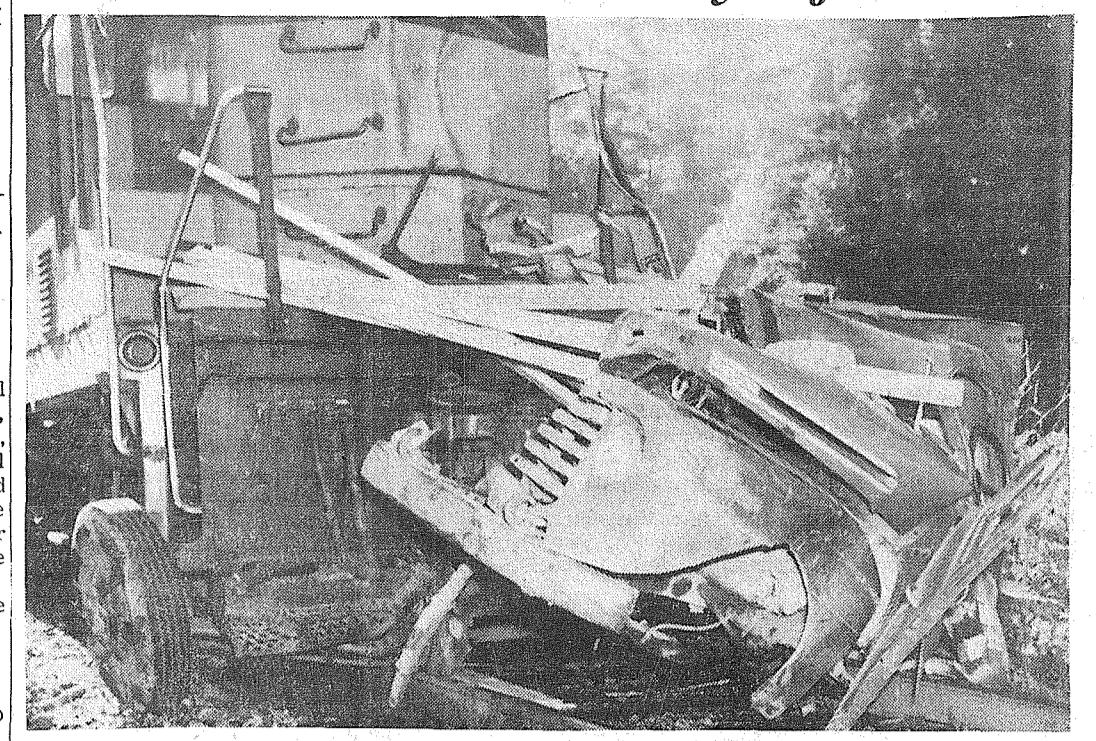

Mass Testing for FP Hi Students

Mass testing of Franklin Pierce sophomores began Oct. 28 by the school's guidance department as the Iowa Test of Educational Development was given to all 10th graders. Funds for the test were made available through the National Defense Education Act which Franklin Pierce qualified for last spring.

The battery of tests lasts six hours and Director Stan Monson

reported that parents will be able to see the results when they are known sometime in December. The Iowa tests are being given in conjunction with the Differential Aptitude Tests.

"A complete picture of sophomore students will be gained through both tests and will be of considerable value in the student's future educational and vocational pursuits," Monson said.

Assisting with the tests are Counselors Pat O'Connell and Kenneth Bates. Test results will be scored in Chicago and will return in about six weeks. Monson said it would take one week to complete the testing.

Sophomores will be tested on the understanding of basic social concepts, background in the social sciences, correctness and appropriateness of expression, ability to do quantitative thinking, reading in social studies, natural sciences, and literary materials; general vocabulary and uses of sources of information.

If parents will use more of the back of their hands and less of the lash of their tongue, you'll see some no cost changes fast.

Sooner or later, we're going to have to learn that the solution to every problem can't be found in the old refrain — spend, spend, spend — tax, tax, tax.

Maybe they're spending all their time in the house now watching television and then again, maybe there's another answer. In this modern day and age, who's got time to grow old?

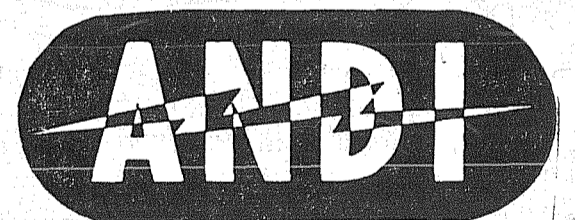

That's quite a change over most of the great-grandmothers we remember, back in our younger days, who couldn't rock more than 15-per-minute without getting palpitation of the heart.

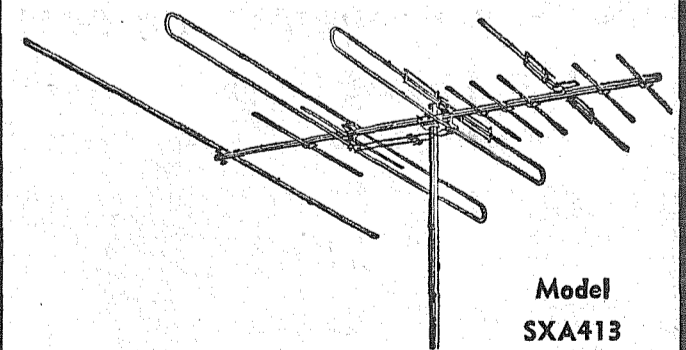
