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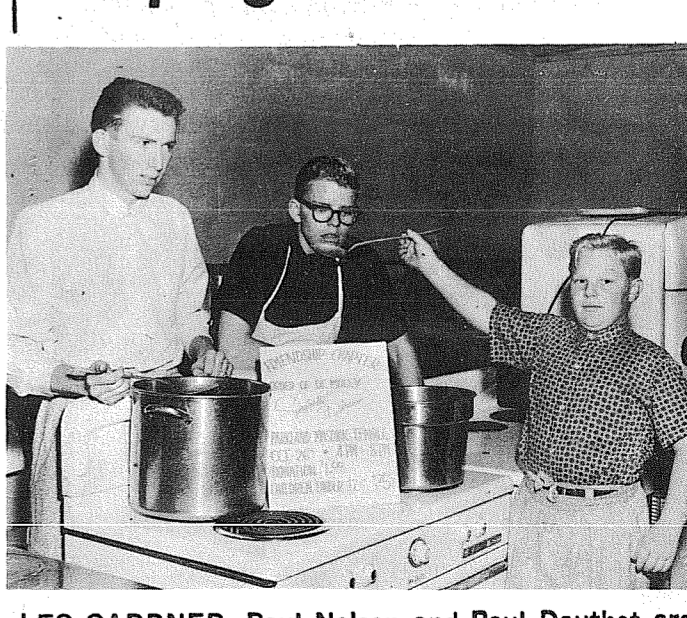
Checks May Be Stopped VA Advises

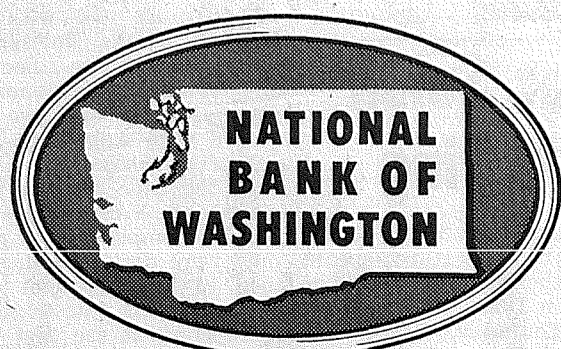
NBW PRESIDENT GOODWIN CHASE CONFERS WITH THE "WORKING PRESS"

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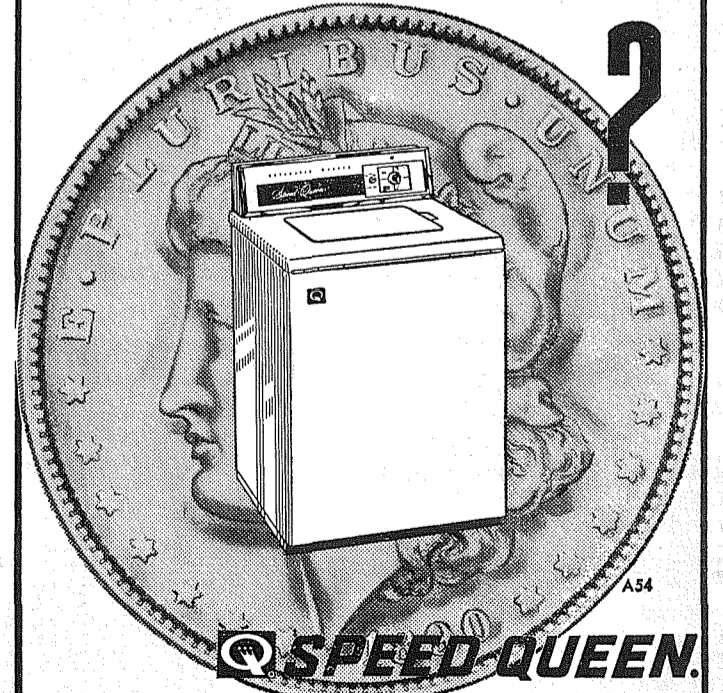



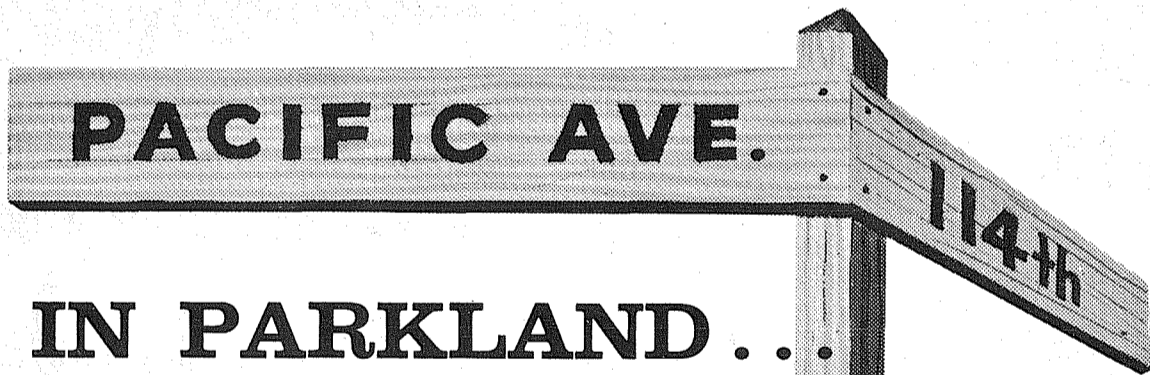
Carved and painted on cedar, the mural utilizes the colors which Coastal Indians originally produced from natural resources.

Often seen in the waters of Puget Sound, the killer whale is also called the orca or blackfish. The design sometimes was used to decorate the house fronts of Northwest Coast Indians.

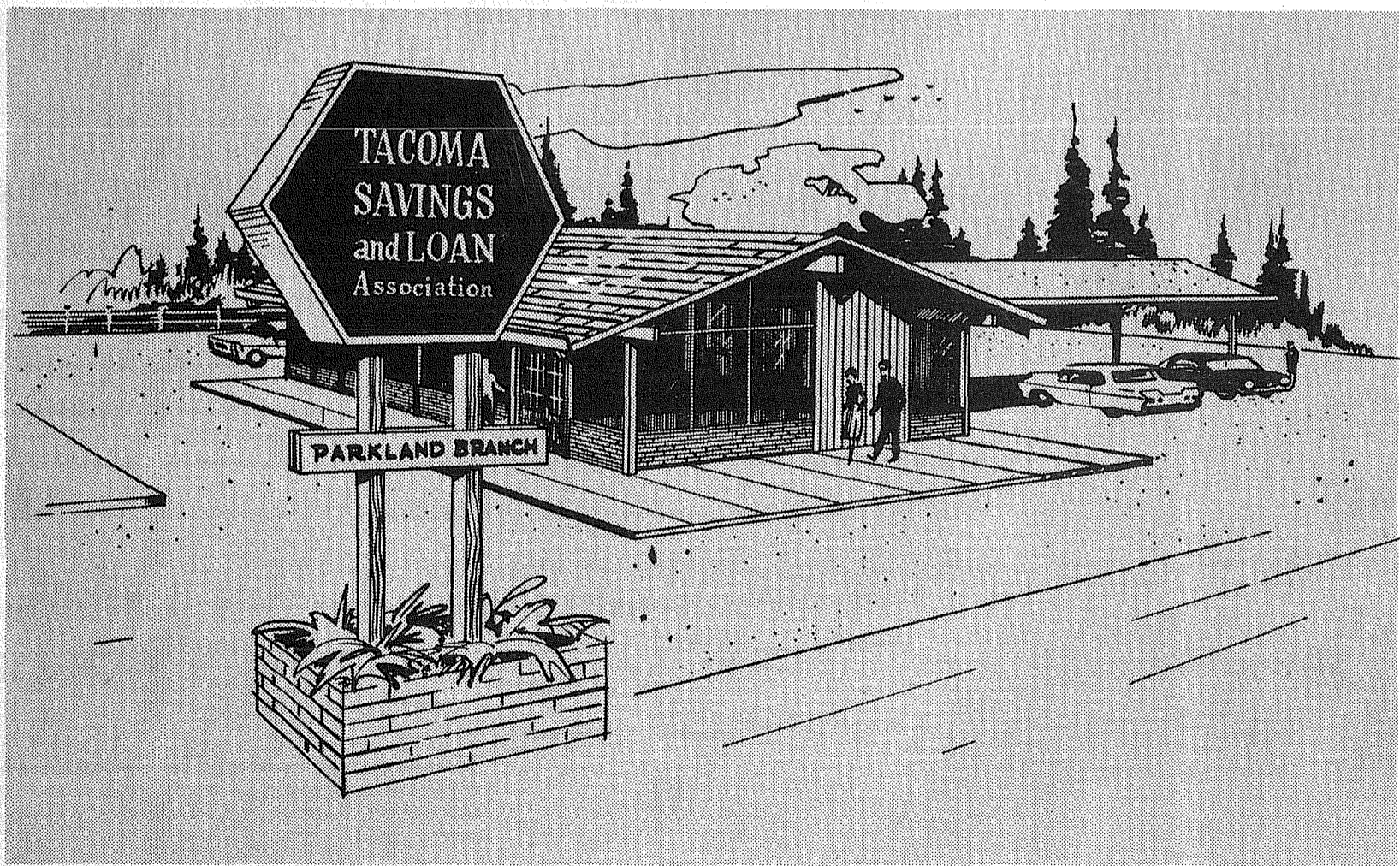
According to the legend, Gunarrh, the Indian boy, was carried to the undersea home of the whale. There, supernatural powers were conferred upon him, and he was given the right to use the killer whale design as an emblem.

The bold and vivid mural was adapted from Indian art by craftsmen of Klee Wyk Studio at Nisqually, Washington.

Extra Sales Help Offered Vocational Training Course

The Clover Park Vocational Technical school, in cooperation with the Washington State Employment Service and many of Lakewood's and Tacoma's leading merchants, is offering a special course

for the training of extra Christmas sales personnel. Every year at this time the stores are faced with the responsibility of hiring hundreds of sales clerks to help in the seasonal rush. Feed Problems Answered At Animal Meet

Latest information on feeds for faster gains will be presented at the 16th Washington Animal Nutrition Conference, November 12 and 13 in Mt. Vernon.

Jack Crawford, County Extension Agent, said the session is aimed at providing answers from research to questions and problems faced by feed mixers and dealers, feedlot operators, and anyone else interested in mixing feed for livestock.

This year's program will give special emphasis to feeds for larger animals, especially for cattle and other ruminants.

One of the nation's top authorities on large animal nutrition, Dr. W. H. Dfander (FAND-er) of the University of Missouri, Columbia, Mo., will address the conference twice. His topics: Current status of vitamin A and caroten in ruminant nutrition, and recent studies on potassium in ruminant nutrition.

A briefing session on WSU's total animal science research program will provide progress reports on some of the animal nutrition studies being conducted by university scientists.

A panel discussion and workshop on feed formulations will provide answers to problem questions submitted earlier by representatives of the feed industry.

Other speakers will include WSU agricultural researchers and extension specialists and representatives from the feed industry.

The conference is sponsored jointly by Washington State University and the Washington State Feed Association, Inc. The stealing of evergreen brush and huckleberries on private property adjoining public roads is a constant problem, especially now, at the height of huckleberry harvesting. A clarification of property owners' rights on land bordering a public right of way is in order.

County Extension Agent Dave Klemperer reports that in some cases individuals have stolen huckleberries from private land adjacent to public roads, claiming they were still on the public right of way. This occurs when a right of way has been extended and properties are not been resurveyed.

The right of way on public roads varies from 30 to over 60 feet total width. To determine the extent of a 40-foot right of way on either side of a road, one would, of course, measure 20 feet from the road center line, and not from the road edge as some trespassers propose to do.

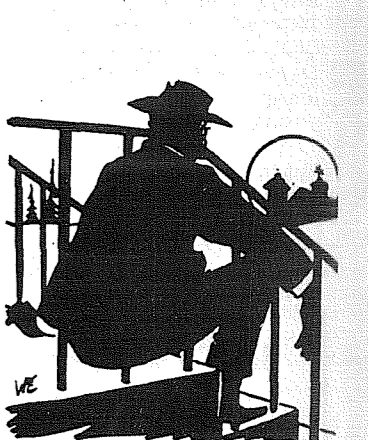

It's The Law

Under our dual system of government, two sets of law, state and federal, may govern what we do.

State laws have traditionally governed certain fields, for example, law of wills, estates, and transfers of property upon death. Each state has its own rules on death transfers, how to make wills and what happens when a person dies without a will. But the federal government has some power in this field. In a dispute between the United States and a state over a decedent's estate, the U. S. Supreme Court set forth some of the federal powers. A war veteran died in a veteran's hospital without a will or heirs. He had some personal property. Under the state law property reverted to the state. Under federal law his property goes





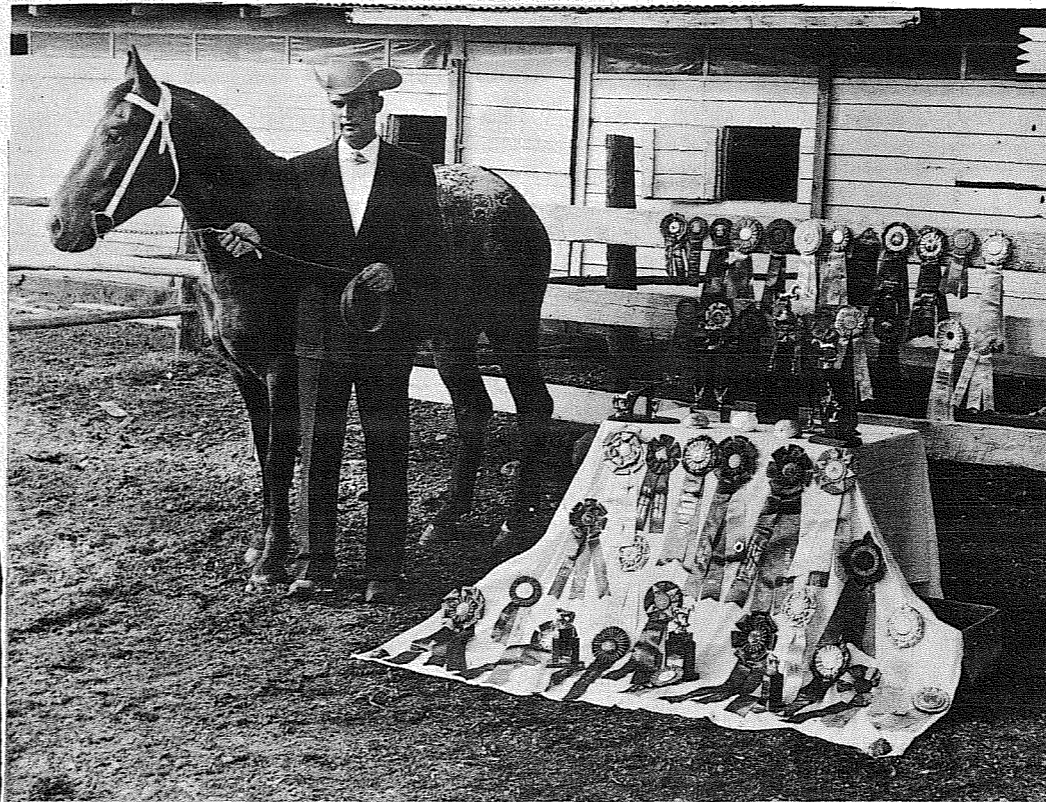
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Local FFA Group Back With Honors

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Bond Vote Will Avoid Split Shifts
Double shifting of students at the Woodland, Waller Road and other schools in Puyallup beginning as soon as 1965 can be avoided with passage of school issues at the polls on Tuesday, November 5.
With October 1 enrollment figures showing a gain of 465 students over one year ago, the school population in Puyallup continues to show rapid growth. This growth is the equivalent of one new school building each year. These students must be housed, and in order to avoid this double shifting in these elementary schools in 1965, the directors of the district have authorized a special election on November 5.
Construction of two needed elementary schools will be assured with passage of the first of the two school propositions which will be on the ballot. Proposition 1 is an \$800,000 special bond issue to provide the local share of the proposed construction and to meet requirements for state matching funds.
In addition to the construction, these funds will purchase the required sites and additional land for future schools. At present, the district has used all its elementary sites and purchases now in acreage for the future are far more economical than later purchasing homes or condemning property for needed building area.
A further use of the funds provided by Proposition 1 would be to provide equipment and site improvements for the new elementary building to be constructed. This proposition is essentially the same as that which appeared on the ballot at the special election last May. At that time, the vote was 77% favorable but the total vote was several hundred short of the number voting required to validate the measure. In commenting on this, School Superintendent Tom Terjeson pointed out that the high percentage of favorable votes indicated that voters recognize the need and accept the proposals and financing method. However, due to state requirements of a 40% turnout of those who voted in the last general election, the number who voted as well as the per cent favorable is a critical factor.
In summing up the proposals, Wes Brand, campaign chairman presented these thoughts: "Student enrollment is high and continually increasing in number. The additional two elementary buildings and sites are needed and will never cost less than now. Since state matching funds are available, we should take advantage of our full share. I hope you will join me and the many other interested citizens in support of these two measures on November 5."

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
