Costs Incomplete

A controversy between a few residents on whether the South Suburban Sewer District, SSSD, or Pierce County should install sewer facilities in the Parkland area, has been generated by recent mail and phone campaigns.

Members of the Pierce County Improvement Association have sent out a "yellow paper" explaining why they want to dissolve the South Suburban District.

This paper states: "The county engineer, K.C. Jones, stated, "It appears the trunk line and the treatment facilities in the Clover Creek drainage area can be built for less than \$300 an acre. The average property owner with a normal house and lot probably would pay \$100."

But County Engineer K.C. Jones in a recent interview admitted "he heard he had said that," but added "The trunk lines and treatment plant would cost somewhere in the neighborhood of \$400 an acre, and with a federal grant it would bring it to around \$300."

The paper continues: "The South Suburban Sewer District states that, if, (underlined) they get a government assistance grant, the cost to the people in the district for the same thing would be \$1,677,100.00, which breaks down to \$1,768 per acre, or an average of \$707 per home. You can more than double this if the grant is refused." The one-sheet pamphlet goes on to say: "These figures do not include the front footage costs for the local sewer lines, which must also be assumed by the property owner. These have been estimated at \$7 per front foot, plus hook-up costs, etc..."

However, Harry Sprinker, Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, told the Times Journal, "The figures that have been quoted by so many people, and attributed to K.C. Jones, county engineer, only take in the trunk line and disposal plant. NO LATERALS OR HOOK-UPS. The South Suburban plan DOES include the complete costs."

"We, (the county), have no figures as to the cost of the sewer system, because we have not yet had a study made, and cannot until we receive approval on a grant application for federal funds. The cost figures, when the study is made, will include laterals, hook-ups, trunk line and disposal plant. We do not know what they will be," Sprinker added. Jones, when asked about his quoted price, said: "In most sewer systems the trunk line and disposal plant would run somewhere between 20 to 30 per cent of the total cost." He added that the total costs, percentage wise, depend upon the number of laterals that are laid. The more laterals that are laid, the lower the percentage of the total costs for the trunk line and disposal plant.

Also stated in the "yellow paper" is: "If sewers are so vital to Parkland, think how important it is that Lakewood, University Place, Spanaway and Midland also be included in an over-all plan that can be accomplished more economically for everyone."

A meeting was held Tuesday afternoon and 20 sewer planning leaders representing Parkland, University Place Sewer District, Lakewood and Westside Water Districts, county and state health, pollution control and planning agencies and the City of Tacoma were in attendance.

A desire for all the agencies to work together to provide county sewers as quickly as possible was repeatedly expressed at the meeting.

One of the reasons for the conference, called by the Washington State Pollution Control Commission, was to acquaint agencies with work being done in other areas.

At the meeting representatives of the SSSD outlined plans for a sewer interceptor line through Lakewood, constructed by the SSSD. The planned interceptor line would take Parkland sewage to the Steilacoom treatment plant.

## 1967 Roundup Draws Crowds

Crowds turned out in record numbers to watch the 17th Annual Parkland Roundup Parade and Rodeo, Business Club officials stated Monday.

An estimated 5000 persons lined Pacific Avenue from South 96th to South 138th St. to view the parade, termed one of the most successful ever, according to Roundup Co-Chairman Bob Magdanz.

Nearly 2700 adults and children paid more than \$2,200 at the rodeo grounds gates, and after the many expenses were paid, the amount to be earmarked for improving

Gonyea Playfield might double last year's donation, Business Club treasurer Bob Ketterer told the Journal. The 1966 Roundup netted approximately \$400 for the county playfield.

During Sunday's rodeo, the spirit of the festivities was dampened when veteran cowboy Sherdy G. Wharton, Rochester, was hospitalized after being thrown from the bull "Soft Seat". The massive Brahma-Angus mix animal managed to upset Wharton during a spin, and as he was falling, the two collided head-on.

Rodeo Clown John Erwin

managed to distract the animal and saved Wharton from further injuries. The injured cowboy was taken to Lakewood General Hospital by Lakewood-Pacific Ambulance where he was admitted with head injuries. He is expected to be hospitalized for several days.

Highlights of the parade included numerous riding groups, a float displaying a tepee with Indians and wild west cowboys from the Elmhurst PTA Cub Scouts, and a float of innovative design depicting the advantages of underground wiring sponsored by Parkland Light and Wa-

ter.

State Representative Ted Bottiger saddled up and rode the entire parade route, as did Sheriff Jack Berry. Bottiger was grand marshal of the parade.

Also among the parade entries were fire fighting equipment from Parkland and Spanaway Fire Districts, two truck mounted bands, Spanaway Lion's caped pony, a display of antique cars, and a number of hydroplane race boats. The Pierce County Sheriff's Posse carried the colors.

## Fallout Protection Survey To Be Conducted Here

One of the minor annoyances of this modern electronic computer age is the questionnaire. At times, we fear, it isn't so minor. Everybody wants information, and we are besieged by telephone calls, mail and people knocking at our doors, trying to get it.

During the next two weeks there will be a door-to-door census in our area to find out what protection area residents have against fallout.

It is recommended, by Civil Defense that all citizens cooperate to the fullest extent with the Bureau of the Census in helping to make this survey as complete as possible. Its object is to save your life in the event of a nuclear attack.

The information gleaned from the questionnaire, will be analyzed and the results reported back to the residents of the home. He will then be informed how much protection against fallout radiation he can expect in the safest part of the home. He will even be

shown how he can increase his protection.

The amount of protection is represented by a number called a "Protection Factor" or "PF". The number represents the amount of fallout radiation received by a person in a sheltered area compared to the amount received by a completely unprotected person. For example, a person in a basement corner with a PF 40 would receive only about one-fortieth as much radiation as he would receive if he were completely unprotected. The higher the PF number, the more protection against fallout.

In addition to the two Protection Factors for the basement, the computer calculates the amount of material (by weight per square foot) that may be added above the best corner to bring its PF up to 40, if it is below.

This figure is printed under the heading "Added Weight,"

An open letter, to the residents of the Parkland area, also was distributed. It claimed "taxation without representation."

According to officials of the SSSD: "In the January 26, 1966, issue of the Pierce County Herald & Times Journal, the commissioners of the SSSD announced they would receive petitions for annexation from nearby areas that desire sewer service."

The article went on to say: "The commissioners elected were necessarily residents of the area included in the sewer district at that time. When the district is expanded, steps will be taken to provide representation for the new areas on the Board of Commissioners."

When Parkland was first annexed into the SSSD Arthur Swindland, a resident of Parkland for 51 years and former manager of the National Bank of Washington, Parkland Branch, was named to the Board of Commissioners.

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** The following section of DO YOU KNOW'S taken from the "yellow paper" have been replied to by Clayton Peterson, president of SSSD, so that both sides of the issue would be presented to the readers.

**"Do You Know --** That a "legal" sewer district has been formed in this area, and there IS no sewer?" Peterson replies: "ALL projects must have organization beforehand."

**"Do You Know --** That all those voting were members of the faculty of Pacific Lutheran University, a tax exempt institution?" Peterson replies: "Under the county facilities law, no vote is given to the citizens for the approval of sewage disposal plants, and we, the university, are taxable. We pay sales tax and real estate taxes on the golf course, but normal taxes are not used for sewers, the cost of construction of sewers is born by assessments and revenue bonds."

**"Do You Know --** That a sewer system alone will not eliminate pollution of our waters and streams? Hazards of epidemics will still remain." Peterson replies: "The pollution of the waters and streams and hazards of epidemics is admitted to exist by the "white paper". Of course the sewers won't eliminate them, but are one of the principal causes of soil pollution."

**"Do You Know --** That "Water Over Roadway" signs will still be posted?" Peterson replies: "These signs are for the problem of drainage,

not sewerage."

And "Do You Know -- That the foot of water beneath your home and the "swimming pool" in your yard will still be there?" Peterson replies: "Any sewer put in only takes care of problems from that day on, not from that day before."

According to Peterson the SSSD has developed their own engineering plan in conjunction with the Harstad Associates, who are experienced in the design and construction of sewers. "The plan also includes a repayment program which has been prepared in consultation with McLean Assc., who are investment counselors, not only for SSSD, but for the City of Tacoma, Pierce County and many other governmental units in the state."

along with the two Protection Factors on the label which is affixed to the Civil Defense booklet, "Fallout Protection For Homes With Basements."

If the basement does not provide enough protection as it stands, the householder can learn from the booklet the most economical measures he can take to increase the radiation shielding of the basement, if he desires.

Area homes without basements usually do not provide much fallout protection, according to the Civil Defense. Occupants of these homes are sent a Civil Defense booklet, "Personal and Family Survival," with general information on fallout protection, and are advised to go to the nearest public shelter in an emergency. The booklet also illustrates the use of "improvised" shelter if no other shelter is available.

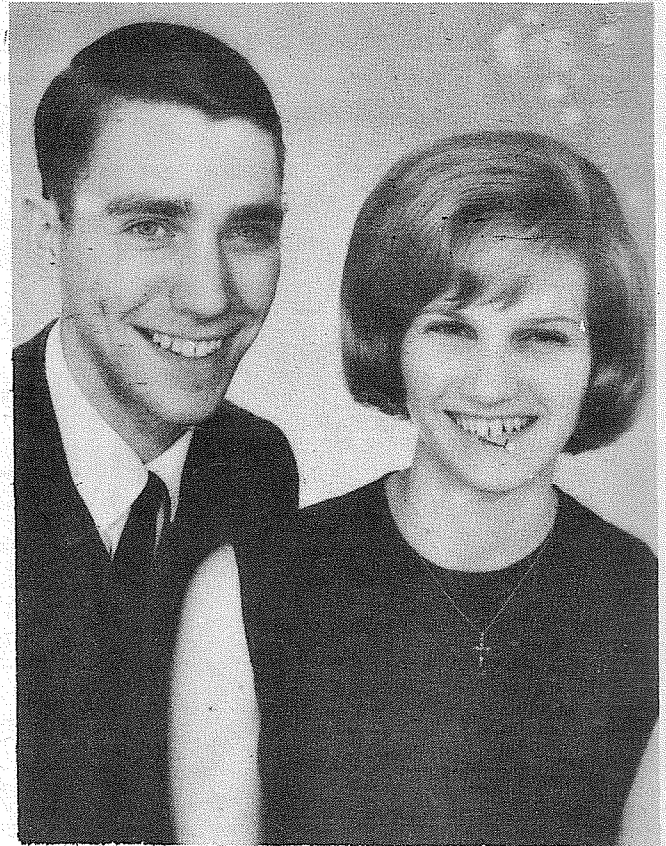
Barrel racing, pole bending, bareback relay racing, chariot races, keyhole competition, music sack race and other jackpot events will follow the breakfast.

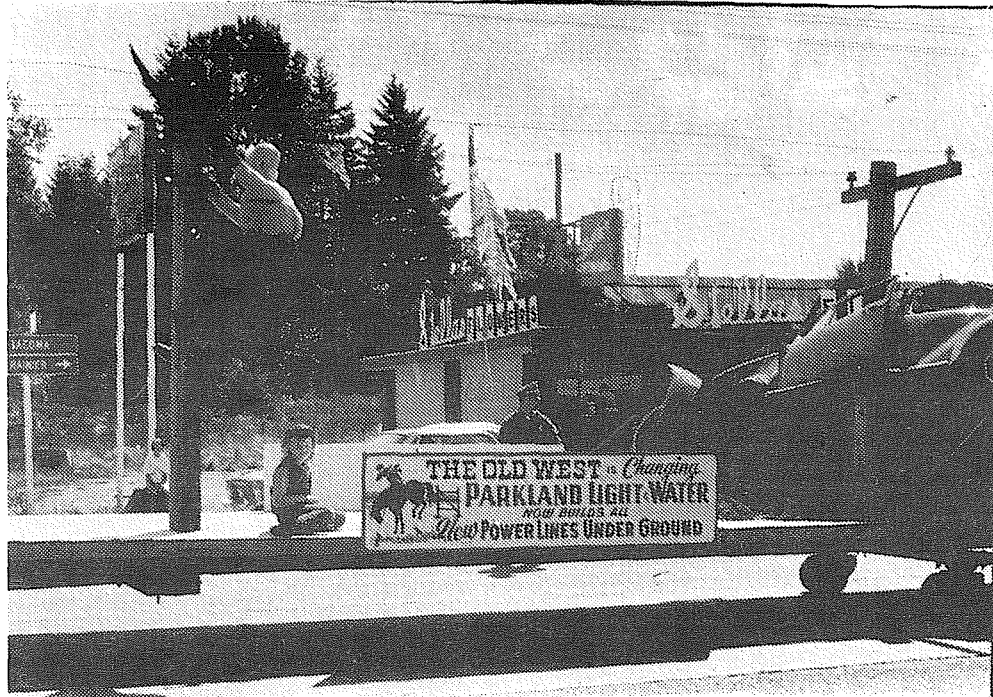

## School--- Health Exam Is Important

School days are almost here again for millions of American youngsters.

With the approach of the fall term, the American Medical Association reminds parents once again that there are health and safety considerations that are important in preparing the small fry for another nine months of studies.

The A.M.A. recommends a thorough health examination for 5- and 6-year-olds who are starting school for the first time. Your phy-



sician will know what to do. His examination will cover all aspects of your child's health, and will encompass hearing (to make certain he can hear the teacher) and vision (to make sure he can see the blackboard). It is better if this examination can be made, and booster immunization given, a few weeks before school starts.

School boards in some communities require a health exam for beginning students. Many schools also require certain immunizations against infectious disease. Your doctor will know of the requirements in your neighborhood.

Most doctors feel that four or five thorough examinations during the school years are sufficient for

healthy youngsters. These usually are spaced at the start of the first school year, about the fourth grade, about the seventh grade, at the ninth or tenth grade, and upon graduation. And, of course, if any untoward symptoms arise at any time, a visit to the doctor is in order. A thorough examination also is important if the child is participating in school athletics. The doctor should be told that junior is going out for football, so that he can look for any health problems that might be heightened by rough, contact sports.

In the excitement of the first few days of school, the smaller child may forget all of the safety warnings you've been teaching him. Each parent should make sure the child knows how to cross streets and intersections en route to and from school. He should know that crossing guards are there for his protection, and obey them. He should know about proper deportment on the school bus. He should know the rules of bicycle safety.

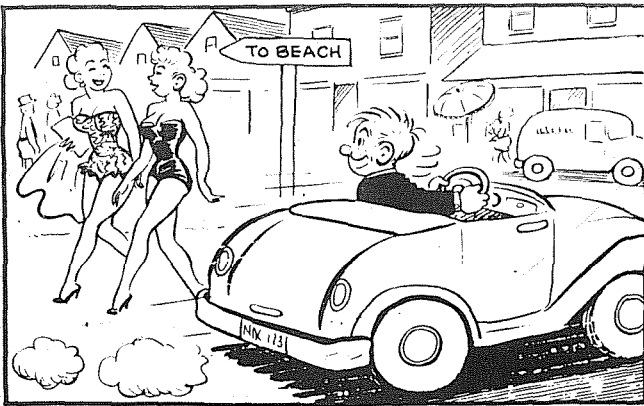

A first step toward bigger woodland profits is to telephone TH 5-9464 and make an appointment with Farm Forester Steve Harvey of the State Department of Natural Resources. Harvey, a professional forester, is available at no fee to make individual visits with landowners on their properties and give competent forest management advice. His office is at 506 River Road, Puyallup.

Farm forester Harvey can give landowners information on timber values, partial harvests and improvement cuttings, timber sale methods, Christmas tree culture, and many other forestry topics.

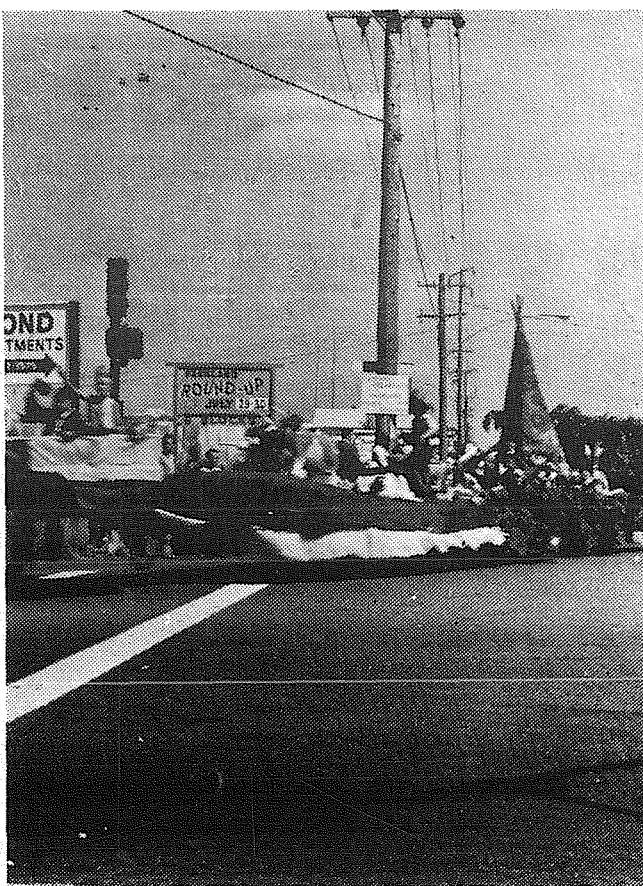

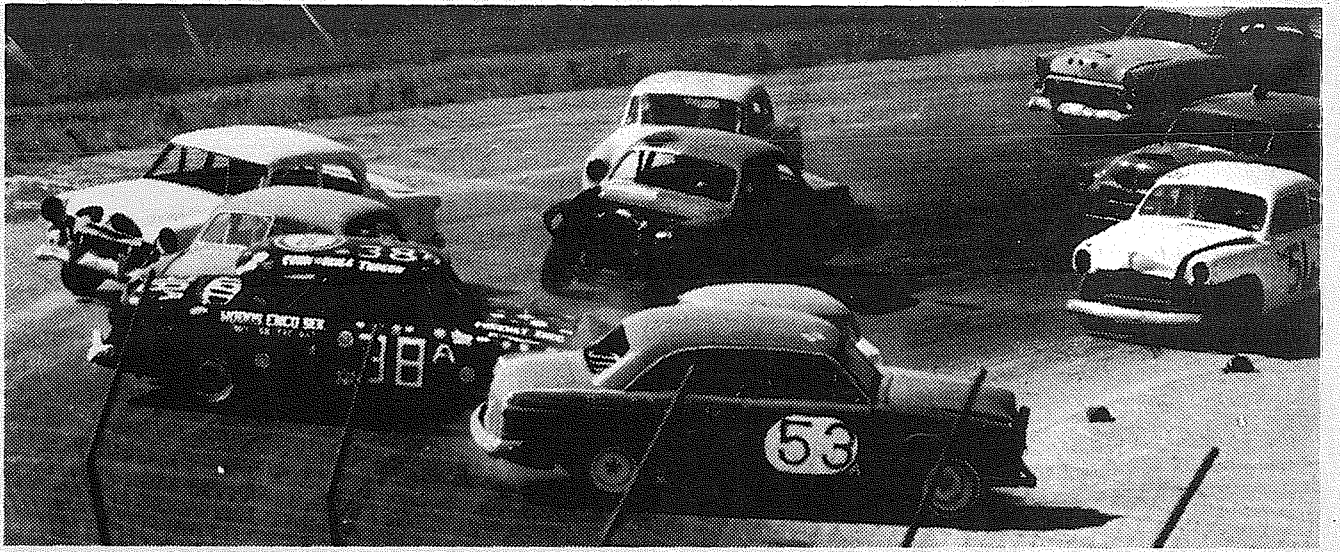
