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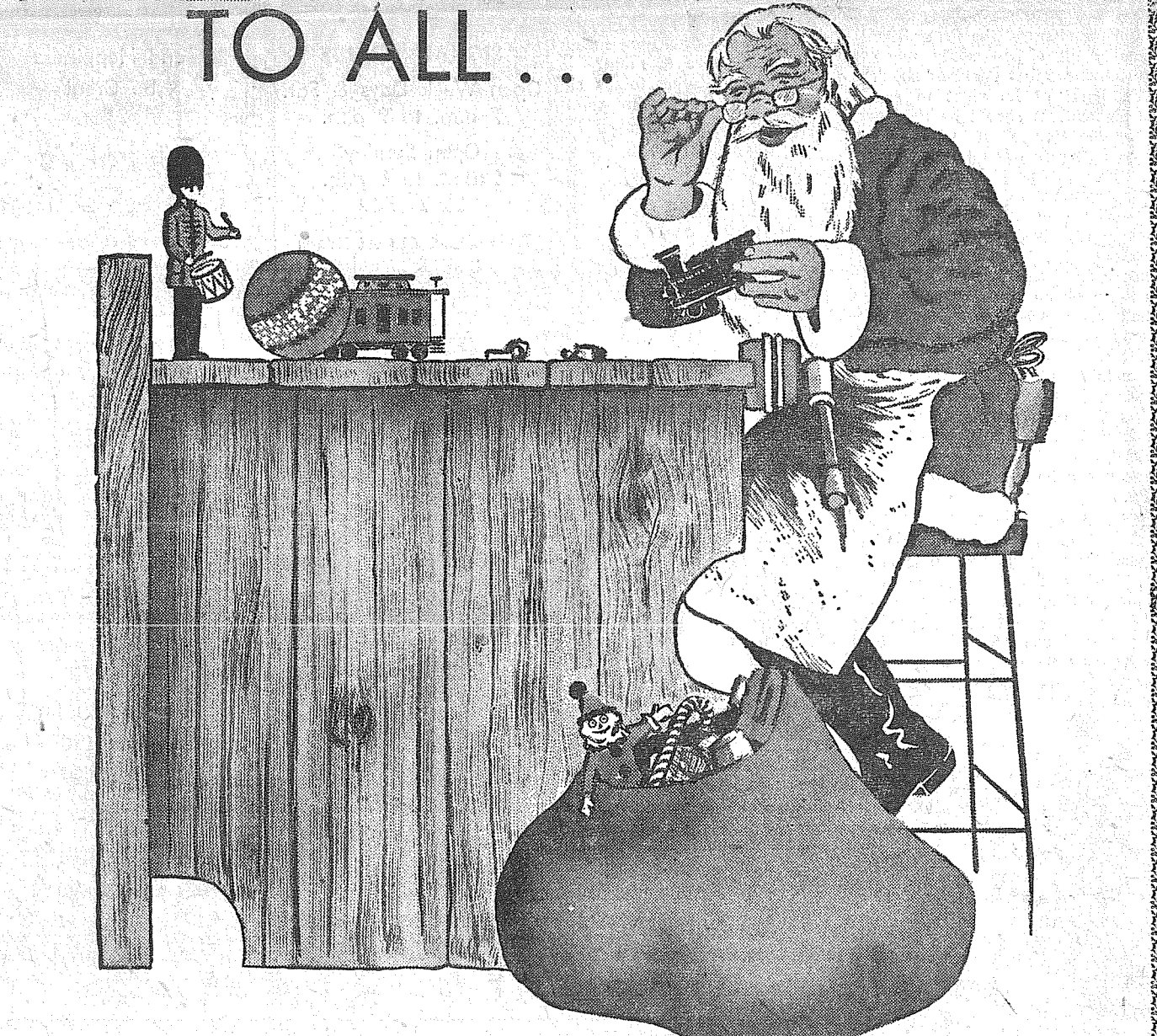
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Xmas Party Held With Pack Meet

Christmas: AND THE BABE OF BETHLEHEM

The deep significance of Christmas makes a profound impression upon all of us. We pause, and think of the birthday of the Prince of Peace...
"... Behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy... for unto you is born this day in the City of David, a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord."
Christmas is the birthday of Jesus Christ. Whatever else we attach to the meaning of Christmas, this is the chief reason for this important day in the year.
We think seriously of the real values of life and the countless benefits to all mankind if we would live according to the principles as laid down by the Prince of Peace. Just think of what Christ has meant to the free world and could mean to the worlds behind the Iron and Bamboo Curtains. Christ has elevated the ideals of mankind from the earthly to the heavenly, from selfishness to self-sacrifice, from sinfulness to holiness, from war to peace. He changed the date of the world's history, beginning a new reckoning of years. "B.C." and "A.D." have the pre-eminence over "In the beginning". He has put his stamp upon history, poetry, art, literature, reforms and civilizations for all the years of time and the cycles of eternity. Why has such influence been exerted by Jesus Christ? Well, because he was, is, and always will be, the Son of God. Because he was "God manifested in the flesh"; therefore great names were given him — the Prince of Peace, Immanuel, the Mighty God, the Everlasting Father, the Lord Jesus Christ, Saviour and Redeemer of men, Conqueror and Intercessor." But none of the names He has received are sweeter than the Babe of Bethlehem and the Lamb of Calvary.
Nearly 2000 years have passed since the Star of Bethlehem first appeared, yet when we listen to the singing of "Silent Night", and the other beautiful Christmas caroles, it seems we can almost hear the inspiring message of the angels:
"Glory to God in the Highest, and on earth, peace to men of good will."
A baby was born in Bethlehem many years ago. His parents were poor and He had no unusual advantages. He raised no army, He conquered no kingdom, He owned no real estate, and He had no bank account. Neither did He write books or paint pictures of compose music. He was mocked at by the great and died a criminal death. Yet this man has revolutionized the civilized world. Multitudes have lived and died triumphantly by the power of faith in Him and obedience to the doctrines He inculcated, and He has more followers in the world today than ever before. His maxims are acknowledged, even by those who reject His authority, to be the noblest and purest that ever have been uttered, and no man has been able to pick a flaw in his character. What will you do with Jesus who is called Christ? Christmas is primarily a children's festival. Except we become as little children we cannot enter into the Kingdom of God. Christmas brings back to us precious memories of childhood days. We also recall our many blessings, and at the same time our thoughts turn to our friends here at home and across the seas, whose acts of kindness we will never forget. Let us never forget that Christ is the center of Christmas.

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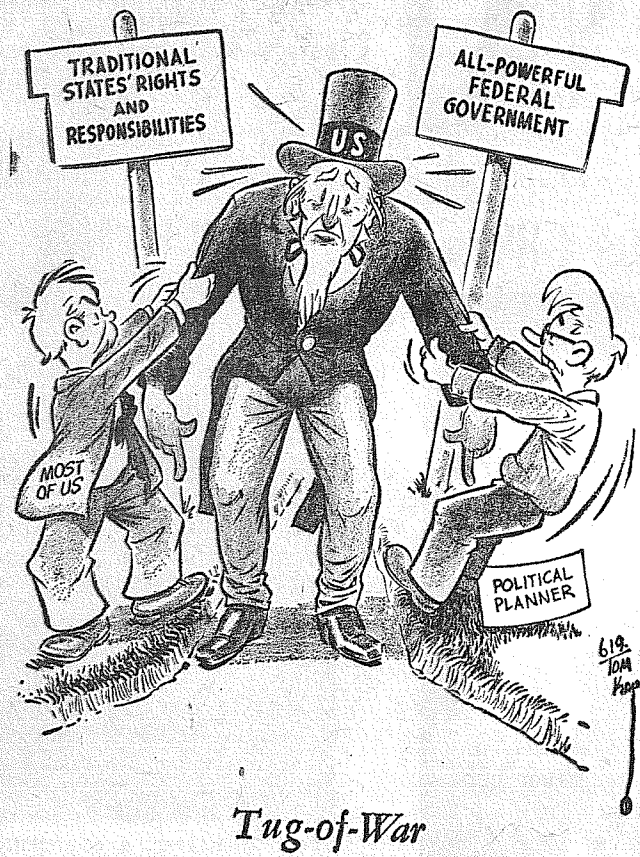

Letter to the Editor:
The question has been asked about the ability of Parkland, should it become an incorporated city, to maintain its city streets. In order to inform the public, the Incorporation Study Committee published a cost analysis in which \$50,000 was allocated to streets from the total estimated budget of \$180,500. The published cost analysis was only a tentative estimate of what might be budgeted by the City of Parkland. It claimed, by its terms, to be no more than an estimate of "an adequate city government with which to begin operation".

The Committee intentionally used conservative figures. The income of a city comes, primarily, from two sources: a levy on assessed valuation and money received from State shared funds. The assessed valuation estimate used by the Committee was \$5,000,000. The Committee used this figure although it was aware of the fact that when the valuations were in, the City of Parkland would probably find it had in excess of \$8,000,000 in assessed valuation. State shared funds are paid on the basis of the population. The Committee used a population of 9,500 in estimating income from this source. It did so realizing that according to school estimates the population of the proposed area is closer to 12,000. The estimate was based on a payment by the State of \$10 per capita while actually these payments have been running about \$12 per capita.

This all adds up to the fact that while the Committee used \$180,500 for an estimated income, it knew the actual income to be expected was more like \$264,000. The study prepared showed it was economically feasible to operate Parkland on the conservative figure, and if s, Parkland would have no difficulty operating on its actual income which would be much more. Your elected officials, if they found it necessary, would have the financial resources from which to appropriate money equal to what the County has spent in Parkland, during the past few years.

The Committee recognized, however, that just as the County budget for highway construction would seem a pittance compared with that of the State, Parkland could not throw into a road building project the financial resources of the County. This would be true of any one of the hundreds of cities in our State with the possible exception of three or four of our larger municipalities. For this reason, the cost analysis presented was based on a study not of what the counties were doing, but what was found to be "the experience of other cities of this size". Based on their experience, the proportion of income allocated to roads was realistic.

The members of the Committee, as a result of the study made, are convinced that Parkland should avail itself of its right to self-government. It should be able to determine for itself what will happen here in our own community. Since the people in Parkland are personally affected, they are the ones that should have the means of passing on proposed developments, be it for shopping centers or housing, and of passing on the caliber of business deciding whether and where such developments should take place. By the same token, businessmen interested in this area should have a city government to which to submit its plans and one with whom it can work if in the estimation of our city officials, the proposed development would be beneficial to Parkland.

Regardless of the feeling of the members of the Committee they personally have no axe to grind. No member of the Committee will run for office, in the event Parkland is incorporated. The people in Parkland are certainly free to do as they wish. They can back incorporation, they can sign a petition being circulated to annex

to Tacoma, or they can do nothing at all. However, the Committee would like to see incorporation put on the ballot so that in the American way, the will of the majority can be registered.
The Incorporation Study Committee is anxious that people of Parkland have all of the facts. Feel free to drop a letter to the Committee at Box 2157 in Parkland asking for the answers to any questions you may have.

Since we have been residents of Parkland for a good many years, I would like to express my opinion as a woman on this subject of becoming a city.
Any man reading this may think my reasoning is screwy but here goes anyway.
As a homemaker, I can't help but compare the likeness of setting up a budget to run a government to the setting up of a budget to run a home. Even though there, it's all too easy to borrow same problem exists of stretching the income. And if this money isn't there, it's all too easy to borrow and when that happens we are on the merry-go-round that often leads people to suicide and mental hospitals.
As a young bride can tell you, it's easy to make a list of all the things needed to start a home and set up approximate costs for these things, but what about all the little hidden things of running a home that don't come to light until after the ball has started rolling?
We like country living and I hope my husband and I can live to enjoy old age here in Parkland. We know there will come a time in all our lives when our income will be small. Most of these incomes will be what is termed "old age pensions." We will still have to pay for the same things the younger person does on a large income. And if we don't go into the expensive, complicated business of running a city government, then when we have reached the class of senior citizens we will have a chance to survive with some dignity left.

The only bad thing we face here in Parkland is the high property tax. And I think we should give a long, long, close look at our schools, both at the local level and the state level. I would like something done also to the law that permits renters to vote on issues that directly effect the property owner. That is why at the present we don't want the expense of sewers.
I know my husband may not be able to work another 20 or 25 years after paying 20 to 30 years for the right to own a home. I don't cherish the idea of another long-term debt that, by the time it's paid, costs you double.
Let's face it — what sort of legacy are we leaving our children? Does money really buy progress or does progress mean happiness and peace of mind? I am all for leaving things as they are, and those who want

city life should move to the size city they wish to live in. But please let us country hicks have some place to live in on this earth.

Christmas And The Babe Of Bethlehem

Unless we kneel at the manger and there greet the Divine Lord, and unless we recognize that God came to earth in the person of the child born in Bethlehem of old, we have no Christmas at all, but just the relics of an outworn social custom, attended by doubtful buying and giving of trinkets, most of which are more ornamental than useful. The name of Jesus means a Saviour because he came to save his people from their sins. The Christmas Christ is the world's Saviour. In this blessed Christmas season, let us dedicate ourselves anew to the making known a world's Saviour. We are told that in the city of Madras, India, there is a Chapel, on the wall of which there is the upper portion of a cross. On one transverse end of the cross there is a pierced hand, the skin of which is brown, after the color of the skin of the people of the East. On the other side of this section is another pierced hand, white, after the color of the skin of the people of the West. It is a glorious symbol of a world Christ.

The inscriptions on His Cross were in the languages of the world. Let us, follow Christian workers, at this Christmas time, consecrate ourselves anew to the whole world. He is the only peace bringer for men and nations. All the leaders of the nations have never conceived of anything so beautiful as Christmas. For a marvel so stupendous, God fell back upon a child. 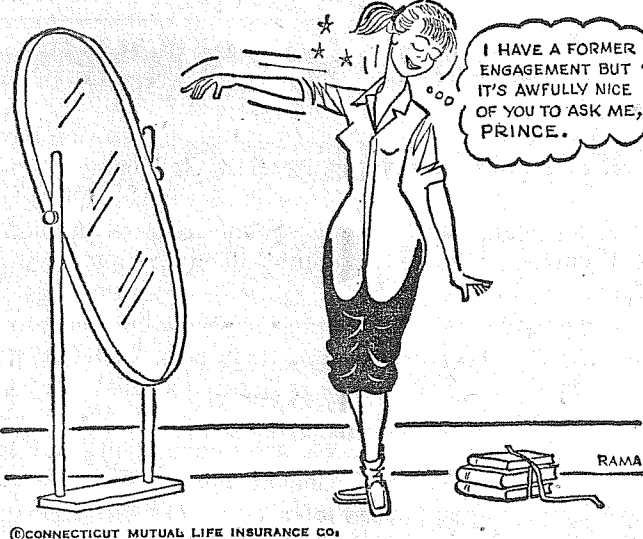

Since Christmas time is a time of understanding, good will toward our fellow man, etc, I feel this might be the opportune time to make a plea for a better understanding of our problem here at the newspaper office.

This paper is brought to you each week solely through the support of our advertisers. To them we owe a responsibility to produce a newspaper which has a news content of a type sufficiently interesting and attractive to hold the attention of you, the reading public. We have a clear understanding with our advertisers: No fighting, no bickering; no misunderstanding.

With some of our readers there seems to be a constant hassle going on concerning our selection of news stories. This is the point I'll try to clear up through this article this week.

Like any business, we have had to adopt certain policies that we feel are beneficial to our service as a newspaper. The policy which causes all the hue and cry is our refusal to run what we refer to as second hand news. If we know that a news article has appeared in print or will appear in print ahead of our publication we feel that it is no longer newsworthy reading matter and therefore pass it by for the following reasons:

(1) We have twice as much local news brought to us each week as we can possibly use and the sorting and omitting of this is a source of bitter complaint by many, so we do not feel justified in leaving more of it out to run a story that has already appeared in print a day or two before our publication.

(2) We have thought if the majority of the news content of this paper has previously appeared in print, we would soon lose you as a reader and in so doing would lower the potential of the advertising placed by our customers, who are on the paying side of our business. Our policy is clear cut. We hope you understand so that we can avoid future misunderstandings. If you have an article you feel must appear in both the daily and weekly papers, then present it to each with a Thursday release date. We have no objection to running a story that breaks on the same day in both. If in the case of major news items we are fortunate enough to get a picture and none appears in the daily, we will run same even though a story does appear, for we feel that the picture which is equal to a thousand words still puts our news story on an even basis regardless of the time element.

Now assuming that I have gotten across my first point, let me cry a little over our pet peeve here in the office. First, so that there is no misunderstanding, let me clearly state that there is no running battle progressing between us and the daily. On the other hand, there is mutual respect and a willingness to work together on both sides as evidenced by the many visits to each other's plants to borrow this or that. Now to the point I'd like to make.

There has been case after case where we have run a majority of the small news, tidbits released to us by local clubs for a year or so without a word of thanks or a nod in our direction. That's fine — but what gripes us is that when this selfsame club or organization finally does some little thing that's important to them or the community they by-pass us like we had the plague as they rush to the city desk of the daily with the story clutched in their hot little fist. After a while we get kind of fed up with this treatment.

Take this case as a for-instance: For the past week or so one of my employees has been working hard to set up a publicity stunt designed to be different and to publicize his organization. He had my OK to spend as much time as necessary on the project as I could see a good news story in the making. Arrangements went well until it was determined that another organization whose assistance was needed had a clause in their by-laws prohibiting participation without the payment of \$25. Since my employee's organization had already spent their limit, I gave him the go ahead to make the arrangements and the Times Journal antied up the \$25 fee to have everything according to Hoyle. Came the big minute and I and three employees headed for the scene of action and immediately fell over a reporter and photographer from the daily. When questioned on it, they told us some one in the sponsoring organization had called them and insisted they come out and that there would be a real story here for them so they came out and there was and there went my story and 25 bucks. The daily played it up on Page 1 like the Chicago fire. I'm not complaining about them — they did a fine job with our story. The irony of it is that, to the best of my knowledge, this is the first major publicity stunt put on by this organization and one of the first times they've had a write-up in the daily, but I can go back through our file for 12 years and show you enough copy on them to reach from here to California. Can you blame me for doing a slow burn?

Nuff said. I'll hang up my crying towel now and hope for a little better understanding and co-operation from local organizations this coming year.

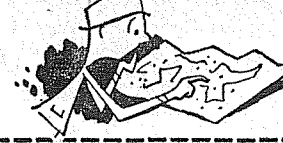

 Combine evaporated milk, water, pudding mix and flavoring extract in quart jar or container. Cover and shake briskly for one minute, or until well mixed.
 Let stand five minutes, until set.
 Cut cake layers in half to make four layers.
 Cover one layer with 1/4 of the chocolate pudding. Top with second layer and 1/4 of the pudding, then third layer and remaining pudding.
 Cover with fourth cake layer. Garnish with "lace" made by sifting confectioner's sugar over a paper doily placed on top of cake.
 Then carefully remove doily.
Mocha Parfaits (Eight servings)
 Two tall cans, 1 1/2 cups each, evaporated milk; 1 cup water, 1 package vanilla instant pudding mix, 1 tablespoon instant coffee, 1 package chocolate instant pudding mix.
 In one-quart jar or container, combine 1 tall can evaporated milk, 1/2 cup water, vanilla instant pudding mix and coffee. Cover and shake briskly for one minute, or until well mixed.
 In another quart jar or container, combine 1 tall can evaporated milk, 1/2 cup water and chocolate instant pudding mix. Cover and shake briskly for one minute, until well mixed.
 Arrange layers of chocolate and coffee puddings alternately in parfait glasses, topping with a spoonful of the chocolate pudding.
 Garnish with maraschino cherries or a little whipped cream.

County Agent's Corner

 Commercial poultrymen will not be much concerned with income tax payments for 1959. Not after the year long price-cost squeeze. All farmers, however, will want to take extra care in preparing their income tax returns this year. Stricter tax policy indicates that farmers' returns will be checked more closely. This means that nearly every farmer's return will get at least a quick once-over. This includes checking for errors in arithmetic or obvious fraud. Some will be picked for a complete audit.
 This is no reason for farmers to panic but rather to be careful when preparing returns. A few suggestions would include checking and double-checking every figure that is included in the return, and having records to back up every item. If in doubt about an item of income or expense, find out before you file a return. A call to the Internal Revenue office, tax information division, at BR 2-5121, may save many headaches later.

CHRISTMAS TREES TO BE MORE COMPETITIVE
 Christmas tree consumption is slowly rising but lower prices may be in the offing too. Increased competition from more producers is the reason.
 The U. S. Forest Service publication "The Demand and Price Situation for Forest Products" states that the consumption of Christmas trees in the United States has been rising slowly and 1959 is expected to be somewhat above 40 million trees. Imports from Canada have usually totaled between 10 and 12 million trees annually in recent years. Assuming this import level is maintained in 1959, the demand for Christmas trees from domestic forests and plantations should be near 30 million trees. Prices paid for Christmas trees on the stump vary widely, ranging from as low as \$0.25 for wild trees to \$2.00 or more for plantation grown trees.
 The relatively high price paid for plantation grown trees has attracted many new producers and has resulted in very large increases in Christmas tree planting. This strongly suggests the likelihood of increasing competition for available markets and lower prices.

Rural or suburban organizations that have not been contacted but

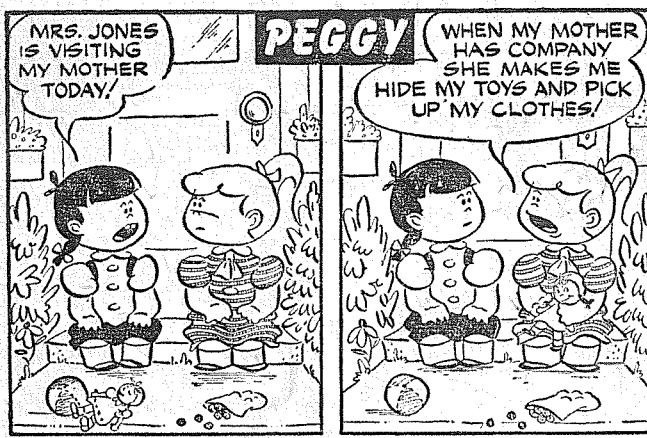

It's the LAW

HERD LAWS
When the west was being developed there were large areas where cattle and other domestic animals were running at large.

It was the basic law that these great herds had the right to the range and any farmer who wanted to keep such animals away from his house or his fields had to erect fences to keep the animals out. Thus, in the range area it was the duty of those entering to look out for the stock.

With the increase in population, the growth of cities and the general limitation in the size of the herds with the corresponding increase in the lands devoted to crops, it became in the public interest in some localities to give agriculture the prior right, and force the owner of stock to fence

in his herds.
Washington law provides that the county commissioners may designate any county or part thereof of at least two square miles in area, as a stock-restricted area. After this is properly done according to law, it is unlawful to permit unattended stock to run at large in such places, and the person violating such provision is liable for a fine. In addition, livestock found unattended on the right of way of a public highway in a stock-restricted area may be impounded and sold.

Although it is still basic that the state is range area, unless otherwise restricted by proper orders, such range area is rapidly growing smaller and smaller and the day may come when all of the state will be subject to herd laws and range area will cease to exist. (This column is written to inform not advise. Facts may change the application of the law.)
