## Survey Group Seeking Data On Past Clover Creek Floods

Mr. F. M. Veatch, District Engineer of the Geological Survey, has disclosed that the Survey is making studies of flood conditions along Clover Creek in Parkland. Hydraulic engineers of the Survey are preparing profiles of flood stages and maps of the area that has been flooded during several floods.

Collection of data has been done over a two-year period under a cooperative agreement with the Washington State Highway Department. During this period the Survey engineers have been measuring discharge, determining flood elevations at each bridge and drawing boundaries of districts inundated by flood waters in the study area which extends from Brookdale Golf Course to McChord Field.

The study also includes a program of contacting local residents for information about past floods. Mr. Veatch reported that they have obtained a meager amount of data on the flood of December 1933 which appears to be the highest known flood. They are trying to locate people who can furnish pictures of this flood or definite information regarding the level to which water came. Postmaster John McMonagle reported today that public demand for the 'PROJECT MERCURY' Commemorative stamp is rapidly exhausting the local supply. The Tacoma Post Office placed 300,000 astronaut stamps on sale within one hour of the completion of Tuesday's space flight. Twenty-four hours later, many postal stations were sold out completely and others had only partial sheets on sale. The numbered blocks, so cherished by collectors, are no longer available at the larger stations or the Main Office and philatelists searching for them are advised to contact smaller contract outlets.

"An additional supply of the popular stamp has been ordered and is expected to arrive in about one week," the Postmaster said.

## Let Me Tell One:

### The Dangers Of Driving

I met Sgt. Tom Precious of the State Patrol, today at our office. He came in to tell us that the Patrol is stepping up enforcement of the left turn laws on our highways.

Something that I wasn't aware of. The emphasis will be placed on the law that makes it illegal to cross the double yellow stripe in a left turn. The law states that left turns off a highway can only be made where there is a break in the yellow lines, usually at intersections.

Sgt. Precious told us something else, which came as something of a surprise to me, although it is most logical when applied to highway driving. It is illegal to stop, for any reason, in the traffic lane of a highway. Only where a left turn is legal can you stop in a traffic lane and then only for the purpose of clearing for your left turn.

The main reason for this step-up in enforcement of these traffic rules, the sergeant said, was the dramatic increase in the number of accidents caused by drivers making left

that the Seattle-Tacoma stretch of Highway 99 has such a bad reputation is this type of accident. Speeding drivers, most of them driving near the limit, can't always judge whether the car in front is stopping or proceeding until it is too late to stop safely.

A word to the wise should be sufficient, and all drivers should be aware enough of the hazards of normal driving these days without tempting fate by adding to the hazards with illegal maneuvers.

Something that I have thought a lot about during the years, and it is the practice in some states, all drivers should spend some time with a State Patrolman, an ambulance driver or a morgue attendant or in a hospital emergency receiving room. Many times seeing the results of traffic accidents will make us more aware of what we could get into by our own carelessness or negligence.

I know, I've been in most of those places and the number of people hurt and killed when they thought they were driving safely will surprise most people.

## Bethel Levies Explained By School Board

The two special levies which voters will decide at the Bethel School election Tuesday, March 13 are \$15,000 for 1962-63 Kindergarten operation and \$65,000 for 1962-63 general fund maintenance and operation.

The kindergarten levy is needed to make up the deficit in state appropriation cut by 1961 legislature. The operation levy, which has been passed annually for several years now, is needed to take care of the added expenses of 75 additional students, because the districts low assessed valuation ratio fails to bring in sufficient money by regular levies, and the desire to give a better quality education to Bethel children.

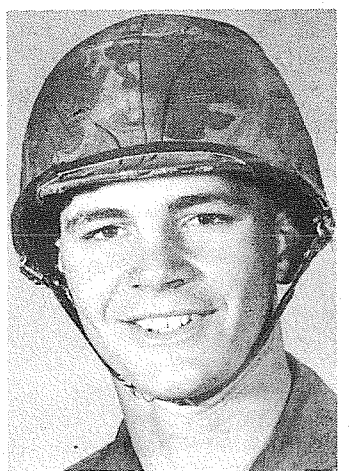
Use of the money would be allocated to meet teachers salaries, buy supplies, heat rooms, maintain and operate busses. It would also maintain present education level of a good pupil-teacher ratio by replacing retiring teachers and adding additional ones for increased enrollments purchase desks, textbooks, library materials and other supplies.

It would replace a 1947, 58 capacity bus with new economically operating equipment with greater capacity, and maintain late bus service for after school Senior and Junior High School activities.

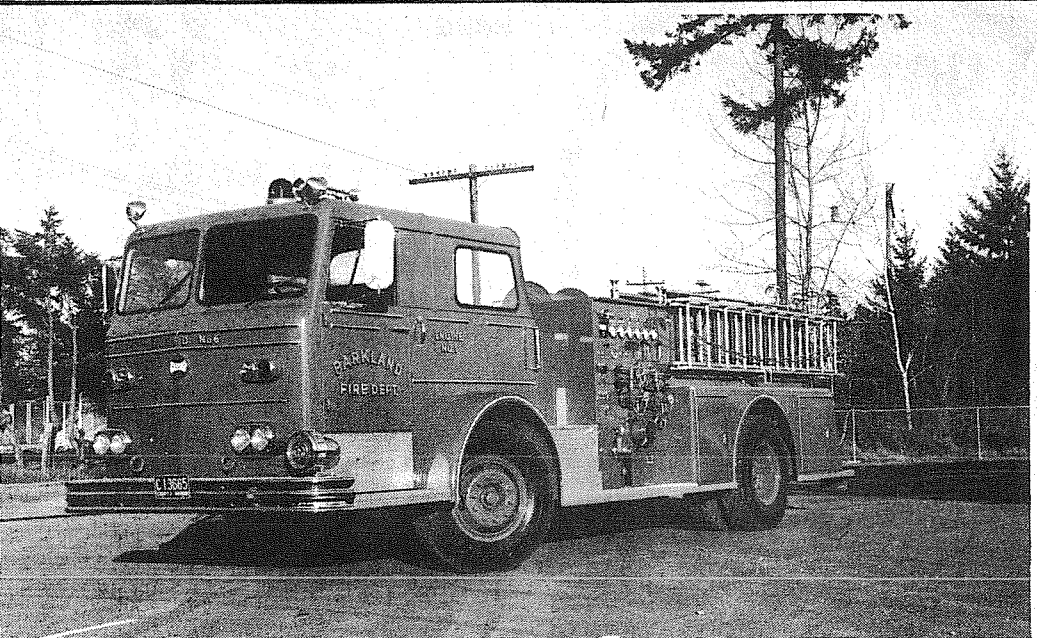
The levy would also carry on the districts program of buildings and grounds maintenance and improvements.

There would be no tax increase as a result of the passage of these measures, since the combined millage of 12 mills would be less than the 12.2 that will be paid for excess levies this year.

## Nearly Half Of Tax Forms Incomplete

The Internal Revenue Service District Director, Neal S. Warren, in Seattle, today advised that many unhappy taxpayers who are expecting a refund check from Uncle Sam will instead be receiving their tax returns back for completion.

Mr. Warren said that as high as 2 out of 5 returns received in Tacoma recently have had to be returned because of missing dependent exemption information or missing Schedules B.

The required dependent exemption information, Warren said, is to be shown in Schedule A on the reverse side of Form 1040. Apparently taxpayers are overlooking this because of its location, which is different from last year.

Neal Warren also added that a Schedule B is required to report income received from sources other than wages, such as bank interest, dividends, rents, etc., where the total amount of all such income is over \$200.00. This Schedule B, Warren said, is also new this year.

### Forest Industries Employ 68,000 In Washington

For 68,000 persons in the State of Washington, multiple use forest management is trees and jobs. These are the men and women directly employed by the state's forest industries.

The state's four million acres of Tree Farms, federally administered lands managed for sustained yellow harvest, and timber from other private and government agencies pump a whopping \$920 million yearly into the state's economic blood stream. Wages alone account for \$357 million.

According to R. L. DeLong, chairman of the Washington Committee of American Forest Products Industries Inc., forestry education arm of the nation's forest industries, privately owned tax paying timberlands in the state are a prime contributor to the permanence of the forest industries in Washington.

"More than half the privately owned timberlands in the state are currently being managed as Tree Farms," according to DeLong.

"Tree Farming is an economic reality. Thousands of additional landowners should take advantage of the help offered by the two technical forestry associations responsible for administering the Tree Farm Program in the state."

Washington forests are currently growing more timber than is being harvested or lost to insects, diseases, or fire.

However, according to DeLong, the new markets being opened up for lumber, plywood, veneer, pulp and paper by the expanding population, will require the highest standards of good forest management on all available forest areas.

"This certainly doesn't mean any reduction in recreation facilities, watershed protection, grazing areas, or living space for wildlife," says DeLong.

"Tree farming, by its very nature, encourages highest quality water. Scientific harvesting of mature timber exposes additional acres to forage for wildlife. Road networks engineers to transport logs, to the state's manufacturing plants remain after logging to serve as fire access roads.

"Periodically, after harvest, professional foresters check an area to see that it is re-seeding properly, to make sure no

disease or insect epidemics occur. This is not possible in those areas which are maintained as single-use reserves." According to DeLong, millions of board feet are destroyed annually by insects and disease.

Infestations that could have been controlled, and millions of dollars in timber values saved through proper management.

"The forest industries," concludes DeLong, "are an important link in the life-line of Washington's economy."

"Fullest possible development of this state's most valuable renewable resources should be the goal of all landowners who have the responsibility of managing and protecting potential Tree Farm acres."

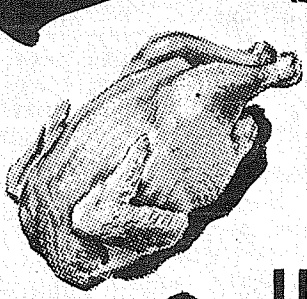
