Educational TV's Place In Schools Explained By Spanaway Principal

by R. J. Fraser, Principal Spanaway Elementary School Education is changing quite rapidly. It must change

To meet these changes and demands of soclety the schools are using every available method which will improve the quality of education. Educational television is one of the newest and best methods of aiding with the television instructthe teacher to broaden the scope of education.

Television is a good but some of the specialized subvery expensive method of teaching. Original transmitting and receiving equipment is costly. Only large districts can afford to install equipment and personnel to produce educational television. Bethel and most of the districts of Pierce structors make periodic visschool County have joined with Clover Park to establish KPEC Channel 56.

Financing With Federal aid, grants from the Ford Foundation and pooling of resources, Clover Park has been able to broadcast very fine programs. Most of the Bethel District receiving equipment was financed through National Defense Education Act funds for the purpose of improving instruction in math, science, and foreign langu-

Most of the programs are grades where aid of a specialized nature is needed. There are some subjects that require a great deal of special training. Foreign languages, music, science and art are the type of subjects that need special help.

Language Courses The Bethel District has set up a program where the youngsters will have the opportunity to study Spanish from the fourth grade thru the 12th. A younger child will learn a conversational knowledge of a foreign language easier than a more mature person. Because of this, Spanish is started in the fourth grade. Mrs. Rediske, the television teacher stresses vocabulary and conversation. With the teacher's guidance, the children carry on conversations and perform activities with Mrs. Rediske on the screen. When the children reach Junior High FP Board To School, they may go into the more formal aspects of Spanish.

Music Program The television music program is taught by Mrs. Curtiss, Mrs. Taylor, and Mrs. Carlson. These three teachers have a great deal of talent and special training to put across a fine music pro-

Mrs. Curtiss teaches the television program for the first and second graders; Mrs. Taylor handles the third and fourth graders, and Mrs. Carlson has the fifth and sixth grade programs.

Through television, many hundreds of children have advantage of being taught by three very fine music teachers.

Mr. Whiteman, Bethel District upper grade music instructor, can see a marked improvement in the musical ability of the students who have had three or four years of training through the television program. Sciences







a - Wondering and a - Wandering . . .

With JACK BROWN

Seems I goofed. A long distance call this morning to the office brought the information that I had forgotten the fact that the paper came out a day earlier, due to Thanksgiving, and thus the column I was about to write would fail to make the deadline. What to do? Give you all a rest for a week? This seemed to be the logical thing to do, so here I sit, temporarily snowed in, writing a column that will now be a week in advance. Hope the crew can stand the shock.

To me yesterday was like a day out of the past. I happened to be in the information office at Kingsley Air Force Base at the time that word went out to all U.S. bases that the president had been assassinated. Naturally, as was the case all over the country, confusion more or less reigned for a few minutes until the shock of disbelief wore off. Within minutes the base commander issued the order for the flag, waving on high in front of the building, to be lowered to half-mast. Just what prompted so many of us to walk outside to watch the flag come down I don't know, but there I stood beside civilian workers, and Air Force personnel of all ranks. Not a word was spoken. Only the gentle sobbing of some of the women could be heard as the flag fluttered down the lanyard.

To me it was like turning back the clock, for once before in my life I had been at the headquarters of a military base when word had come to lower the flag to half-mast in memory of a president who had just passed away. The memory of that particular flag dropping halfway down the mast on a lonely island, in mourning for President Franklin D. Roosevelt will always remain with me as one of the most stirring or perhaps disturbing moments of my life. Now again I have witnessed a sight that I had hoped never to see again.

On both occasions my feelings and the feelings of those around me were the same. Prevalent as before were the fears of the consequences.

I think, however, that everyone should hold with the thought that this great country of ours once lost a president at one of the most crucial times in history, yet managed to overcome the loss and forge ahead. Admittedly these are crucial times, yet I have no fears but what we will overcome the loss of our nation's leader and continue to formulate a better world for all.

If anything can be said to have been gained by this national tragedy it might lie in the proof that Americans are able to rise above all ties, party, religious and other to share a common sorrow and pledge support to those who ask it in such a time of

I hope I never again live thru such solemn moments as yesterday and yesteryear when the lowering of our nation's flag has such dire meaning.

Over on the other side of the mountains in Medford I saw a well lighted sign that read: "INTE-GRATE PUT A COLOR T.V. IN YOUR HOME."

Back to the typewriter with a beautiful trip behind me. With a raging snow storm in Klamath Falls, and nothing to do but wait for blue skies tomorrow, I volunteered to do my good deed for the day and drive a woman across the mountains and then grab a commercial plane back.

It's been a long time since I made a mountain drive in a real genuine near blizzard and while all the other motorists cussed. I reveled in the challenge of the drive and the beauty of a winter wonderland.

O.K., so I'm nuts. See you next week.

So it's now next week and I'm back in the office once again. Since I wrote the above I have been back

to Parkland to pick up my number two and three sons and head for Denver to spend a pleasant Thanksgiving with my daughter, her husband and children. Yesterday, on the way home, I couldn't help thinking once again of you landlocked folks who

haven't experienced the complete freedom of owning an aircraft. We rolled out of the sack about 7:30 yesterday, had breakfast, packed up and drove completely across

Denver to the airport. Once there we loaded up and hopped across town to a near-by airport to have coffee and say goodbye to friends and at 10:45 I tossed the little guy into the back seat, climbed in the front with number two and headed for home.

The day was clear and the Rocky Mountains beautiful beyond description. What a flight. I only wish I could have shared it with each and every one of you.

We stopped in Burley, Idaho for lunch and to refuel and then headed on home, over the Blue Mountains and the Cascades, landing at Spanaway around five thirty last night.

A short drive home, supper for the kids and myself and then a review of all the papers I have missed and a couple of my favorite TV shows. All this in one short winter day, just because I earned
