable under zero gravity conditions.

Astronauts will draw water from the air-free system by pumping the handle on a positive displacement pressure pump, meantime grasping a support bar with the free hand. Without something to grasp, they would push themselves across the kitchen everytime they tried to move the handle, since there is no such thing as measurable weight at zero gravity.

Improved weather forecasting made possible by data collected from U.S. satellites now in orbit could reduce by half the \$2-billion losses imposed annually by unwarned storms, the German-born rocket pioneer believes.

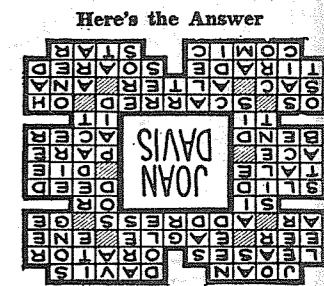
"This," he added, "would in itself pay for the nation's \$1-billion a year space program."

Von Braun said that although the Russians have launched heavier payloads in the space race, "we have collected greater knowledge of space from our satellites."

**It's The Law**

When Dr. S prepared his income tax return he listed his athletic club dues and the costs of his campaign for election as a member of the board of governor of the athletic club as ordinary and reasonable business expenses.

Although many members of the club were patients of Dr. S, the Commissioner of Internal Revenue disallowed the deductions claimed by Dr. S for his club dues and for the cost of his successful campaign to be elected a member of the board of governors of the club.

Dr. S appealed to the courts, contending those expenses were in fact business expenses. Do you believe he is correct in his claim?

The Circuit Court of Appeals held that the doctor's claimed deduction for club dues and the expense of his election campaign were not allowable as tax deductions. The fact that his campaign costs to become a member of the board of the club included many luncheons and other expenses of entertaining members of the club who were his patients did not make them business expenses.

The court held that the doctor was a professional man and not a business man, and pointed out that the athletic club was not an association of doctors, and election to the club's board of directors would not enhance either his skill, usefulness or reputation as a doctor. The deductions claimed for such expenses were held to be improper, and he was required to pay additional taxes as a result of the disallowance of these expenses. (This column is written, not advised. Facts may change the application of the law.)

**a-Wondering . . . and a-Wandering . . .**  
with JACK BROWN

Hey! That's my money you're spending! This phrase at last is beginning to be heard throughout our country, indicating a long awaited awakening by the "So What'ers" of our nation.

I don't know if he was a recently awakened "So What'er" or not, but here is what one man recently wrote to his editor:

"When our social security system was originated there was no thought of subsidizing deliberate idleness nor the begetting of illegitimate children to increase the monthly stipend. But it finances a great deal of this sort of thing at present and no one seems to be able to come up with a solution. And let this writer make it clear that he includes unemployment compensation as a part of the general social security program. The results, therefore, of this massive effort, largely political in inspiration, to bridge such universal crises in the lives of just about everybody have been more to prolong the trouble than to alleviate it."

This seems to be a thinking man's statement, one that might well give us all reason to think.

When you take a close gander at the proposed bills to provide benefits to people under Social Security, it would seem that there are several apparent flaws in it . . . flaws which should be given much more official and public consideration than seems to have been the case so far.

First of all, there are millions of elderly people covered by Social Security who, it may be presumed, most urgently need aid. But the proposed bill would do nothing for them.

Moreover, the bill would "favor the rich at the expense of the poor." Hospitalized patients would have to pay \$10 a day toward the charges for nine days, along with all non-hospital charges. Thousands on Social Security would be unable to afford such a drain on their resources. Ded to believe they were getting something for nothing, they would find the program a pig in a poke affair. But those who could afford to pay all their own expenses could pay the \$90 and get a free ride for all the rest of their hospital charges, with the working people of America picking up the tab."

If the day ever comes when the pioneer has no place in the affairs of men, civilization will have started its decline. There are pioneers in every human activity—literature, art, medicine, business—anything you can name. They are people of strong faith. Nothing requires a greater measure of the instincts of the pioneer than the development of a new enterprise. The next time you step aboard an airliner you will have before you the end result of one of the greatest pioneering epochs in human history.

Air transportation as we know it today is a story of the tragedy and triumph of individuals. One of those individuals is Juan Trippe. Not so many years ago, when Mr. Trippe began operating flying boats between Miami, Florida and Havana, Cuba, his company was looked upon as an adventuresome little outfit, but one that probably wouldn't even amount to much since people thought the airplane had no real future as a mode of transportation. Skepticism did not faze Juan Trippe. He had unbounded faith in the creative genius of aircraft manufacturers and his own operating people. He expanded his lines down through the West Indies and along the coasts of South America, eventually to Europe and on around the world.

Today Mr. Trippe's "little outfit" is known as Pan-American Airways, this country's biggest overseas airline, which has become far more than a means of transportation. Pan Am is an instrument of commerce and travel bringing people of all nations into contact with each other. Because of Mr. Trippe's faith in air transportation, the dream of international understanding and good will may be closer to realization than many believe.

The big question is, are we going to maintain a country in which the Juan Trippes of the future can thrive?

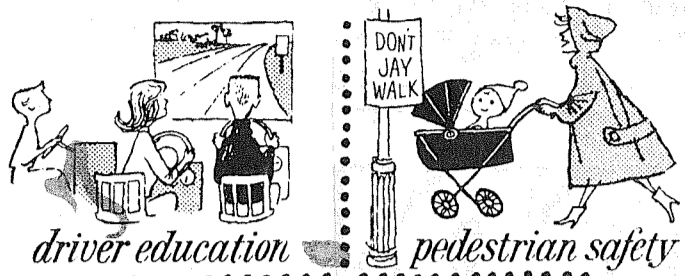

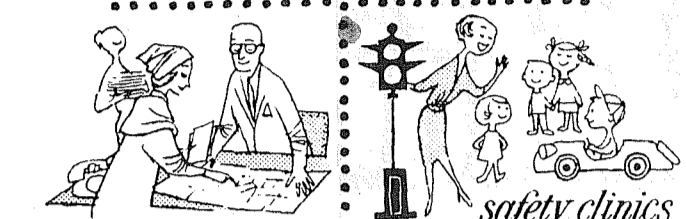

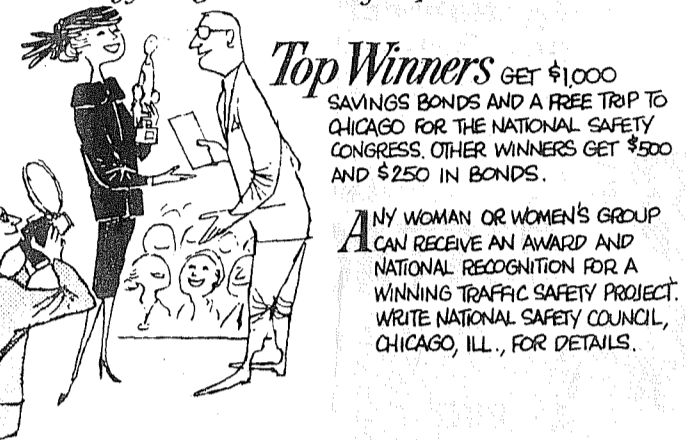

formation. Purcell listed the following ways in which performance records obtained under standardized conditions can be of value to the beef cattle breeder:

1. To cull the cow herd.
2. To select young animals on the basis of weaning weight.
3. To select for improvement of rate and efficiency of gain.
4. To select carcass quality.

Among local breeders who are doing performance testing are Dick Stidham, a Hereford producer at Eatonville; Frank and Andy Chopic, Angus breeders at Roy; and Otto Erickson, a Hereford breeder at Buckley.

The group heard a report from Harold Olson of the Public Affairs Committee. A program in the exciting field of nature study does exist for girls and boys in Pierce County interested in 4-H work. The program, although not carrying the name, Nature Study Project, Outdoor Life Project, or Naturalist Project, is found in many ways in our standard 4-H Forestry project. For example, in the basic requirements already are set up such things as forest insects, forest wildlife, tree identification and appreciation, forest soils, forest protection, outdoor survival, camp cookery, campfire safety, cone collecting, improving wildlife habitat, taking wildlife census, club clam bake or fishing bee, trapping mountain beaver and other forest pests, mountain hike with

overnight camping and, as important as any, the requirements under the heading "OTHER". This catch-all term opens the door for a multitude of outdoor activity left only to the imagination of the 4-H member and the interest and cooperation of his leader. Such things as bird study, rock collecting, geology, wood carving, marksmanship in archery and riflery, canoeing, boat handling, wood craftsmanship, mountaineering, snowshoeing, astronomy, and many others fall in this realm of possibility. We must keep in mind then that the main purpose of forestry in 4-H work is not to make "foresters, tree farmers" and "wood workers" but to develop citizens who have a basic understanding of one of our greatest northwest resources, (our forests) how they are related to soil, climate, and topography, and how they are used for timber, watershed, wildlife, grazing and recreation.

LET US CONSIDER OUR FUTURE—With an increase of around three quarter million people in our state last year, we find that each of us has just a little less acreage available to us on which to grow food, build homes, and raise our families.

Knut Lunnum, State Extension Forester, in his January issue of "Forest Crops" relates it in this way—"This slow but surging tide of humanity has a habit of flowing with the contour, first flooding the valleys and lowlands with a drift of structures, concrete slabs and the other artifacts of our times and then creeping slowly to higher ground. Pressures and frictions develop, first in congested areas and as the tide swells we become aware of the leaks in the basement of our economic structures. Frantically and hastily we rush to mend the breach with stop-gap methods that treat the symptom but overlook the cause.

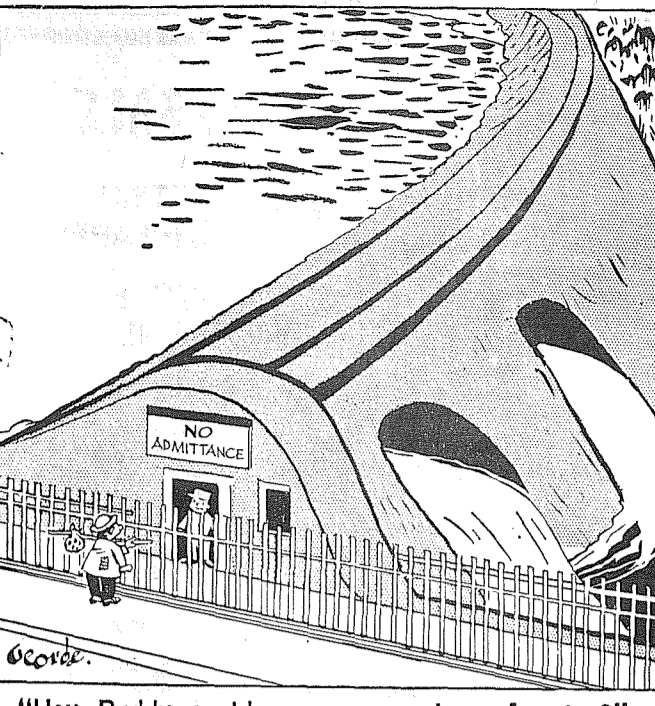
The pressures of mounting population are everywhere evident throughout the northwest but its effects on our renewable natural resources and the problems it poses are perhaps the most urgent. Urgent because awareness and understanding of the rank and file of our people are necessary before we can embark on a sound resource program and urgent because the mistakes we are making today are so difficult to correct."

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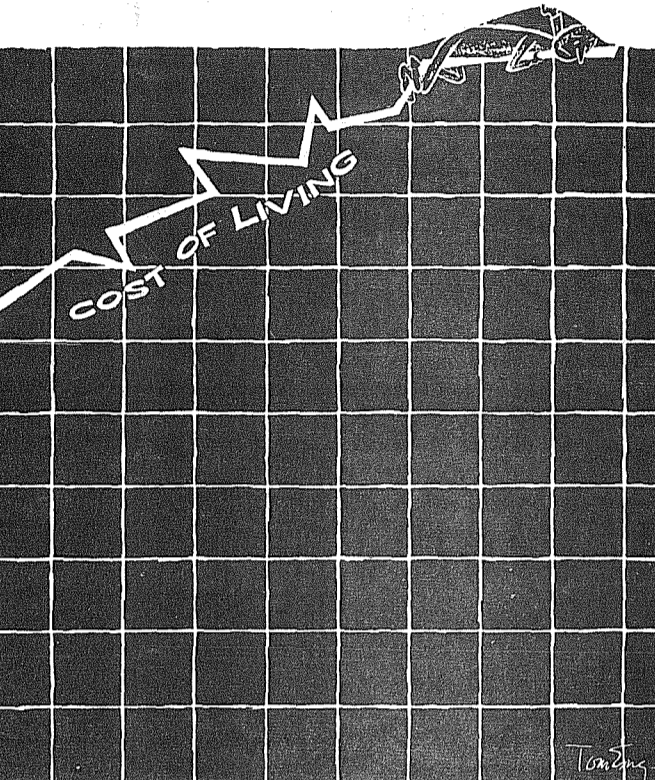

The Natural Resources Study Committee prepared their preliminary report in five major sections. These include (1) Forests (2) Cropland and Grassland (3) Water (4) Fish and Wildlife and (5) Minerals. Examples of some of the facts considered are as follows: (a) approximately one-half of our small woodlands are inadequately stocked, (b) per capita acreage of land suitable for cultivation has decreased from 8 1/2 acres in 1900 to 3 1/2 acres in 1959, with the expectation that it will be decreased to 2 1/2 acres by 1975. (c) Flood and erosion cause acreage loss and lower soil productivity. (d) Raising population means more demand on our fish and wildlife. (e) Coal estimates for Pierce County range from 210 to 600 million tons of usable coal.

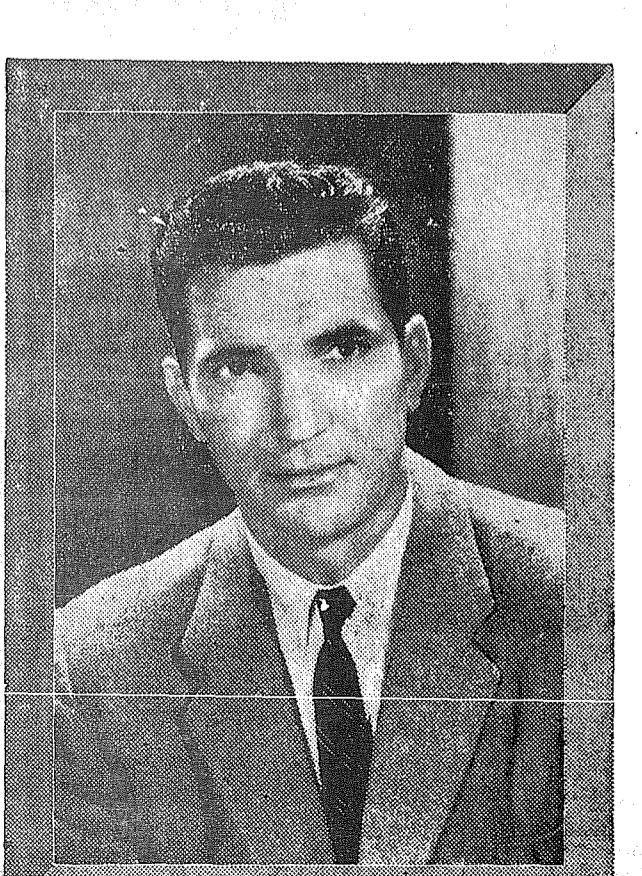

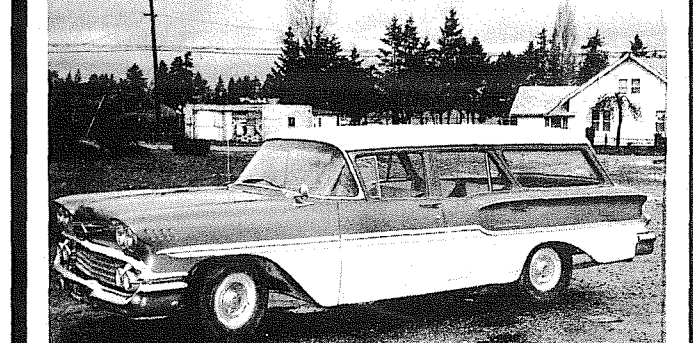

**County Agents  
Corner**

Civil Defense

A series of very interesting defense orientation meetings were held recently for county-city employees. The sessions, under the supervision of Gus Partridge, director of Pierce County Civil Defense, were used to acquaint us with the need for civil defense training. Information presented included international affairs, the role of government in civil defense, chemical biological radiological defense, Conrad and national warning, and public information.

To me, the most important part was the need for educational programs to inform people that with proper shelter, food and water supply, many persons may survive a nuclear attack. This could be as important a deterrent to war as the possession of nuclear weapons. The nation prepared to survive a nuclear attack would cause aggressors to think twice before attacking. The meetings clearly emphasized the need for individual responsibility in civil defense. Each individual must know how to protect himself and have adequate food storage (a two week supply). Mr. Partridge's office in the county-city building has available free information kits describing individual civil defense plans.

Another phase of civil defense is the activity of the Pierce County USDA Emergency Planning Committee. This group composed of representatives of the Pierce County Soil Conservation Service, Farmers' Home Administration, ASC, Forest Research Service, and the Extension Service, has responsibility for keeping an inventory of food storage facilities in the county, as well as food processing and distribution centers. This is a most vital function in the event of an emergency.

**Peninsula Poultry Association**

Neil Castner, head of Western Farmers' Association egg department, described egg pricing methods to poultrymen at a recent meeting of the Peninsula Poultrymen's Association. He stated that the base price is still established by Urner-Barry in New York. Other areas work either up or down from that price. The New York price is not realistic because of small amounts of eggs sold. Egg prices between surplus and deficit production areas differ largely by freight charges (approximately 2c per dozen.) In this state we enjoy a larger spread. Many times this is 5c per dozen above California prices. Combined bargaining power greatly influences this. To have effective bargaining power requires a large volume controlled by one individual or group. Mr. Castner stated that it is most essential for producers to produce for a definite market. He reported that a California marketing organization recently closed its doors to new marketing members. Those who produce without a specific market have lots of worries.

He reported that in 1950 there were 3,258 egg shippers to the Western Farmers Association. In 1961 there are 417. The present shippers produce over three times as many eggs as the 3,258. Approximately one-half of the present shippers produce about 90% of the eggs.

Eggs compete with other foods in the market place. In the Puget Sound area, 210 stores do over 80% of the business. Eight buyers do most of the wholesale purchasing for these stores. They can exert considerable pressure in price and quality.

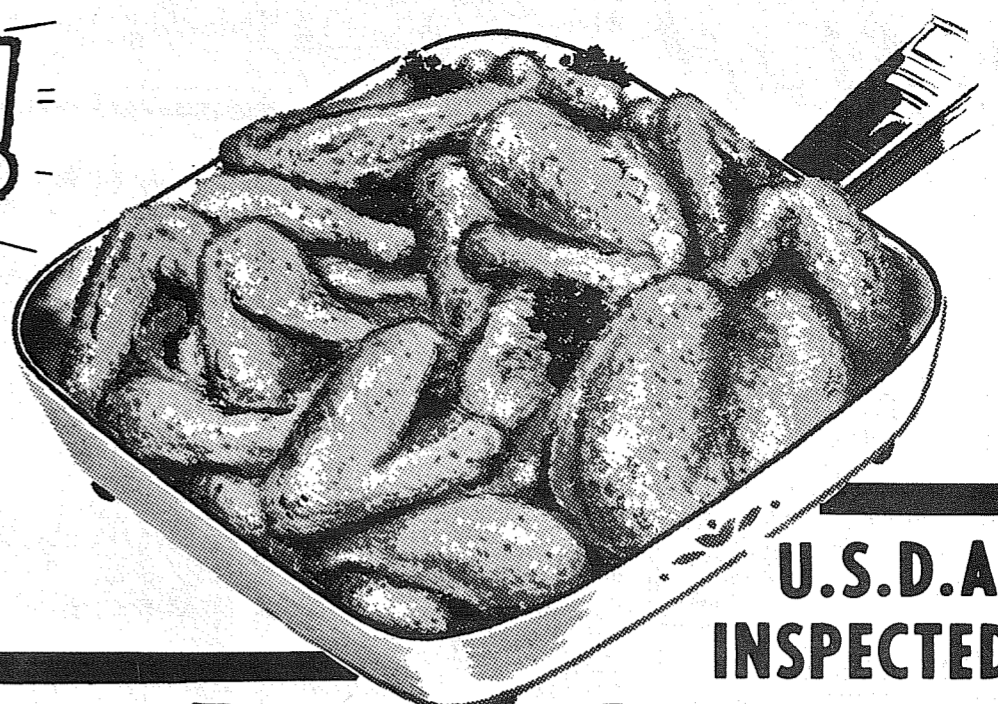

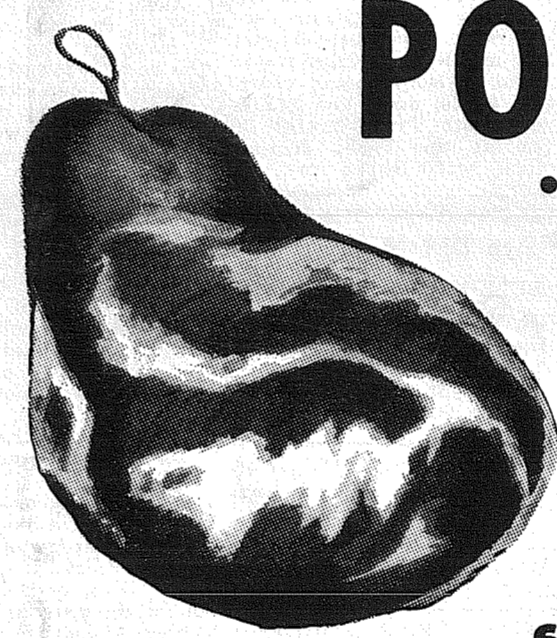



**County Agents Corner**

**Dairymen Sell Crops**  
Dairymen are really selling crops but use the dairy cow to convert or manufacture these crops into salable products. Most dairymen spend much time and effort in getting efficient converters (cows) that produce well. Many of these same dairymen that cull low producing cows do not attempt to cull out low producing pastures. Improved varieties and newer plantings have been tested and produce more than old grass stands. Newer plantings with improved varieties respond to fertilizers more than older stands. This is similar to the dairy cows, improved cattle respond more to good feeds.

If you are a dairymen, remember you are only converting feed into food. You cannot expect your land to produce good crops with old rundown stands of grass in your pasture any more than you can expect cull cows to make top milk producers.

Take a look at your farm, are you feeding top selected cows on cull producing pastures? You can start right now with pasture plans for this year. Good seeding, fertilization, and management can give top quality and quantity of pasture plus extra hay or silage and save you dollars on that feed bill next year.

You have many, many phone calls as a county agent all the time from people about what to you may not seem important problems, but what to them are very real and important. Just recently, for example, two occurred. One was from a man who said a neighbor's bull was chasing him and his neighbors' children. "Must I wait till my child is injured or accorded some worse fate?" he asked. In checking with local police, they indicated that if the animal was enclosed in a proper fence, and if the children had been throwing rocks or otherwise aggravating the animal then there was no recourse to the law. If, however, the animal was running loose in a zoned her law district, then this is something else. For information or help in cases of this type, phone FU 3-3311, Ext. 714, Pierce County Sheriff's office, if you live in Pierce County.

In the other case, a man phoned saying his neighbor had cattle pastured very close making a serious odor problem and a prospective buyer of his home had just told him—"I'm not interested in buying any house with big piles of manure nearby". In this case the man lived in a zoned residential area so the cattle had to go. Furthermore, according to the county-city health-sanitation department, phone FU 3-3311, Ext. 325, the cattle would have to go even though not in a zoned area if the Health Department investigator, upon checking, found definite sanitation hazards there. Within the city limits, if you intend to keep cattle you first have to have the written consent of all people that are within fifty feet of the property. Second—have at least 20,000 sq. ft. yard area for the animals and they must be fifty feet from the adjoining property line from the neighbors.
