The annual banquet and installation of officers of the Skookum Archers was held on Saturday evening, Dec. 29 at Johnny's Ranch.

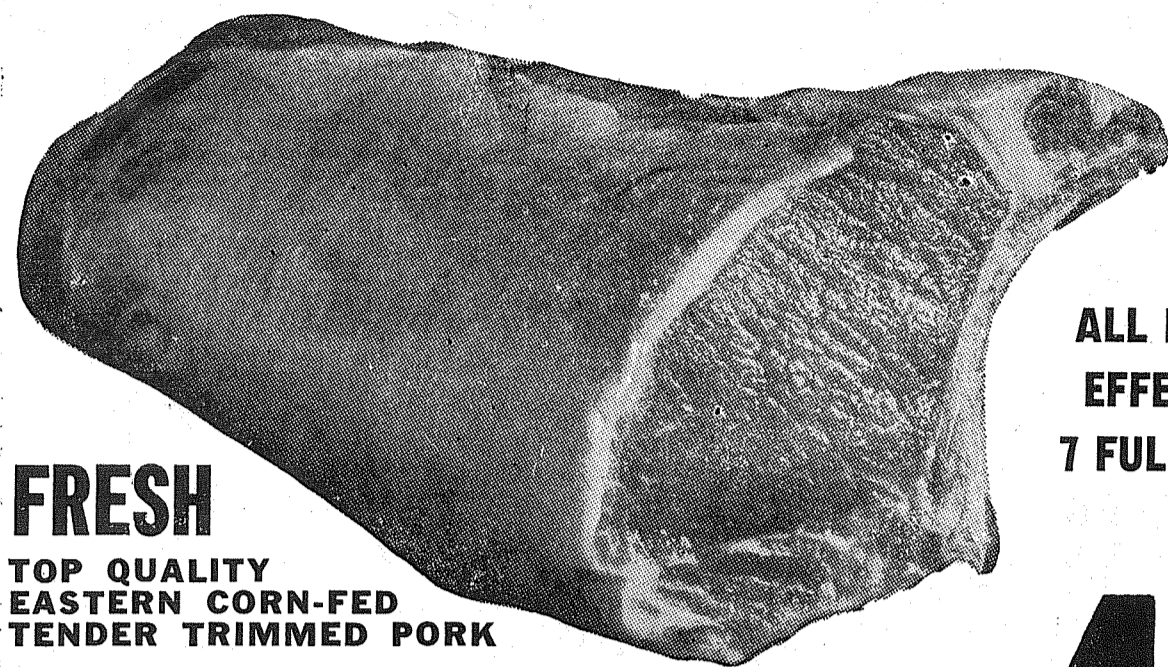

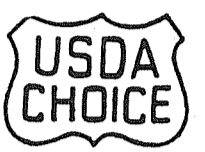
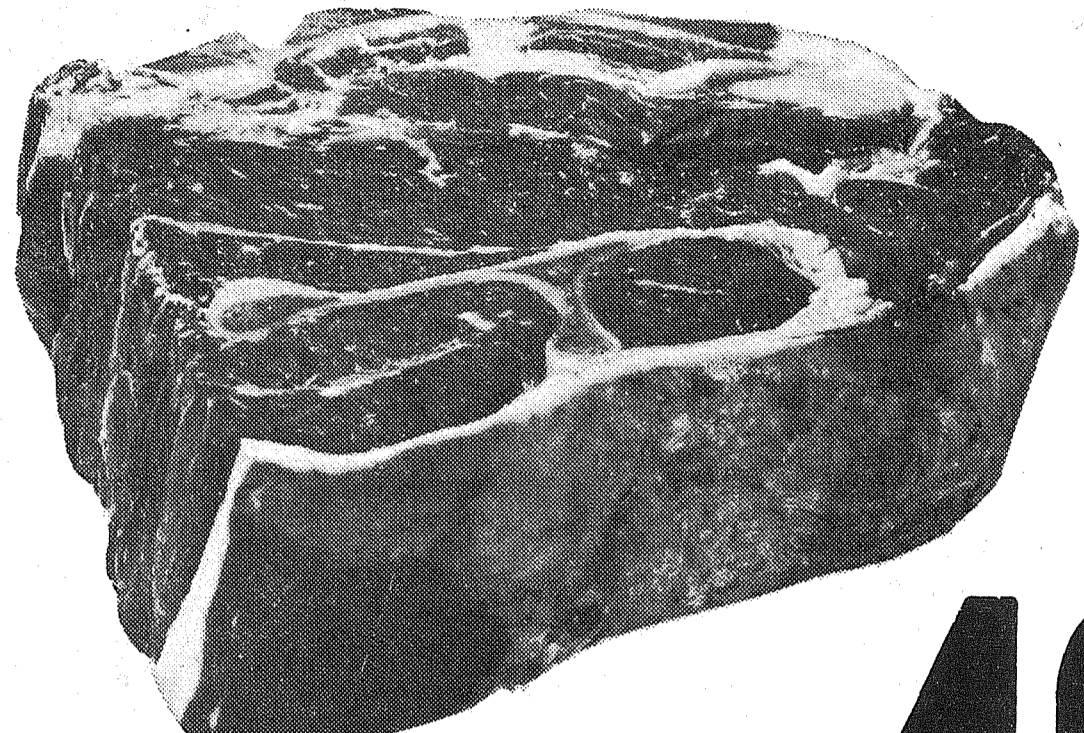

**Douglas-Fir Beetle  
A Threat To Storm  
Damaged Timber**

Storm-damaged and wind-thrown timber will provide ideal breeding grounds for the Douglas-fir beetle. The only sure way of preventing a Douglas-fir beetle attack is to remove such timber as soon as possible, warns County Agent David Klemperer. Preliminary estimates of timber downed by the October storm is 1,113,000 board feet in western Washington. The Douglas-fir beetle is the most important bark beetle enemy of Douglas fir and builds up in outbreak numbers in fallen and damaged trees. Serious epidemics have occurred under conditions which occur following a severe storm, explains D. H. Brannon, WSU extension entomology specialist. Under such conditions the beetle can multiply to tremendous numbers which then spread to healthy trees, thus providing a serious threat to timber stands. In attacking a tree, the beetles bore directly through the bark to the wood surface and then excavate an egg gallery in the inner bark. The beetles bring with them the spores of a blue-stain fungus. The fungus develops in the tissues of the tree and by its action aids the beetles in girdling the trees, which die in a few weeks, Brannon says. Removing most of the fallen and damaged trees within the next year will considerably lessen the danger from insect attack, he adds.

I object . . . I object to a Pierce County department head advocating compliance with a new method of assessing thru threat of coercion and duress, veiled or otherwise. I refer to a statement accredited in the daily paper to County Assessor Roy Craig in which he was quoted as saying, "We expect no problems on audits, for should any taxpayer refuse access to his books or records, an estimated assessment could be placed against the property sufficiently large to cause correct figures to be forthcoming." Now if this isn't taxation, collection and compliance under threat then I would like to hear your definition of it. Undoubtedly the assessor's office is acting within lawful rights in adopting a new method of assessment, leaving the work and burden of proof up to the taxpayer, but why was the last legislature that passed a bill to this effect so lax as not to set up a definite set of penalties for non-comformers instead of leaving the way open for the tax paying citizenry of an entire county to be openly threatened with retaliatory action for non-compliance. Mr. Commissioners and other duly elected officials . . . I'd like to have you convince me that Craig's statements were in good taste that this proposed action is the American way. There is always the chance that he was misquoted, but I doubt it very much for any reporter worth his salt would certainly be extremely sure of his ground on such a serious matter. Government and taxation by threats of this nature, no matter how trivial, cannot be tolerated if we are to remain a free nation. On the brighter side of life we have all enjoyed many splendid Christmas scenes during the recent holidays and admired many decorations. I'm sure. To me I saw the ultimate and most outstanding in Christmas decorations last Sunday evening going into Sydney, B.C. I happened to look off to my left towards Victoria and could scarce believe my eyes for from 1200 feet out over the water I could clearly see the lighted outline of what appeared to be a large castle type structure. I cut over that way and took a good look at one of the most splendid sights I've ever seen at night. The Parliament buildings of B.C. had been completely outlined with yellow lights. Each cornice and abutment was outlined giving the impression that a person was looking at some great cathedral from the past. I understand they plan to do the same again next year so would urge anyone with a yen for decorations of this type not to miss it. It's only an hour's flight up there and well worth every minute of it. Speaking of flying, it might interest some of you who stick fast to the old "one foot on the ground" method of transportation, to know that one major insurance company in Texas will, as of the first, reduce their insurance rates by 30% to all active pilots. Why? It has been proven statistically that a flyer is so much safer in the air than the person on the road that this company has taken this step, naturally, with the thought of increasing their business foremost, but as well, to shatter the illusion that flying is only for the birds. Top officials of the government are now planning to perform the neatest trick since Houdini developed his amazing illusions—to tax less and at the same time spend more. This scheme comes at a time when we are running a fiscal year deficit of close to \$8 billion, and when the federal government's increases in tax revenues are substantially below its increases in expenditures. The pending jumps in spending will, if Congress should be so foolish as to authorize them, be largely and perhaps wholly in welfare state projects. Then, in all probability, the weary old cycle would start again. There would be a wave of inflation, a further cheapening of the dollar which is now worth less than half of what it was before World War II, new wage demands supported by strikes in the major industries, and increased living costs of every kind. The Soviets, who hope this country will collapse from internal economic disturbance, could hardly ask for more. Girls . . . You'd do well to remember that the best way to keep your youth is not to introduce him to anybody.
