Park Land To Be Sold, Funds Will Aid Development Outlines Program

"The first step in the county's plans for total development of Spanaway Park will be the sale by public auction of approximately 13 acres of Park land within the next 60 to 90 days", County Commissioner Harry Sprinker announced this week.

The land to be sold is located on the Northwest corner of Military Road and Pacific Avenue. Money paid for the sale of this land will be utilized in furthering the recreational development plans as will the funds realized from a future parcel sale of all Park owned land East of Pacific Avenue, amounting to about 100 acres.

A recent \$68,300 advanced by the U. S. Community Facilities Administration for the planning program will enable the department to call for actual construction bids by the early spring of 1964, Sprinker said. The plans include a football field, three baseball diamonds, swimming pool, six picnic shelters, two bathing beach bath houses, an 18-hole golf course, a basketball court, two hand ball courts, a games area, toilet facilities, a community building, golf clubhouse, and a care-taker's residence.

"There will be no trailer park as it would be in competition with already existing private parks in the area," the Commissioner said.

Users fees will help pay costs of these new facilities which will be served by a new water system, a sewage disposal system, storm drainage, and a new electrical distribution system for night-lighting.

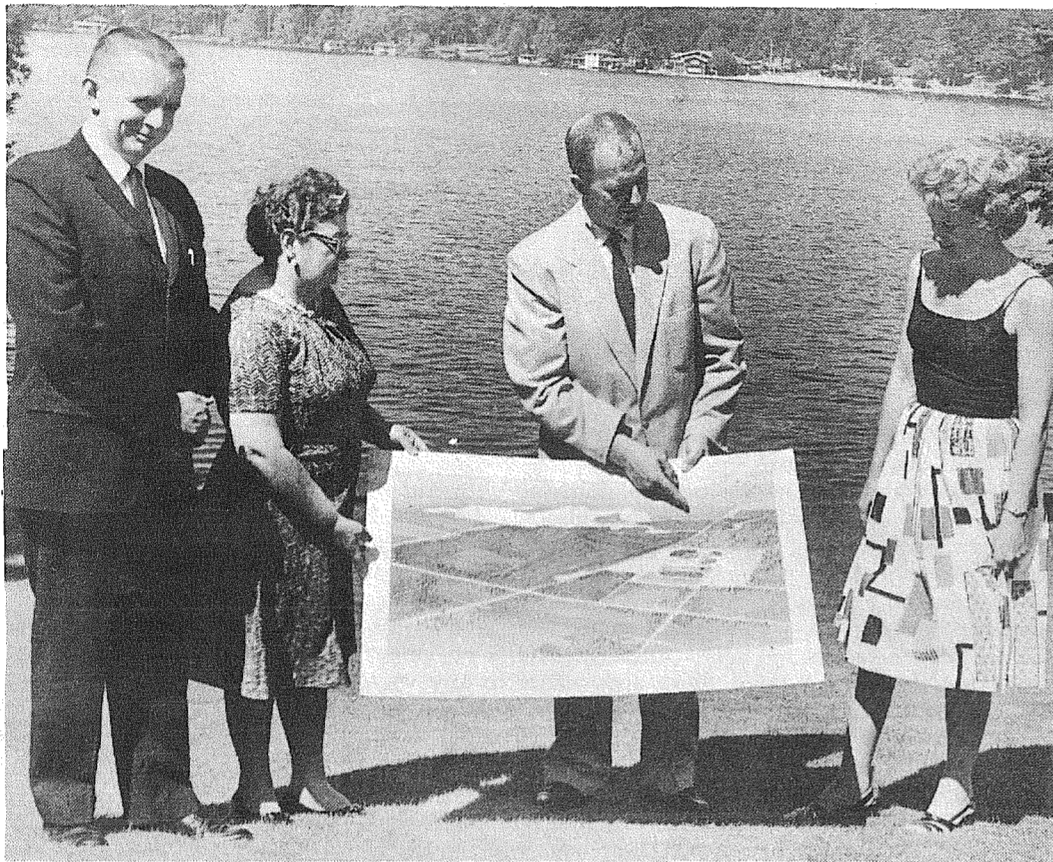
Spanaway Park consists of approximately 450 acres and was given to the county in 1959 by the Metropolitan Park Department. Development of the extensive recreational improvements will be spaced over a period of five years, according to planning estimates.

One of the most spectacular sights of the Thun Field National Air Show August 3rd and 4th, co-sponsored by the Optimist Clubs of Western Washington, will be the giant finale of the program. The Fly-Away of visiting aircraft after the completion of the show will fill the sky with almost every variety of airplane known to man.

Parkland Air Show patrons have been advised to avoid the congestion of arriving spectators from other parts of the country by traveling to Thun Field via South 176th Street from the Mountain Highway.

Anyone in the market for a 1963 or older airplane will have an opportunity to see a display of all of the largest airplane dealers in the Northwest at the show, and every type of plane will be shown. There will also be kiddie rides, helicopter rides, all sorts of concessions ranging from peanuts and popcorn to programs and camera equipment.

Puyallup Eagles Lodge No. 2308 will erect stands for spectators and the Summit Fire Department will have emergency equipment on hand.

Vance Airlines operating their giant DC-3 will give the crowds an opportunity to get a bird's eye view of the countryside. There will be comedy-battles, precision demonstration, sky-writing, racing, famous names, and fabulous antics.

Also on display will be the celebrated presidential staff

car. The only car of its kind in the world, the luxury auto cost thousands of dollars and was made expressly for the use of the President. It's a four door 1960 Cadillac open car (not a convertible or touring car) with rolled leather upholstery, six-way seats, air conditioning, a automatic trunk opener, automatic door locks, thick floor carpeting, and all the extras the maker could imagine.

The wing-walkers, barnstormers, and stunt men who will take part in the show are examples, not of mere showmanship, but of the breed of men who serve to advance the cause of safe and sane aviation. They have helped to make the airplane a useful mode of transportation instead of a toy by providing research material about the stresses and strains resulting on a craft in stunt maneuvering.

Due chiefly to men such as these, America was kept abreast of the rest of the world in the interim between World Wars I and II.

Radios Will Control All Car Traffic

The Tacoma Citizens Band Radio Association (TACBRA) who recently won acclaim for their aid to local police in controlling traffic during the Tacoma dock fire, will be on hand at Thun Field during the National Air Show, Aug. 3 & 4, to handle ground communications and traffic.

The twenty-five club members who have volunteered their services for the big event will be furnishing communications for FAA, Weather, and Dick Jelsing, a former highway patrolman, who will be in charge of traffic inside the field during the show.

TACBRA will use two-way mobile radios and hand-held walkie-talkies as well as two base stations working as control nets to control the mobile units.

The association has only been organized about eight months and the Tacoma dock fire was the first time the members were called upon to demonstrate their ability in the communications and crowd control field.

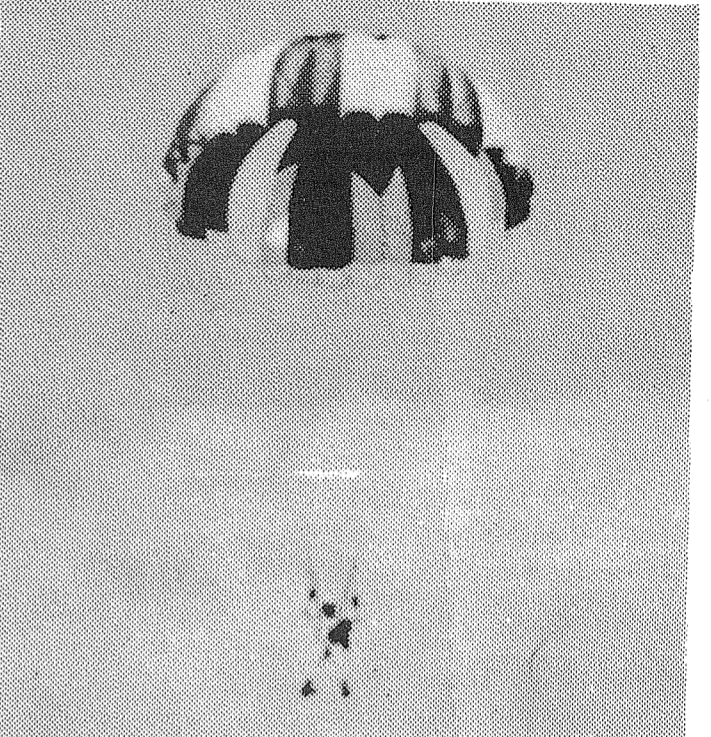

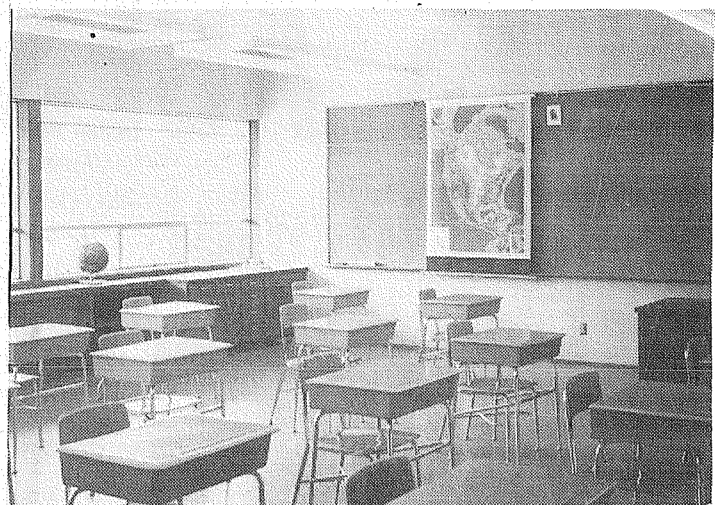

Accuracy In Bleach Use Aids Fabrics

A bleach in the washing machine can make clothes look brighter, newer, and fresher — provided it's used properly, Miss Bernice Belshaw, county extension agent says.

Bleaches aid in soil and stain removal, help white fabrics retain their whiteness, and serve as a disinfectant. However, the use of bleach requires a little know-how so that fabrics won't be damaged.

Miss Belshaw makes the following suggestions for careful use of bleaches:

Don't use a chlorine-type bleach if there's any iron in the water. The chlorine and iron combine to leave brown and yellow deposits on the clothes. Perborate or monoperoxysulfate bleaches may be used in water containing iron.

Follow gorment labels for washing instructions. Wash-and-wear or embossed cottons sometimes turn yellow with a chlorine-type bleach. When labels say "do not bleach" it means the finishes used will probably retain the chlorine. Use laundry marking ink to label the garment and remind you to keep it out of bleach water.

Although the yellow stains can be removed with dye, prevent the stains if possible. Many of the newer garments are labeled "chlorine resistant finish" and will not yellow with the use of chlorine-type bleaches.

Don't use a chlorine-type bleach on silk, wool, acetate, rubber, or spandex fibers. Use caution with colors. Some dyes are unaffected by bleach. Others will fade. If in doubt, test a sample of the fabric.

Never pour full-strength bleach directly on a fabric. Holes will result. Don't mix bleach with other cleaners, except detergents. Store all bleaches out of reach of children.

Information on buying and using bleaches is contained in Pacific Northwest Bulletin "Be a Better Buyer of Bleaches". The bulletin is available on request at the county Extension office, 742 County-City Building.

a - Wondering and a - Wondering

The word "politicking" isn't in the dictionary. But it's a good, if homely, word just the same. It's as American as apple pie. It describes something that is going on in this country, in which anyone can run for anything, day in and day out the calendar around. All the way from the Presidency down to dog catcher, people, informed and uninformed, are constantly arguing the merits and demerits of one candidate against some other joker. But politicking involving them has reached an unusual high. It may be due to the confusion of the world we live in. Internationally speaking, it is in a mell of a mess. The whole Western defense posture is in question. The Common Market is up in the air. The political situation in Britain, brought to a head by the Profumo-Keeler scandal, has, unless a major miracle occurs, doomed the Macmillan government. Here at home, an interminable Congress has produced practically nothing due to the extremes of differences over a dozen and one major issues—civil rights, the Welfare State in all its ramifications, tax reduction and fiscal reform, deficit financing versus a balanced budget, etc., etc.

So far as candidates are concerned, interest centers on the GOP. Mr. Kennedy will ride the donkey once again. But who is going to saddle up the elephant is a very different matter.

It is probable that if the conventions were held tomorrow Senator Goldwater would walk off with the riding crop. The Goldwater boom has been phenomenal. Indeed, some of the meetings, largely organized by young people, have taken on the aura of actual conventions, complete with state banners and the rest. The Senator hasn't announced his candidacy, but no one doubts that he will come if called. The political arguments on his behalf are unique. His backers freely admit that the great Northeastern industrial states with their huge blocks of electoral votes, will go for Kennedy, and that some of the Midwestern and far Western states, including California, will be in his ranks too. But, they say this can be offset and more by a sweep of the South. That would mean Republican victory in states that have always gone Democratic by huge majorities. But times have changed, say the Goldwater people, and past precedent has lost its meaning. The main reason for this theory of Southern defection from the Democratic ranks, of course, is the integration issue.

Then there is another personable figure—Nelson Rockefeller. His standing in the polls plummeted with his remarriage. It was widely stated that, politically, he was all through, but a lot can happen in a year and memories are short. Some political writers say, the fact that various of his influential political backers ran for the woods when his popularity sagged may be something of a blessing in disguise. They deserted his camp; therefore, he is no longer obligated to them or their views and wishes in any way. He can be his own man, just as Goldwater can, and say and do precisely what he thinks. This is no small asset.

These two men certainly do not exhaust the possibilities. They could eliminate each other, and bring about the nomination of a comparatively dark horse. This could very well open the gates for George Romney, who is Eisenhower's favorite and has a great deal of support in powerful industrial and financial circles which prefer a middle-of-the-roader to an outright liberal or conservative. And if Romney, too, fell by the wayside, a real long shot, such as Governor Scranton, could get the nod.

Difference between political groups—the prime examples being the Rockefeller and Goldwater factions—are hot, increasing, and in some instances downright bitter. The battles that lie ahead may not be enlightening, but they'll be interesting. It's a cinch that the stuff will start hitting the fan early in the campaign.

Larson Portrait Given PLU

A painting of Mrs. Tobias Larson, one of Parkland's most beloved and respected former citizens and wife of one of the founding fathers of Pacific Lutheran University, has been added to the permanent art collection of PLU.

The painting, which is approximately 81 years old, is a gift of Mr. and Mrs. Randolph E. Haugan of Minneapolis. Haugan is general manager of the Augsburg Publishing House. Mrs. Haugan is a step-daughter of Mrs. Larson.

Herbjorn N. Gausta, one of the foremost Norwegian-American artists, painted the portrait. Born in Vestfoldalen in Tinn, he came to America with his parents at the age of 12 but returned to Europe several times to study art and dedicate his time to painting.

A native of Norway, Mrs. Larson immigrated to America in 1844 with her parents who settled in Wisconsin. She married Tobias, who was a teacher in 1856. Prior to coming to Tacoma in 1893, they were in Indian mission work in Wisconsin.

The Larsons settled in Parkland where he served as teacher, pastor, treasurer and board member of PLU. Shortly before his death in 1903 he established the Parkland Children's Home.

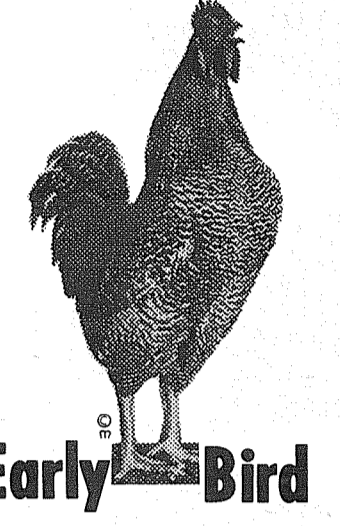
Mrs. Larson, affectionately known by all her friends in the community as "Grandma Larson", continued an active interest in all local church and charitable activities for many years.

In 1900 at the age of 64, she left her home and spent two days and nights aiding in caring for the victims of the disastrous Tacoma street car crash in Gallier ravine.

Mrs. Larson died August 24, 1934 at the age of 98 in her Parkland home.

The portrait of Mrs. Larson is the second gift from the Haugans. They previously had given the university the portrait of Tobias Larson, also painted by Gausta.

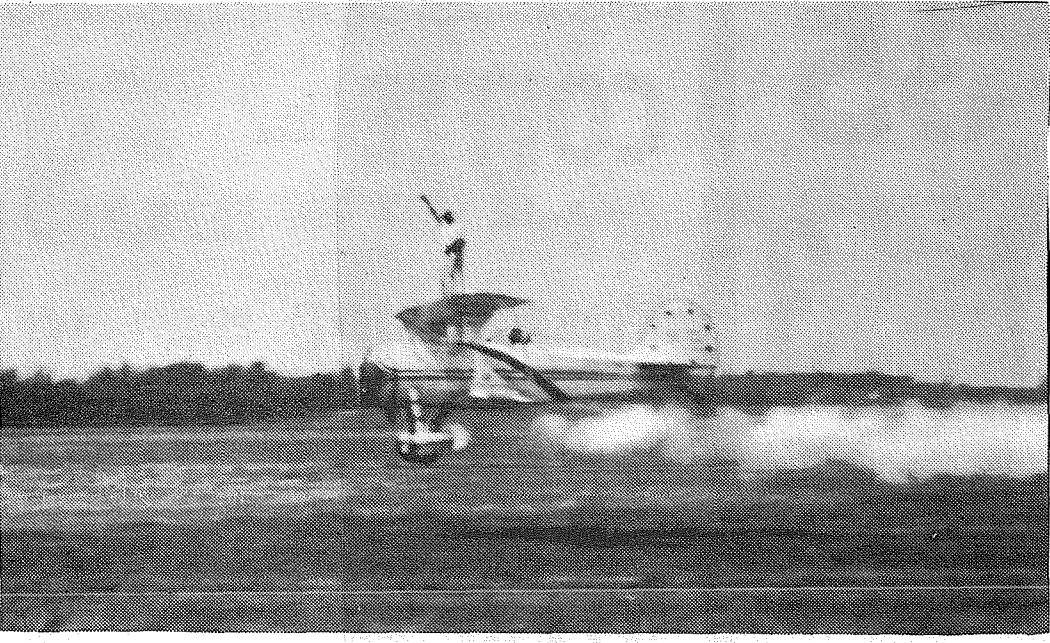

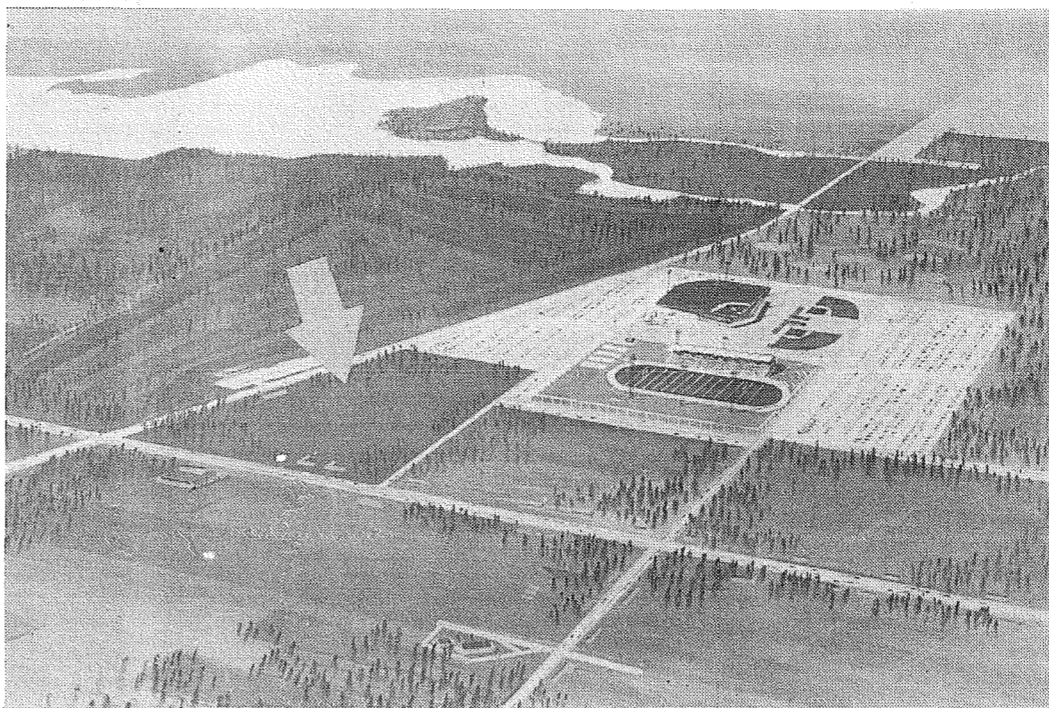
