U.S. Issues Warnings On Use Of Repellent

Another warning against the use of "X-33 Water Repellent" has been issued by the U. S. Food and Drug Administration through its Commissioner, George P. Larrick.

The product is an extremely flammable masonry water proof.

Because of the extreme risk of flash fires and explosions

all consumers who have obtained the dangerous product are urged to return it unopened immediately to the dealer.

"X-33 Water Repellent" has recently caused three deaths and several injuries in the United States.

Householders are warned against attempting to destroy or dispose of the product themselves without first consulting their local fire department.

The X-33 product, as manufactured until about two months ago, has a point of ignition at a temperature of 40 degrees F. The product manufactured since that time has a flash point of 73 degrees F.

The householder's problem is the determination of which product he has purchased. Since the cans bear no identification as to new or old product, and because the old product is of such a high flammable nature, all cans should be returned at once to the dealer.

Concerted efforts are being made to remove the hazardous repellent from the market. Even a sticker label is not sufficient warning for consumer protection. There is serious question as to the desirability of lay people using the product for home use.

Kozy Korner Is Robbed

Somebody started the New Year on the wrong foot by breaking into and robbing the Kozy Korner Kafe in Spanaway on January 1st.

After gaining admittance via a window, the thieves broke open a cigarette machine and juke box, although they left a Muscular Dystrophy collection container in plain sight on the counter.

This is the second time in four years the establishment, has been robbed according to Mrs. Wilma Yoder and her mother, Mrs. Bertha Nida, owners and operators. Four years ago the place was the victim of both thieves and vandals who did malicious damage to the interior.

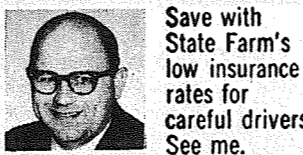
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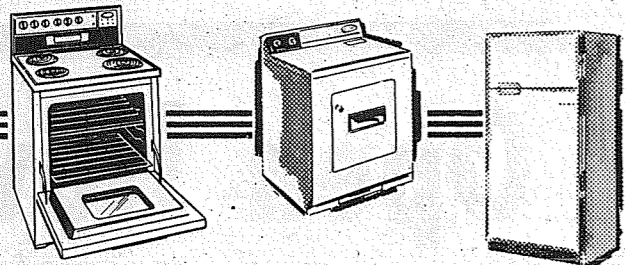

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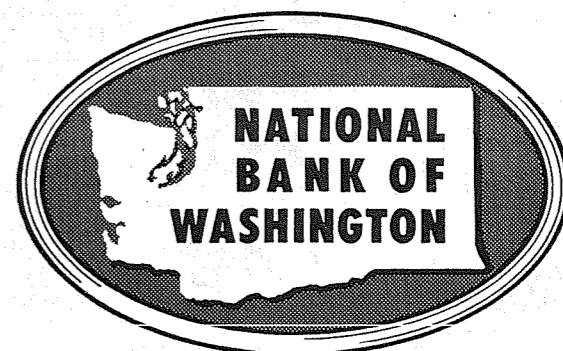
