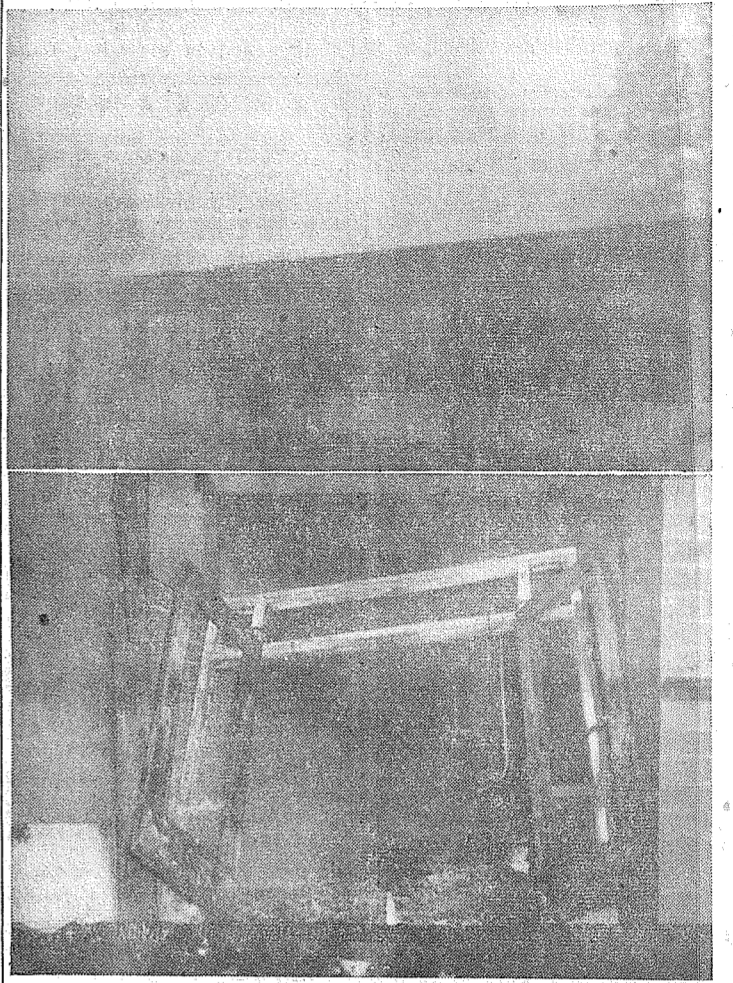

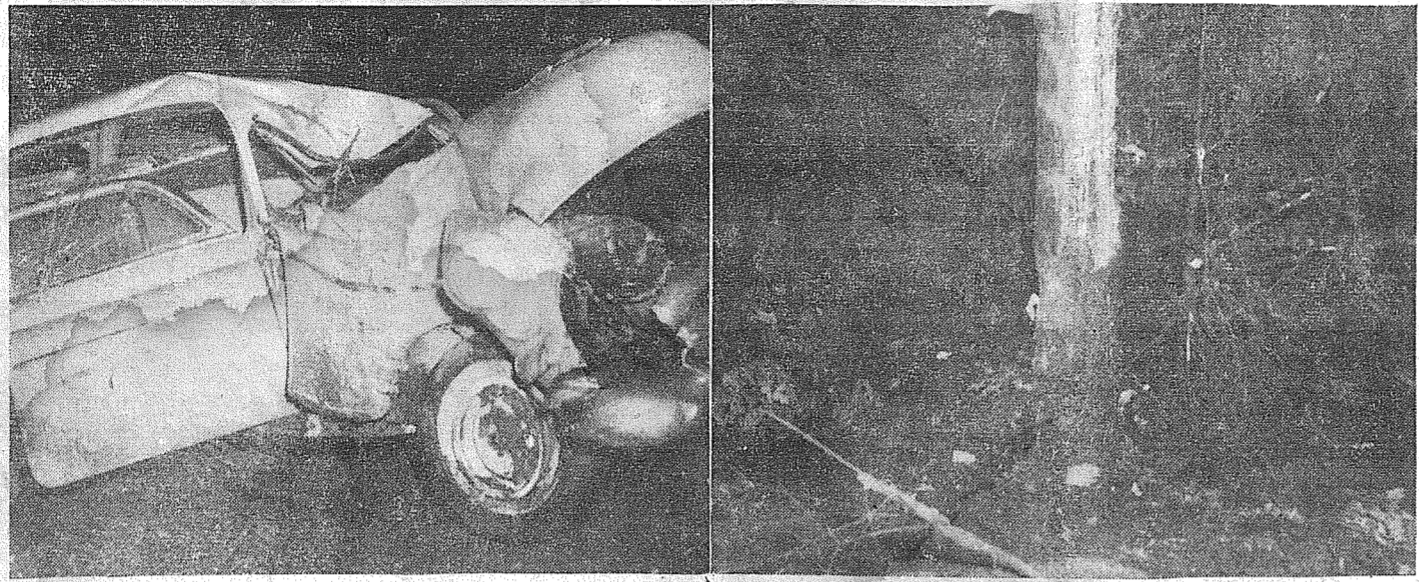
Shortly before 5:30 Tuesday an electric heater used in the morning a passerby reported a room during the night might possibly have shorted, thus causing Meridian Ave. So. She immediately notified the Summit Fire Department. Chief Ash Butler rushed to the scene and, after surveying the situation, called all five Summit trucks plus six men from Puyallup. A Midland Fire truck was dispatched to cover the Summit station.

#### New Wing Destroyed

The \$350,000 northwest wing of the Firgrove School had burned down. The blaze had started in a storeroom used for work tables and storage cabinets. Chief Butler told the Times Journal that

### It's the LAW

**A MINOR ACCIDENT**

Mr. A was involved in a minor accident one morning while driving to work. The left corner of his front bumper ticked the right fender of a car driven by Mr. B.

Since the traffic was heavy and he considered it dangerous to stop at that spot, Mr. A drove on for a block and a half and pulled up to the curb in a parking place. He inspected his bumper and found no damage done, though a little paint from the other car was on the bumper.

Mr. B stopped at the accident scene and wrote down the license number of Mr. A's car.

When Mr. A started to drive on after inspecting his car's bumper, his wife said, "Hadn't you better go back and get the name of the driver of that other car? I think you have to make an accident report."

"That's the trouble with a woman," Mr. A retorted. "Always worrying about nothing. It's just a minor accident. You don't have to make any report for a little thing like that."

Do you think Mr. A is right in believing it isn't necessary to report such minor accidents? Mr. A is wrong, as he found out later. Mr. B reported the accident to the police and gave them Mr.

A's license number. The next day the police checked his car and found paint from Mr. B's car on the front bumper.

Mr. A was arrested and charged with hit-run driving for failing to stop and give information at the scene of the accident. Since the damage to the other car's fender would cost more than \$25 to repair, Mr. A also was charged with failing to file an accident report within 24 hours. If convicted on the hit-run charge, he will have his driver's license revoked for at least a year, and may be fined a maximum of \$500 and sentenced to a maximum of one year in jail.

community since it affected not only the Firgrove school but also LeVage Construction Co., a Parkland outfit owned and operated by Del LeVage and Gail Owen. Known for constructing many of the businesses in Parkland, LeVage reported an estimated loss of \$150,000 of the \$200,000 they had in the wing. Chief

Butler, after completing his examination of the premises Tuesday afternoon, estimated the total loss at from \$175,000 to \$200,000.

**Immediately**

LeVage Construction announced that they would begin reconstruction of the wing immediately, and expect to be done in four to six months. The initial construction took eight months; but since the foundation is laid, the next effort should be cut almost in half.

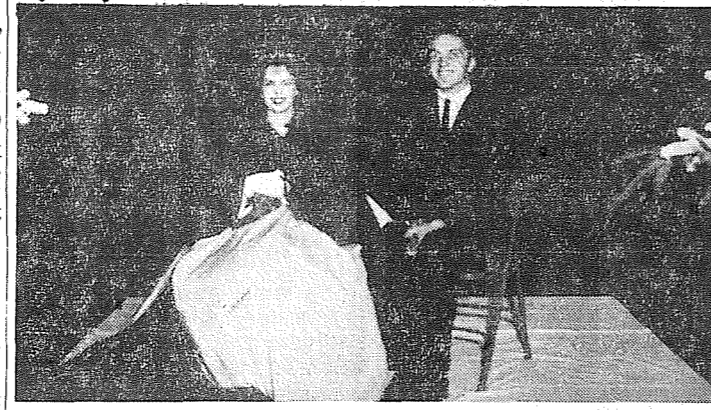
If you're looking for something to do next Tuesday, or any Tuesday between now and May, go out to the Lakewood Ice Arena and find out what we're talking about.

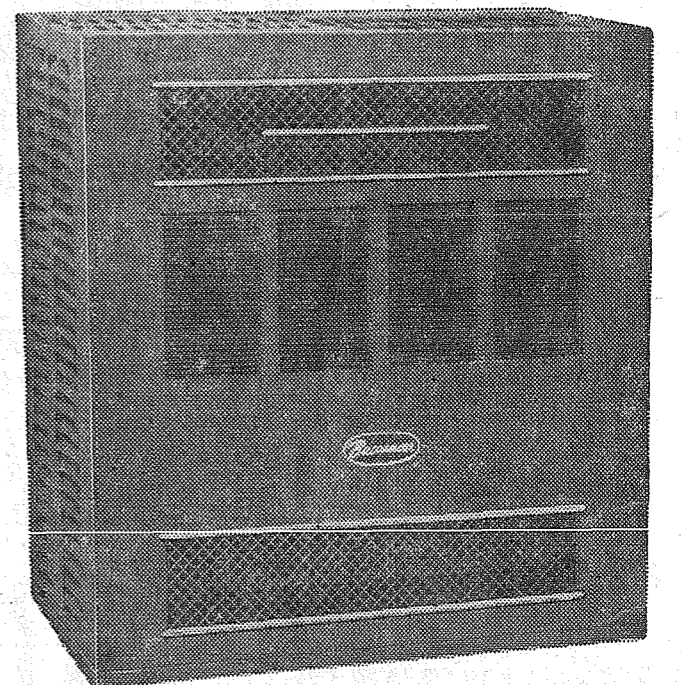

### It's the LAW

In business, the backbone of buying and selling is checks. Every day thousands of checks are written, cashed, endorsed and used in the payment of bills, personal and corporate, large and small.

Consequently, the law seeks to protect the commercial world by punishing those who deliberately abuse the use of checks. One of the most serious crimes is that of forgery.

Almost everyone knows that it is forgery to sign another's name to a check and cash it without such person's permission, but the crime of forgery can be committed in a variety of additional ways. It is forgery for a third person to increase the amount of a check after the maker has written it, or to make any material alteration of it with intent to defraud.

Forgery even can be committed by a person without writing anything on a check. Thus, one who cashes a check knowing it has been forged is guilty of forgery. One who, with intent to defraud, erases a restrictive endorsement, such as "For Deposit Only," or one who has in his possession with intent to cash, a check which he knows is forged, is likewise guilty of forgery.

The maximum penalty for forgery is imprisonment in the penitentiary for not more than 20 years.

In England for several centuries a man who could not pay his debts could be imprisoned by his creditors in the debtors' gaol (jail), where the debtor might be kept until death if no one would pay his debt.

In this country, until about a century ago, the same practice was allowed. But, the constitution of the State of Washington provided that a man could not be imprisoned for his debts, so debtors' jails never have been known here.

Walter relied on that constitutional provision when he was ordered by the court to pay about \$500 in debts when his wife, Mary, divorced him.

Walter had the money to pay the debts owed by himself and his ex-wife, but he refused to pay them, saying, "I don't care what the judge says. I know my rights. I can't be put in jail for not paying bills!"

Do you think Walter is right? Can he be jailed for refusing to pay the bills?

The answer is that Walter is wrong. Under the constitution a man cannot be jailed for failing or refusing to pay his ordinary debts. But when ordered in a divorce proceeding to pay the debts of the married couple, a man must do so or face jail.

When the creditors began to try to collect the debts from Mary, which they had a right to do, she had Walter arrested for contempt of court. He found out, in jail, that to obey the court's order, even though the order required him to pay some of his debts.

A week later Joe and Mary were walking down the street when Mary saw Harry. She pointed him out to Joe, who grabbed him and held him while Mary called the police.

Harry was charged with petty larceny. A jury found Harry not guilty, however, since some of the

jurors thought Mary might have been mistaken in identifying him.

Harry then sued Joe and Mary for false arrest. Do you think Harry has a chance to collect damages for his arrest?

Under these facts, Harry might win his lawsuit.

A private citizen may arrest another person when a felony has been committed and he has reasonable grounds for believing that the person arrested is the guilty party. A private person may also make an arrest to stop a breach of the peace committed to his presence. However, a private citizen is not authorized to make an arrest for a misdemeanor, even if committed in his presence, unless the misdemeanor is also a breach of the peace.

A breach of the peace is conduct which disturbs public peace and order, such as riots, fights and anything which may provoke outbreaks of public disorder. Petty larceny is not a breach of the peace.

Joe and Mary should have had a police officer arrest Harry when they saw him and recognized him as the man who had stolen their son's tricycle. They did not have authority to arrest him themselves.

If Joe had seen Harry stealing the tricycle, Joe could have used reasonable force to keep Harry from taking it, but could not have made a legal citizen's arrest. If Harry had stolen property worth more than \$75, his offense would have been grand larceny, a felony, and Joe would have been able to make a legal citizen's arrest.

### County Agent's Corner

Forage Testing Can Pay Off For You

The chemical analysis of a sample of hay or silage will unlock many hidden secrets and help show the feeding value of dairy cattle rations.

By knowing the amount of protein and total energy in the hay or silage fed, a dairyman can more economically balance the daily diet of the cow with other feeds. The daily nutritive requirements of the dairy cow must be met for most economical production.

A producing dairy cow needs feed each day for both body maintenance and production of milk, protein and carbohydrates. To either underfeed or overfeed may be wasteful. The fact that cows are being fed and may be consuming large amounts of roughages and other feeds is not assurance that they are receiving all the protein and energy they need. This situation can occur because of high moisture content, low protein content, low energy content, or high fiber content.

All dairy cattle roughage producers in the state of Washington can have their forages analyzed by the WSU Forage Testing Program. The cost of testing is small compared to the savings that can be made through the overall feeding and management program.

Information on how to have your forage tested can be obtained at the county Extension office.
