

"Safe and sane" fireworks are those items of pyrotechnic display which have been tested and approved by the State Fire Marshal, and which carry the State Seal of Approval. They must not, according to the state law, explode, rise into the air. discharge balls of fire, or contain poisonous chemicals.

wasp-waisted, black or reddish-black, and about 1/2 inch long. They are conspicuous Now Control because of their habit of running about rapidly outdoors from early spring until late fall. The winged form of car-

penter ants resemble the workers in shape and color but have four wings. The winged ants began swarming this year around the middle of May. This is the time when new ant colonies are formed. Termites differ in their

appearance markedly and should not be confused. The workers are yellowish to grayish white, up to 1/2 inch long, short-legged, slow-moving insects that spend their life hidden from view. The winged termites are brown, thickwaisted, with long wings. They fly during warm, humid
