

### In Pre-Flight At Pensacola

(FHTNC)—Naval Aviation Cadet Elmer L. Huston, son of Chester L. Huston, of 166th and Lakeside Dr., Spanaway, Wash., is attending the Naval School of Pre-Flight at the Naval Air Station, Pensacola, Fla.

The 16-week course, which began on August 13, covers the basic pre-flight instruction and officer indoctrination subjects. Upon completion of the course, they will enter basic flight training at the Sauffley Field Naval Auxiliary Air Station, also at Pensacola.

The flight training program leads to officer status as an aviator qualified to wear the "Wings of Gold."

### Added Power Equipment For Parkland

Installation of \$10,000 additional power equipment for Parkland's growing electrical needs was approved unanimously by Tacoma's Public Utility Board Wednesday.

Tacoma City Light will install and maintain the power facilities at the Sales Street Substation, South L and 112th Streets, and furnish power while the work is being completed from a mobile substation. Parkland Light and Water will reimburse City Light for the substitution equipment, less credit of \$1,000 a year for each year the mutual purchases its entire supply of electrical power and energy from them.

### Dr. H. S. Adams Rejoins PLU

Dr. Harry S. Adams, member of the Pacific Lutheran University faculty from 1947 to 1951, is returning to PLU this fall semester as associate professor of physics, it was announced today.

Dr. Adams received his bachelor of science (1945) and master of science (1947) degrees from Kansas State University. This year he was granted a doctor of philosophy degree by the University of Minnesota.

After leaving PLU in 1951, he did graduate work at Minnesota and then for three years was engaged at the University's Rosemount (Minn.) Research Center in the department of aeronautical engineering.

### Corvallis Man Biology Teacher

Roger K. Guilford of Corvallis, Oregon has been appointed to the Pacific Lutheran University faculty as an instructor in biology, it was announced today by Dr. Robert Mortvedt, PLU president.

Guilford has bachelor of science and master of education degrees from the University of California. This month he is completing work for a master of science degree in plant pathology at Oregon State University.

At OSU Guilford has been doing research on the evaluation of an electrolytic cell as a source of agriculture spray. His thesis problem is concerned with the potential use of silver in plant disease control.

### Evening School Registration

Registration for courses in the Franklin Pierce District's evening and extended education programs will be held September 17, at Franklin Pierce High School at 7 p.m. First class sessions are scheduled for September 24 at 7 p.m.

Classes will be scheduled to meet for 1, 2 or 3 hours depending on enrollment for each class.

Some of the popular courses to be offered are sewing (beginning Bishop method, and advanced) typing, bookkeeping, business machines, upholstery and driving.

All classes will convene on Mondays at the high school.

Hudson, announced that Ray Sabin, New York Life Insurance Co.; Gordon Satterthwaite of The Bank of California, N. Sabin and Satterthwaite will be co-chairmen of the education section and Lemley will head up government. First duties of the new campaign leaders will be to enroll unit chairmen, Sprinker said.



### Hats In The Ring

Here in the Parkland area we have always been well-pleased with the services of our Justice of the Peace Delbert Bresemann. We have demonstrated our confidence and trust in Bresemann by electing and re-electing him for almost a quarter of a century. That sounds like a long time, but Delbert is only 48 years old now. We started him early, making him the youngest man ever to serve as a JP in the state of Washington.

Delbert Bresemann now has the opportunity to step into a wider area of public service, and the campaign he is conducting for election as Justice of the Peace in District 3 has been most revealing. Our only regret is that some of his documented facts were not presented to the taxpaying public years ago. Certainly they indicate that the old JP system needed a complete revision, for how else could one account for the record of Bresemann's opponent, Willard Hedlund?

As a Justice of the Peace since 1956, Hedlund has been receiving a salary of \$6,500 a year. The budget to operate his office is slightly over \$10,000 per year. A JP court is at least supposed to be self-sustaining. With the exception of Hedlund's court, all of the JP's process enough cases to more than pay their way.

In 6 1/2 years, Hedlund's court operations have cost the taxpayers \$65,000, and he has returned to the county in all that time a total of \$3,760! In 1960, for example, he turned over to the county a total of \$916.00. During that same year, Bresemann returned \$47,176.00. In 1960, Bresemann tried 1,560 cases, Hedlund 65. In 1961, the hard-working JP's in the county (such as Stone, Shackleford and Bresemann) tried an average of 5000 cases each. During that same year, Hedlund tried 48.

The comparative figures, taken directly from the State Auditor's Examination Report Files, indicate this same incredible difference, year after year, between Hedlund's operations and those of the other JP's. The figures indicate that the other courts have been forced to assume the extra burdens imposed upon them because Hedlund was not bearing his fair share of the work load. Despite the fact that Hedlund's inactivity and empty

### Dino Batali

Dino Batali, Democratic candidate for state representative in the 29th legislative district today issued the following statement on behalf of his candidacy:

"Our district is entitled to better representation than we have received from the present incumbents.

"My one campaign promise is this. If I am elected, I will communicate with the voters in my district. I will keep you constantly aware of how I voted on important issues. And why I voted as I did.

"I do not believe an elected representative should forget his constituents once he is elected. I do feel that he should be in continuous touch with his voters to determine their feelings on the important issues which face the State Legislature.

"There is the need for responsible government based on majority desires. My own convictions and principles will govern my conduct as your representative. No pressure group will influence me.

"I can't honestly offer simple cure-alls to complex questions. I don't have any easy formulas for solving complex governmental processes. But I do promise to study all problems thoroughly. Make decisions firmly. And take action vigorously.

"I promise you this. I won't let you down."

"What am I for? This: a junior college in my district; the Natches Tunnel; more parks and improved recreational facilities; a sensible, decent medical-care plan; modernization of our Unemployment Compensation Program; tougher crackdowns on drunken drivers causing fatal accidents, the Attorney General's recommendation to increase the minimum driving age to 18, above

### Jack Berry

Jack Berry, Republican candidate for Pierce County Sheriff, this week issued the following statement in behalf of his candidacy:

"Your sheriff must be a professional lawman, trained to recognize threats in the most effective manner.

"I believe that I best meet those qualifications. My 11 years as a deputy sheriff of Pierce County, appointed by former Sheriff Harold Bird, plus my training as a graduate of an FBI course and the knowledge I gained as former president of the Washington State Deputy Sheriffs' Assn. (during which time I led a campaign that ultimately resulted in the placing of sheriff's officers under civil service), and many other factors give me a solid background of law enforcement training and knowledge.

"Pierce County will be a clean county, which I will supervise with integrity and impartiality. Strict enforcement will prevent the attempts of gamblers and other vice lords to gain a foothold in our county.

"I already have proposed the outline of a realistic program to (1) guide our young people through the critical, formative years; (2) make our highways and lakes safer for our citizens; (3) provide all areas of the county with the police protection your tax dollars entitle you to; and (4) return our county to its proper status as the clean, progressive community it was under Harold Bird. These must be tackled now—ignoring them won't make them disappear."

Berry, 41, was born and raised in Tacoma. He is a Marine Corps veteran of World War II, the father of four children and is active in Central Lutheran Church, Tacoma.



### Improve Your Parks

Ancient, unsightly out-houses or sparkling, clean new restrooms at Spanaway Park.

That is one of the choices facing voters Tuesday in the special County Park millage election.

The special millage will raise a million dollars. Of that, \$300,000 will be spent to renovate Spanaway Park. The fact that work and a lot of it is needed at Spanaway is not news to the many thousands who visited the park this year. Some of the toilets are delapidated relics of WPA days. They are not built to carry the load of people who visit the park each year.

Last summer, 350,000 visits were made to the park and the number of visits increases each year.

Other work scheduled at Spanaway with the \$300,000.00 includes fixing roads and improving beaches; improvements on water systems; and work on bathhouses. Athletic facilities in the Bethel-Franklin Pierce-Pacific Lutheran University area will also be improved.

This means the average home owner will pay a small sum somewhere between \$8.00 and \$12.00. Yet this average of about \$10.00 will literally bring a million dollars worth of improvements and acquisition of new land for our county parks.


The acquisition of new land is one of the big emergencies of our civilization. Population is expanding, and every day, the number of people using the parks already in existence increases. Adding to this pressure is the fact that everyday more and more land once open to the public decreases.

Pierce County is not alone in this problem. It is urgent in this part of the country, but be still have time compared to the eastern part of the United States. Visitors from that area see what we have out here and tell us to act now, to buy the land for public use before it is too late. They urge us not to wait too long as Lutheran University area they did there.

For these reasons, the Pierce County Commissioners set up the special millage election. If approved, the improvements will be for us, but also for our children and their children.

The special millage is not a bond issue. It is for one year only and will be for approximately 3.5 mills.

**Toomey Ends Helicopter Class At Texas Base**

**Grangers State Views On Initiative 211**

Initiative 211 means a constitutional amendment, Nelson said, to provide both population and area representation for the state. This amendment will be submitted to the 1963 Legislature, he added. It provides for an increase in House seats from 99 to 107.

"At present there are eight counties without direct representation in the Legislature," Nelson said. "These eight counties are normally out-voted by counties of larger population in the same legislative districts," he explained. "The counties are San Juan, Asotin, Ferry, Adams, Skamania, Island, Wahkiakum and Jefferson. They do not have anyone appearing for them directly in either house of the legislature."

Although the state constitution provided for at least one representative and senator from each of the existing 34 counties, Nelson said, an initiative redistricting measure adopted in 1930 created new legislative districts combining two or more counties into single legislative districts with two representatives each.

**Thompson On USS Hunley**



**Janovich Statement**

"I have written a list of vitally needed improvements -- too extensive to enumerate here -- that can be put into effect without additional tax dollars. Each of the improvements on this list shall be posted in the coroner's office, to become major factors in the conduct of the office when I am elected. "Prominent on that list will be my determination to cooperate fully with all law enforcement agencies, hospitals, social and welfare agencies and clergymen of all faiths for greater efficiency with economy. My staff will be selected on the basis of professional merit -- not political expediency."




