PLU Choir Of The West Makes Hit In Norway Bid Farewell

Sorflatanger, Norway — (Special). The Pacific Lutheran University "Choir of the West" begins the second half of the Norway portion of its two-month concert tour of Europe here today (Sunday), and if it is anything like the first part of the trip, the 68-member group will not want to go home.

The capella choir, under the direction of Gunnar J. Malmén, has been afforded the royal treatment everywhere. Receptions, banquets and parades along with meetings with ambassadors, mayors and other city and national officials have been the order of the day. The choir literally has been given the reign of every community in which it has appeared in this beautiful land of fjords, waterfalls, mountains and lakes.

But, one must not overlook the extremely favorable reviews the PLU singers have received. Wherever the choir has appeared, the local newspapers have had a critic and photographer present.

One reviewer called the program "a fantastic performance" and said the choir resembled a huge symphonic orchestra in technique and tone.

Another stated that this is the finest choir he has ever heard from America which, in itself, covers a lot of territory since there have been many top choirs here in recent years.

Still another commented, "The impression which remains after the 'Choir of the West' concert is so overwhelming that one has difficulty finding words to accurately describe the performance."

However, the greatest critic of all is probably the Norwegian people. Norwegian audiences do not applaud readily. If they don't like a group, they can "sit on their hands." But, they have broken into rhythmic applause, an especially high honor, on numerous occasions.

After a concert here today, the choir will continue its three-week boat trip southward along the Norwegian coastline stopping at Trondheim Monday. Here they will give a concert in the famous Nidaros Cathedral where Norway's kings are crowned.

Other stops on tap this week are at Kristiansund Tuesday, Molde Wednesday, Alesund Thursday, Floro Friday and Bergen Saturday.

In all the group will give 28 concerts in Norway before it heads for Denmark June 30. Six concerts are listed for Denmark, five in Germany and two in France for a total of 41.

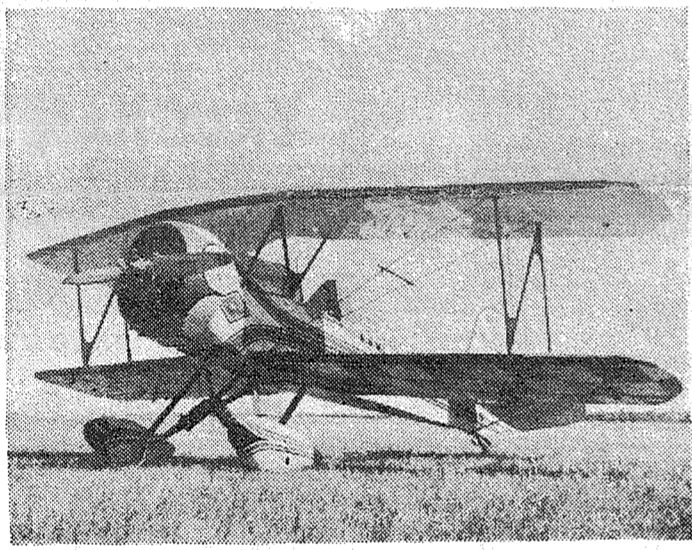

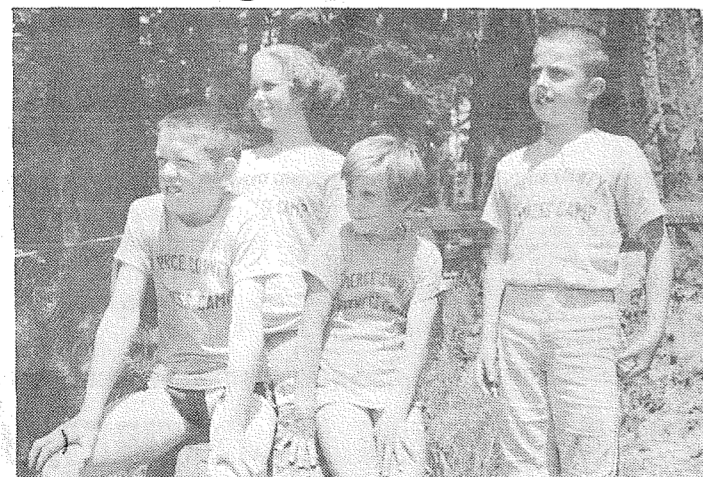

County Agents Corner

Carpenter Ants Often Confused With Termites

Carpenter ants are frequently confused with the dampwood termite. Since the controls are different, it is important to distinguish between them.

County Agent Jack Parsons describes carpenter ant workers as wingless, long-legged, wasp-waisted, black or reddish-black, and about 1/4 inch long. They are conspicuous because of their habit of running about rapidly outdoors from early spring until late fall. The winged form of carpenter ants resemble the workers in shape and color but have four wings. The winged ants began swarming this year around the middle of May. This is the time when new ant colonies are formed.

Termites differ in their appearance markedly and should not be confused. The workers are yellowish to grayish white, up to 1/2 inch long, short-legged, slow-moving insects that spend their life hidden from view. The winged termites are brown, thick-waisted, with long wings. They fly during warm, humid evenings this fall.

Another good way to distinguish these two pests is in the way they feed. Carpenter ants bore in the wood to provide living quarters

but do not feed on it. Thus, they equal their borings as fine sawdust from their so-called mines. In contrast, termites consume the wood in which they live, thus we have no sawdust markings.

Of these two wood working insects, the termites are much more destructive. However, in each instance some control should be started.

Parsons says the County Extension Office has free bulletins on Carpenter Ants and Termite control available for the asking.

plication cannot control the plants that emerge from the lateral roots following the first spray application.

This secondary growth will require a second application of the control chemical in about 6 weeks after the first one.

A third application should be made in late summer or early fall in irrigated areas or those with unusually large amounts of summer precipitation. The third application will control the late emerging Canada thistle plants.

In all cases, the most effective treatment has been with 2 pounds of amine 2,4-D per acre in enough water to wet the foliage sprayed. This is the rate per application.

Three applications would, of course, mean a total of 6 pounds of amine 2,4-D per acre per season for Canada thistle control.

The one location that has constantly resisted this treatment has been subirrigated bottoms with constantly high water tables or Canada thistles growing on ditchbanks. The later are apt to have root systems developed adjacent to or within the wet perimeter of the ditch.

Amino triazole will do an excellent job on most patches of Canada thistle when applied at the recommended rate of 6 to 8 pounds of the active ingredient.

Patches have been observed that apparently were resistant to amino triazole, as some have also been resistant to 2,4-D.

Use of amino triazole, however, is a questionable practice in view of its lack of registration for use on crops. The tolerance is zero for this systemic in any marketed crop. This means any crop with the tiniest trace of amino triazole will be removed from the market by the government.

Now Control Canada Thistle

Canada thistle can be controlled and the time to start the process is right now, Jack Crawford, county Extension agent advises.

He passes along control recommendations just received from Ben Roche, WSU's Extension weed specialist:

Canada thistle can be controlled with 2,4-D if it is sprayed at least twice during the growing season and three times in areas with long growing seasons.

Control measures should be started when the state's Number One weed pest is in the bud and bloom stage.

Recent research indicates that one spray application, even when properly timed, will kill the weed but not all the root system. The one ap-
