

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A Threat To Storm Damaged Timber

by David Klemperer Storm-damaged and windthrown timber will provide ideal breeding grounds for the Douglas-fir beetle. The only sure way of preventing a Douglas-fir beetle attack is to remove such timber as

soon as possible, warns County Agent David Klemperer. Preliminary estimates of timber downed by the October storm is 1,113,000 board

feet in western Washington. The Douglas-fir beetle is the most important bark beetle enemy of Douglas fir and builds up in outbreak numbers in fallen and damaged trees. Serious epidemics have occurred under conditions which occur following a severe storm, explains D. H. Brannon, WSU extension ent-

omology specialist. beetle can multiply to tremendous numbers which then spread to healthy trees, thus providing a serious threat to

timber stands. In attacking a tree, the beetles bore directly through the bark to the wood surface and then excavate an egg gallery in the inner bark. The beetles bring with them the spores of a blue-strain fungus. The fungus develops in the tissues of the tree and by its action aids the beetles in girdling the trees, which die

in a few weeks, Brannon says. Removing most of the fallen and damaged trees within the next year will considerably lessen the danger from insect attack, he adds.

Why? It has been proven statistically that a flyer is so much safer in the air than the person on the road that this company has taken this step, naturally, with the thought of increasing their business foremost, but as well, to shatter the illusion that flying is only for the birds.

This scheme comes at a time when we are running a fiscal year deficit of close to \$8 billion, and when the federal government's increases in tax revenues are substantially below its increases in expenditures.

The pending jumps in spending will, if Congress should be so foolish as to authorize them, be largely and perhaps wholely in welfare state projects. Then, in all probability. the weary old cycle would start again. There would be a wave of inflation, a further cheapening of the dollar which is now worth less than half of what it was before World War II, new wage demands supported by strikes in the major industries, and increased living costs of every kind.

The Soviets, who hope this country will collapse from internal economic disturbance, could hardly ask for more.

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
