

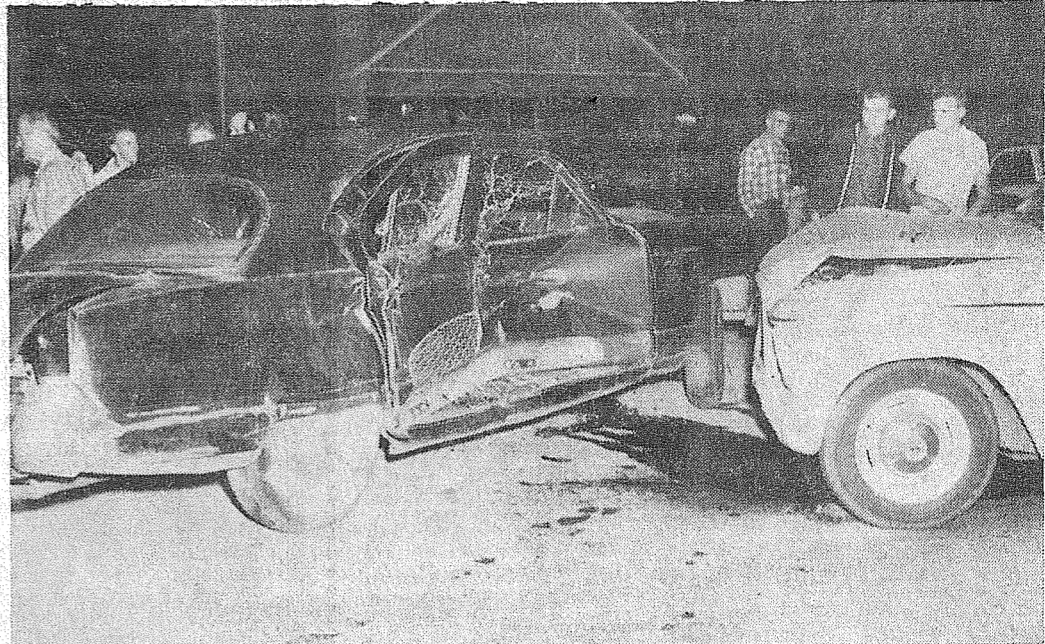

A sudden left turn by the driver of the '51 Kaiser seen at left caused this accident Saturday night at S. 145th and Pacific. Remarkably, no one was hurt. Thomas E. Hukill, 64, of 4121 S. 47th, attempted to turn into the Mixing Bowl when he was hit broadside by a '60 Studebaker driven by Robert L. Austin, 34, of Rt. 1, Box 319, Spanaway. Neither driver was hurt. Two passengers in the Hukill car suffered lacerations. They are Moris Hukill and Grace Binn, both of 4121 S. 47th. Thomas' wife, Martha, also a passenger, was not hurt. 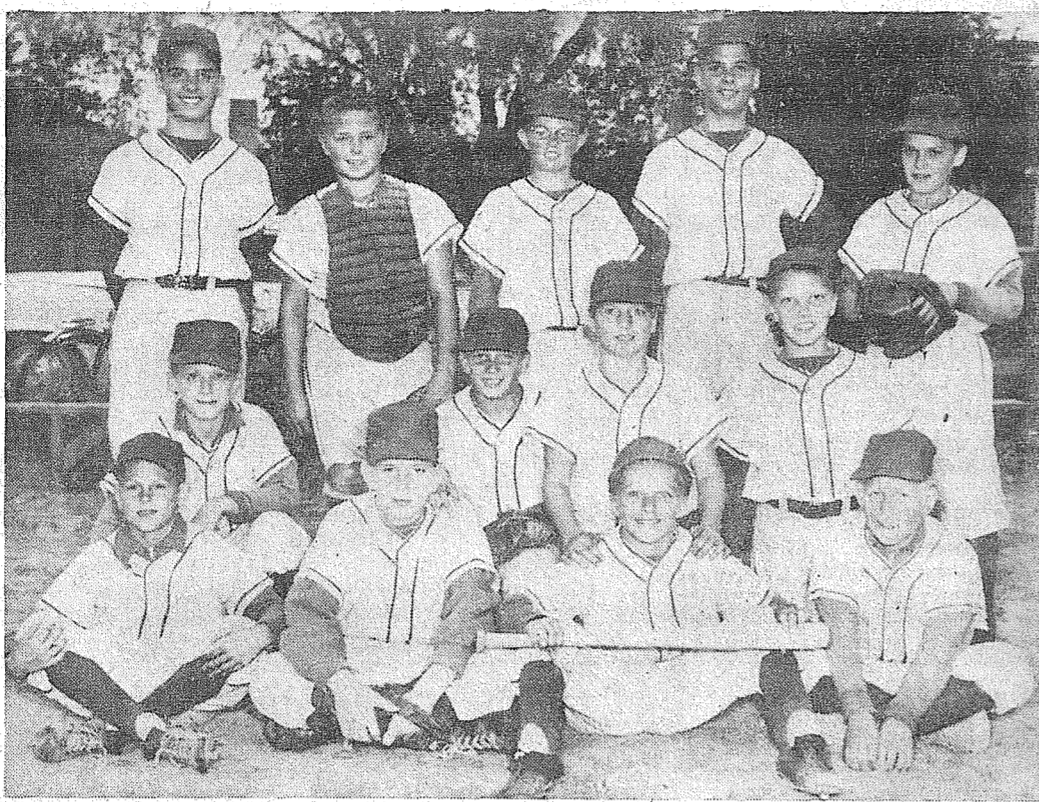

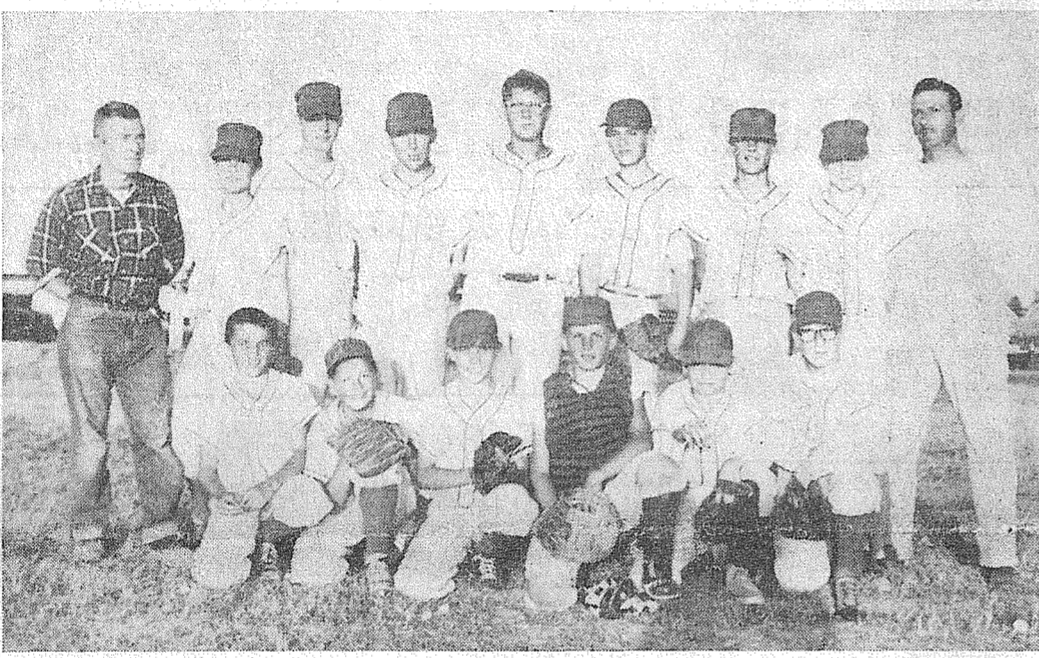

Immanuel Will Show Life of Christ

The most detailed depiction of the life of Christ ever filmed, just completed after four years in production, is to be presented in 12 episodes of thirty minutes each by the Immanuel Baptist Church on Sunday evenings at 6:00 p.m., starting this Sunday, September 25, 1960.

The Rev. Ed Coy will conduct discussion groups and give supplementary background and interpretations. He said this would be one of the first showings of the complete motion picture series in this community.

"This Living Christ series was photographed in full color," Rev. Coy said. "Its cast includes more than 200 speaking parts. Never in the history of church teaching have people been offered the opportunity to get so complete a political, economic and religious background of the greatest story ever told."

The Living Christ series is the top achievement of Cathedral Films, producer of "The Life of St. Paul," "I Beheld His Glory," and the theatrical feature-length film on the life of Christ, "Day of Triumph." Beginning with the prophecies of Isaiah during the reign of Hezekiah, it is a complete pictorial account of events from the nativity through the crucifixion and the resurrection.

The public is invited to attend the showings in the auditorium of the Immanuel Baptist Church at 94th & Pacific Avenue. An offering will be taken.

On Sunday, September 25th, there will be two church services each Sunday morning at Immanuel Baptist Church. The first service is to begin at 8:30 a.m., which is something new and is on an experimental basis for the remainder of the year. Sunday School begins at 9:45 a.m. followed by morning worship at 11:00 a.m. Everyone welcome!

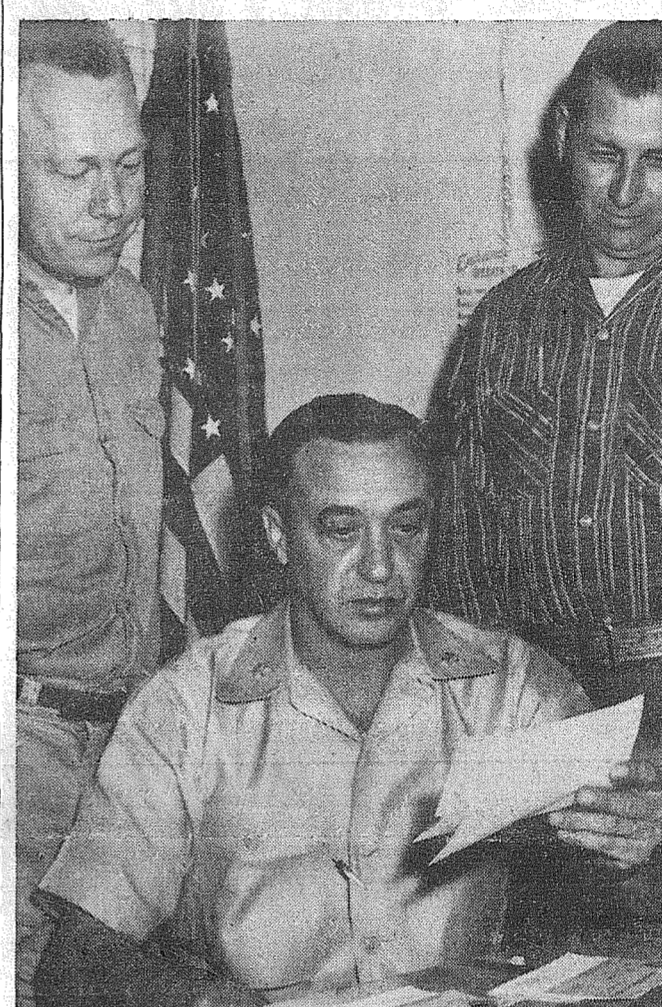

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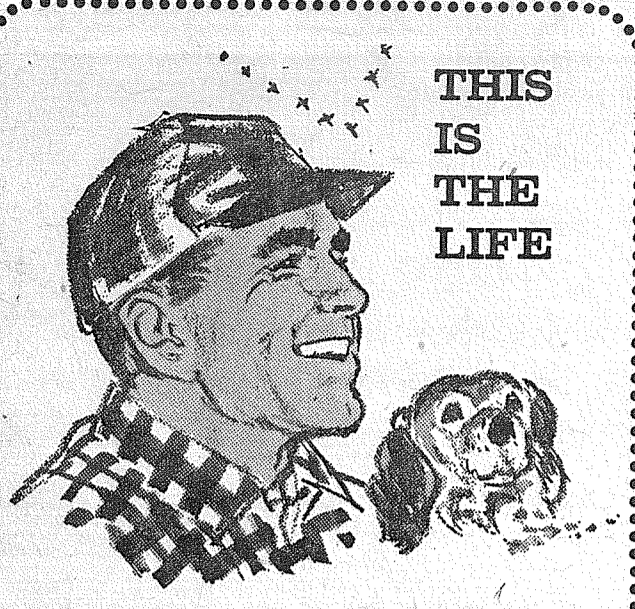

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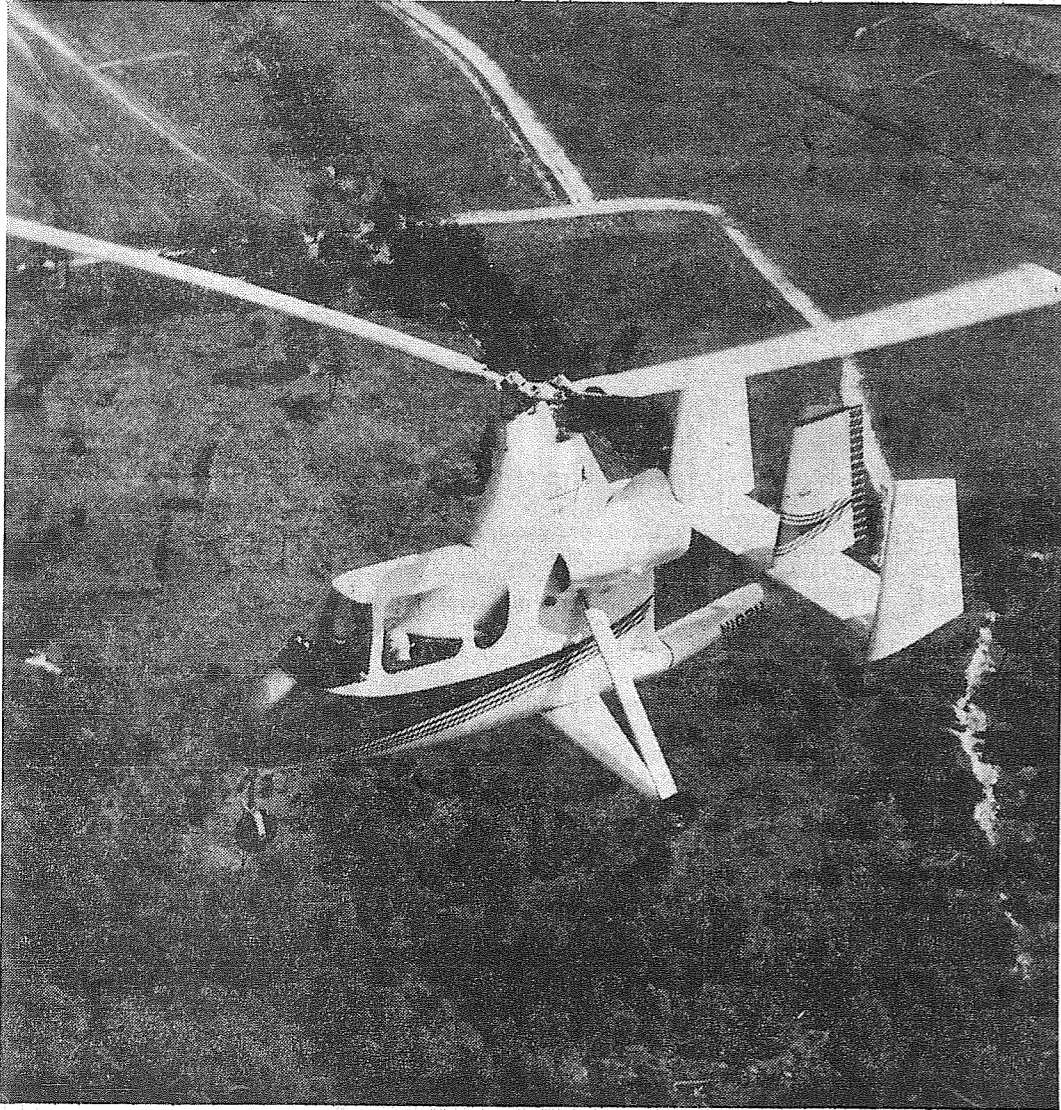

IT CAME scudding down out of the blue skies and zipped at tree-top level over the historic Gettysburg battlefields. Like a jaunty bumblebee, the strange, little craft turned on a dime, gave back five cents change, and scooted for its home base at the Fairchild Aircraft and Engine plant at Hagerstown, heart of the rolling Maryland countryside. The craft was the heralded Umbaugh 18. There it was, with the awesome Blue Ridge mountains as a backdrop, cruising at better than 100 miles. Its three rotary-blades were in constant but silent rotation. The tight, little rotor from its 180 Lycoming engine suddenly cut to a whisper, and the plane came almost to a dead stop high in the air. It began a graceful, ever-slower vertical descent. Four feet from the ground, the pilot flared the craft—suddenly raising its nose and it kissed the ground as softly as a spinning maple leaf wafting to a deep lawn. This is the aircraft designed to do for the aviation industry what Henry Ford's Model T did for the automotive industry. The manufacturer plans to have this versatile, easy to fly, rotor wing airplane on the market in large numbers in the near future, and priced within reach of all. It has too many uses to enumerate but its greatest selling point is its ability to make a jump takeoff wherein it leaps 12 to 15 feet vertically into the air from your lawn or pasture and flies off from this height. Who needs an airport.

First semester classes will begin the following Monday on October 3 for a ten-week period ending the first week of December. Second semester classes will meet on Monday and or Wednesday evenings.

New this fall will be the use of our Foreign Language Laboratory for teaching conversational Spanish. By using individual tape recorders each student has the amount to a private tutor. The stress is placed upon learning to speak the language. An intermediate course, as well as beginning, will be offered for those who have had some previous training. If the demand is sufficient we would like to offer conversational French. Please call the director of adult education if you are interested so that plans for the course can be worked out.

In addition to the above offerings, will be the popular offerings of the past, including clothing (Bishop Method), tailoring, upholstery, interior decorating, woodshop, typing, bookkeeping, office training, public speaking, driver training, citizenship, landscape gardening, cake decorating, speed reading, and radio and electricity.

Courses of study giving detailed descriptions of each course will be available at all schools Wednesday, September 21, 1960. There will be no advance registration prior to Monday, September 26. 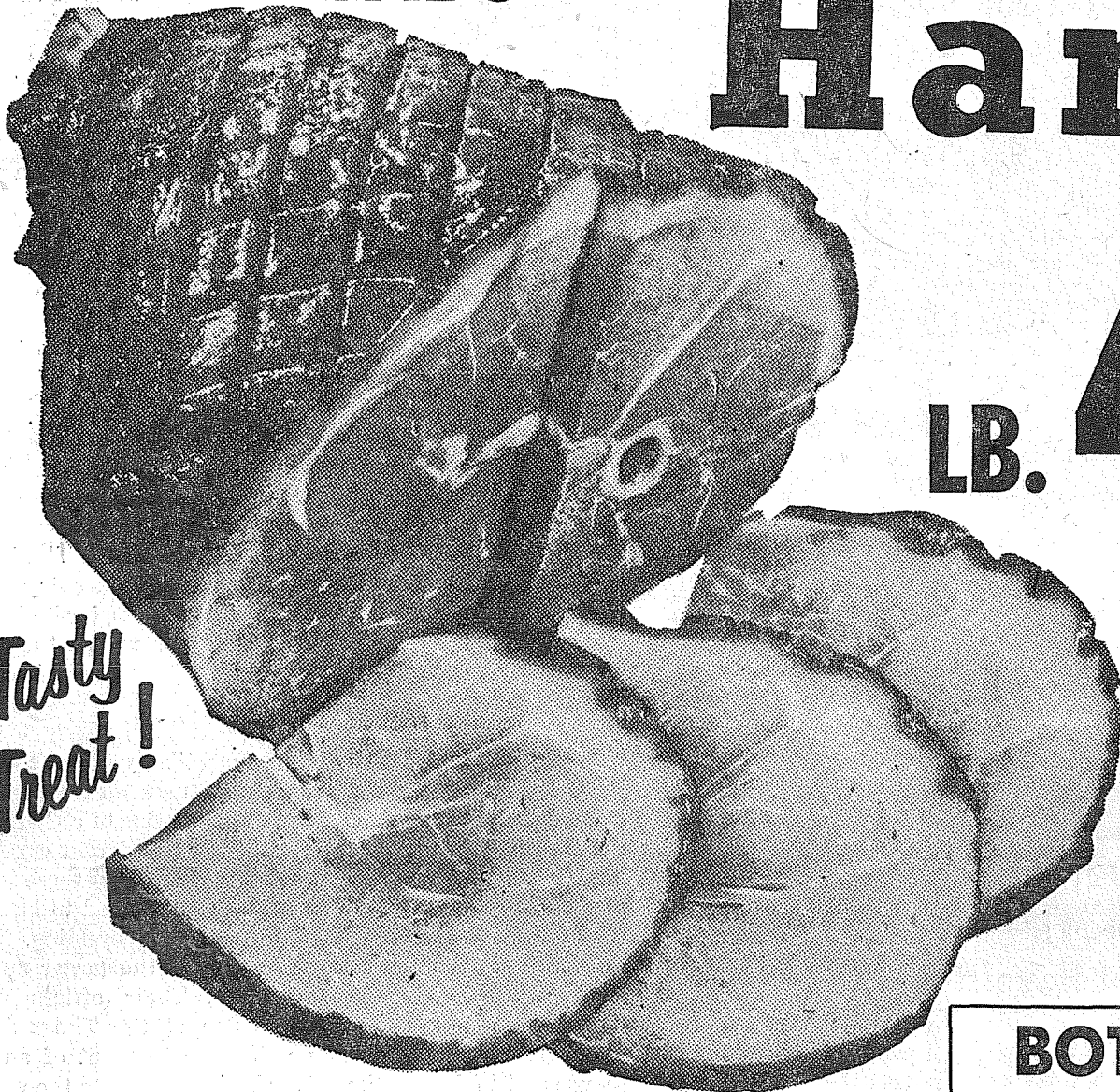

Many Americans Can't Prove Birth

Last year, 1,296 residents of Washington, turned to the U. S. Bureau of the Census for help in proving they were born. These persons were among an estimated 30 million United States residents who are without proof of age or birth.

COOLING THOUGHT

CAMBRIDGE, Mass.—With the temperate outside at 98, Harvard Professor Douglas Bush began an alumni luncheon speech by quoting the opening lines of Keats' "Eve of St. Agnes," which describe a frigid winter night. "These lines have nothing to do with my speech," Bush said. "I offer them merely as a little preliminary air conditioning."

The historical records of the Census Bureau provide the only source of this information for most of these 30 million people.

Proof of age or birth is needed today to collect social security and other retirement benefits. It is needed to obtain passports. It is needed to qualify for jobs carrying certain age or citizenship requirements. It is needed for some forms of insurance.

Since 1920, the Census Bureau has provided more than three and one-half million persons with copies of their Census records on age, place of birth, citizenship, or kinship. Persons seeking such records of facts about themselves should write to the Personal Census Service Branch, Bureau of the Census, Pittsburg, Kansas, for a Census Records Search Application Form. A fee of \$3.00 is charged

for a search of not more than two censuses for one person and for one copy of the information found. Additional copies cost \$1.00 each. An expedited search costs \$4.00. Expedited searches are usually completed within a few days while the routine \$3.00 search may take up to 30 days, depending upon the backlog of requests and the ease or difficulty in locating the information.

The personal information in the records of the 1900 and later censuses is confidential by law and may be furnished only upon the written request of the person to whom it relates or, for a proper purpose, a legal representative such as guardian or administrator of an estate. Information regarding a child who has not reached legal age may be obtained upon the written request of either parent.

I've had a few odd experiences like getting lost in the Pentagon and having to give a colored boy a buck to lead me out. Think that's a bit of malarky? Ask someone that's been there or try it yourself sometime.

I've noticed several things on this trip, I see that people in the East still have time to sit on their front porch and watch their neighbors and the world go by. Surprisingly enough many of these folks I've seen are young people. Maybe a few more of us Westerners should take the time to set out on the front porch once in a while. We might live a little longer.


As you all know, Pierce county streets and roads are lined daily with foreign cars. In the east I've seen very few. The reason seems to be that loyalty to American products is much stronger here than in our area. Perhaps this in part is due to the close proximity of the American auto manufacturers.

In an eastern newspaper I noted the results of a recent quiz given to members of the coming up senior high school classes. It showed that 61 per cent did not believe in need for profit; 83 per cent estimated current industrial profits at 50 per cent; 53 per cent recommended government ownership of banks, railroads and steel companies; 55 per cent agreed with the theory "from each according to his ability—to each according to his need." If this survey be authentic then we as American parents and-or teachers have failed miserably in our responsibility to instill in the minds of our high school students the principles of our American system which has made this country so great.

You've all heard the old adage that you can't tell a book by its cover. I've turned up a new idea along this same vein of thought. You can't tell the size of a Company by its advertising. I've been calling on different companies dealing in aviation products. Naturally those with large ads in the national magazines I expected to be equally large in size as pertaining to their building, help, facilities etc. I twice passed up one of the larger advertisers while looking for the place. Their offices were about the size of the casting room at the Times Journal. Another time the taxi pulled up in front of an old house and I felt sure the driver had taken me to the wrong address but upon closer examination I found a sign that said "Office" to the firm I intended to see. In this case I had fully expected to see a large factory at least two or three blocks long. Guess I'm just a gullible character.

Here's a little information on a personal survey I took in Washington D.C. by driving down the streets as our government offices closed for the day and by spending a day visiting many of them. By actual count I came up with the figure of eight colored people employed in government offices to two white persons. Don't ask me what this proves or if it's good or bad. I don't have the answer. All I know is that it sure came as a surprise to me.

Forced-air ventilation is high on the list of poultry subjects these days. Fred Carlson, Riverside vicinity poultryman, is one of the ventilated house. Fred has a 24 ft. wide poultry house that is divided into four 30 ft. long pens. He will move the roosts sections most recent to prepare for a fan from the back wall to the center of the house. The sections will be enlarged to place feeders on top. Droppings will be captured in the dropping pits.

One exhaust fan will be installed in the front wall of each pen. Fan capacity will move about 5 cubic feet of air per minute. Fresh air intakes will be at plate level along the back wall. Air intake space will be allotted at the rate of 100 sq. inches for every 300 cubic foot per minute of air moved. The house will be entirely closed except for the regulated air intake openings. No attempt will be made to restrict light. Fred's birds are June hatch date so are reared under natural decreasing daylight.

behind Fred's new venture is to house move birds in the same area and to help maintain dry litter. Square footage per hen will be reduced from three to about 1 1/2 more feeder, water, and nest space will also be provided. Insulation will be installed in the ceiling to help maintain favorable temperature during cold weather.

The basic principle of successful forced-air ventilation is that cool

outside air is drawn into the pen. It is warmed by heat from the hens. Warm air holds more moisture than cold air. As the air flows across the pens it picks up the moisture and is expelled on the other side.

The cost of the installation should compare very favorably with conventional housing costs. In other words, the total cost divided by the number of additional birds housed would amount to

approximately what it would cost to build a conventional house for the additional birds. This figure would be between one and two dollars per hen.

Some poultrymen such as E. M. Antonson from Gig Harbor and Clifford Johnson, Edgewood, combine light control with the forced-air ventilated houses. Windows in the houses are covered so light cannot enter. Birds reared under decreasing amounts of light be-

tween 8 and 22 weeks of age seem to perform better in the laying house. May, June, July August and September hatches bear this out. Much is yet to be learned about lighting hens and pullets. As research work becomes available, it very likely could point the way to more use of controlled light and ventilation in poultry houses. In the meantime forced-air ventilation is becoming more popular to house more birds, to help maintain dry
